### Canadian-West Land Regulations

The sole head of a family of 17 males over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war and who has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta applicant must appear in person at Dominion Land Agency in St. James' District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties—six months residence upon and cultivation of land to extent of 20 acres in certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section a pre-emption. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Reside six months in each of three years after entering homestead can rent and cultivate 50 extra acres. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and set a fence upon 100 acres. When Dominion Lands are vested or posted for entry, settler's holder who have served overseas and have been honourably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agent's Office (but not Sub-Agent). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent. Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm laborers in Canada during 1917, as residence duties under certain conditions.

Rules Relating to Private Bills.  
36 All petitions for Private Bills must be presented within fourteen days after the commencement of the session exclusive of adjournment.  
37 No Private Bill shall be brought into the House, but upon a petition first presented, truly stating the case at the peril of the suitors for such Bill, and such petition must be signed by the said parties.  
38 A committee shall be appointed at the commencement of every Session consisting of five members of whom three shall be a quorum, to be denominated The Private Bills Committee to whom shall be referred every Private Bill, and no proceedings after the first reading shall be had upon such Bill until such Committee has reported thereon to the House.  
39 So soon as the Committee has reported any Bill, such Bill together with any amendments that may be suggested by the Committee, shall be printed at the expense of the parties who are suitors for such Bill and printed copies thereof delivered to the members before the second reading if deemed necessary by the Committee.  
40 No Bill for the particular interest of any person or persons, Corporation or Corporations or body or bodies of people shall be read a second time until all fees be paid for the same into the hands of the Clerk of the House.  
41 No Bill having for its object the vesting in or conferring upon any person or persons, Municipality or Body corporate the title to any tract of land shall be received or read in the House unless at least four weeks notice containing a full description of the land in question has been published in the Royal Gazette and one other newspaper in this Province of the intention of such person or persons Municipality or Body Corporate to apply for such Bill.

### Catholic Art and Artists

(By N. C. W. C. News Service.)  
When in the spring of 1920, the correspondent of the N. C. W. C. News Service described the success achieved in the Paris Salon des Beaux Arts by the Section of Religious Art, a fact was also laid out the fact that thenceforward there would be similar section every year. The great public favor which marked the first initiative would certainly plead for its continuance.

This was no rash forecast. After the lapse of only a few months a new exhibition of Modern Christian Art has been inaugurated in the Palais du Louvre, which is a government building. The Director General of Fine Arts represented the government at the inaugural ceremony, and presided. The exhibition was arranged by the St. John Society a Catholic organization established for the restoration and the spreading of religious art in all its various forms.

Since the Salon of last spring the St. John Society has been successful in assembling more than 500 new works presented by some 200 different artists, most of them Parisians, though there can be found in the number also an Englishman, a Belgian, a Spaniard and several Swiss.

All the different varieties of religious art are represented in the exhibition. There are paintings whose subjects and inspirations are altogether religious, such as Sacred Hearts, Virgins, Celestial Visions, and also large mural decorations intended to cover the entire walls of a chapel. The great artist, Georges Desvalliers, exhibits a similar composition called "Redemption," and Albert Besnard, director of the French School of Rome, sent a large picture of Pope Benedict XV.

There are also a great many specimens of the sculptor's art, representing Christ, Saints and Angels, intended as monuments for the dead of the war. One Ecce Homo an Helie in the Desert and a Prophet were sent by the statuaries, M. Paul Daric, who made the greatest "hit" in the last Salon. He is a former shepherd, who obtained "the great medal" in this year's Salon, and is accounted by all critics a sculptor of great genius.

Some architectural works are also to be seen—drawings for chapels, spires and churches now in course of erection, and drawings for religious buildings intended for the devastated areas. The exhibition includes specimens of stained glass, ironmongery, railings, communion tables, altars, lamps, crucifixes, candlesticks, a few altars, church furniture, richly engraved missals, gold and silverware, chasubles, sacerdotal ornaments inspired by mediaeval models, and, finally, lace, altar cloths and tapestries.

Besides the separate pieces or those classified by series of the same kind, there are also seen ensembles composed by groups of artists who carry on their work in common, under the supervision of one selected from their number. Accordingly, there are a chapel of the Holy Virgin, a chapel of St. John the Baptist, a chancel for a small village church—each the joint work of eight or ten different artists, namely, an architect, a sculptor and painters, glassworkers, cabinetmakers, etc.

The walls of the Holy Virgin Chapel are adorned with pictures recalling the litanies, each panel having been painted by a different artist. But unity is preserved in the ensemble, for all the artists who contributed to the works are adepts of the same school of painting, and the disciples of the same master.

Now a number of these groups have established permanent associations of Catholic artists working in common, or, at least, under the same direction. For that reason certain works on exhibition are not presented by private persons.

It is quite noteworthy that this inclination on the part of Catholic artists to assemble together and by a discipline and a strong desire to achieve the greatest possible beauty through the unity of their best efforts, tends to re-establish the former corporations and brotherhoods of the Middle Ages.

The esthetic ideas of the different studios mentioned in a preceding paragraph are quite advanced. Most of the works on exhibition are not reminiscent of the old traditional art forms. This is cause for admiration and even resentment to the number of visitors and critics. It is necessary to bear in mind that the name of this exhibition is merely "Exhibition of Modern Art," and to understand these artists need must be given to the statement of their acknowledged master, the great painter, Maurice Denis. He said:

"We study and consult the ancients, but we take great pains to avoid transporting their forms and imagination into our own work. Respectful of the arts of the past, of which we are very fond, we perceive in them the teaching of ratio, and try to find in them example of good taste, but, prompted by our personal faith, we elevate our imagination in order to discover new manifestations of these eternal truths which are the matchless substance of Christian art."—Catholic Bulletin.

### Remarkable Event In Pagan Japan

Rev. M. Steichen, P. F. M., tells of a conversion in the mission of Tokyo, Japan, that seems like a special mark of divine favor. The story is as follows:

"About a year ago, the pagan students of the Faculty of Medicine of the free university of Keio sent us an invitation to give a series of religious conferences in the halls of the university itself.

"About fifty students and several professors attended the opening conference.

"This event was remarkable because the medical world in Japan is less accessible than elsewhere to religious ideas. Moreover, the University of Keio is the one usually selected by the sons of the families devoted to pleasure, and open enemies of austere virtue.

"The key of this mystery was given us some days after. The organizer of these conferences was a man of twenty-four years. A pagan, like the rest of his fellow students, he had, for some time, experienced an irresistible desire to be instructed in the Catholic religion, of which a dear friend had spoken.

"The name of the young man, his birthplace, and his intrepid zeal, convince us that he may indeed have been a descendant of Paul Miki, one of the twenty-six martyrs who died upon the cross at Nagasaki, on February 5th, 1597.

"Miki at once decided to become a Catholic. He studied diligently, and in due time this spiritual son of a martyr received his baptism. In memory of his illustrious ancestor he took the name of Paul. So Paul Miki has again taken his place amongst us. Thanks to his unalterable zeal, the missionaries continue to instruct the students at the university, and their masters, several of whom have expressed an earnest desire to become Christian also.

"After more than three centuries has the blood of this glorious martyr finally begun to germinate in the soil of Japan, so arid, so ungrateful."

The Canadian Army Pay Office

A few statistics issued in connection with the passing of the Overseas Military Forces of Canada are interesting, as they throw a light on the work which was performed in administering the C. E. F. after it left the shores of Canada.

The total disbursements by the Department of the Overseas Paymaster-General (Brigadier-General J. G. Ross, of Montreal) amounted to approximately \$700,000,000. All the vouchers supporting these disbursements, duly audited, have been returned to Canada, and lodged in safe custody in Ottawa.

Britain's Eastern Commitments.

The outcry against Wastefulness which has been the feature of British political life for the last few months seems to have resulted in the lessening of some of the military commitments in the Middle East, to which the Government was pledged so lavishly last year.

The work of the overseas pay office of the Canadian army was a remarkable thing. Despite the vast volume of transactions, no complaint against the pay office was ever established, and few were made. Yet at one time a staff of nearly 1,700 officers and clerks was necessary in London to handle the work.

State Control of Prices

Newfoundland undertook a year ago to place the fish industry in the hands of Government. It was assumed that prices for cod and herring could be maintained; but the experiment has been a failure on the positive side.

The freedom of the Dardanelles is no longer a matter of first importance as it was prior to 1914, when there was free communication between Russia and the outside world. Today communication with Russia is of slight value to Britain, and the Straits primarily concern only those states which are dependent upon them for the marketing of their produce.

When it was announced at the beginning of this month that Archbishop Edward J. Hanna of San Francisco had appointed Rev. Dr. F. X. Morrison, for fifteen years pastor of St. Joseph's Church, Berkeley, to the important charge of St. Francis de Sales Church, Oakland, there was sorrow among the parishioners and citizens in the University City, and joy among the people of St. Francis de Sales.

Before his departure from Berkeley Dr. Morrison was tendered a farewell reception by the parishioners and friends of St. Joseph's. Out of appreciation for his work in Berkeley, Joseph Flynn presented Dr. Morrison with a handsome purse with sufficient funds to purchase a new automobile as a gift from the congregation, and also delivered a farewell address on the occasion.

Rules Relating to Private Bills. 36 All petitions for Private Bills must be presented within fourteen days after the commencement of the session exclusive of adjournment.

37 No Private Bill shall be brought into the House, but upon a petition first presented, truly stating the case at the peril of the suitors for such Bill, and such petition must be signed by the said parties.

38 A committee shall be appointed at the commencement of every Session consisting of five members of whom three shall be a quorum, to be denominated, The Private Bills Committee to whom shall be referred every Private Bill, and no proceedings after the first reading shall be had upon such Bill until such Committee has reported thereon to the House.

The sole head of a family or any male over 15 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war and who has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

When Dominion Lands are very hard to get for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agent's Office (but not Sub-Agent). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.

Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm laborers in Canada during 1917, as residence duties under certain conditions.
