If a range has become red from overheating or rust, before applying stove blacking, rub the surface well with vinegar and allow it to dry Blacken when the stove is slightly warm, not hot.

In washing curtains, add an ounce of gum arabic, dissolved and strained, to a gallon of starch water. This gives a crispness to the curtains, quite like the dressing they have when newly bought.

To clean and tighten cane chairs, soak them well with hot water and from the fire. use soap if necessary. Dry them in the open air and when thoroughly dry they will be as tight as when new, and perfectly clean.

Faded spots on wood, caused by heat or light, can be removed by rubbing with linseed oil or sweet oil mixed with an eighth part of alcohol. Old linen or flannel rags are best to use for this purpose.

The Ice Palace a Failure.

The Typhoid Scare.

Since its inauguration at the time when the typhoid epidemic was at its height, the Emergency Hospital has cared for one hundred and twenty cases of typhoid, and thirteen cases of other diseases, diagnosed at first as typhoid, and later developing into intestinal grippe or some relative disase. The death rate has been 5 per cent. on a general average. There is no congestion at present, and the hospital is able at present to accommodate all applications for admission. The statement has been issued by

Dr. Patch, the superintendent. Dr Patch says that because the typhoid fever died away in February it does not follow that it will not pay an unwelcome return visit. He blames the water supply wholly for the continued reccurrence of the disease.

The Sterilization Plant.

The new sterilization plant was installed a few days ago at the headquarters, and is giving every satisfaction. The water now appears much clearer, being free from muddy sediment and a yellow color.

The Tenant Law.

The tenant law here is a rather severe one as it gives too much power to the landlord and leaves the tenant with none on his side. The Herald is waging war on the injustice of the law and asks the citizens to fight to have it changed. The labour unions are going to fight it and ask that monthly leases be signed not yearly ones. A complete revision of the rental system is demanded. The City Council and the Quebec Legislature will be petitioned in the matter.



rial of Persons in St. John's:rson or persons having charge of the Church of England, Roman Catholic. General Protestant or Salvation Army Cemeteries or burial places of St. John's, shall permit the burial of any person without first having received a burial permit, signed by the Registrar General of Births, Marriages and Deaths, under a penalty

of Ten Dollars, or in default, Thirty days' imprisonment for each offence 2. The Registrar General of Births, Marriages and Deaths shall not issueany burial permit without first having received a certificate, on a form to be issued by him, and signed by a registered Medical Practitioner, certifying to the death of the person for whom burial is required, and setting forth as far as is known the cause of

death. NOTE.—The Registrar General has supplied all Medical Practitioners with forms of Death Certificate. In the case of persons who have died without medical attendance, because of inability to pay for such services, the relatives or friends will apply to the Magistrate or Clerk of the Peace, who will arrange with a Medical Practitioner to issue the necessary
