The mechanics' lien act is another piece of legislation along the same lines, affording protection to mechan-ics against the loss of wages.

This act is not of exclusive interest to labor, but as in the case of the direct legislation act, it has been raised loudest and most per-sistently in demanding it. The act merely provides the ma-chinery whereby co-operative socie-ties may be organized to carry on a business on a co-operative basis sim-liar to the co-operative basis sim-liar to the co-operative institutions of England where such societies have proven of inestimable henefit to the working classes and where the prin-ciple of co-operative trading has grown to enormous proportions.
