## REMARKS.

The foregoing duties are cumulative and to be levied, the one in addition to the other.
Exemption from duty under any act-extends only to the duties imposed by that particular Act.
Specific duties are taken in sterling at $\mathfrak{L 1} 4 \mathrm{~s} .4 \mathrm{~d}$. currency and the $\mathfrak{f}$ sterling.
Ad. Valorem Duties under the Imperial Act 5 \& 6 Vict. cap. 49, and the ad valorem duties under the Provincial Act, 8 Vict cap. 3 , on the articles marked thus t are calculated generally by adding 10 per cent to the invoice price. -See $2: 3 d$ sect. of Imperial Act, $3 \mathbb{\&} 4$, Wm. 1V. chap. 59.
The ad valorem Duties moder the Provincial Aet 8 Vict. chap. 3, except on the articles marked thus tare calculated on the actual cosi of the articles where purchased.
Bouds may be taken for the payment of Prorincial Duties, (that on the articles marked thus * excepted) when the amomnt exceeds tion-currency.--See 1 fith sect. of Provincial Act $4 \& 5$ Vict. cap. 14.
Goods may be warelioused at any duly constituted Warehousi'. if Port, and may be entered at any frontier port, under Bond, to be passed on for that purpose.
Articies Imported by or from the United States, paty both Imperial amb Provincial Duties as foreign goods, without reference to the plare of manulacture or production.

## DRAWBACK ON MERCHANDISE EXPORTED TO THE british provinces in north america.

With reference to a recent Act of the Congress of the United States, allowing Drawback on Merchandise exported to the British Provinces in North America, articles so exported from the United States, and imported into this Province, will be liable to the payment of the duties imposed both by the Acts of the Provincial Legislature, and also to the duties under the Imperial Act 5 \& 6 Vict. cap. 49, whether such goods are originally the growth, production or manufacture of the United Kingdom, or of any of the British Possessions in America, \&c., or otherwise.

The 27th Section of the Imperiai Act $3 \& 4$ W. IV. cap. 59, which enacts, "That no goods shall, upon importatio: into any of the Brit" jsh Possessions in America, be deemed to be of the growth, produc"tion or manufacture of the United Kingdom, or of any British "Possession in America, unless imported from the United Kingdom, "or from some British Possession in America;" consequently, all articles imported into this Province from or through the United States, are deemed Foreign, although any of such articles may be the growth, production or manufacture of the United Kingdom, which, when so imported, must be held to be liable to duty as Foreign Goods, i. e. to the duties in full imposed both by the Acts of the Imperial Parliament and of the Provincial Legislature, imposing duties of Customs now in force, viz: Imperial Act 5 \& 6 Vict. cap. 49, and Provincial Acts, 8 Vict. cap. 3, \& 6 Vict. cap. 31, the one in addition to the other.

With reference to the exemptions from duties imposed by the recent Provincial Act 8 Vict. ch. 3, in favor of persons coming into the Province as settlers, in the opinion of the Law Officer of the Crown, Cattle and live stock of all descriptions, such as Horses, Cows, \&e., when brought in for the use of persons coming into the Province for the purpose of actually residing therein, do not fall within the meaning of the words "other personal effects," nor" within any of the exemptions specially mentioned in the schedale annexed to the above mentioned Act, and are consequently subject to duty.

#### Abstract

An Act to secure the right of property in British Plantation Vessels navigating the Inland Waters of this Province, and not registered under the Act of the lmperial Parlitment of the United Kingdom, passed in the third and fourth years of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled, An Act for the Registering of British Vessels, and to facilitate transfers of the same, and to prevent the fraudulent assignment of any property in such Vessels.


[17th March, 1845.]

WHEREAS it is expedient to secure the right of property in British Plantation Vessels, navigating the Inland Waters of this Province, and not registered under the Act of the Imperial Partiament intituled, An Act for the registering of British Vessels, passed in the third and fourth years of the reign of His Majesty, William the Fourth, and to facilitate transfers of Vessels, and to prevent the fraudnlent assignment of the property in such Vessels: Be it therefore enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and of the Legislative $\Lambda$ ssembly of the P'rovince of Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of and under the authority of an Act passed in the Prrliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and intituled, $A n$ Act to rr-unite the Provinces of Upper and Loued Canala, aud for the Government of Canadd, ind it is hereby enacted ;
