ELEVEN BODIES ON SHORE OF LAKE SUPERIOR

Barge Annie M. Peterson Wrecked and Another Probably Lost. STEAMER IS MISSING. Havoc of Great Storm on Lakes Partly Revealed Yesterday.

Special to The Toronto World. SENEY, Mich., Nov. 20.—The barge Annie M. Peterson, of the Edward Hines Lumber Company's fleet, of Chicago, has been found broken up on shore, eight miles from the Grand Marais (Michigan) life saving station.

The bodies of six men and two women have come ashore, which causes the belief that the steamer Chief Curtis and the barge Selwyn K. Marvin, with which the Peterson was in tow, may also have been lost, as the Peterson is reported to have had a crew of only seven. No trace of the other boats has been found as far as White Fish Point.

STEAMER LOST? CANADIAN PRESS DESPATCH. MARQUETTE, Mich., Nov. 20.—Four bodies were found ashore at Grand Marais, Mich., today in a tangle of wreckage believed to have been part of the barge Annie M. Peterson. The crew of the Peterson, which is believed to have consisted of seven men.

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TROOPS' VALOR PRAISED BY SIR JOHN FRENCH

Splendid Stand Made Commands His Deepest Admiration and Solicitude. Canadian Press Despatch. LONDON, Nov. 20.—A remarkable tribute to the bravery of the British soldiers fighting in France is paid by Field Marshal Sir John French in a special order, part of which was published here today. The order, which is addressed to the British army, is signed by the British commander-in-chief, Lord French, at his headquarters, Nov. 19. In part it says:

"Your commander-in-chief has watched with the deepest admiration and solicitude the splendid stand made by the soldiers of His Majesty the King, in their splendid efforts to maintain the forward position which they have won by gallantry and steadfastness. His courage and endurance is beyond all praise. It is an honor to belong to such an army."

BRITISH LINED FORTS AT BIXCHOOTE. Kaiser is Busy Visiting German Camps Around Ypres. Canadian Press Despatch. PARIS, Nov. 20.—The allied lines around Ypres, where the greater part of the British forces are entrenched, are now being reinforced by the German attack, which only a few days ago broke forth violently from the Bixchoote sector in France.

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ENEMY MOVES MAIN ATTACK TO ARGONNE

Sharp Fighting Has Taken Place There for Last Three Days. DEFEATED AT NIEUPORT. Attempt to Gain Control of Canal Locks Was Frustrated. Special Direct Copyrighted Cable to Toronto World.

LONDON, Nov. 20.—In the western war area the Germans have moved their main point of attack from West Flanders to the Argonne forest. Sharp fighting has been in progress in this region for the last three days.

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Admiralty statement adds, for vessels to be without pilot in these waters.

Estimated German Losses.

Military circles estimate the German losses to date at 1250,000 killed and wounded, as well as missing, according to a Copenhagen despatch. This estimate does not include about half a million sick.

The actual casualty lists, including those of Saxony, Westphalia, and Bavaria, show losses of 950,000.

Further charges of atrocities committed by the Germans in Belgium, including the allegation that a total of at least 2500 civilians were executed at Taminies, Dinant, and in Belgian Luxembourg, were made by the Belgian commission in an additional report made public by the war bureau today.

The Austrian Lloyd Steam Navigation Company steamer Metkovich struck a mine in the harbor of Salskirk and sank. Most of the passengers and crew were drowned.

In a message from Amsterdam today, it was reported that an English woman was seized by the Boerians at the docks at Salskirk. She was dressed in the robes of a priest, it is said, when captured by the Boerians.

A despatch from Stockholm to The Morning Post says that the British admiralty has ordered permission to Swedish trans-Atlantic liners to make the passage north of Scotland, thus removing the danger to the British shipping as the result of mined waters.

German Ships Escaped.

Two German ships escaped from Chilean ports within the last 24 hours, carrying provisions for the German Pacific squadrons. The Memphis, it was learned today, slipped out of Punta Arenas last night. Only a short time before the flight of the Memphis was reported the steamship Luxor escaped from Coronel with 3000 tons of provisions on board.

**REAL ESTATE AGENT GUILTY OF FORGERY**

**J. C. Richardson Admits Truth of Whole Indictment at Sault Ste. Marie.**

**SENTENCE DEFERRED**

**Confesses to Appropriating Over Five Thousand Dollars Wrongfully.**

SALT STE. MARIE, Ont., Nov. 20.—J. C. Richardson, a former real estate broker who was arrested here a few weeks ago charged with forgery and misappropriation of funds, came up today in the district court before Judge Stone. Richardson withdrew his plea of "not guilty" and entered a plea of guilty to the whole indictment, consisting of two charges of forgery and five counts of misappropriation of funds. The greatest loss by Richardson's transactions is the Dominion Sugar Company of Wallaceburg, whose agent he was. Richardson had received 500 bags and 250 boxes of sugar, the proceeds from which he admits having appropriated to his own use. Involving a sum of upwards of \$5000. **Hamilton Legislation Committee Moves to Have School Opened.**

**TO PROVIDE MEALS TOO**

**Howitzer Battery Embarks on Rigorous Course of Instruction for Front.**

HAMILTON, Nov. 21.—The civic legislation and reception committee today has been working on the establishment of an institution for the education of and the caring for feeble-minded children. After considerable discussion it was decided to confer with the board of education in an effort to have them take charge of the work, and it was suggested that the old Troy Street School be used. City solicitor Waddell stated that the board of education will not only be asked to educate them, but also to take them from their homes and to provide them with a noon lunch.

The city council was recommended to seek to have the municipal act changed, whereby property owners in cities of over 100,000 population having property encroaching on the street lines, can be forced to remove the encroaching portion of the building.

Military Activity Continues.

Military activity continues at the Howitzer Battery yesterday morning commenced a course of tactical drill that will take them some time to master. A possibility of their returning to Toronto before their officers return from qualifying is past, so they will be in Hamilton for some weeks yet, but they have been preparing for the front in earnest.

**OFFICIAL STATEMENTS**

**FRENCH**

"There is no important incident to report."

"The day of Nov. 19 was marked by the almost total absence of infantry attacks on the part of the enemy. It was only at times that their artillery fire was much more violent than on the afternoon of Nov. 18."

"To the north the weather has been very bad, and has fallen in the region of the Yser Canal, to the east of Dinant, it is believed by the Germans."

"In front of Ramscappelle we have withdrawn from the water two 165 centimetre mortars abandoned by the Germans."

"There has been a fairly intense artillery fire to the south of Ypres."

"On the centre there have been no important actions to report. In the Argonne three vigorous attacks on the part of the enemy's infantry were made."

"On our right wing the Germans have reconquered the destroyed section of Chauvigny."

"Further to the east we have made some progress."

**GERMAN**

"In West Flanders and in North France no appreciable change in the situation has taken place."

"Heavy rains and snows, which first soaked and then partly froze the ground, have made our movements very difficult."

"A French attack at Combrailles, to the southeast of Verdun, was repulsed."

"The situation at the northeast of the front remains unchanged. East of the plain of the Mazurian Lake region, in which were some old obsolete cannon. The retreat of the Russian forces and Neuvilly continues. Our attack has made progress to the south of the front. No decision yet has been reached in the fighting around Lodez and to the east of Czenstochowa."

**RUSSIAN**

"The efforts of the Germans seemed to be aimed at trying to break down our front between the Vistula and the Warta."

"Our offensive on Nov. 19 met with partial success."

"In Galicia we have captured Wlanicz, Gorlice, Dukla and Ulok."

**TURKISH**

"An official statement given out by the Turkish war office, reaching here by way of Germany and Austria, declares that the strongly fortified Russian position near Aretz has been captured by the Turks in a bayonet charge at the end of two days' fighting."

**AUSTRIAN**

"In the southern war theatre there have been minor battles on our entire front. Our attacks are progressing favorably. Yesterday we captured seven officers and 800 men."

"The weather is unfavorable. There is one more heavy snow storm expected in the heights. The flat country is inundated."

**TWO ADMIRALS IN DOMINION'S NAVY**

Two Captains, Six Commanders, Two Cruisers, Sloop, Submarines.

Ottawa, Nov. 20.—A statement published by the naval service department today contains some interesting information relative to the ships of the Royal Canadian Navy.

The flag officers are Vice-Admiral Charles E. Kingsmill, director of the naval service, and Rear Admiral Wm. G. Story, R.N., superintendent of the Esquimaux Dockyard.

There are two captains, Captain R. G. Corbett of the Niobe, and Captain E. H. Martin, who has charge of the Halifax Dockyard. The former is lent by the royal navy. There are six commanders, but only two of these are in the permanent Canadian service, Walter Hesse of the Rainbow and R. M. T. Stephens, the coast water are named CCI and CCE. The former is in command of Lieutenant Adrian St. V. Keyes who is also named as commander of the submarine flotilla, while the other is in command of Lieut. Bertram E. Jones.

**MORE GERMAN ATROCITIES.**

BROCKVILLE, Ont., Nov. 20.—Mrs. Mary Robb, writing to a friend in Brockville from her home in the Town of Broughty Ferry, near Dundee, Scotland, relates many interesting facts concerning the present situation in the city, and the letter continues: "The Germans seem to be so cruel, they are cutting off the hands of children so that they will not be of any use. A lady in Aberdeen has taken nine Belgian children, only one of whom has hands."

**Brockville Player for Coast.**

Word has been received in town from "Dublin" Kerr, the old Brockville star hockey player, who now resides in Calgary, that he expects to play the winter with Victoria in the Pacific Coast League. He expects to leave shortly for the coast.

**Return From Alsace.**

Mrs. Michael Wendling and two children of this town, who left on June 25 last to visit relatives in Willstheim, Alsace, returned to Brockville. They were at their destination three weeks when war was declared between France and Germany. Mrs. Wendling was unsuccessful at first in securing the necessary passport to leave the country, but eventually, thru the United States consul, she succeeded, and with her children passed thru the German lines into Holland, accompanied by Rev. Father Deutcher of St. Alphonsus, Man., who was returning from a visit to his aged mother in Alsace. The homeward trip began on Oct. 31 and they sailed from England on Nov. 7 for New York. Mrs. Wendling states that she saw many thousands of wounded French and German soldiers in Mulhausen and Kolmar. They could hear the thundering of the artillery at Metz and Saarbrücken, at the home of her parents, twenty miles distant. Rev. Father Deutcher, who is a western home, was taken for a spy in London and Liverpool, but after proving his identity he was permitted his liberty. He left Alsace when 14 years of age.

**BABY RAILWAY PAYS.**

**THE BELGIAN NURSE IS A CANADIAN DRAMA**

Produced in Massey Hall Last Night—Proceeds for Red Cross Fund.

"The Belgian Nurse" a three-act drama by Canadian author J. F. Busch, opened at Massey Hall last night before a large audience. There is nothing extraordinary about the play but the pathos and human interest grips and leaves one wondering. At no particular place does it bring home the fighting spirit of the war, but it deals with the Red Cross Society work and the horrors and sacrifices which come after the struggle. The author has put a lot of work into the play, but in some cases he has failed to take advantage of situations which stage mechanics could have made realistic. However, the play appeals to the emotional public and its patriotic and patriotic spirit makes it especially effective at this time.

The idea is very good. The pretty nurse is shown first on the battle field and her care for the wounded soldier lays the foundation of a love affair. The second act is laid in Montreal. The wounded soldier returns minus an arm and discovers the Belgian nurse who attended him. In the last act the war has again begun to grip the soldier and make him restless for the grim strife. The change makes itself apparent in his actions towards his wife, the former nurse. In the end the announcement of the fall of Berlin sweeps the nurse from the soldier's mind and he becomes the human and loving husband as before.

Eugene Fraser as Kane, a wounded Canadian soldier, and Louise Corbin as Marie, the Belgian nurse, are very well suited to the parts and their work was strong and clear cut. Campbell Dunlop appeared in a dual role. The first a character representation of Kane's philosopher, was very real to life and deserved great credit. Harry J. Fisher as Jacques, a German spy, and Lillian Niedervaver, as Fantine, another German spy, worked up some good climaxes.

**UNIQUE HONOR IS PAID TO AMERICAN WOMAN**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Official announcement of the award of the Grand

Cross of the Order of Elizabeth by Emperor Franz-Joseph to Mrs. Frederic Penfield, wife of the American ambassador at Vienna, was called today by the Austro-Hungarian embassy here. Mrs. Penfield has been indefatigable in her work among the sick and wounded soldiers of the dual monarchy. It is the first time this distinction has been conferred on a woman not connected with the imperial family.

**FLAT-BOTTOMED BOATS EMPLOYED IN FIGHTING**

BRUGES, Belgium, Nov. 19.—The London—Fighting between the German and allied forces in the inundated territory between Dinnard and Neupont on the North Sea coast is now frequently being carried on in boats.

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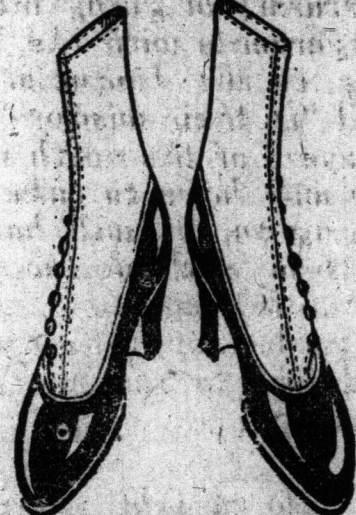

## WILL BEGIN SOON ON CEMETERY ROAD

Works Committee Return Hopeful Answer to Deputation From North.

**FULL INQUIRY ORDERED**  
Charles Collins Says Italian Foreman Dismissed Him Without Provocation.

A deputation of North Toronto residents representing more than 5000 persons residing east of Yonge street, appeared before the works committee yesterday afternoon, urging the members to proceed at once with the work of constructing the proposed road thru Mont Pleasant Cemetery. The special legislation secured by the city to enable the negotiations to proceed with the work to be carried on expires in March next, and for this reason the deputation asked that there be no further delay.

"For fifteen years now we have been trying to get this improvement made," declared H. H. Ball in addressing the committee. "The completion of this work was one of the agreements under which the town of North Toronto entered the city; the town council was most ready to proceed, had the necessary bylaws passed, and a satisfactory arrangement made with the cemetery people."

At one point in the work it is necessary to construct a 112-foot bridge from the cemetery over the railway tracks onto Merton street. The plans specified, to which Aid. McBride objected; the committee will ask the works commissioner to call for competitive tenders on steel and concrete.

Charges Nepotism.  
But for Aid. McBride, the case of Charles Collins, a civic laborer, would have been passed over without serious consideration, but when the alderman demanded further information from the works department representatives the members set up and demanded a full investigation. Collins who claims to be a testotaller, was discharged from his position of night watchman, and the foreman on the allegation that he was intoxicated and caused lumber from the job. At the request of the members Collins wrote out a full statement to call for competitive tenders to the effect that it was he who took the lumber; the man claims he has no recollection of the incident.

The committee recommended that application be made for legislation to expend \$50,000 on the extension of Crawford street to College.

The street commissioner secured authority to purchase three automobiles for his inspectors at \$580 each.

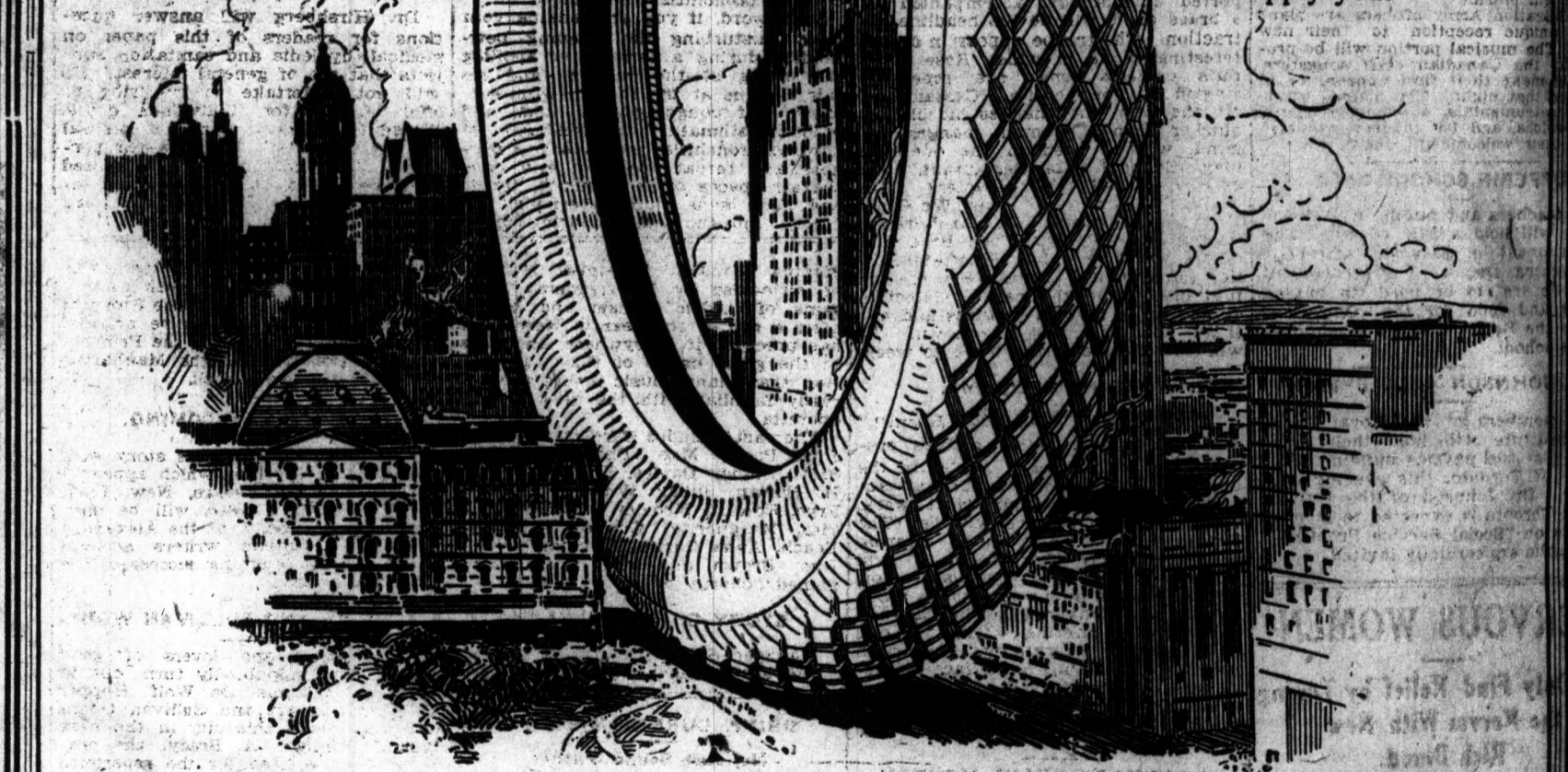

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PLANNED TO SHELL RESIDENCE OF CZAR

Russian Warships Foiled Ambitious Designs of Goeben and Breslau.

LATTER WAS TIMID Stood Off While Sister Cruiser Received a Severe Pounding.

Canadian Press Despatch. PETROGRAD, Nov. 20, via London.—From reports received here of the naval engagement off Sebastopol between Russian and German warships it is apparent that the former German cruisers Goeben and Breslau, which row by the Turkish flag, were bound for Yalta with the intention to bombard the summer residence of Emperor Nicholas at Livadia, just outside the Yalta.

There seemingly was much confusion aboard the Goeben on the appearance of the Russian ships 25 miles off Sebastopol harbor, at the mouth of the Crimean straits. The Goeben made no immediate alteration in her course, nor did she open fire at once.

The Russian fleet steamed in battle formation at once bringing the Goeben between them and the coast. The Russian flagship Levstaf opened a broadside with her 12-inch guns, hitting the Goeben's upper deck and setting the ship on fire in several places. The Goeben replied, but in spite of the short range, forty cable lengths, her shot resulted in no serious damage to the Levstaf.

PRINCE OF BUELOW FOR POST IN ITALY Germany Apparently Striving Hard to Win Italians' Good Will.

Canadian Press Despatch. PARIS, Nov. 20.—A despatch from Rome to the Fourner agency states that Prince von Buelow has been appointed German ambassador to Italy. Recent despatches from Rome have indicated that Herr von Flotow, the German ambassador there, was about to retire.

Prince Bernhard von Buelow, formerly chancellor of the German Empire, who usually resides in Rome, and who, thru his Italian marriage, has great influence in Italian society, was mentioned as likely to take the post in view of its importance at this crisis.
