CRIME AND PAUPERISM.

Chicago Overcrowded With Beggars, Cripples and Criminals—Public Institutions and Courts Kept Busy.

Mr. A. Pringle of Toronto writes The World from Chicago to the effect that tramps, vagabonds, paupers, named and crippled beggars and unkempt women with hungry children are flocking to Chicago in hundreds...

Chicago has become the veritable dumping ground for the off-scourings of all humanity. Women of all ages and conditions—women, women, peddlars and beggars are coming in unusual numbers.

Not one step above these are the small army of people who have come to Chicago expecting large wages and short hours, who owing to the lack of employment they sought they have rapidly spent all their money and are seeking charity at the hands of the city.

In the opinion of the police the epidemic of crime which is now sweeping over the city is directly connected with the great influx of tramps and paupers.

Wholesale Forgery of Autograph Literary and Historic Documents. LONDON, Dec. 1.—Considerable of a sensation has been created in the literary world by the discovery of a Birmingham man who has been forging autographs of literary and historic documents.

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ARRESTED FOR A GERMAN SPY.

Letters and Documents Found in His Possession Tend to Prove the Truth of the Charge—He Was Showed Through Italy, Austria, Russia and Germany to Paris.

LONDON, Dec. 2.—The Paris correspondent of The Times reports the arrest in Paris yesterday of a German of the name of Laskin on the charge of being a foreign spy.

Letters and documents found in his possession tend to prove the truth of the charge. Detectives had shadowed him through Italy, Austria, Russia and Germany until he arrived in France.

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WHERE IMMIGRATION LAKES IN.

Manitoba and the Northwest Have Over 36,000 New Prairie Settlers in the Last Eleven Months.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 1.—Nearly 1200 settlers arrived in Manitoba and the Northwest during the last month, making a total for 11 months this year of over 36,000.

November is not considered a phenomenal month for the immigration of the last 30 days the C.P.R. land departments have disposed of 38,500 acres in Manitoba and the Territories, on which they have realized \$128,000.

How He Swindled Many Toronto Druggists. Legitimacy of the Man Who Was Arrested.

Dr. J. Alexander Bost, the alleged president and treasurer of the alleged Richmond Chemical Co., of Toronto, a Philadelphia, who was arrested in Buffalo on suspicion of smuggling drugs from Canada to the United States, is well known to Toronto druggists, to whom he sold a preparation known as Taylor's Emulsion of Cod Liver Oil, and also an anti-ruff powder. The World yesterday got hold of a half pint bottle of the emulsion, which is labeled:

The labels on the box say the compound is manufactured by Dr. J. Alexander Bost at Toronto, Canada, and has a branch office in London, Liverpool, St. Louis and Boston.

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TRADE GETTING HEALTHIER.

THIS IS WHAT THE WHOLESALE MERCHANTS SAY.

Collection Continue to Improve. Enquiry for Christmas Novelties. White Lead Manufacturers Cutting Prices. Reassuring Goods—Daily Goods.

Trade during the week has been moderately good for the season. In drygoods there seems to be a little more activity, Christmas novelties and flannels being in active demand.

Payments continue to improve and the bank statement is quoted nearly everywhere as a further evidence of the healthy condition of trade.

HIDES AND SKINS. Skins advanced 5c yesterday. The ruling price is 90c although higher prices are being paid; prices unchanged.

Wool. There is no material change. Foreign enquiry is still marked by its absence.

There is a moderate demand from local manufacturers for small lots, there being no disposition to stock up.

The activity noted during the last few weeks is more marked this. Demand is chiefly for rubbers, overalls and heavy leather goods.

Spanish sole leather is very active and stocks low. Demand is principally on eastern account.

An increased movement is reported this week, especially in the city. The demand for glass is particularly active.

Hardware. Trade continues to hold its own and no particular feature has developed.

Trade during the week has not been bad. A number of country merchants have been in the city.

General trade good during the season and better than at the same time last year.

Payments fair. Sugars continue to move slowly, dealers thinking the market is in a money policy.
