REMARKS.

The foregoing duties are cumulative and to be levied, the one in addition to the other.

Exemption from duty under any act—extends only to the duties imposed by that particular Act.

Specific duties are taken in sterling at $\mathcal{L}1$ 4s. 4d. currency and the \mathcal{L} sterling.

Ad. Valorem Duties under the Imperial Act 5 & 6 Vict. cap. 49, and the advalorem duties under the Provincial Act, 8 Vict. cap. 3, on the articles marked thus † are calculated generally by adding 10 per cent to the invoice price.—See 23d sect. of Imperial Act, 3 & 4, Wm. 1V. chap. 59.

The ad valorem Duties under the Provincial Act 8 Vict. chap. 3, except on the articles marked thus † are calculated on the actual cost of the articles where purchased.

Bonds may be taken for the payment of *Provincial Duties*, (that on the articles marked thus * excepted) when the amount exceeds £50-currency.—See 16th sect. of Provincial Act 4 & 5 Vict. cap. 14.

Goods may be warehoused at any duly constituted Warehousing Port, and may be entered at any frontier port, under Bond, to be passed on for that purpose.

Articles Imported by or from the United States, pay both Imperial and Provincial Duties as foreign goods, without reference to the place of manufacture or production.

DRAWBACK ON MERCHANDISE EXPORTED TO THE BRITISH PROVINCES IN NORTH AMERICA.

With reference to a recent Act of the Congress of the United States, allowing Drawback on Merchandise exported to the British Provinces in North America, articles so exported from the United States, and imported into this Province, will be liable to the payment of the duties imposed both by the Acts of the Provincial Legislature, and also to the duties under the Imperial Act 5 & 6 Vict. cap. 49, whether such goods are originally the growth, production or manufacture of the United Kingdom, or of any of the British Possessions in America, &c., or otherwise.

The 27th Section of the Imperial Act 3 & 4 W. IV. cap. 59, which enacts, "That no goods shall, upon importation into any of the British Possessions in America, be deemed to be of the growth, production or manufacture of the United Kingdom, or of any British Possession in America, unless imported from the United Kingdom, or from some British Possession in America;" consequently, all articles imported into this Province from or through the United States, are deemed Foreign, although any of such articles may be the growth, production or manufacture of the United Kingdom, which, when so imported, must be held to be liable to duty as Foreign Goods, i. e. to the duties in full imposed both by the Acts of the Imperial Parliament and of the Provincial Legislature, imposing duties of Customs now in force, viz: Imperial Act 5 & 6 Vict. cap. 49, and Provincial Acts,

With reference to the exemptions from duties imposed by the recent Provincial Act 8 Vict. ch. 3, in favor of persons coming into the Province as settlers, in the opinion of the Law Officer of the Crown, Cattle and live stock of all descriptions, such as Horses, Cows, &c., when brought in for the use of persons coming into the Province for the purpose of actually residing therein, do not fall within the meaning of the words "other personal effects," nor within any of the exemptions specially mentioned in the schedule annexed to the above mentioned Act, and are consequently subject to duty.

CAP. V.

An Act to secure the right of property in British Plantation Vessels navigating the Inland Waters of this Province, and not registered under the Act of the Imperial Parliament of the United Kingdom, passed in the third and fourth years of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled, An Act for the Registering of British Vessels, and to facilitate transfers of the same, and to prevent the fraudulent assignment of any property in such Vessels.

[17th March, 1845.]

WHEREAS it is expedient to secure the right of property in British Plantation Vessels, navigating the Inland Waters of this Province, and not registered under the Act of the Imperial Partiament intituled, An Act for the registering of British Vessels, passed in the third and fourth years of the reign of His Majesty, William the Fourth, and to facilitate transfers of Vessels, and to prevent the fraudulent assignment of the property in such Vessels: Be it therefore enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of and under the authority of an Act passed in the Prrliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and intituled, An Act to re-unite the Provinces of Upper and Lower Canada, and for the Government of Canada, and it is hereby enacted

And forthwith to give notice thereof to the Inspector General or other officer to whom the copies of certificates are to be transmitted; and in case the Collector shall be desired so to do, and the bill of sale or other instrument shall be produced to him for that purpose, then the said Collector is hereby required to certify by indersement upon the bill of sale or other instrument, that the particulars before mentioned have been so entered in the book of registry of certificates of ownership, and indersed upon the certificate of ownership as aforesaid.

Nature of the priority intended in this Act.

XI. And be it further enacted, That when any transfer Transfershy of any ship or vessel, or of any share or shares thereof, wayou more shall be made only as a security for the payment of a debt Morgagee or debts, either by way of mortgage or of assignment to a trustee or trustees for the purpose of selling the same for the payment of any debt or debts, then, and in every such case, the Collector of the port where the ship or vessel is registered, shall, in the entry in the book of registry, and also in the indorsement on the certificate of ownership in manner hereinbefore directed, state and express that such transfer was made only as a security for the payment of a debt or debts, or by way of mortgage, or to that effect; and the person or persons to whom such transfer shall be made, or any person or persons claiming under him or them as a mortgagee or mortgagees, or as a trustee or trustees only, shall not by reason thereof be deemed to be the owner or owners of such ship or vessel, share or shares thereof, nor shall the person or persons making such transfer, be deem-deemed an ed by reason thereof to have ceased to be an owner or own-owner. ers of such ship or vessel any more than if no such tranfer had been made, except so far as may be necessary for the purpose of rendering the ship or vessel, share or shares so transferred, available by sale or otherwise, for the payment of the debt or debts, for securing the payment of which such transfer shall have been made.

And be it enacted, That if any person or persons shall falsely make declaration to any of the matters hereinbefore required to be verified by declaration, or if any or talsifying person or persons shall counterfeit, erase, alter, or falsify any certificate or other instrument in writing, required or directed to be obtained, granted, or produced by this Act, or shall knowingly or wilfully make use of any certificate or other instrument, so counterfeited, erased, altered or falsified, or shall wilfully grant such certificate or other instrument in writing knowing it to be false, such person or persons shall, for every such offence, forfeit the sum of one hundred pounds sterling.

2. Merchandise, the growth or manufacture of the United States, exported to a foreign country and brought back again; and personal effect, not merchandise, of citizens of the United States dying abroad.

4. Wearing apparel and personal effects, not merchandise, of persons arriving in the United States.

5. Apparatus, ins ruments, books, maps, statuary, cabinets of coins, antiquities, &c., imported for the use of any philosophical or literary

society, or any college, academy or school.

6. Anatomical preparations, models of machinery and inventions; specimens in natural history, trees, shrubs, plants, bulbs or roots, and garden seeds not otherwise specified; berries, nuts and vegetables, used principally in dyeing or composing dyes; all dye woods in sticks:

whale and other fish cils, and all other articles the produce of American fisheries; animals imported for breed; fruit, green or ripe, from the West Indies, in bulk; tea and coffee, when imported in American

vessels from the places of their growth or production.

Adhesive felt for sheathing vessels, alcornoque, aloes, antimony erude, argol, asafætida, ava root, barilla, bark of cork tree, uumanuinctured; bells or bell metal, only fit to be re-manufactured, and chimes of bells; brass in pigs or bars, and old brass only fit to be remanufactured: Brazil wood, crude brimstone, and flour of sulphur, bullion, burr stones unwrought; cantharides, chalk, clay unwrought: cochineal, coins of gold and silver, copper the use of the mint, copper in pigs or bars, and copper ore; plates or sheets of copper for sheathing vessels, but none is to be so considered except that which is 14 inches wide and 48 inches long, and weighing from 14 to 18 oz. per square foot; cid copper fit only to be re-manufactured; cream of tariar, emery, flints, ground flint, gold bullion, gold epaulets and wings. grindstones, gum Arabic, gum Senegal, gum tragacanth, India rubber, in bottles or sheets, or otherwise, unmanufactured, and old junk, oakum, kelp, kermes, lac dye, leeches, madder root, mother of pearl, nickle, nux vomica, palm leaf unmanufactured, palm oil: Per vian bark, pewter when old and only fit to be re-manufactured; plating unnanufactured, ivory unmanufactured; plaster of Paris unground, rattans and reeds unmanufactured, rhubarb, saltpetre when crude, sarsaparilla, shellac, silver bullion, silver epaulets and wings, stones called polishing stones, stone called rotten stone, sumac, tartar when crude, teuteneque, turmeric, weld, woods of all kinds, when manufactured, not herein enumerated.

- \S 10. On all articles not enumerated above, a duty shall be levied of 20 per cent.
- § 11. When a specific discrimination is not herein made between goods imported in American or in foreign vessels, an additional duty of 10 per cent is imposed on all merchandise brought in vessels not of the United States, and a further addition of 10 per cent on goods brought in foreign vessels from any place east of the Cape of Good Hope. *Provided*, that existing treaties and former acts of Congress be not infringed.
- \S 12. All duties are to be paid in eash, and goods are to be sold after 60 days detention.
- § 14. On foreign sugar refined in the United States, a drawback shall be allowed equal to the duty paid; on spirits distilled from foreign molasses, a drawback of 5 cents per gallon, till January 1st, 1843; at and after that time, the drawback shall be reduced one cent per gallon, on the 1st of January of each year, till it be extinguished.
- § 15. No drawback shall be allowed but on goods experted within three years from their importation. Ten per cent of the drawback

Sec. 8. And be it further enacted, That all laws now in force in relation to the allowance of drawback of duties upon goods imported into the United States and exported therefrom, and in relation to the conditions and evidence on which such brawback is to be paid, shall be applicable to the drawback allowed by this act. And, in addition to existing provisions on the subject, to entitle exporters of goods to the drawback allowed by this act, they shall produce to the collector of the port from which such goods, wares and merchandise were exported, the certificate, under seal of the collecter or other chief revenue officer of the port to which the said goods, wares, and merchandise were exported in the said adjoining provinces; which certificate shall be endorsed upon a duplicate or certified copy of the manifest granted at the time of such exportation, and shall state that the same identical goods contained in the said manifest had been landed at such foreign port, and duly entered at the custom-house there, and that the duties imposed by the laws in force at such port upon the said goods had been paid, or secured to be paid, in full; and the said exporters shall also produce the affidavit of the master of the vessel in which the said goods were exported, that the same identical goods specified in the manifest granted at the time of such exportation had been carried to the port named in the clearance or r anifest. and had been landed and entered at the custom-house, and that the duties imposed thereon at the said foreign port had been paid, or secured to be paid; and that the goods referred to in the certificate of the collector or chief revenue officer of such foreign port herein mentioned, were the same identical goods described in the manifest aforesaid, and in the said aflidavit.
