



It does not follow that because a man has an itch for writing, and has proved a skilful assailant in a controversy when under the shelter of an assumed name, that he will be equally successful when using the editorial "we," and when the responsibility attaching to an utterance found in the columns which he controls will be saddled upon the editor, rightly or wrongly, as the case may be, Neither does it follow that a man whose communication is made presentable by the editors's revision is possessed of the judgment to carefully revise the writings of others. And again, simply because a man's overweening conceit makes him believe that he can write in an intertaining and instructive style, is, after all, no reason why the reading public should not turn from the drivel which he would foist upon them. He Attempts to Swim Throught the Whirl-pool and Fails—No Trace of the Body has yet been Discovered.

Niagara Falls, Ont., July 24.—At 4:05 p.m. Captain Webb commenced to swim the whirlpool rapids. He had passed the bend below the railway bridge when last seen, all right. A large crowd of citizens witnessed the daring feat from both sides of the river, and all have made a rush to the whirlpool.

Capt. Webb attempted the foothardy feat of swimming the whirlpool rapids this atternoon. He arrived from Buffalls by the Erie railway, and put up at

He was very reticent, saying very little, but upon being asked if he would go through it, he said: — At 4 o'clock I will make the attempt. He left the hotel about 3;39 p.m., and went went down the ferry hill and got finto a hoat with the ferryman, John McCloy, and was rowed out into the river, where he commenced to undress. From this point until he was into the midst of the great rapids, which rises to the height of 30 or 40 feet opposite the incline railway of the Whirlpool Rapids Park company, he was planly seen by people standing on the bridge. 


