NORMANBY BY-LAW DEFEATED.—The Normanby By-law for Clifford and Greyham extension of the Wellington, Grey & Bruce Railway, was voted on on Wednesday and defeated by a majority of thirty-nine.

COOL BURGESS' TROUPE.—This troupe was greeted with an overflowing house last night. The audience was highly satisfied with the performance, and was kept in roars of laughter the whole evening. "Cool" himself was as usual inimitable in his specialties, and all the other members of the troupe gave great satisfaction. The entertainment was of a most varied character, the grave, the gay, the humorous and grotesque being blended in a delightful melange. To-night the troupe give their last performance, when they will no doubt be as well patronized as on the previous evening.

WESLEYAN TEA MEETING.—The anniversary held in the Wesleyan Church on Wednesday evening was a perfect success. There was a very large attendance. After the refreshments—which were plentiful and superior—had been disposed of, the large company adjourned from the basement to the church, where the pastor of the congregation occupied the chair, discharging his duties in an able and characteristic manner. On the platform there were also the Rev. Messrs. W. S. Griffin (Toronto), W. F. Clarke, Wardrop and Ball. Mr. Clarke was the first speaker, and indulged in some happy pleasantries in connection with his honored friends the bees, and to his being elected President of the United States Bee Association, recently held at Indianapolis, Indiana, and in a more serious mind urged the members of the congregation to make a vigorous effort for the extinction of the church debt. Mr. Griffin followed, and was received and listened to as only an old friend and popular favourite can be, and largely contributed to the zest and enjoyment of the evening by his felicitous sallies and humorous remarks. Mr. Ball also said a few words, and, with the pronouncing of the benediction by Mr. Wardrop, one of the most pleasant gatherings in connection with the Wesleyan body was brought to a close, about eleven o'clock.

The Second National Cat Show, held at the Crystal Palace, open on Dec. 2nd and 4th, contained 349 cats. On Dec. 2nd it was visited by 10,000 persons. The wonder of the show, if not of the world, was a pure tortoise shell "tom," without a white hair on his body.

Guelph Christmas Fat Cattle Fair.

On such an occasion the great centre of attraction is the competition for superiority in the various classes of fat animals, and right worthily are they represented at the Canadian "Smithfield" on the present occasion. The first class called on is that for oxen 4 years and upward, and the contestants were 9 in number.

Mr. J. S. Armstrong, Eramosa, exhibits his two magnificent bullocks; one of which is a light roan, being absolutely standard, an extraordinary even well fed animal, with splendid bristles, is particularly fine in back and loins, deep and wide in the hams, handles firm throughout, in fact an unexceptional animal throughout. Mr. Armstrong calculates that this ox will have about a foot deep of fattest meat on his rib; this very fine animal goes to Ottawa having been purchased by the Messrs. Satchell for \$460; the companion ox is red and white in color, perhaps less not quite so evenly laid on, but is even superior to the other in front, shouder and long rib, being absolutely standard in these points, with a soft silky coat and flesh firm.

George Hood exhibits in this class a truly noble Hereford steer that cannot fail to strike the spectator with great gratification and wonder as being a specimen of remarkable evenness of texture, unexceptionable in all points. This noble animal also becomes the property of the Messrs. Satchell.

Mr. Robt. Ballantyne, of Downie, near Stratford, brings forward for competition two very fine animals; one, a red and white, very evenly to extra good across the loin and back, with splendid bristles and hindquarters; the other ox is much the same in colour, although, perhaps, not quite so good as the other, still both animals reflect the highest credit on their feeder.

Mr. Henlock Young exhibits two very superior animals, and which command much admiration, one a dark red, of great length, with good chest and flesh firm; the other a light red and white ox with deep wide chest and firm flesh evenly laid on.

Govin Hume, Galt, shows a rather roughish steer, but not calling for any particular remark beyond that he will undoubtedly make good beef when brought to the shambles.

In the class of oxen under 4 years Mr. Peter Rennie, Fergus, exhibits a wonderful steer of size and substance, of snowy whiteness in colour, remarkable for its flesh and as solid as a rock, and excelling in all the points that constitute a first-class premium animal.

Mr. John S. Armstrong shows two of his noble animals; one a particularly stylish steer of very handsome appearance, perhaps the most handsome any farmer has raised, with flesh laid on perhaps even more evenly than either of his older companions; the other is red and white, with level firm flesh, and excelling his companion across the "breach" in fact an animal of such worth at this point in rarely to be seen.

In the class of cows, Mr. Walter West exhibits the famous "Cockburn" cow, on whose sides the fat was shaking visibly; we heard good judges pronounce her condition as rather "flabby."

Mr. Hurd, of Hamilton, exhibits a fine cow, but somewhat rough; so we learn, Mr. Jas. Cowan, of Guelph Township, but this animal did not show to advantage, probably from her being well up in years. Mr. W. S. Armstrong's cow was a great beauty, and attracted much admiration.

In the class of heifers under four years Mr. W. Whitelaw exhibits, to our mind the gem of the entire collection of animals this day shown; she is a deep red, of the most perfect symmetry, small bone, and shows unmistakable traces of the neatness of the "Butterfly" tribe. She weighs some 1000 lbs., and is well up in years, but she is a beauty, with the view of being killed in Guelph for the benefit of the legs; Mr. Whitelaw's heifer took first prize at the Provincial and Central Shows in 1872. Mr. George Elliott shows a particularly fine heifer with flesh well laid on and evenly; Mr. Govin Hume's heifer is larger than either of the others, and has every appearance of having taken on fat in considerable quantity. As will be noticed below, Mr. J. S. Armstrong carried off the prize for the best fattest heaf of any age, but Mr. Whitelaw's heifer had many ardent supporters for the hour.

In sheep the show was excellent; the entries in some classes surpassing those of former years. We have not time nor space to particularize, so we can only just mention by way of excellence the exhibits of Messrs. Geo. Hood, G. & E. Tilton, Evan Macdonald and G. Shaw, although there were many others deserving notice. In pigs the entries were not numerous, but the quality was superb; Messrs. Tuck, Graham and J. & S. McQueen having some really splendid animals on exhibition.

Poultry—In the poultry department a very fine display was made. Messrs. W. Thompson, C. Heath and W. Evans showing some really magnificent specimens of geese; very fine turkeys are exhibited by Messrs. John Card, W. Evans, Mrs. Hales, Joseph Jackson, jr., and Geo. Neustadt; very fine ducks are exhibited by Messrs. C. Haves, John Card, James Anderson and Mrs. Hales; some plump, well-fed young fowls are exhibited by Messrs. Thos. Card, John Card, and Mrs. Howes.

The judges are Messrs. Hunter, Pilkington, Conlon, Weston, and Blake, of Hamilton.

Local and Other Items.

This hay at Hamilton is not yet frozen over, owing to the prevalence of high winds.

A Montreal man named Patrick Boyle, has been fined ten dollars for starving his horse and cow.

Mr. S. H. Blake was installed as one of the Vice-Chancellors of Ontario on Wednesday.

A statue of the Virgin Mary, of pure Carrara marble, the gift of the Pope, was inaugurated in the Church of Notre Dame, Montreal, on Sunday.

The editorial and composing rooms of the recent defunct Toronto Express were damaged by fire on Saturday night to the extent of \$10,000.

This County Seat of the County of Ottawa will be shortly removed from Aylmer to Hull, the Bill for that purpose having passed the second reading in the Quebec Legislature.

We see by the Bothwell papers that the ladies of the Wesleyan Methodist church in that town, will hold a *mush and milk* social there shortly. We suppose a turrip "swarry" will be in order after that.

As Ottawa paper complains that while hay is worth \$20 per ton on the Gatineau and \$60 on the Upper Ottawa, it is only from \$8 to \$10 on the Lievre, and that other farm produce is equally low in proportion.

So prosperous is the city of Ottawa at the present time that the St. George's Society, established in the capital, have resolved this year to disband the usual messes employed to raise a fund for the benefit of the poor at Christmas.

A deputation of French hatters recently waited on the Lieut. Governor, asking if an amnesty were to be insured for those connected with the rebellion of '39-'70. His Excellency professed to know nothing about it.

It is refreshing to come across such a gem as the following:

The miserable old wooden shanty which has for years done duty as a passenger station for the Grand Trunk Railway at London was burnt down on Tuesday morning. The *Advertiser* says that careful estimates place the loss at \$63,871.

On account of its being impossible to secure a place in which to lecture at the time desired, Mr. Froude will not deliver a Montreal audience until February or March. He goes the re under the auspices of the University Literary Society.

A baker charged with the murder of one Pelletier, after the last Quebec central election, in whose case the jury could not agree, has been admitted to bail in the Queen's bench in \$1,000 personal security, and two securities of \$500 each.

The Canadian way of measuring a tree is said to be as certain as it is grotesque. You walk from the tree, looking at it from time to time between your knees. When you are able to see the top in this way, your distance from the root of the tree equals its height.

The American buyers are swarming over the country in pursuit of poultry for the Boston and New York markets, and are carrying off all the better class of fowl. They are also shipping off all the fish they can get from the Gattineau lake, and their pot-hunters are eager in their inquiries after venison.

The Huron Signal regrets to learn that the health of Mr. M. C. Cameron, M.P. for South Huron, has been seriously impaired for some time past. A change has been deemed desirable, as he left on Friday last for a trip to New York, Washington and some of the Southern States.

Government Matters in Toronto.
Within a few days the Ontario Government will decide the precise location of the Inebriate Asylum at Hamilton, and the location of the Model Farm as well. Of the emigrant agents appointed by the Ontario Government, few were chosen from Canada, and the rest in the old country. Though the appointments were only made a fortnight ago, the agents have all left for their destinations save one. Applications still continue to pour in, no less than one hundred and fifty having been received up to the present time. Their appointments extend over six months, with the exception of Rev. Horrocks Cocks, the chief agent, whose engagement is for one year.

Within a few months 3,000 volumes have been added to the parliamentary library.

A number of improvements have been effected in the interior of the Parliament Buildings, including the repainting and whitewashing of the halls and corridors. The wardrobe has been re-arranged and improved, the post-office and reading room enlarged at the expense of the wardrobe, and much better lighted. The floor of the House presents an entirely new appearance, a thousand dollar carpet added to its beauty. The desks and chairs also are revarnished, the ladies' and speaker's gallery seats are raised and the heating facilities improved.

Clamor for the Dissolution of the French Assembly.

Paris, Dec. 11.—The number of petitions for the dissolution of the National Assembly circulating for signatures throughout Paris and the departments is greatly increasing. The Prefects at several departments where the movement has assumed formidable proportions have been summoned to Versailles. The members of the moderate Left are in favour of the dissolution of the Assembly.

The Duke de Broglie, a Monarchist, has been elected a member of the Committee of Thirty, in place of M. Fourien, who has just been appointed Minister of Public Works.

New Orleans, Dec. 11.—Acting Governor Pinchback has relieved Major General Campbell from active duty and appointed Major General Longstreet to the command of the first division. Gov. Warmouth to-day issued a proclamation warning all good citizens against in any manner recognising the General Assembly at the Merchants' Institute. Finckh, as acting Governor, commands all state officers, tax collectors, sheriffs and others to recognize and work only with legal officers now in authority, until their successors shall be regularly installed, and guarantees protection to such officers in the discharge of their duties by all the force of the State if necessary. The militia officers who are ordered by acting Governor Pinchback to report to Gen. Longstreet, express their determination to obey no orders except those coming from Governor Warmouth.

Hartford, Conn., Dec. 12.—The concluding game of the match between Springfield and Hartford for the chess championship of New England, resulted last night in the victory of Hartford on the forty-first move.

Yankton, Dakota, Dec. 12.—Three fourths of the horses here have the epizootic, and one stage per week is run to Fort Randall with oxen.

St. Louis, Dec. 12.—The horse disease is still spreading; sixty died yesterday.

San Francisco, Dec. 12.—The Madoc Indians have retreated to Wright's cave on the southwest side of Tule lake, Oregon, with their children and squaws, and have laid in a good supply of provisions. It is estimated that 50 Madoc warriors, with a number from Pitt river, and several others with them, are fortified there. So far fourteen settlers have been killed in the war. Henry Miller was tortured to death. Four hundred troops are in the field besides volunteers. A decisive battle is expected at Wright's cave, provided the Indians hold the position long enough.

New York, Dec. 11.—The crowds collected in the vicinity of Fifth Avenue Hotel are excitedly discussing the fire. Great numbers are visiting Bellevue Hospital morgue to view the corpses of the victims awaiting recognition. The bodies of two old men lie on marble slabs awaiting recognition by their relatives, presenting a ghastly sight. In the dead-house in the rear nine coffins lie side by side, each containing dead bodies. Eight-seventeen persons perished in the flames, and the remains, which are charred and scalded beyond all chances of identification. Some of the deceased evidently have been literally roasted to death, and others are burned black, with their tongues protruding from their mouths, and in all cases the arms and legs are drawn up, with the hands tightly clenched. Mary Ann Pagan was boiled by steam till she assumed a bright red colour; she died in great agony this morning; she shows no signs of being scorched by the flames at all. Mary Ann Heavy, while escaping from the burning portion of the hotel, fell from a fire-escape and still lives, though her injuries will end fatally. Crowds have been entering and leaving the hospital all day.

Later particulars of the fire in the Fifth Avenue Hotel state that eleven female servants perished in the flames, and believe it has not been surpassed by any of the neighboring towns and villages. The number of cattle brought forward was not so great. This is no doubt owing to the scarcity of feed, in consequence of which but a small number have been fed. About 150 head were on the ground, of which nearly one-half were sold. Prices ranged from 3c to 5 1/2c live weight. Most of the animals changed hands at 4 1/2 and 5c. Quite a number of the animals were hardly in as good condition as at former

The Rival Railway Schemes.

The vote on the Peel By-law granting a bonus of \$70,000 to the Credit Valley Railway may have an injurious effect on the prospects of the Hamilton and North Western By-law which will shortly be voted on. The battle between the rival projects resolved itself as usual into a contest between Toronto and Hamilton, and in this instance Toronto came off winner. Of course it remains to be seen whether the carrying of the one By-law will affect the carrying of the other. To-morrow the city of Toronto votes on its by-law granting a bonus of \$100,000 to the Credit Valley, but even though it is carried, a very large sum has yet to be raised before even half the amount is pledged which will be required to build but a portion of the road. The promoters of it no doubt expect to receive aid from the Ontario Government, but it is questionable whether this line comes within the class of railways which the act designs should receive aid from the Railway Fund.

It is now a matter for the Hamilton men to consider whether, in the event of their Peel By-law being defeated, it would not be a much wiser course for them to give up their North Western scheme, and adopt the Guelph one, which proposes to build a railway from this town to Orangeville, and thence to Collingwood. We think that in either case the plan is more feasible, and its accomplishment more certain. The expense would be but a fraction of what will be required to build the other road direct from Hamilton, and the distance saved would be but trifling. In the event of probable defeat we would strongly urge on the Provisional Directors the wisdom of changing their route and adopting the Guelph scheme as the best and cheapest, and the one most likely to be carried into effect.

Editorial Items.

The Reform Banquet at Toronto will take place on Wednesday, 8th January.

The Dominion Board of Trade meets in Ottawa on the 15th of January. It is fully expected that the President and Secretary, and possibly some other members of the National Board of Trade of the United States, will attend the sessions of the Dominion Board.

The Goderich Signal congratulates the Huron County Council on the decision they have come to, to abolish the toll-gates on their county roads, for the coming year. They will not regret this step. More than a year ago the toll-gates in the County of Wellington were abolished, and so satisfactory has been the change, that we have not heard a single individual say he would wish them reimposed. We may safely predict that, after a year's trial, the County of Huron will be equally well pleased with the removal of these annoying imposts.

THE MARKET BY-LAW.—A farmer who appears to be interested in our Market By-Law, writes us a rather facetious letter, respecting the kind of wood rack which, according to an amendment in that By-law, the Council will require to be used by those who bring cordwood into the Town for sale. Our correspondent tries to throw ridicule on the contemplated change; but if he was living in Town and had to go to the market periodically, and see the styles, shapes and sizes of these racks, he would at once pronounce the most of them a humbug, a delusion, and a snare. We admit there are many honest sellers of wood, but there is no denying that there are also a good many dishonest ones, who will take advantage of poor people, who are obliged to buy their wood by the load, by bringing their wood in a rack, which gives one an idea that it holds much more than it actually does. It is to protect these people and the public generally from fraud and deception, that the amendment was brought up. At the same time we do not suppose for a moment that the Council have contracts to use this style of rack. When quantities of wood are delivered to any person in town, it can always be properly measured after being piled.

The Kingston *Whig* declares it has good authority for announcing that Sir Francis Hincks has sent in his resignation as Minister of Finance.

Another deputa tion, composed of Hon Mr. Covert and Hon Mr. Young of the New Brunswick Government, is now in Ottawa on the subject of better terms—so it is reported.

It appears that Mr. Cauchon, unabashed by the exposure of the transactions which demanded the resignation of his seat in the Quebec Legislative Assembly, is actively canvassing the constituency of Montmorency with a view to his re-election.

WAR AND COMMERCE.—It is urged by some that English trade has gained largely by the Franco-German war, and that she has been serving both belligerents to the great advantage of her commercial interests; but official statements prove that such has not been the case. Credit Valley Railway.

Great Rejoicing in Erin Village.

From our Correspondent. About 8 o'clock on Monday evening, a special telegram was received that the bonus for the Credit Valley Railway in the County of Peel was carried by over 100 of a majority. In a very short time the whole village was illuminated with bonfires, and salutes and cheer after cheer clearly indicated what the feelings of the people were in the matter. The most pleasant part of the rejoicings was after Mr. John Clark invited to an oyster supper the members of the Council, who had just wound up the business of the township for this year, and no doubt felt considerably relieved. Along with them was a number of other friends.

After doing full justice to the oysters, the chair was taken by the Reeve, when toasts and speeches for and against the railroad were freely given by Mr. Alex. McLaren, Caledon, who has been a very active promoter of this road, also by Dr. McNaughton and the Reeve, and Messrs. Milloy, Johnson, Berry, Wood, Currie, Ferguson, and others.

Seldom have we seen more enthusiasm and rejoicing in our little village than was manifested over the success of this scheme in Peel. Neither is it to be wondered at that such was the case, when the effect of railroads sufficiently near to injure without benefit has been felt, and will be more and more; and, knowing also that the granting of that bonus in Peel paved the way and opened the chances for the getting of a road through Erin.

Mr. Geo. Laidlaw has already informed the Reeve that the Company is ready to co-operate with the people of this township and county, with a view of extending the line through to Fergus, &c., and in a few days we may expect a deputation from Toronto, urging the advantages of the road. It would be well for the people of this township and county to favorably consider the question, as it will be a line with a medium gauge, and one which will connect Lake Huron with Lake Ontario, and with all the leading lines on the continent.

The Market By-Law.

To the Editor of the Mercury. Sir,—In last week's paper I see that your Town Fathers have been trying to amend their famous Market By-Law, by not compelling us poor farmers to stand all day in the market with our butter, and not sell until the good people of the Town have done snoozing. Thanks for this one hour, good Councilors. But there is one thing you have bungled a little in, when you are about to compel us to have a certain kind of rack in which to carry our wood to Market. Would it not have made the thing more complete to compel us to have our horses properly matched, and harnessed, the driver of suitable height, and complexion, with claw-hammer coat, kid gloves and other fittings, and his master's coat of arms on the tail end of the sleigh? Please think this over at next meeting, and try if you cannot make the thing up nice, and see what an improvement it will make in the west-end of the Market Square next year. Yours, &c., A FARMER.

The defence was that the defendant had by arrangement with Mr. Mair credited the amount on a private account which defendant had against Mr. Mair, and that Ash had ratified this arrangement. Mr. Ash denied that he had assented to it, and claimed that the debt being a partnership debt the defendant could not set off a private account against one of the partners. Verdict for defendant. Mr. A. H. Macdonald for the plaintiff. Mr. Guthrie, instructed by Mr. Goforth, for the defendant.

PATTELO vs. HAND.—The parties live in Orangeville. Action on a promissory note which Hand had endorsed. The defence was that plaintiff had paid the note to the bank at the request of Orange Lawrence, the maker, and so had discharged the defendant. This the plaintiff denied, and said he had in effect purchased the note from the bank and had done so at the request of both the maker and endorser. Verdict for the plaintiff \$137. Mr. A. H. Macdonald for plaintiff. Mr. Guthrie, instructed by Mr. McCarthy, of Orangeville, for defendant.
