New Chief of Staff.

General Sir Archibald Murray, who has just been appointed Chief of the Imperial General Staff, is one of our youngest and most builliant generals. Fifty-five years of age, he entered the Army at the age of nineteen, and at twenty-seven was a captain.

General Murray first saw active service in the Zululand campaign of 1888. 'His greatest experience of war -excepting the present one, of course -was, however, in South Africa, In the South African War he gained a great reputation for handling America and which has never taken men. He was not only mentioned a number of times in despatches, but he was awarded the D.S.O., added seven clasps to his medals for the

battles in which he took part, and emerged from the war a full colonel. From 1907 to 1912 Sir Archibald was Director of Military training, and from the latter year till the war broke out he was Inspector of Infan-

As soon as war was declared. General Murray was appointed to be Chief of the staff to Sir John French, who stated in one of his despatches that "Sir Archibald Murray has worked day and night unceasingly with the utmost skill, self-sacrifice and devo-tion."

As Chief of the Imperial General Staff, General Murray will be responsible for the choosing and organization of the best military brains for running the various campaigns we are fighting. Part of his duties, too, will be to train the officers of the new armies, one of the most important duties of any at the present time, for much depends upon the way an army is officered.

Sir Archibald is exceedingly popular in the Army, for he has won his high position through sheer hard high position work, and not influence.






