





The foregoing was the finding of the coroner's jury which met in the Willowdale School House, last night. Dr. Bond of North Toronto was the coroner in charge.



eral; all those who were in the order prior to the first of August, 1914, and who have, or who may enlist for overseas service, not only have their in-surance kept good, but are relieved from the payment of all premiums or

assessments. The insurance liability upon the members who have enlisted over \$1,500,000, but the insurance fund of the order cannot possibly suffer as a result of any loss that may occur by the death of enlisted mem-bers. At the recent annual meeting, a provision was made by which al

losses will be taken care of by a patriotic levy upon the membership gen-erally. On the first of October of this year, every member of the order will contribute 50 cents towards the payment of the insurance of those members who lose their lives in the present war. This levy will raise over \$45,-000, and will take care of 45 deaths.

This provision for a special levy is an absolute protection to the insurance fund and gives to the membership who are not taking an active part in the war an opportunity to assist in a patriotic way.

On the first of this month, the insurance fund of the order passed the \$5,000,000 mark and the balance to the credit of the combined funds at the end of August amounted to \$5,454,-795.37

For the first eight months of the present year, the number of deaths was 32 less than in the corresponding period of last year, notwithstanding that the umber of deaths this year included 12 members who were killed in action the present war.
