Decreasing Population.

It is needless to dispute that in all America the population has been moving from the farm to the town during the past few years. The tendency has been the same for fifty years, but during the past decade it has been more marked than ever. Toronto has grown at a phenomenal rate while many of the rural counties have decreased. Little, stood counties have fallen back. Those that have fallen back are the old counties under general cultivation; those that have stood still are the average counties with those whose holdings are the new ones opening to settlement.

This flow of people into towns is not a mere vagary, nor is it the result of class legislation. It is principally an evidence of progress. Time was, and we can all recall it, when every farm gave employment to half a dozen, and three or four able-bodied men the year round. But machinery has displaced these people, and a farmer and one hired man, and a hundred acre farm, and a gathering in the harvest has not the feverish anxiety it once had. The man who lived in a small shanty, farmers—harvesting, logging, carpentering, sheep-shearing, pig-killing, anything, everything, and always busy—this man is extinct, and his family of ten children are lost to the population of the country. We all know that this man always had ten children at least. The small country people who were farmers in summer and odd-jobs in winter. This class has been exterminated by farm machinery. The towns where the machinery is made offer them employment or better chances of securing work. At least the blacksmith shop and wagon shop that used to stand at every four corners and do a thriving trade, employing from three to six men and supporting three or four families, has dwindled into a horse-shoeing and repair shop, run by one man, has been squelched entirely by the large shops in town. Machinery is here and the tendency is to centralize and consolidate. The small grist mills that were once as numerous as churches have been swallowed up in the big ones that grind hundreds of barrels of flour every day. Where one hundred men not long ago worked in four mills ten have supplanted them in the townships of western Ontario and in a less general sense perhaps of all mills.

What observant Torontonians has not seen the process evolving upon where did the Massey Manufacturing Company come from, where did John A. Belton come from, where did I. G. Hunter, Goldie, McCannagh & Co. come from? The Massey Manufacturing Company has become merged in the Massey Company, and thus the movement cityward goes on. Of course as Toronto's population swells with the mechanics and artisans of these manufacturing Guelph, Brantford, Woodbridge and Newcastle feed the drain. But it is only a displacement of the branch of population—not a loss. Unless a man is prepared to dispute that the saving of labor is an advantage to mankind—unless he holds the view that the machine is a curse to the race—he must be pleased at this movement from the country to the town. It is inevitable. Here, then, is the point: Machinery is driving, and will continue to drive, manual labor away from the soil into the cities or quit the continent. It is this now in a certain measure and it will become more completely so each year. Men are being crowded from our farms; it is not wise, since they must go into manufacturing, to encourage manufacturing in all its branches in Canada and create a large urban population! No man can dispute it. Yet by a system of false argument Sir Richard Cartwright would prove that Canada should keep open house with the United States and have our manufacturing done across the lines where those displaced on the farms by American machinery would be forced to migrate in search of employment. And not these alone, but those now in our cities and towns engaged in shops and factories that could not long survive the immense increase in the number of workers and waste. Study this matter seriously, for it concerns all. The world has reached that stage when, to thrive, a country must manufacture.

### HERE IS A GOOD SITE

A Building Inspector's Most Desirable Place for a Rifle Range.

After spending a pleasant afternoon at Long Branch, one of The World's Young Men leisurely strolled along the Lake Shore road until he came to the site inspected by the military authorities in the spring, which by its slightness, so favorably impressed them as the very spot for a rifle range.

It is a farm of nearly 200 acres, extending from the Lake Shore road to Lake Ontario, the exact site is easily picked out. It is only the space of one field south of the Grand Trunk Railway; it is immediately past the well-known grove of thickly-planted trees, the entrance to the farm, which is owned by Mr. Hancock Renwick of Queen-street west, has the old gate of the Horticultural Gardens, which were removed there when the new iron railings were adopted. The distance of this proposed site is 10 miles from the City Hall and five miles from the Harbour.

The World's Young Men received permission of the occupants of the farm to walk over the trim little estate. A good roadway, extending to the lake shore, divides it into equal parts. With the exception of a small orchard and cottage, the area is all clear. The property extends three-quarters of a mile to the lake, of which there is an uninterrupted view from the highroad. There is an easy, gradual descent to the shore, and the ground is nearly as level as a cricket field. This is a great consideration in the choice of a rifle range, for several have been visited which would require a far more extensive and costly preparation of the ground to be eligible for a rifle range.

As that would be the case with this Fort Credit site is the erection of batts. Only two things have been put against it, one of which are needless. In the first place, it is said that the Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo Railway will, if ever constructed, pass through Mr. Renwick's farm; and in the second place, that there is danger of someone being shot by any stray bullet. As to the first objection, it is replied that, although the promoters of the railway did originally propose such a course for the railway and thence a bridge across the Harbour Bay and on to the Exhibition Grounds, on the strenuous objection of the York County Council, who took no account of the cutting of Humber Bay in two, the track of the line was altered, and now it will go on to Mimico, not touching the proposed site, thence to Toronto Junction and thence to the City.

This objection of the first objection. As to the second—that there is danger on the lake, The World's Young Men investigated this. No steamers approach within three miles of the shore at this spot, and the only boats that come to land are from Long Park. The proposed site is within the borders of the county of Peel, and is too far westward to be in the hands of the Ontario Land and Water Company, who never see a boat approach within, not a rifle shot, but cannot shoot at the alleged danger of stray shots. Identically it may be remarked that in England the authorities prefer that stray shots go into the sea than over the butte inland.

In reply to The World's Young Men, this project was syndicated; that Mr. Renwick is the sole owner, that he sold the land for \$300,000 in the spring of last year, but owing to a failure to comply with the conditions, on the advice of his solicitors, Messrs. Macpherson, Clarke & Jarvis, he recovered possession of the property, and though it has materially increased in value of increase in the value of land hereabouts. New Toronto and Mimico Proper—not far distant—and has augmented in price 100 per cent. during the same period.

From Mr. Renwick's farm there are views of Toronto and the Island in the distance; the headland at Long Park, the asylum buildings at Mimico, the factories of New Toronto, and the great recommendation of the site is that it is dry enough and large enough and pleasant enough for the summer camp of either of our volunteer regiments. As a very short distance from the land, on the west of the head, with deep water all around, where a wharf accessible by steamboats might easily be constructed for the landing of regimental stores.

As regards other means of access, there are two lanes almost close to the farm, at which platforms could be erected close to the Grand Trunk Railway. Then the Victoria and Lake Shore Electric Railway is now in course of construction, and this could easily be extended to the proposed site. Certain it is that within a couple of years the New Toronto and Mimico Proper, if not Fort Credit, the couple of miles between Mimico and Mr. Renwick's farm, and a good level road and the line could be laid much more cheaply than in the vicinity of the Harbour. It is only a few rods from a suburban station on the Grand Trunk.

The World came away quite as favorably impressed with the eligibility of the site as a rifle range as had the military men in the spring. Now that it has been positively decided that the Garrison Common ranges will be abandoned, it behoves the Parks and Gardens Committee, in conjunction with the military authorities, to make their final choice.
