FREE STATE CONSTITUTION.

LONDON, June 7. A revised draft of the Irish Constitution was brought to London to-day by Arthur Griffith, President of the Gaelic League. The Evening News, which the Irish remain within the Empire in the way as the Dominions. "Decisions of the Privy Council," says the paper, "shall be final in all constitutional matters concerning the State, subject to certain conditions. The assent of the Crown must be obtained to all legislation in the State. The oath of allegiance shall be the Anglican form, but may be observed." The News says it understands there have been modifications of earlier provisions in the draft which gave the Free State a control over foreign affairs of the Imperial Government was to-day, the News asserts, in respect of the Free State.

CHINA FACING WORSE SPLIT THAN EVER.

PEKING, June 7. Developments of the last twenty-four hours indicated early to-day that China, which a few days ago seemed on the verge of a unified Government, located here, was in grave danger of a worse split than ever with North and South drifting only to civil war.

EARL OF YPRES.

LONDON, June 7. The title of Field Marshal French was gazetted yesterday as Earl of Ypres, dropping the name French. Very few British peers have chosen the name of a foreign place as a title.

RELIEF MEASURES FOR VETERANS.

TORONTO, June 7. Riley's army of unemployed veterans of war which marched on Ottawa to demand that the government do something for them, have returned to Toronto by special cars supplied by the Government. Premier King and the Minister of Labor have promised

PORTUGAL STORM SWEEP.

LISBON, June 7. Portugal has been swept during the last few days by violent thunderstorms which have done incalculable damage in the country districts. SUGAR JUMPS IN ST. JOHN.

ST. JOHN, N.B., June 7. The wholesale price of Granulated Sugar has advanced twenty cents per cwt. here.

30 DAYS TO TAKE VOTE.

CINCINNATI, June 7. Labor leaders say it will take thirty days to spread and canvass the strike vote authorized yesterday by the eleven Railway Brotherhoods and Organizations. Strike ballots are returnable June 30th. About 1,300,000 workers will be affected if the unions decide to strike again the recent wage reductions. The paralysis of American railways on July 1st is considered a possibility.

ROYAL MARRIAGE TO-DAY.

BELGRADE, June 7. Princess Marie of Roumania was making final preparations for her marriage to-morrow to King Alexander of Jugo-Slavia. The Royal pair will occupy the palace which has been unoccupied since the assassination of King Alexander and Queen Draga in 1903. The Serbians, believing the Palace accursed, have begged Marie never to cross the threshold.

STRIKE BALLOT ORDERED.

CINCINNATI, June 7. A triple-barrelled strike ballot calling for a vote of the 400,000 railway shopmen of the country on three separate questions was ordered by the executive council of the six shop craft unions here to-day.

NEGOTIATIONS TO CONTINUE.

HAZELTON, Pa., June 7. Although the Anthracite Mine Workers General Strike Committee rejected the operators' proposal for the appointment of a Commission to arbitrate questions on which miners and operators are deadlocked, provision was made for the continuance of negotiations by the appointment of a sub-committee to draft proposals.

NEW CHIEF TRAFFIC MANAGER.

OTTAWA, June 7. W. E. Campbell, lately freight expert advising the Government Railways Department and Railway Commission, has been appointed chief traffic officer for the Dominion, succeeding the late James Hardwell.

HOSPITAL GUARD.

LONDON, June 7. A message sent by the Mother Superior of Mater Hospital to King George informing him of an attack on the institution at a time when the streets were occupied by Crown forces, resulted in a military guard being stationed at the Hospital to-day, says a despatch from Belfast. "This prompt action has given great satisfaction to the Catholic population of the city and also to the married patients of the institution," the Mother Superior was quoted as saying.

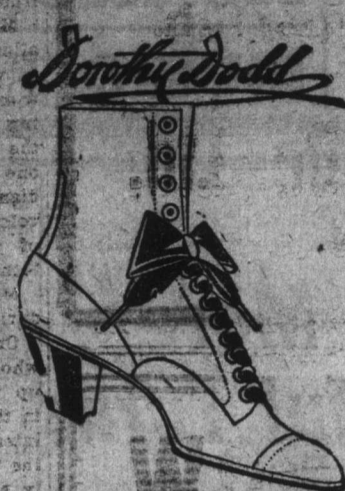

NEWFOUNDLAND BRANCH.

The seventh annual meeting of the Women's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church opened yesterday in Govar St. Church. At the morning session officers for the coming year were elected and other business transacted. The afternoon session was held at 2 o'clock. The chair was taken by Mrs. Eugene Lindsay. After opening devotional exercises Mrs. Lindsay introduced to the large gathering of ladies the guest of honor, Mrs. H. A. Lavell, B.A., of Kingston, Ont., President of the Board of Managers for Canada, Bermuda and Newfoundland. Mrs. Lindsay mentioned that this was the seventh year that the Newfoundland Branch had been in existence, and that seven was a lucky number, so that it was a propitious time for Mrs. Lavell's visit. Mrs. Lavell had just come from a sojourn in the beautiful land of Acadia, and although we might not have all the beauties of that land to show her, we nevertheless had loving hearts in Newfoundland, and accorded her a most hearty welcome. Mrs. Lavell in reply said that she did not need to come to Newfoundland to learn about the loving hearts there, but that she had already heard before the session of the kindness of the people. Mrs. (Rev. J. A.) Rogers had told her about them, and had sent her love to all her friends in Newfoundland. Mrs. Lavell brought cordial greetings from the Women's Board, and said that Mrs. Ross, ex-President, would have been delighted, had it been possible, to be with them. She also spoke of the difficult position she had to fill in following Mrs. Ross, who had been President of the Board so long, and had filled the position so acceptably. The delegates should not be discouraged because the financial returns for the year had not been as good as they had hoped. Such difficulties might only turn their thoughts to God. Let the results be accepted in faith and love, and all the workers go forward steadily and cheerfully, remembering that, after all, money was not everything. After Mrs. Lavell's address Miss Marquette Mitchell sang a solo, "My Task," which was very beautifully rendered. Mrs. (Rev. T. B.) Darby then welcomed the delegates. She said, in part, I welcome you all most heartily to the city of St. John's and to our church. We have welcomed many similar gatherings in the past, but I am sure we have never extended a welcome to a more influential, earnest band of workers engaged in the very highest form of service. In replying for the delegates, Mrs. Howse, of Grand Bank, thanked the St. John's W.M.S. for their cordial welcome to their homes, city and church. She said that they deemed it a great privilege as well as a great pleasure to be fellow-workers in the cause of their Master and Lord. She hoped that all the delegates would go back to their homes with firmer faith in God to face the difficulties that might lie before them. Miss G. Parsons, ex-Secretary of the Branch, was then asked to come forward with the delegates, also Mrs. W. G. Currie, Grand Falls, both active members of the W.M.S. Mrs. J. Peters then read greetings from the Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Branches, and several local Auxiliaries. Dr. Fenwick, President of Conference, extended greetings. Mrs. David Johnson, of St. Andrew's W.M.S., and Mrs. Lewis, of St. Thomas's Home Missionary Society, also spoke. The minutes of the morning session were read by Mrs. R. Duff, Recording Secretary. Miss M. Howse was accepted as a candidate for the field. Mrs. Whigge, who had returned, has again applied and been accepted. A paper was read by Mrs. R. Duff, "The Message of the

Mountains Float on Earth's Interior

INTERESTING THEORY ADVANCED BY SCIENTISTS.

Mountains float. Cubic feet of rock weigh less, on an average, than the valley. The mountains held up by the lighter material of earth's crust floating under the sea. This has been proved by recent investigations by the division of geology of the United States coast and geodetic survey, under the direction of William Bowie, chief of the division, and his predecessor, Prof. John Hayford, now with Northwestern University.

It has been found that the crust is about 60 miles in thickness and near that depth, probably the material of the earth is so plastic that it acts for long time as a fluid. The earth's crust floats on a layer of plastic material. If the earth's crust is pushed up by vertical forces with the base of each block at a depth of 60 miles below sea level, an area of the basis of the block the same as and as large as the square, these blocks would have the same mass; that is, they would be the same.

By means of the geodetic observations by the United States coast geodetic survey, the weight of the blocks have been found to be approximately equal. This result has been suspected for decades but Dr. Hayford and Dr. Hayford have proved it.

Geological science will be profoundly changed by this discovery. It is known the mountain masses are due to the presence of lighter material in the earth's crust under the sea and that the ocean bottoms are higher because the material under them is heavier or heavier than the average.

Dr. Bowie concludes that there is no tendency for the mountain masses to break down through the action of the sea, as they are not extra heavy. They are like the portions of the crust projecting out of the water, which are held up by the ice which is below in the water. The icebergs float so does the mountain.

Dr. Bowie holds that, as mountain systems are in areas, which were very low in elevation, mountains were caused by a swelling of the crust in the earth's crust under the sea. The lessening of the density of the crust in a column of sixty miles long, elevate the area about 2000 feet, a change in density, due to physical or chemical changes, is within reasonable limits.

As the mountains, plateaus and the ocean areas from equilibrium there must have been a transfer of material from the columns of earth's crust under an area where elements are deposited, back to the area from which the material was lifted by water and wind. Dr. Bowie believes that the flow of material in place just below the crust, that is, somewhat below 60 miles.

Forest Fire Out.

RAIN STILL FALLING.

The forest fire which has been burning in the neighbourhood of Bay Falls is now out. Rain fell all night and this morning completely extinguishing the flames. The residents of the villages endangered by the fire have returned to their homes. Active work in fighting the fire was done by the residents and men from two companies.

Hunting for Diamonds Full of Peril.

William J. LaVarre, of New York and Washington, an explorer who through all his life has had a burning urge to prospect for diamonds, has just returned to New York from a trip through South America and New Guinea, bringing with him the largest diamond ever found on this side of the Atlantic.

This diamond, the explorer believes, may lead to beds of great carbon deposits, a diamond source which might rival the output of the famous Kimberley Fields of South Africa.

The rough gem will be polished and cut for the market. It is thirty and a quarter carats and in rough measure seven-eighths of an inch from point to point.

Mr. LaVarre calls his jewel "an alluvial diamond." That means that it was carried to the jungle earth from which he withdrew it by rushing water; and it is his theory that the Essequibo and Mazaruni rivers, one or the other, or both, brought the diamond down from the craters of volcanoes in which the terrific heat of erupted lava crystallized carbon formation.

Mr. LaVarre had many adventures during his journeys in the jungle.

One day he and twenty-five natives who were of his party were paddling up the Mazaruni River. They were in the midst of a 250 mile trip to the interior of British Guiana, and along the way were on the alert and casually prospecting for precious stones or minerals. LaVarre had the diamond fever then. The carmen were paddling automatically along, jargoning to each other, and the explorer's eyes were on the banks of the stream.

Gliding gracefully through the water, a long, sleek, river monster—a giant water boa—came toward the boat with its unwatching passengers. With a leap from the water the boa flung itself at the boat. The terrified and panic-stricken natives, not knowing what else to do, cast themselves overboard into the river. They swam in all directions. This mass flight disconcerted the boa constrictor somewhat, but the monster soon recovered its wits and, leaving LaVarre sitting quietly in the boat preparing his gun for action, slipped its long body over the low side of the vessel and set out in pursuit of one or two of the comparatively slow swimming human beings.

A LUCKY SHOT.

One, slower than the rest, went in to new panic when he turned and saw the slither form gliding menacingly near behind him. His panic made him forget to swim for an instant and he went down.

Then a shot rang out and the body of the boa went limp. LaVarre's aim had been good. His bullet had crashed through the head of the reptile, and after a little while the natives came back to their boat, which was drifting for lack of man power.

Mr. LaVarre said the snake seemed to him, as he watched its threatening antics and as he prepared to shoot, the biggest reptile in the world. But when its carcass was recovered from the stream and the explorer set to work to explore it the boa turned out to be a paltry eighteen feet in length.

Nothing frightens the native so greatly as a snake. Consequently they avoid all places where they think snakes might be in hiding.

LaVarre's chief hunter once disclosed the fact that he had never seen a large snake nor even a jaguar during all his days of wandering under the canopy of the jungle. And the jungle is overrun with wild beasts, and reptiles. The explorer has captured many rare specimens and presented them to museums and zoological institutions.

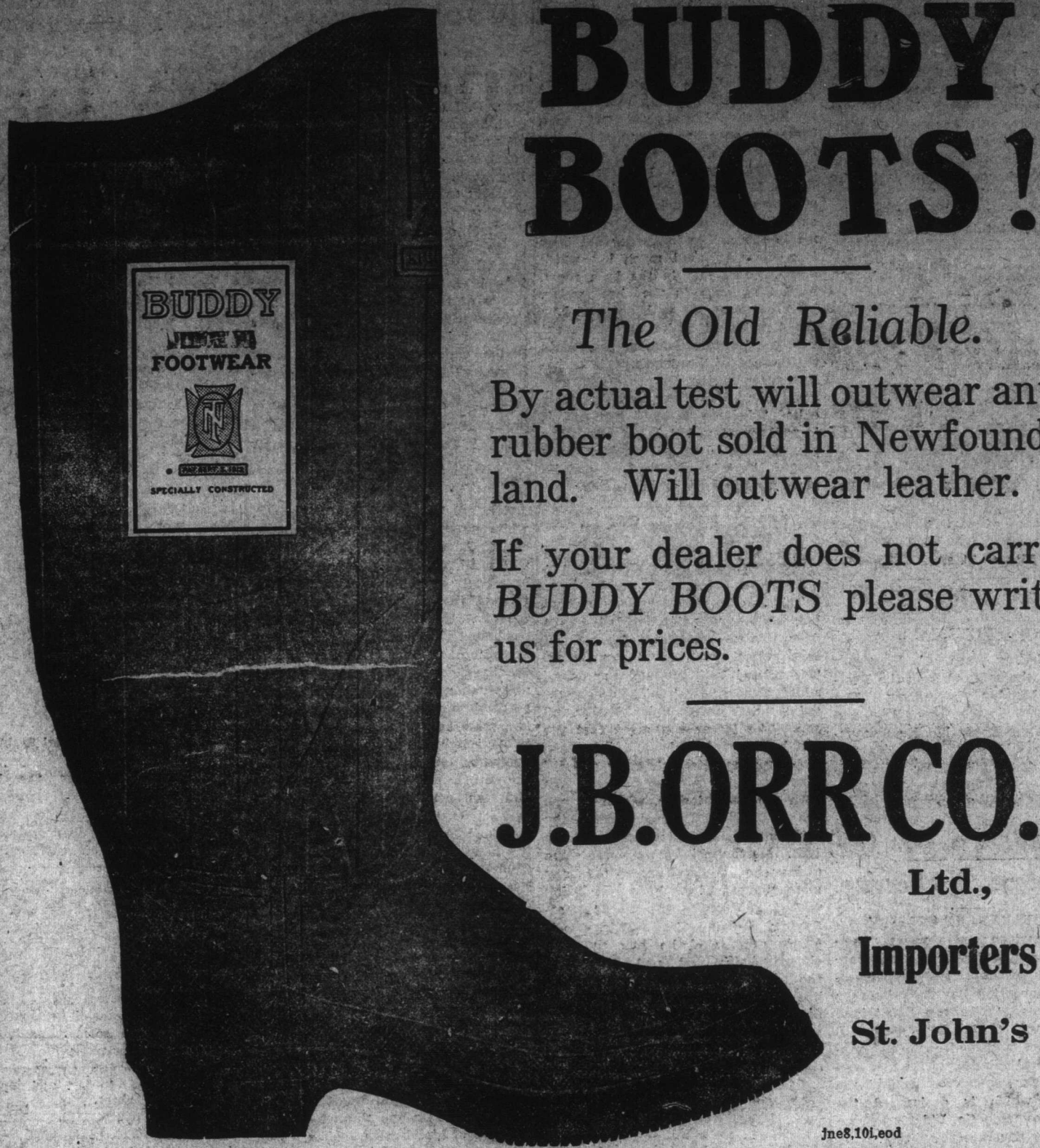
On another occasion LaVarre had a battle with a big snake in the jungle—this time a venomous one—and was bitten. He went through a terrible ordeal and his life was on the brink of going more than once before he recovered from the effects of the bite.

But to get back to diamonds. The name given to the large diamond LaVarre found is "The Kurupung." It resembles nothing more than its rough state than a disproportionate lump of green bottle glass. "If you came across it in the street," he says, "you would knock it out of the way."

Then he goes on to describe it: "When it is examined closely one sees a certain oily sheen which is very typical of the rough diamond. Its shape is octahedron and, measuring seven-eighths of an inch from apex to apex, it is peculiarly heavy for so small an object."

TEETH VERSUS STONE. The bushman's idea that everything but diamonds can be bitten with the teeth still holds good. Down in the bush the natives bite all of the stones they are doubtful about, and those that break under the pressure of molars are thrown away. If the teeth break, the stones are kept for further examination.

"The results of my last expedition into the jungle make me feel that perhaps the diamonds which are certainly there are of volcanic origin. The character of the Kurupung is alluvial. While it was held fast in the clutches of solid rock it had been worn by friction. This diamond was so ex-

posed that a groove was worn in it by loose material "where this big stone was found a thousand other stones have been eroded from the ground mass and spread over a large area of the jungle floor by the almost perpetual rains. Then they were swept into the streams flowing thru British Guiana."

LaVarre believes he is getting nearer and nearer always to the true source of the diamond deposits by the processes of elimination which he follows. He has found many small diamonds and much imperfect formation of the near diamond species.

Whoever, in stream and near there, he has found no gems he has eliminated. Now he has come down to two streams in the beds of which diamonds are lying, and he hopes to follow these rivers to a common head and there find the diamond held he seeks.

DIAMONDS OF VARIOUS COLORS. The diamonds he has found vary in color—white, pink, blue, yellow, green, and black—and their shapes range from spherical to flat and include some practically perfect diamond shaped gems. The largest South American stone on record pre-

vious to his find was only half as large, weighing but fourteen carats. It was discovered by a "spook-knocker," a huge native whose ordinary vocation was something like that of a butcher.

On his prospecting trips Mr. LaVarre's interest in natural history, and the animal life of the jungle has influenced him to seek and capture many rare specimens of monkeys, reptiles and birds. These trophies include the strange, long-haired, short-tailed monkeys known as the Uakari, the vampire bat, and an odd and ugly turtle called the Mata-Mata. This last is a puzzle to scientists, who have had much difficulty in solving the age of the reptile.

"The Mata-Mata is so ugly," says Mr. LaVarre "that all other creatures flee whenever it approaches."

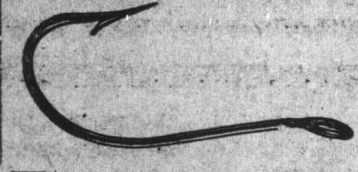

When I was a little boy, I remember being offered 5 cents for every half hour I spent at the piano. When I grew older this was unnecessary, but now after many years of music lessons I can only play "God Save the King" with one finger. Edward Sherry (James Liddy) had taken no lessons but successfully maintained himself as a professor of music. He was assisted by his sweetheart, Lulu, a dancer. (Miss Marguerite Torrey) who had a number of pupils in the terpsichorean art and these frequently performed to the delight of the audience. Enter, one Theophilus Sherry (Billy Clifton) who is described as a connoisseur of Greek Art which is another way of saying he knew nothing about it. He is accompanied by his niece Yvonne from the Convent (Ruth Oswald.) Edward Sherry, his nephew, had so filled the old man up with his prowess as a pianist, that he simply had to come and see the family genius and his wife and the children. The son of the President of Venezuela (Henry White) made one of the children and Lulu became the other. An Irish housekeeper who talked like a Swede (Clara Thropp) made an excellent wife for poor Edward, although she was constantly watched by her husband Philippe (Teddy Wilde). Complications naturally ensue, but straighten themselves out in time to let everything end happily. Miss Ruth Oswald seemed to know a lot for a Convent girl, and frequently demonstrated her fondness for division following on James Liddy's definition of a kiss as "Nothing divided by two." I am neither a mathematician nor a prohibitionist, but I did not consider her song "I'm alright" in good taste. Otherwise she was alright; Miss Torrey gave a real exhibition of her dancing ability for the first time; and her light and graceful movements were greatly admired. This applied particularly to the Grecian Classical Dance which she gave as a specialty. The song "Every little movement has a meaning of its own" was particularly catchy. Miss Thropp gave an excellent performance and Miss Rennie as Pepita, the lady of the dagger, was also quite good. Mr. James Liddy is at his best in Madame Sherry and the manner in which he took advantage of his niece's fondness for division brought a blush to the faces of every uncle in the audience, coupled with a desire for as pretty a niece. Billy Clifton was as noisy as ever, and was a constant source of amusement. His frequently ejaculation "I'm surprised" ought to become a catchword shortly. Mr. Henry White, played very well and Teddy Wilde was ridiculously funny. Mr. Thomas Wall was in splendid voice when he rendered "I fear no foe" and "The Bells of St. Mary's" during the interval between acts. He was loudly applauded. The Allied Debt to the United States.

IS IT OWING IN EQUITY?

By T. B. MACAULAY, President Sun Life Assurance Company of Canada. (Montreal Daily Star.)

I have read with much interest the Star editorial on the British debt. As the United States demands payment of interest at least on the money due her, Britain has no option but to demand similar payment from the countries that in turn owe her.

When considering this problem, however, we are faced with a fundamental question. That the debt is technically due, no one denies. But is it morally and reasonably due from the standpoint of equity? Let us look into its merits.

Most of us, I think, consider that even from the outbreak of the war the men of Britain and of the Dominions were fighting the battles of the United States, as well as of our own Empire, and of our Allies. We have all heard Americans also express that opinion. Though it took some years for their people, as a whole, to recognize that fact, it was as true in August, 1914, as it was later when the gallant boys of both nations were fighting side by side. Germany aimed at world domination, and had she won the war, her political and commercial control of all Europe, all Africa, and much of Asia, would have been at once established. She would have been the Colossus of the world. Her eyes were already fixed covetously on South America, and development there would have followed rapidly. With the naval, military and financial resources then at her back, what would she have cared for the Monroe doctrine?

It would, however, be hardly reasonable to claim that the United States should have entered the war at its outbreak, for the people had to be wakened. It is doubtful if they were sufficiently informed as to the merits of the struggle prior to the Lusitania incident. What would have happened, however, if the United States had intervened then? The war would have been shortened by two years, millions of lives and tens of billions of dollars would have been saved, the condition of the world to-day would not be what it is, and this problem of the war debts would, in all probability, not have arisen.

When the United States at last threw its vast power into the scales, that great addition to the cause of civilization and righteousness was decided.

For whom did the Allies sacrifice the lives of their men before the United States entered the war, and from that date until the American troops arrived? For all who did not wish a German world, for all free people, including Britain, Canada and the United States.

The war was fought not merely with lives, but with money. The financial burden fell chiefly on Britain. She had to advance huge sums to her Allies. Had she not done so, Germany would have achieved a speedy victory, and the turn of the United States would then have come. Much of this money was spent in that country. Never before in the history of the world did any nation have such a stupendous stream of wealth poured into its lap. And this money was the life blood of nations who were giving their all, but not for themselves alone.

If we are right in believing that the United States had a great stake in the war before she entered it as afterwards, we may well ask whether it is fair that the Allies should bear alone the crushing financial burden of even those earlier years, during which the United States accumulated much of the wealth of the world. Surely their awful losses in life, before the United States lost a single man, was enough of a handicap.

But the case is much stronger. The huge sums borrowed in the United States before April, 1917, are not in question. The debts we are considering are credits granted to the Allies by the American Government after it had itself entered the war. These advances were chiefly for munitions with which to fight the acknowledged enemy of the United States. Had the American armies been then in France, these guns and shells could have been used by them, but the Americans were not yet there in force, and the Allied armies used them for the benefit of all. In doing this, these French, British and other troops saved the Allied and American cause from defeat. Because American shells were fired against the common enemy by British soldiers (great numbers of whom gave their lives in doing so), does it follow that they must also be paid for by British taxpayers?

It may perhaps be claimed that part of the money was used to feed the Allied troops and peoples. Can men fight, and at the same time cultivate their fields, or work at other occupations? We used to hear of American "Soldiers of the Soil," and were told that these men were fighting as

A "Help Wanted" ad. suggests a different environment, but one requir-

ing an almost equally versatile applicant.

The small apartment is granted to be desirable, but surely there is an exaggerated, Alice in Wonderland, look about this advertisement, which appeared under "Apartments" Wanted.

WANTED—Second-hand safe to buy or rent, having outside dimensions not less than 55 inches high, 44 inches deep, and 44 inches wide.

"Articles to Exchange" provide some odd side-lights on human nature—the things which have grown tiresome, the new delights expectantly sought, as in the three following ads. The first would seem to indicate a practical turn of mind.

PIANO, upright, splendid condition, will sell or exchange for good flock of poultry and portable houses.

The next suggests a more artistic temperament, weary of the tuneless sewing-machine:

SEWING machine, Singer, the very latest, used only three months, will exchange for phonograph.

While the third is also an aspiration after art—the advertiser is ready to give the earth, or so much of it as he owns, for the pictured evening at home with the gramophone.

VICTROLA—For good machine will give dead to my fifty-foot lot, "Diamond Island," Lake Muskoka. No encumbrance.

So one might go on at great length with "Want Ad." vagaries. Instead one hopes that all the wishes and projects which seem so odd to the unlightened outsider, may result satisfactorily to those who so trustfully set them forth in print.

Singing for Health.

It is acknowledged by most people that the human voice is the most beautiful and certainly the most wonderful musical instrument in the world.

Having attained the rudiments of breath control, we are then in a better condition to commence the actual voice production. The attempt to produce long-sustained notes on each of the vowels, commencing with the broad "AH," will reveal in a surprising manner how little under control is the normal person's voice.

The car is geared to make a speed of 50 to 60 miles an hour, but can be geared to a higher speed. Women Doctors.

It was not so many years ago that a woman physician was unknown, and if a woman proposed to study medicine and practice, a convention of men would pass resolutions condemning any such aspiration. Women have always had to fight the supposed superiority of men. The lower the state of male intelligence, the more convinced he was that he was mentally as well as physically, the nobler being. It was only by force of demonstration that woman established the fact of her better sense and wiser judgment.


The battle of women for recognition as physicians has been a long and difficult one. It was but a few years ago that every medical school in the world barred women from a doctor's degree. France, Germany, Switzerland, and Italy have been the most liberal in offering medical education to women, and it is to the credit of a New York hospital that it was the first to open its doors to graduate women physicians on the same terms as men.

There is every reason why a woman should be more successful than a man in the practice of medicine. She is

more painstaking, more conscientious, more careful, more sympathetic. In those institutions where she is equally favored as a student, she almost invariably attains a higher average of standing than her male classmates. Her sex is a distinct advantage in her treatment of both children and women, for she is naturally able to gain their confidence and establish their trust more promptly than one of the opposite sex.


During the war women doctors and women nurses showed that they were able to undergo privations and endure hardships of the most trying character. Their work in the hospitals and camps, and even at the stations close to the front, proved them able to perform every duty, and answer every demand that was made of them.

Gradually the woman in medicine is establishing her right to recognition. Slowly, as she has gained everything, she is making her way by sheer pluck and actual proof. The time will come when she will be as thoroughly and rightly recognised as she now is in art, in astronomy, in chemistry, in the schools, and in the home. Certainly, she ought to be qualified to sustain and prolong it.







Tarvia Prevents Dust; Tarvia Preserves Roads.

In the United States and Canada Tarvia is the standard by which all other road-binders and preservatives are judged.

This layer of sand will prevent horses from slipping and Automobiles from skidding and will prolong the life of the road surface. Broken stone is not as satisfactory or as economical as sand for this purpose.

A road after being treated with "Tarvia B" does not become muddy in rainy weather, but sheds the water and dries off quickly after the rain, leaving the road in admirable condition while untreated roads are still deep with mud.

"Tarvia B" surfacing should be applied annually but only when roads are in good condition and free from surplus dust. All holes and depressions should be repaired with fine broken stone and "Tarvia K-P."

When "Tarvia B" is applied by mechanical sprinker, care should be taken to have men with brooms and hand sprinklers go over the ground so that excess "Tarvia B" may be brushed out and not allowed to run waste and so that bare spots be treated and the entire road surface secured.

ROYAL ROMANCE IN NEAR EAST, WEDDING TAKES PLACE TO-DAY.

King Alexander of Jugoslavia, second son of the late King Peter of Serbia, became heir apparent to his father's throne in 1909 when his elder brother, Prince George, renounced his rights as a sequel to a bitter press campaign in which an almost endless list of outrages were charged against him. The campaign was intensified by charges that the royal youngster had murdered one of his servants during a fit of anger. Serbia, upon its liberation from the Austrians, became the predominant state in the organization of Jugoslavia, therefore it was certain that its Prince Regent, as Alexander had been designated when King Peter retired in 1914, was headed straight for the new throne. He had won the respect and esteem of the Balkans in many ways, but chiefly through his efforts to unite the Serbs, Croats and Slovenes, formerly under the Austrian yoke. These endeavors won him the title of "Peacemaker." His action in appointing governors for Serbia, Montenegro, Slavonia, Bosnia, Balmatia and Croatia, also was warmly approved.

DEVOTED TO ALLIES.

King Peter died in August, 1921, at the age of 76, and Alexander, then suffering from an attack of appendicitis in a Paris hospital, was proclaimed his father's successor at Belgrade. King Alexander was born in 1888. As a youth he was frail and sickly, but his career began to give more promise after several years of hard campaigning at the head of Serbia's army. His education was completed at Petrograd and his first real military training was obtained in the Balkan War of 1912. Throughout the World War he was devoted to the Allied cause. It was Alexander that ordered the mobilization of Serbia's army and personally led it into battle. He was severely wounded in the fighting around Belgrade before his troops were forced to evacuate the city, and barely escaped capture at Nish, where he set up a capital for a brief period before the Austrians entered. Several attempts were made to assassinate him during his regency, and after he became king. The latest of these occurred in June, 1921, and resulted in the death of one person and the wounding of six others. Some 14,000 persons were arrested as a result of the plot.

THE BRIDE.

The young Princess Marie, called the prettiest Princess in Europe, is only 22 years of age. She is the second daughter of King Ferdinand and Queen Marie of Rumania, and is not well known for the reason that her life has been spent quietly at home except for a short period in England, where she attended school. Her mother, born an English Princess, has one of the most interesting personalities to be found among the crowned heads of Europe. While she was charged with attempting to build up a tremendous power by marrying her children to the greatest political advantages, she has stated emphatically that the betrothal of Marie was the result of a genuine love match. "It is a mistake and unfair to say that it is a political marriage," she said recently. "Even among kings and princesses, there is such a thing as love at first sight. That is what happened in this case."


