"It will be seen that the Board hav- | back. ing estimated its income from Game and Fishery Licenses at \$9,100.00, received only the sum of \$5,910 from these sources, being an aggregate shortage of \$3,190.00."

The sources of the income of the Board appear to be under the Inland Fisheries Act. 1910, money received in respect of licenses for the killing of game and for the taking of fish. and money granted by the Legislature. This latter source has not been tapped so far, as the Legislature has granted no money to the Board. Without such Legislative grants the come of the Board can be estimated at \$6,000 on the basis of experience of the first year of its existence The expenditure of last year was \$10,545.41. If these rates of income

and expenditure prevail in future years, the Legislature will be called upon to subsidize the Board at the rate of from \$4,000 to \$5,000. The nest egg of \$180,186, the balance of the Game License Trust, having been expended, will not be again avail-able, and it cannot be expected that the public or the Auditor General will pass again without serious protest any irregularity of the Government

in making an illegal appropriation of from \$4,000 to \$5,000 to meet a deficit, as they made the illegal appropriation of \$3,000 to meet the deficit of the first year's work of the Board.

The issues at present seems to be: (1) Is the work of the Board worth a subsidy of \$5,000 a year from the Legislature; or (2) should the Board be put in a position to raise \$10,000 a year from those who enjoy the sport the Board protects; or (3) should the Board be limited to the present means of raising taxation from foreign sportsmen and be giv-en notice to live within their income? The main object of the Board seems

to be to preserve salmon rivers. Over \$10,000 was spent by the Board last year. Three thousand three hundred and sixty-nine salmon were taken out of these rivers. That seems to be a high price for salmon. It would not matter if the salmon killers were paying it all, but it is a matter of comment when the Government makes a payment of \$3.000 on Executive authority, and may be called upon en illegal payment of \$5,000 for this

season's work. We shall be glad to hear an expres-sion of opinion on these matters.



New Locomotive Boiler
