I have the honor to inform you hat the Government has had under consideration your letters to the rime Minister, dated January 15th, 912, and March 11th, 1912, in relation o the establishment of a car-ferry or frigerator steamer service between e West Coast of Newfoundland and the American Continent for the car-riage and transport of fresh fish and other products, and I am directed to say that in the event of your forming ary, 1913, for the purpose of establishing and operating the said service, composed of capitalists of undoubted financial standing, the Government will be prepared (subject to approval and ratification by the Legislature) to enter into a contract with said Company containing the following

1. The Company may lay out, con struct and operate a Railway from South West Arm, Green Bay, to Humbermouth in Bay of Islands and be-tween such other points in Newfoundland as may be agreed upon. 2. The Company may enter upon any Crown Lands, or into
