PARISH NOTES

The Harvest Festival for this parish will be held
 on Sunday, Oct. 13th.

The Woman's Auxiliary began their weekly meet-
 ings on Monday, Sept. 30th, when a discussion was in-
 augurated as to whether more work could be under-
 taken by the branch in connection with the work
 amongst the white settlers in the North-West.

The Parish Guild will meet on Oct. 3rd, to discuss
 the organization of a Poppy Fête, or German Garden,
 in November. Money is as necessary this year as
 ever, and there is still \$200.00 to pay for the road
 assessment as well as for some needed repairs. It
 is the fixed intention of every woman in this congre-
 gation to help, and when they cannot attend the
 meetings, to make things at home, sell tickets, and
 by their interest help on the work. Plans are being
 made for weekly meetings at the Rectory, to make
 poppies and other flowers for the Garden.

The October number of the MAGAZINE is different
 to all other numbers, as it has little to record of the
 past and much to look forward to in the future. In
 fact it is full of hope instead of memory. Every
 autumn it sounds the high call to work, and with a
 youthful optimism, expects every one to do his duty.
 There are so many good works prepared for us to
 walk in, that no one need be left out. This is the
 month to decide what special work will be ours this
 winter.

Special preachers during the summer were the
 Rev. J. M. Davenport. W. Archer, A. W. Jenks,
 G. H. Broughall and C. G. Sharpe, and for four
 Sundays the Rev. A. C. Chapman acted as *locum*
tenens during the absence of the parish clergy.

The first meeting of S. Agatha's Guild was of the
 executive, and was held in the Rectory on Sept. 23rd.
 At it was present Miss Cowan, the retiring Dorcas
 Secretary, who left for England last week. She will
 be much missed in the Guild and was presented by
 her colleagues with a beautiful case containing
 Prayer Book and Hymn Book.

It is with great regret that we chronicle Mr. Huson
 Murray's removal from the Parish to the neighbor-
 hood of Ossington Ave. and Bloor St. Mr. Murray's
 connection with St. George's began with the erection
 of the Church in 1845, so that he is the oldest, as well
 as one of the most attached members of the Church.

He will be greatly missed, as he has never been absent from Church and has been the most attentive of sidesmen. His resignation of the chairmanship of sidesmen is a call to other laymen in the congregation to take a more active part in welcoming strangers to the Church.

A hearty welcome home to Mr. Biggar and his family, whom we were glad to see in Church after an absence of three years.

In a sermon preached on Sunday morning, Sept. 22nd, a scheme for promoting fellowship among strangers attending St. George's and increasing the attendance of men at Church, was put before the congregation. At a well-attended meeting of men belonging to the congregation, including the two Churchwardens, held on Monday night, Sept. 30th, this plan was warmly endorsed and Sunday, Nov. 3rd, was chosen as the day on which it will be in-

augurated. Fifteen men promised active sympathy and six in addition undertook to assist the Brotherhood Chapter in the work of visiting boarding houses. We hope to give details of the scheme in our next issue.

Mr. Kenrick's Class for men will re-assemble on Sunday afternoon, October 13th. The Sunday School, thanks to the help of members of the congregation who have taken the places of those teachers who have been away from town, has been meeting since the beginning of September.

A Church worker who will be greatly missed is Mr. F. J. Walker, who was President of our Young People's Association. A handsome souvenir was given him by the Society on his departure for London, Ontario. His successor in Y.P.S. has not yet been chosen. His place as sidesman will be filled by Mr. W. S. Greening.
