HE Grand Lodge was opened in AMPLE FORM by the M. . W. . Grand Master, A. McKeown, who announced to the Brethren the purpose of the Communication, and called on the Grand Marshal to form the procession in the following order :

Tyler, with drawn Sword, Stewards with rods. Entered Apprentices and Fellow Crafts, Visiting Brethren, Brother with Banner. Past Masters, two and two, Royal Arch Masons, two and two, Band. Grand Tyler, with drawn Sword, Grand Stewards, with white Rods, Graud Superintendent of Works, with Square, Level and Plumb, Grand Secretary, with book of Constitutions, Grand Treasurer, with various coins, documents, etc., Brother, with Bible, Square and Compasses, Grand Chaplain, Past Grand Wardens. Past Deputy Grand Masters. Junior Grand Warden, with silver vessel filled with oil, Senior Grand Warden, with silver vessel filled with wine,

Deputy Grand Master, with gold vessel filled with corn, Past Grand Masters, Grand Master, Grand Pursuivant, Grand Standard Bearer,

Grand Marshal, Grand Director of Ceremonies, Under directions of M.[•]. W.[•]. Grand Master.

The head of the procession having arrived at the objective point, the brethren halted, opened to the right and left, and uncovered. The Grand Master and his officers passed through the lines to the platform. The rest of the brethren surrounded the platform (inside the circle of spectators) forming a hollow square. The Grand Master was seated in front of the centre of the platform, immediately surrounded by the principal officers of the Grand Lodge. Upon a table before him were deposited by their several bearers, the Holy Writings, the Book of Constitutions, the golden vessel of Corn, the silver vessels containing Wine and Oil, the Great Lights, the Five Orders of Architecture, and the Working Tools.

All being properly arranged, after a hymn by the choir and appropriate music, the Very Worshipful Grand Chaplain offered up the following prayer :

And now O God of Israel, who saidst in the beginning. Let there be light, and there was light, grant us to preform this service unto Thee in Holiness; that evermore guarded by Thy power, and guided by Light of Truth, we may continually render unto Thee all Glory and Thanksgiving, world without end. HISTORICAL STATEMENT.

BY BRO. REV. E. D. MCLAREN.

The President of the Association addressed the M. \therefore W. \therefore Grand Master, and presenting him with the Trowel, invited him to proceed with the ceremony.

The Grand Master :---

MR. PRESIDENT AND GENTLEMEN :

The Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons have gathered here to-day, by your invitation, for the purpose of laying the foundation stone of this building.

The Masonio Fraternity of this Province greet you with a God speed in the laudable undertaking of erecting a building in which will be propagated the noble tenets and principles of Christianity. The erection of this building is an evidence of your devotion to the principles which you profess; also of the liberality, energy and self-denial of the young men of your city, and will stand as an enduring monument to the zeal and enterprise of the citizens of Vancouver.

May symmetry and order rest upon each line and curve, and strength and beauty characterize each arch and pillar, from base to copestone; and may the grandeur of its proportions attract the admiration and gladden the heart of every lover of order and of progress.

Brother Senior Grand Warden: It has been the custom among the Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons, from time immemorial, to

assemble for the purpose of laying the foundation stones of public buildings, when required so to do by those having authority. The Grand Lodge of British Columbia having been invited by the Young Men's Christian Association to lay the Corner Stone of this building, it has by my order been here convened, and it is my will and pleasure that you now assist me in the performance of that pleasing duty. This you will communicate to the R. W. Junior Grand Warden, and he to the Craft, that they, and all others present, may be duly notified thereof.

The Senior Grand Warden :---

Brother Junior Grand Warden: It is the will and pleasure of our Most Worshipful Grand Master that the Grand Lodge of British Columbia do now assist in laying the foundation stone of this building. This you will communicate to the brethren, that they, and all others here assembled, may have due and timely notice of his order.

The Junior Grand Warden :---

Brethren: It is the will and pleasure of the Most Worshipful Grand Master of Masons in this Province, that the Grand Lodge do now proceed with the ceremony of laying the Corner Stone of this building. Of this you will take due notice, and govern yourselves accordingly.

An enlivening piece of music by the choir followed the announcement, after which the Grand Master, addressing the Grand Treasurer, said :---

Brother Grand Treasurer: It has ever been the custom of the Craft, upon occasions like the present, to deposit within a cavity in the stone placed at the north-east corner of the building, certain memorials of the period at which it was erected, so that if, in the lapse of the ages the fury of the elements, the violence of man, or the slow but certain ravages of time, should lay bare its foundation, an enduring record may be found by succeeding generations, to bear testimony to the untiring, unending industry of Free and Accepted Masons. Has such a deposit been prepared ?

Prov'd by the Grand Master's hand, Long may this foundation stand ! May its superstructure rise In grace and beauty 'neath the skies. Let us join in songs of praise, That a Temple here we raise; Hoping ages hence 'twill prove A home for Charity and Love.

After which the Grand Superintendent of Works presented the working tools to the Grand Master, who handed

> The Square to the Deputy Grand Master, The Level to the Senior Grand Warden, The Plumb to the Junior Grand Warden,

When those officers descended to the stone and arranged themselves in the following order: The Grand Master at the East; the Deputy Grand Master at the North; the Senior Grand Warden at the West; and the Junior Grand Warden at the South.

The Grand Master, assisted by some workman ready for the purpose, then spread the cement upon the lower stone, and directed the upper one to be lowered to its place, which was done with a lewis and suitable tackle, and at the signal given it was lowered at three separate intervals, the grand honors being given by all the assembled brethren at each separate stoppage of the stone.

When it was adjusted in its place and the Grand Master had pointed the cement about its edges, he addressed the Deputy Grand Master, as follows :—

 \mathbf{R} . W.: Deputy Grand Master, what is the proper jewel of your office ?

D. G. M. The Square.

G.: M.:. What are its moral and Masonic uses ?

D., G., M., To govern our actions by the square of virtue and to prove our work.

G.: M.: Apply the implements of your office to those portions of the stone that should be squared, and make report.

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The D.: G.: M.: applied the square to the stone, and reported : M.: W.:., I find the stone to be square—the craftsmen have performed their duty.

Grand Master: R. W. Senior Grand Warden, what is the proper jewel of your office ?

G. S.: W. The Level.

G.: M.:. What are its moral and Masonic uses ?

S. G. W. Morally it reminds us of equality, and its use is to lay horizontals.

G.: M.: Apply the implements of your office to the stone, and make report.

The Senior Grand Warden applied the level to the stone and replied : $M \therefore W \therefore$, I find the stone to be level; the craftsmen have performed their duty.

Grand Master: \mathbf{R} . W.: Junior Grand Warden, what is the proper jewel of your office ?

J.: G.: W.: The Plumb.

G.: M.: What are its moral and Masonin uses ?

J.: G.: W.: Morally it teaches rectitude of conduct, and we use it to try perpendiculars.

G.: M.: Apply the implement of your office to the stone, and make report.

The Junior Grand Warden applied the plumb to the stone and reported: Most Worshipful, I find the stone is plumb; the craftsmen have performed their duty.

The Grand Master then approached the stone, saying :---

The craftsmen having faithfully and skilfully performed their duty, I declare this foundation stone to be well formed, true and trusty. May the edifice which is to rest upon it ever be devoted to the uses of those whose mission it is to extend the spread of useful knowledge, to practice unceasing and unostentatious charity, and to inculcate fraternity and goodwill among men; and may it be completed by the craftsmen in peace, love, and harmony—they suffering no contention among themselves except that noble and fraternal one, as to who best can work and best agree. At this juncture the G. :. D. :. C. :. directed the Grand Stewards to hand the following vessels to officers, respectively :

Gold vessel containing corn to Deputy Grand Master. Silver vessel containing wine to Senior Grand Warden. Silver vessel containing oil to Junior Grand Warden.

The Deputy Grand Master :---

I pour this corn as an emblem of plenty. May the blessing of bounteous Heaven be showered upon us, and upon all like patriotic and benevolent undertakings, and inspire us and the hearts of the people with virtue, wisdom and gratitude.

Response : So mote it be.

The Senior Grand Warden :---

I pour this wine as an emblem of joy and gladness. May the great Ruler of the Universe bless and prosper our Dominion, Provincial and City Governments; preserve the British Empire, and may it be a bond of friendship and brotherly love that shall endure through all time.

Response : So mote it be.

The Junior Grand Warden :---

I pour this oil as an emblem of peace. May its blessings abide with us continually, and may the Grand Master of Heaven and Earth shelter and protect the widow and orphan; shield and protect them from the trials and vicissitudes of the world, and ~ bestow his mercy upon the bereaved, the afflicted, the sorrowing, that thoy may know sorrow and trouble no more.

Response : So mote it be.

The Grand Master struck the stone three times with the gavel. Standing in front of all, his hands extended, offered the following invocation :—

May the beneficent Author of Nature bless the people of this Province with an abundance of the necessaries, conveniences, and comforts of life; assist in the erection and completion of this building, protect the workmen against every accident, and preserve the structure Grand

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from decay, and grant to us all sufficient supply of the corn of nourishment, the wine of refreshment, and the oil of joy. Amen.

Response : So mote it be.

The Public Grand Honors were then given.

The Grand Master then delivered the plans and implements of architecture to the Architect, saying :---

Brother Principal Architect: Relying upon your skill in our noble art, I now confide to you these implements of Operative Masonry. May this undertaking be speedily accomplished; may there be no envy, discord or confusion among the workmen; and may you perform the important duties with which you have been charged, not only to the satisfaction of those who have entrusted you with their fulfilment, but in such manner as shall secure the approbation of your own conscience, and redound to the honor of our Ancient Craft.

The Grand Master and his officers then returned to the platform and resumed their seats.

The Grand Master then addressed the assemblage as follows :----

Men and Brethren here assembled, be it known unto you that we be lawful Masons, true and faithful to the laws of our country, and engaged by solemn obligations to erect magnificent buildings to be serviceable to the Brethren, and to fear God, the Great Architect of the Universe. We have among us, concealed from the eyes of all men, secrets which cannot be divulged, and which have never yet been found out, but they are lawful and honorable, and not repugnant to the laws of God or man. They were entrusted in peace and honor to the Free Masons of ancient times, and having been faithfully transmitted to us, it is our duty to convey them, unimpaired, to the latest posterity. Unless our Craft were good and our calling honorable, we should not have lasted so many centuries, nor should we have been honored with the patronage of so many illustrious men in all ages, who have ever shown themselves ready to promote our interests and defend us from all adversaries. We have assembled here to-day, in the presence of you all, to build a house, which we pray God may deserve to prosper, by becoming a place of concourse for good men, and promoting harmony and brotherly love throughout the world till time shall be no more.

The brethren all responded, so mote it it be.

After the response, the Grand Director of Ceremonies requested the brethren (ln keeping with a time-honored custom) to pass around the stone and place upon it their offering.

After the offering, the Grand Master continued :--

Brethren, the work is done ! Upon a solid foundation we have placed our memorial stone. It hides from mortal eyes (we hope for ages yet to come) in its safe and silent tomb, the records of this day. In all its appointments, and with all the glory of its architectural design, this proud Temple shall rise to its lofty roof, a fitting and noble testimonial to the devotion of the young men of this city.

Let us offer one prayer, one spontaneous aspiration, as a fitting conclusion to the hour. Oh Temple, planned with the cunning skill of laborions art, rise in all thy majesty and beauty toward the skies! May thy walls be strength and all "y tabernacles peace! May the votaries who shall enter thy porches, find evermore therein repose, refreshment, peace! May the "stranger and the sojourner in the land" ever enjoy the blessings of thy welcome and thy shelter; and when the hour of thy decay and dissolution crumbles thee to earth, may there be thousands of faithful and devoted hearts to raise thee from thy ashes with renewed splendor and more enduring life! "So mote it be."

The Grand Chaplain then offered the following prayer :

Blessed be the Lord that hath given rest unto his people. The Lord our God be with us; he was with our *fathers*; let him not leave us, or forsake us; that he may incline our hearts unto him, to walk in all his ways, and to keep his commandments and his statutes, and his judgments, which he has commanded.

Response : Glory be to God on high, on earth peace, good-will toward men.

Benediction:

May the blessing of Heaven rest upon us and all regular Masons : May brotherly love prevail, and every moral and social virtue cement us.

Response : So mote it be. Amen.

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



> The Square to the Deputy Grand Master, The Level to the Senior Grand Warden, The Plumb to the Junior Grand Warden,

When those officers descended to the stone and arranged themselves in the following order: The Acting Grand Master at the East; the Deputy Grand Master at the North; the Senior Grand Warden at the West; and the Junior Grand Warden at the South.

The Acting Grand Master, assisted by some workman ready for the purpose, then spread the cement upon the lower stone, and directed the upper one to be lowered to its place, which was done with a lewis and suitable tackle, and at the signal given it was lowered at three separate intervals, the grand honors being given by all the assembled brethren at each separate stoppage of the stone.

When it was adjusted in its place and the Acting Grand Master had pointed the cement about its edges, he addressed the Deputy Grand Master, as follows :—

 \mathbf{R} . W.: Deputy Grand Master, what is the proper jewel of your office ?

D.: G.: M.: The Square.

Acting Q.: M.:. What are its moral and Masonic uses ?

D.: G.: M.: To govern our actions by the square of virtue and to prove our work.

Acting G.: M.:. Apply the implements of your office to those portions of the stone that should be squared, and make report.

The D.: G.: M.: applied the square to the stone, and reported : M:: W:, I find the stone to be square—the craftsmen have performed their duty.

Acting Grand Master : R. W. Senior Grand Warden, what is the proper jewel of your office ?

G. S. W. The Level.

Acting G.: M.:. What are its moral and Masonic uses ?

S.: G.: W.: Morally it reminds us of equality, and its use is to lay horizontals.

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Acting G.:. M.:. Apply the implements of your office to the stone, and make report.

The Senior Grand Warden applied the level to the stone and replied : $M \therefore W \therefore$, I find the stone to be level; the craftsmen have performed their duty.

. Acting Grand Master: R.: W.: Junior Grand Warden, what is the proper jewel of your office ?

J.: G.: W.: The Plumb.

Acting G.: M.: What are its moral and Masonic uses ?

J.: G.: W.: Morally it teaches rectifude of conduct, and we use it to try perpendiculars.

Acting G.: M.: Apply the implement of your office to the stone, and make report.

The Junior Grand Warden applied the plumb to the stone and reported: Most Worshipful, I find the stone is plumb; the craftsmen have performed their duty.

The Acting Grand Master then approached the stone, saying :--

The craftsmen having faithfully and skilfully performed their duty, I declare this foundation stone to be well formed, true and trusty. May the edifice which is to rest upon it ever be devoted to the uses of those whose mission it is to extend the spread of useful knowledge, to practice unceasing and unostentatious charity, and to inculcate fraternity and goodwill among men; and may it be completed by the craftsmen in peace, love, and harmony—they suffering no contention among themselves except that noble and fraternal one, as to who best can work and best agree.

At this juncture the G. '. D. '. C. '. directed the Grand Stewards to hand the following vessels to officers, respectively :

Gold vessel containing corn to Deputy Grand Master. Silver vessel containing wine to Senior Grand Warden. Silver vessel containing oil to Junior Grand Warden.

The Deputy Grand Master :---

I pour this corn as an emblem of plenty. May the blessing of bounteous Heaven be showered upon us, and upon all like patriotic and benevolent undertakings, and inspire us and the hearts of the people with virtue, wisdom and gratitude.

Response : So mote it be.

The Senior Grand Warden :---

I pour this wine as an emblem of joy and gladness. May the great Ruler of the Universe bless and prosper our Dominion, Provincial and City Governments; preserve the British Empire, and may it be a bond of friendship and brotherly love that shall endure through all time.

Response : So mote it be.

The Junior Grand Warden :---

I pour this oil as an emblem of peace. May its blessings abide with us continually, and may the Grand Master of Heaven and Earth shelter and protect the widow and orphan; shield and protect them from the trials and vicissitudes of the world, and so bestow his mercy upon the bereaved, the afflicted, and the sorrowing, that they may know sorrow and trouble no more.

Response : So mote it be.

The Acting Grand Master struck the stone three times with the gavel. Standing in front of all, his hands extended, offered the following invocation:—

May the beneficent Author of Nature bless the people of this Province with an abundance of the necessaries, conveniences, and comforts of life; assist in the erection and completion of this building, protect the workmen against every accident, and preserve the structure from decay, and grant to us all sufficient supply of the corn of nourishment, the wine of refreshment, and the oil of joy. Amen.

Response : So mote it be.

The Public Grand Honors were then given.

The Acting Grand Master then delivered the plans and implements of architecture to the Architect, saying :--

Brother Principal Architect: Relying upon your skill in our noble art, I now confide to you these implements of Operative Masoury. May this undertaking be speedily accomplished; may there be no envy, people

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n our sonry. envy, discord or confusion among the workmen; and may you perform the important duties with which you have been charged, not only to the satisfaction of those who have entrusted you with their fulfilment, but in such mauner as shall secure the approbation of your own conscience, and redound to the honor of our Ancient Craft.

The Acting Grand Master and his officers then returned to the platform and resumed their seats.

The Acting Grand Master then addressed the assemblage as follows :---

Men and Brethren here assembled, be it known unto you that we be lawful Masons, true and faithful to the laws of our country, and engaged by solemn obligations to erect magnificent buildings to be serviceable to the Brethren, and to fear God, the Great Architect of the Universe. We have among us, concealed from the eyes of all men, secrets which cannot be divulged, and which have never yet been found out, but they are lawful and honorable, and not repugnant to the laws of They were entrusted in peace and honor to the Free God or man. Masons of ancient times, and having been faithfully transmitted to us, it is our duty to convey them, unimpaired, to the latest posterity. Unless our Craft were good and our calling honorable, we should not have lasted so many centuries, nor should we have been honored with the patronage of so many illustrious men in all ages, who have ever shown themselves ready to promote our interests and defend us from all adversaries. We have assembled here to-day, in the presence of you all, to build a house, which we pray God may deserve to prosper, by becoming a place of refuge for the sick and afflicted and by promoting charity and brotherly love.

The brethren all respon led, so mote it it be.

After the response, the Grand Director of Ceremonies requested the brethren (in keeping with a time honored custom) to pass around the stone and place upon it their offering.

After the offering, the Acting Grand Master continued :---

Brethren, the work is done! Upon a solid foundation we have placed our memorial stone. It hides from mortal eyes (we hope for ages to come) in its safe and silent tomb, the records of this day. In all its appointments, and with all the glory of its architectural design, this prond Temple shall rise to its lofty roof, a fitting and noble testimonial to the devotion of the citizens of Vancouver.

Let us offer one prayer, one spontaneous aspiration, as a fitting conclusion to the hour. Oh Temple, planned with the cunning skill of laborious art, rise in all thy majesty and beauty toward the skies! May thy walls be strength and all thy tabernacles peace! May the weary and afflicted who shall enter thy porches, find evermore therein repose, refreshment, peace! And when the hour of thy decay and dissolution crumbles thee to earth, may there be found thousands of faithful and devoted hearts to raise thee from thy ashes with renewed splendor and more enduring life! "So mote it be."

The Grand Chaplain then offered the following prayer :

Blessed be the Lord that hath given rest unto his people. The Lord our God be with us; he was with our *fathers*; let him not leave us, or forsake us; that he may incline our hearts unto him, to walk in all his ways, and to keep his commandments and his statutes, and his judgments, which he has commanded.

Response : Glory be to God on high, on earth peace, good-will toward men.

Benediction :

May the blessing of Heaven rest upon us and all regular Masons : May brotherly love prevail, and every moral and social virtue cement us.

Response : So mote it be. Amen.

HYMN: "Praise God from whom all blessings flow."

Specific work of convocation being accomplished, the Grand Marshal reformed the procession and returned to the Hall, and Grand Lodge was closed with solemn prayer.

February 14th.—In the absence of a report of the Committee of Investigation can the Lodge legally ballot on the candidate ?

Answer.-No.

March 13th.—In what degree shall a Lodge be opened to conduct the Burial Service ?

Answer.--The Third.

April 20th.—Is a member liable for Lodge dues from date of initiation ? Answer.—The Lodge custom decides.

June 8th.—Does neglecting to sign the By-Laws of this Lodge justify a Brother to refuse to pay dues ?

Answer.-No.

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June 10th.—Is a Mason under suspension cualified to become a Charter member of a new Lodge ?

Answer.—Certainly not.

Several other questions have been asked which, by reference to the Constitution, were easily answered.

SPECIAL COMMUNICATIONS.

On invitation from the Young Men's Christian Association, Vancouver, B. C., through their Secretary, that the M.. W.. Grand Master would lay the Corner Stone of their new building with Masonic honors, I caused Grand Lodge to be convened in Special Session at Vancouver, on Thursday, 24th July, 1890, for the purpose.

The M.: W.: Grand Master and officers of Grand Lodge, together with the Brethren of Vancouver Lodges, then proceeded with the ceremony, during which the President of the Association presented your servant with a beautifully engraved silver trowel, which, I can assure the Association and this Grand Lodge, will ever be kept and treasured as a memento of that pleasing event in my Masonic experience.

On April 23rd, I commissioned R.[.]. W.[.]. Bro. Wm. Downie as my special deputy to summon Grand Lodge for the purpose of laying the Corner Stone of Alexandra Hospital, Vancouver, B. C.

The reports, in full, of both Special Communications are in the hands of the Acting Grand Secretary, and will be submitted for consideration at present session.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

I ask you to place a memorial page in the proceedings of this year, to our late distinguished Brother, the Rt. Hon. Sir John A. Mc-Donald, K. C. B., who had the honor to represent the Grand Lodge of England near the Grand Lodge of Canada. At the time of his last visit to this jurisdiction, I had the honor of being one of a Committee who presented him with an address of welcome on behalf of this M. W... Grand Lodge, when he replied in eloquent terms of his high appreciation of the Masonic Fraternity, and expressed his regret that, owing to the shortness of his stay, he could not do himself the pleasure of visiting the Lodges. We, not alone as Masons, but as loyal citizens of the Dominion, acknowledge the great loss which his death entails, for by his skill as a legislator, integrity as a citizen, and his ability as a diplomat, he has advanced the Dominion of Canada in a marked degree.

I further recommend that in future the delegates from the several Masonic districts elect, at the annual session of Grand Lodge, their own District Deputy Grand Masters. By doing so the Grand Master will be relieved from a delicate task, and the various districts conferring the honor will naturally place a greater value upon the office. The majority of Grand Lodges adopt this method, and it meets with satisfaction.

REPORTS.

The reports of the D...D..G.. Masters will be laid before you at this session and, I am certain, were quite satisfactory evidence of the progress and harmony prevailing throughout the jurisdiction.

The report also of the Committee on Grand Lodge Regalia, appointed by resolution at last session will be read, and I trust their labors will prove satisfactory to the Grand Lodge.

Before completing my report I wish to express my sympathy with the Brethren of Union Lodge, New Westminster, on the destruction of their magnificent building by fire. It was a memento of their zeal and energy, and I trust, by the continuation of these virtues, they may raise from the ashes of the ruins a temple equal in magnificence, and destined to be longer enjoyed.

CONCLUSION.

Brethern, the time has come when I must surrender the Grand Master's gavel to another-I trust more able hands. In doing this I desire to assure you, my Brethren, that it is with a heart overflowing with gratitude for the great honor which you conferred upon me, in electing me to the proud position of Grand Master. You have placed me under obligations which I can never forget. I realize better than others can that I have, perhaps, committed errors in the discharge of the exalted duties entrusted to me. I can assure you that I have endeavored to perform my work with an honesty of purpose, and have been governed in all my acts by the rules and regulations as promulgated by the Grand Lodge. To the officers of Grand Lodge I am under obligations for assistance rendered and uniform courtesy and kindness always extended to me by all Brethren. I cannot close without expressing my sincere thanks to W.: Bro. Quinlan, acting Grand Secretary, for faithful services rendered to myself and this Grand Lodge since his appointment,

DEPUTY GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

To the M.:. W.:. Grand Master, R.:. W.:., V.:. W.:. and W.:. Brethren of the Grand Lodge A. F. & A. M. of British Columbia :

It affords me great pleasure at this our annual communication to meet you in Kamloops, the growing and thriving city of the upper mainland; although not having visited here for ten years, I am not a stranger, and am more than pleased to know that Masonry has kept in the vanguard of your progress, that peace, unity and concord prevail; and may it ever so continue.

Of my official acts I have not a very great record to make, and regret that owing to distance, lack of time and opportunity, I have been unable to visit all Lodges, but the necessity of this has been in a great measure provided for in Grand Lodge by the appointing of District Deputy Grand Masters, who I am sure have done their duty, and whose several reports we await with pleasure.

I attended the M. W. Grand Master and Grand Lodge on the occasion of laying the Corner Stone of the Young Men's Christian Association Building at Vancouver, at which the Brethren of Mt. Hermon and Cascade Lodges were present in large numbers, thus showing their appreciation of the honor conferred on the Masonic Fraternity, and witnessed the impressive ceremony done in a most efficient manner by our M. W. Grand Master.

On January 1st, I had the pleasure of attending our M. W. Grand Master and other Grand Lodge officers, and assisted in the installation of officers in Victoria-Columbia Lodge, No. 1, at the conclusion of which the Brethren escorted us to Harmony Hall, where a most sumptuous repast was set, and we spent one of those enjoyable and fraternal evenings for which the Masonic Fraternity throughout the Province is so proverbial, dispersing with the one regret that such gatherings did not occur more frequently.

Saturday, May 2nd, was set by the M. W. Grand Master as the day for his official visit to Ashlar Lodge, No. 3, Nanaimo. He was accompanied by several of the Cratt from Victoria. I took this occasion to pay this, my own Lodge, an official visit, and shall leave the report on the work done that evening, as well as any other remarks, to our M... W.. Grand Master and to our Bro. R. Craig, D... D... G... M... I have on two other occasions paid official visits to Ashlar Lodge, in which I have always taken a great interest, and thank the Brethren for their uniform kindness.

On December 17th, I proceeded to Comox for the purpose of instructing Hiram Lodge (now under dispensation) in the work of the several degrees, I found the officers very apt and showing a very keen interest. We spent two evenings in a profitable manner, and it afforded me much pleasure to have been of some assistance to this promising Lodge.

By special invitation from Hiram Lodge (U. D.) on April 23rd I paid an official visit, accompanied by Bros. R. Craig, V..M..D..D.. G.: M.:, W. K. Leighton, J.: W.:, W. H. S. Perkins, S.: D.:, and Geo. A. McBain, J.: D.:, all of Ashlar Lodge. On this occasion we were received at the newly completed Hall, and had the honor of opening and conducting the first meeting in the new premises as well as of having the pleasure of conferring the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason on three candidates, in which I was very ably assisted by the above named Brethren, as well as by those of Hiram Lodge. At the conclusion of this work we witnessed the Honorable Degree of a Fellow Craft conferred by the Brethren of this Lodge, which work was done in a highly creditable and efficient manner. We spent a most enjoyable and profitable (I was going to say evening, but we were all night at it) time, during which we were hospitably entertained at a fine luncheon, and am sure all that were present will long remember the occasion.

I must certainly compliment the Brethren of Hiram Lodge on the very beautiful, comfortable and well furnished Lodge room, which is greatly to their credit, and from personal knowledge I feel assured that no more zealous Masons exist in the Province; both officers and members are working with that "noble contention, or rather emulation, of who can best work and best agree," knowing the material which has been admitted to their fellowship, as well as that which has been rejected. I feel confident that the M.: W.: Grand Master entrusted a dispensation to worthy and cautious Brethren; I have therefore much pleasure in recommending Grand Lodge to issue a warrant of Constitution to Hiram Lodge, Comox.

Our deepest sympathy should be extended to the Brethren of Union Lodge, No. 9, in the loss and destruction of their magnificent sion to port on ir M.[.]. I have which I r their

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en of ficent Temple (at the dedication of which I had the pleasure of participating), and feel assured that the well known zeal and energy of our New Westminster Brethren will not languish, and that we shall soon see a new Temple (phœnix like) erected and dedicated to our noble order. In view of the above, and to show our fraternal love in a more substantial manner, I would recommend Grand Lodge donate the sum of five hundred dollars to Union Lodge, No. 9, as their pecuniary loss has been severe.

The "Grim Reaper" has not made a very great havoc in our ranks during the past year, for which we should feel truly thankful.

Doubtless the thought uppermost in your mind, at this time, is the great loss we have all sustained in the death of our beloved Grand Secretary, Henry Brown. The tidings of his death came to us like the lightning's flash out of a clear sky. How much might be said of the labor he performed, of the time he spent and the interest he felt in all that pertained to the welfare of Masonry and this Grand Lodge in particular. To his wise and prudent management of affairs pertaining to his office, is due the substantial condition we find ourselves in at this time. His irreproachable character was a tower of strength, not only to our Grand Lodge, but to the Craft generally: The sentiment of affection and esteem, in behalf of this Grand Lodge, should be suitably engrossed and presented to the children of our late Grand Secretary, as well as spread on the records of this Annual Communication.

We have also been called upon to mourn the loss and demise of W. Bro. Thomas Mowat, P. M. of Union Lodge No. 9, which has been a cause of deep regret to both his Masonic Brethren and those who had the good fortune to know him. Our Brother was cut off at an early age from a useful career, but the "Almighty Fiat" has gone forth, to his bereaved family the sympathy and expression of fraternal love from this Grand Lodge should be extended.

In the death of illustrious Bro. Albert Pike, who died at Washington, D. C., April 2nd, 1891, at the ripe age of 81, Masonry has lost an eminent patron and defender, a brilliant Masonic star which ages may not replace, my feeble efforts are inadequate to write his praises and would recommend this Grand Lodge to spread a suitable memorial on the minutes of this communication as well as a memorial page in its annals.

It is gratifying to note that throughout the Province, peace, harmony and brotherly love prevail in all our Lodges, membership is increasing commensurate with care and safety. Lodges are in good financial standing and a general air of "Peace on earth, good will towards" all men" prevails. Our earnest prayers should be that the good Masonic work may go on in love and unity in our own fair land as well as throughout the world. There are other subjects I could touch upon, but fear I might (if not already) trespass on grounds rightly belonging to our M.: W.: Grand Master in his annual address.

My thanks are due to the Brethren for the many kind acts extended me in the year just closed, and in conclusion I trust our deliberations at this, our annual communication, may be characterized by the same brotherly love, peace and harmony that we are taught to inculcate; that we may legislate wisely; and when our labors are ended, return to our homes with a happy reflection of having done our duty to God, our fellowman, and to our beloved order.

May the G. A. O. T. U. bless and preserve us in health and spirit to continue our Masonic labors and to meet together for years to come.

REPORTS OF THE DISTRICT DEPUTY GRAND MASTERS.

The Grand Secretary read the report from District No. 2.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A. F. & A. M. of British Columbia.

MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHREN,—It affords me pleasure to report that Masonry in District No, 2 is keeping pace with the general prosperity and advancement of the country. The members of the three Lodges in this District are live earnest workers for the tenets of our Ancient Institutions.

I regret that I have been unable to visit the different Lodges as often as I could have wished.

On the 10th of January, accompanied by V.: W.: Bro. Sillitoe, Master of Union Lodge, and R.: W.: Bros. Kelly and Hoy, W.: Bros. Manson, Charleson, Grant, and about thirty brethren from New Westminster, I paid an official visit to Cascade Lodge. W.: Bro. Horne, the Master of the Lodge was absent, being in Victoria attending to his Parliamentary duties, but his place was ably filled by W.: Bro. L. R. Johnson, who conducted the business of the Lodge and conferred the 2rd degree in such a manner as to reflect credit on himself and his Lodge. After a number of questions, among them one of jurisprudence, had been disposed of, the Lodge was closed, and the brethern of Cascade proceeded to exemplify their mode of entertaining visiting brethren at a banquet. Their examination was a pleasure to listen to, and worthy of the early days of Mount Hermon. The burning of the Masonic Temple, at New Westminster, was a serious financial loss to this Lodge, and it may take some years to recover from the disaster, but it has served to rouse more of the energy, that the brethren of Union Lodge seem to be full of, and I understand that now they contemplate erecting even a finer and better building than the one they lost.

I cannot close this report without expressing my appreciation of the fraternal kindness, which I personally have experienced, at the hands of my brother Masons of this district.

Three years, milestones in life's journey, have gone by since I was honored by being appointed D. D. G. M. for Cariboo District, No. 4, and I feel that I owe an ample apology for not sending in this report sconer, that it might have been real at the session of the Grand Lodge. However, my time was much more than usually employed during the last two months, and when I knew that W.: Bro. Stone intended to be present at the meeting I felt satisfied that Cariboo, No. 4, would be well reported.

Cariboo Lodge, No. 4, being the only Lodge in the District, and as I seldom miss a meeting of the Lodge, I can speak well of it. As far as my experience goes it is safe to say that the work done by No. 4 will compare favorably with that of the best in the Province, when our isolated position is considered.

During the months which have elapsed since I sent the Annual Returns of Cariboo Lodge, to the late G. S., we have added one more to our Membership by the regular process, and we have lost one by Dimit, W.. Bro. Geo. A. Dow, who, no doubt is now, or soon will be, a worthy member of one of the Victoria Lodges. The prospect for a rapid growth in membership in Cariboo is far from bright.

The Lodge owns the building and the lot on which it stands. The . odge is plainly furnished, the floor carpeted, the walls newly papered, in fact quite comfortable. The lower or ground floor (formerly owned and occupied by the Bank of B. C.) we rent to the trustees of the Barkerville Public School at a rental of \$10.00 per month. The value of property in this place now, depends on what can be got for it. If we had to build such a Hall as we have, it could not be done for less than two thousand dollars, perhaps more.

The members of Cariboo Lodge, officers and privates, have a strong desire for correct instructions in the Ritual, and would feel honored if it were possible for the Grand Lodge to send some competent Craftsman here to enlighten them. For my part, as I have said before, when writing on this subject, my opportunity for acquiring light has been confined to Cariboo. Such as I have, when any Brother showed the least desire to learn, I have always been willing to dispense it freely; so, if some here are somewhat in the dark, I do not feel that the fault is mine.

On the whole, we may say that Cariboo Lodge is in a healthy condition, harmony prevails, and we hope for better days.

Now, with heartfelt thanks to those Brethren who have conferred so much honor on me during my time as D...D...G...M..., also to my Brethren of Cariboo Lodge, one and all, for the invariable respect they have paid me as your representative.

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lodges or the District Deputy Grand Master's regalia, and it become the property of the Lodges of that District, to be given over to every successor in office.

Your committee would beg further to recommend, although not coming exactly within the scope of this report, that Grand Lodge would reconsider the manner of the appointment of the Deputy District Grand Masters, and would recommend the following:--

That the District Deputy Grand Masters for each District shall be nominated by the representatives of the Lodges and Past Masters of such district, present at the annual communication, by ballot, the representatives and Past Masters of the District voting in the same manner as upon the election of other officers, and confirmed by the Grand Master.

In default of any nomination being made, the Grand Master elect shall appoint a duly qualified brother as District Deputy Grand Master.

District Deputy Grand Masters must be Past Masters and resident within their respective Districts and must not be during their term of office Master of a Lodge.

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NOVA SCOTIA.

To the M.:. W.:. Grand Master and Brethren of the M.:. W.:. Grand Lodge of British Columbia.

As representative of the M.: W.: Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia, I have the honor to present this my first report:-

The Twenty-fifth Annual Communication of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Nova Scotia, was held in Freemasons' Hall, Halifax, commencing on Wednesday, the 11th day of June, A. D. 1890, A. L. 5890, at 10 o'clock, a. m.

M. W. Bro. Rev. D. C. Moore presiding in the Grand East. There were forty-seven Lodges represented. Letters of apology were read from all the Grand Officers not in attendance. A procession was formed and the Grand Lodge, headed by the band of the 63rd Rifles, marched to St. Paul's Church, where W. Bro. Rev. G. D. Harris preached an eloquent and instructive sermon.

At the beginning he says:—"Long before churches were built, Masons met on the highest hills or in the lowest valleys for the purpose of the Craft and to worship God. Belief in and worship of God are two of the leading features and the oldest landmarks of the fraternity. Religion and religious teaching are constantly inculcated in Masonry, which thereby becomes the best and most efficient handmaid of Christianity, in encouraging and assisting men to be men in the true sense of the word, 'man,' and of extending and applying her holy principles."

The sermon thoughout is good.

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The M.:. W.:. Grand Master opens his address with the following:-

"Thanks to the T. G. A. O. T. U. we are spared to meet again in our Annual Communication—the 25th—but only the 21st since the Union. I may fairly say our *United* Grand Lodge celebrates its coming of age to-day. Twenty-one years have passed since he who now speaks from the Throne spoke from the pulpit of the Church we have just left thanking GoD for bringing about union, and praying the Brethren to 'Let Brotherly love continue,' that prayer has been answered. Brotherly love has continued, and I trust will ever continue amongst us."

He speaks in feeling terms of the death of two members of the Grand Lodge-R. W. Bro. A. K. Mackinlay and R. W. Bro. Colonel James Poyntz.

Of the fraternal dead he says:-Forty-nine in all (three more than last year) are entered on the roll of those who "rest in God!" . Grand

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The address is short, dealing with practical subjects belonging to his own jurisdiction.

The Grand Master visited 28 Lodges during the year--of one of them he speaks as follows:--

"Unity Lodge presented the best appearance of any Lodge I have visited. The furniture, regalia, &c., are perfect; every Brother was dressed in black, with white tie and gloves,—no 'white cotton aprons,' but white "lambskins;" and the working of the Lodge was equal to its appointment. I was not only delighted but surprised, for in days gone by it was not thus. An upper room in a private house, and a few—just a few—got together in a sort of social way. But the old tree has renewed its life, and is as vigorous as a willow by the water-courses.

This Lodge proves what a great matter strictness in ceremony is for the proper performance of Masonic Rites. I would point out to Grand Lodge how every organization in these days, feeling the necessity for greater care in what we may think small matters, but which really often touch the well-being of the Craft more vitally than what we may think worthy of far more attention.

I should be glad if this Grand Lodge would positively prohibit the use of any material but lambskin or white leather, in making aprons. Oftentimes the new initiate is presented with "a lie to begin with," and I have more than once during my visitations heard the words changed to "white linen," which is a double lie, as the material is "cotton." I am reminded of an anecdote of one of my own cloth, who wore the hood of a degree to which he had no right. A person pointed out the fact to a witty dignitary, and asked if that was not acting a lie. The reply was, "doubtless it is a false*hood*." Let our Masonry have nothing false about it."

There were seven Representatives near other Grand Lodges appointed, among whom was W.: Bro. Peter Grant, of Union Lodge, New Westminster.

There are 66 Lodges in this jurisdiction, with a total membership of 2839.

On June the 11th, the members of Grand Lodge were entertained by the Halifax brethren to a grand banquet at the Halifax Hotel. Upwards of one hundred and fifty members and guests, decorated with the emblems of their offlices and rank, sat down to dinner, which was prepared in the Brethren Hesslein's best style. 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



"Let us not love in word, neither in tongue, but in deed and in truth.—1 St. John III, 18."

For the first time in its history the Grand Lodge of British Columbia has seen the possibility, and has embraced the opportunity of breaking through the reserve which has hitherto restricted its beneficent presence and influence to the cities of the west, and has travelled eastwards for the purpose of extending its maternal recognition to its more distant members, confirming them in true appreciation of Masonic fellowship and cheering and encouraging them in the prosecution of their individual labors in search of knowledge and light. So notable and interesting an occasion naturally directs our minds to those fundamental principles of our Order which our presence here sets forth with so much emphasis, and specially that last of the great trinity of Masonic virtues contained within the extended points of the compass. Brotherly love is the cement which unites stone to stone in the fabric of Free Masonry, and upon which depends the solidity, the unity and the safety of the structure. No wonder, therefore, that it is the precept most frequently inculcated within our Lodges. No wonder that it forms the theme of our last pious aspiration ere we cease from labor, ere we put off the distinguishing badge of our profession, to mix again with the outside world. No wonder that the holy Patron of our Craft should have devoted so much of his Epistles to the Churches, to the exposition of the beauties of this fairest flower of Christian culture. For our text is not an isolated lesson. The writings of the Evangelist teem with the fervid eloquence of a love drawn from the very breast of Jesus. And our meeting here to-day is an exemplification of this wideness of our Brotherly Love in testimony to our distant Brethren of that all-pervading oneness which knows no difference of language, nor race, nor creed; which knows no latitude nor longitude in its comprehensive love.

On a public occasion like this, however, it may be allowed to a preacher to remember the presence of many to whom the tenets of Freemasonry are a sealed book, and in whose minds the natural question arises, wherefore the need of any further organization than that which the Apostle St. John assisted in establishing for apparently the same end and object? How is it that we venture to add to and supplement an organization, admittedly of a divine character, established upon an equally broad basis, viz., the Fatherhood of God and the universal brotherhood of man, and travelling in its course of teaching upon the same broad line 'of Friendship, Morality and Brotherly Love? Is there not a certain amount of arrogance involved in a proposition that seems to imply the insufficiency of Christianity to accomplish its appointed work?

There is no warrant for any such imputations on the system of Freemasonry. Not the most devout Christian will ever hear within our Lodges a whisper of disparagement of Christian teaching, or the Christian system. If it were so, how could the name of any Christian minister or Christian man be found upon the roll of Masonry? How could it be that in every age the prelates of the Christian church from St. Augustine downwards have not thought it inconsistent with their loyalty to Christ to become members of our order?

There is neither antagonism nor rivalry between us and the Christian system. Nay, rather, it is as the helpmeet of Christianity that the Christian minister looks most favorably upon the ancient craft. If Christianity were all pervading, if it were universally accepted, and above all, if it were practically observed by its adherents, then indeed it might be legitimately held that any other organization, presuming to follow similar lines, was an impertinent intrusion upon its sacred claims. That would be nothing less than an impious proposal to set God right in regard to His own plans. But unhappily we stand face to face with Christianity, not as a theory perfect in its symmetrical proportions and adapted in every detail to its professed object, but with Christianity as it exists as a practical fact in our midst; and, without entering upon a discussion of the causes and circumstances which have resulted in a wide discrepancy between the theory of Christianity and Christianity as a practical fact, no Christian ought to find fault with an organization which subserves Christianity by an endeavor to foster and promote its fundamental principles.

What Christian body is there, I would like to enquire, which does not supplement the ordinary Christian methods by others of merely human origin? Take the subject of Temperance, e. g., essentially a Christian virtue, taught as a part of the Christian system, and capable undoubtedly of the fullest cultivation under that system. Nevertheless no Christian body considers it an affront to Christianity to supplement the ordinary Christian method by the organization of Temperance Societies and Bands of Hope; following herein the practice of the Church of Christ in every age, in encouraging the formation of Guilds or Societies in which men have bound themselves together for the better promotion of some. Christian object or other. Indeed the very existence of what are called religious houses, whether for men or women, and whether for the practice of greater holiness lved in a lanity to

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which ners of essenn, and ystem. ianity ion of pracprmaselves other. ether liness or of deeds of mercy suffices to show that in the mind of the Church herself special bonds of brotherhood, beyond the ordinary ones of the Christian religion, may be lawfully undertaken, and may prove of inestimable value in the development of Christian character and the practice of Christian virtue. This reference to "Bonds" seems to suggest to me a key-note, a sort of substantial foundation for those three main columns which support the fabric of our institution, Friendship, Morality and Brotherly Love. The keynote is Unity. A bond is that which unites two or more persons in any project, or enterprise, or object, whether it be commercial, social, political, or religious, and it implies the resignation of the individual will in the common pursuit of the object to be attained.


The prototype of Unity is God himself. It is His essence, His being; and Holy Scripture teaches us that it is His will to-day, and that He shall hereafter accomplish that will that this Unity Divine should be reflected back from the face of all creation.


"Neither pray I for these alone, but for them also which shall believe on Me through their word, that they all may be one, as Thou, Father, art in Me and I in Thee, that they also may be one in Us."


Meanwhile He has given to man, in imitation of Himself, the institution of family life, by way of daily illustration and habitual contemplation of the unity which governs Himself. And the law of unity is the essential principle of the happiness and prosperity of family life.

Unity of aim, unity of purpose, unity of action, yes, even unity of sentiment, this it is which constitutes the power of the oldest earthly embodiment of the Divine idea which we are accustomed to call the Trinity in Unity. And out of this, by a natural progression we pass on to an association of families, which (often unmindful of the inner meaning of the expression) we call a community; and out of this again, to the aggregation of communities which we call the nation.

Each, severally, in its degree, the antitype or reflection of the heavenly original, each capable, if unhindered by the introduction of any merely human element, of working out in successive generations the will of the great Creator, but each depending for the measure of its well being and prosperous success upon its recognition of the principle underlying its corporate life. And what might not have been the aspect of the world to-day if every generation of every family and community and nation had faithfully discharged its allotted duty in







the economy of the providence of God? It is easier, perhaps, to measure the results of human negligence by the disunion, and strife, and variance that prevail amongst the members of the family of man.

Let us go into the matter a little deeper still. Let us enquire out of what profounder depths of principle the need for unity arises. The question is not a difficult one to answer: the way of knowledge is hard only to those who shirk the labor of it. Surely the need for unity arises out of that which is the loveliest lesson of Divine teaching, viz., out of the principle of *mutual dependence*, or, as it is called in Holy Scripture, our "membership one of another," a principle the most unacceptable to the natural man, who prides himself upon being the architect of his own career, the author of his own prosperity, and who rebels against the least suggestion of his liability in any way to the action of external influence, whether of his fellow man, or God Himself.

But to the spiritually minded man, the humble searcher after Light and Truth, it is only necessary to establish the principle of the Fatherhood of God, and there follows as a reasonable consequence of this, our dependence upon Him, and as a correlative, our mutual debendence one upon another.

And so we arrive, Brethren, at the practical outcome of the principle of unity, as it affects the existence and successful operation of this Order of ours, viz., the paramount duty of every individual to merge his interest in the common good. To sink, in fact, his own individuality,—to live, not for himself but for others,—to work, not for his own gain or advantage, but for the welfare of the universal brotherhood of man,—to die, if need be, unhonored and unknown, if, by his sacrifice, the life of the whole body be quickened and sustained. These are, I take it, the true principles of Freemasonry ; these are the motives that should actuate the life of every Mason.

But it must not be forgotten, that the highest principles are insufficient to attain their own ends. Good laws do not make good citizens, nor good principles good men. Good citizens are those who respect the law, good men are those who live up to the principles they profess.

To talk of unity will avail nothing, the virtue lies in the patient erection, upon the corner-stone of principle, of a superstructure corresponding thereto in every detail. And even though no adequate success appear to attend the individual effort, the very effort itself is ennobling and lifts a man up to a higher level. Let your effort therefore, be to be consistent, *i. e.*, real. Be what you seem to be, what you profess to be. Have the courage of your principles. Dare to do right, whatever the consequences, in public and in private. Every careful man recalls from time to time the obligations of life, and enquires of himself how far he has endeavored to meet them. If every Mason would now and then recall the moments when his hands were stretched out upon the word of God, the weakness of his humanity would be strengthened and upheld by the recollection, and the honor of Freemasonry would be spared many a blow.

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)rt)e, For the honor of the whole Craft is in the hand of each brother, and no member can suffer in his honor, but all the members suffer with him. Therefore can no man say his honor is his own, for his brotherhood binds him up with all men, and the whole body gains or loses by the loss or gain of each member.

Alas! that there should be any loss at all, when there need be none, but as evil is in the world to subdue the pride of man, so does unworthiness come in to mar the glory of our institution, and while to an erring brother our pitiful compassion should extend to the utmost limit of love, there must be no delicate trifling with the sensitiveness of the individual when the honor of the whole brotherhood is at stake.

Finally, one word to you my brothers, not as a body, but singly and separately. Never make the mistake of leaving all the good of Masonry to be done by the Craft as a whole, or by those who have attained, by the goodwill of their brethren, to positions of rank and eminence. You may not have ten talents, or five, but at least you have one, for you are a Mason. Lay out your talent with due care; the circle of your influence may be very small, nevertheless work within it. Let your efforts be directed to making some one individual better than he is, to correcting some error of life, or to stimulating the growth of some latent virtue, and in so far as you are able to accomplish this you are in some measure and degree elevating the whole human race. It is not given to every man to win great victories, or to found great cities, but neither is the victory won, nor is the city built without the co-operation of the individual efforts of the soldiers and the workmen.

"Let us therefore not love in word, neither in tongue, but in deed and in truth." Let not the solemn words we utter, the solemn truths we hear be but an empty formality, or a momentary pastime. Let us rise to a sense of the realities of our professions, and the true dignity of the ceremonies with which we illustrate them.

Let Friendship and Brotherly Love prevail in all their Truth and Beauty and Power, being ever linked together by that morality according to whose strict and unyielding code we are to judge ourselves and others now. as we shall all be judged in the hour when our task will be to work our way in through the Portals of the Eternal Lodge on high.
