BROCKVILLE, 17TH JUNE, 1872.

The Council met at two o'clock p.m.

The Warden in the chair.

Mr. Erratt moved, seconded by Mr. Wilson, that the commissioners appointed to superintend the building of the Gaol and Registry Office give a statement to this Council of the amount due them for services rendered since the last sitting of this Council to the present. Carried.

Mr. Legge moved, seconded by Mr. Whelan, that inasmuch as the committee appointed by the Council to superintend the building of the Registry Office have disregarded the well-expressed wishes of this Council that they should engage some competent person, (other than themselves) to oversee the work, be it therefore resolved that the Council will resist the payment of more than $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. on the outlay as compensation to be allowed said committee, such percentage to pay all work done on Gaol as well as Registry Office since the first day of February, 1872. Carried.

Mr. Wilson moved, seconded by Mr. Millar, that the Sheriff is hereby authorized and empowered to purchase the several articles recommended by the Counties' Property Committee for the use of the Gaol, and the Treasurer is hereby instructed to pay the Sheriff for the costs thereof, and that the Sheriff shall be furnished with a copy of this resolution. Carried.

Mr. Wolfe moved, seconded by Mr. Sheffield, that the committee appointed to oversee the building of the Registry Office are hereby authorized to enter into a contract with any responsible parties willing to do the draining and flagging around and in front of the Registry Office, using their own discretion in the interest of these Counties.

Mr. Whelan, in amendment moved, seconded by Mr. McBratney, that the present commissioners be authorized to make contract for the work required around the Registry Office by Inspector of Prisons, and that they be paid at the rate of $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. for same. Carried.

Mr. Erratt moved, seconded by Mr. Millar, that the amendment passed in reference to the building of drain around the Registry Office

be rescinded, and that Mr. Wolfe's motion be adopted. Lost.
 Mr. McBratney moved, seconded by Mr. Millar, that the minutes of this day's proceedings be now read, and if found correct be concurred in. Carried.

The minutes were read and approved.

Mr. Wilson moved, seconded by Mr. Keeler, that the Council do now adjourn. Carried.

The special committee appointed under By-law No. 370, and dated 23d June, 1871, to superintend certain alterations to the Gaol and to build a new Registry Office, beg leave to present this their third report.

ALTERATIONS TO THE GAOL.

Your committee beg to report that the contractor has now completed the work on the building, with the exception of the board fence to be erected outside the Gaol yard, which he will have done in the course of the present week.

The unusually severe winter entailed upon the contractor much extra expense in warming the room to plaster the walls and ceilings, delaying the work somewhat longer than was anticipated.

The amount paid to the contractor during the execution of the work has been \$5000, leaving a balance due to him of \$500 upon the contract price.

The contractor also claims payment of the sum of \$320 for alterations and additions to the work, principally arising from errors in the plan, and partly from necessitous work in the connection of the new wing with the main building not provided for in the specification. This amount of \$320 your committee recommend should be paid.

The committee beg leave to bear testimony to the very substantial and workmanlike manner in which Mr. John Gordon has executed the work.

In ordering the alteration of some of the Gaol windows in the main building in the second story to an uniform size with the others, so as to admit of better ventilation, the Government Inspector of Prisons overlooked the fact of the too close proximity of two of the windows to the Gaol wall, whereby a facility is afforded for the escape of prisoners, and which can only now be remedied by building a small stone angle on the top of the present wall. As this oversight has occurred in connection with the alterations made, your committee considered it their duty to call the Council's special attention to the matter and await instructions thereon. The contractor offers to do the additional work, as per estimate enclosed, for the sum of \$35.

Your committee are informed that Mr. Langmuir, the Government Inspector of Prisons, made a hurried cursory visit to the addition and alterations of the Gaol on the morning of Friday, the 14th instant, in company with the contractor, but not having sufficient time before his departure to write a report, he stated he would do so on his return to Toronto, probably in the course of this week.

REGISTRY OFFICE.

The suspended work on this building was resumed by the contractor on the 22nd April last, and your committee fully expected to be able to report its completion by this date.

The causes of delay were insufficiency of white brick and a continuance of wet weather, of which the former having been supplied and the latter discontinued, the work is now being pushed on with vigor, and the contractor expects to complete the building in three weeks from this date.

The amount paid to contractor up to date on account of contract has been \$3750.

The Government Inspector of Registry Offices, S. Smith, Esq., accompanied by your committee, inspected the new building yesterday, the 17th instant, minutely examining it in every particular, inside and outside.

The Inspector complained that the choice of site by the Council was not submitted to the Government for their approval, but as the building was now erected he should not raise an objection to its acceptance.

Your committee pointed out to the Inspector certain inaccuracies in the specified measurements in the Government plan, and the difficulty experienced in fitting some of the ironwork without making an alteration in the brickwork, all of which he said was now obviated by a new and improved plan prepared and adopted by the Government in the month of February last.

He showed your committee some other improvements made, which the advanced state of the present building prevented being adopted.

Some alterations in the minor details of the internal fittings he suggested, your committee will have attended to.

The Inspector expressed himself very much pleased with the result of his inspection, and gratified to find the material and workmanship of so superior a quality.

The Inspector recommends, from the peculiar position of the site, the absolute necessity of a good efficient drain at the east end and on the south side of the building with sloping banks thereto, be made, that the risk of damp may be avoided in the inside of vault. Also that the present board fence be removed further from the building.

BY-LAWS.

No. 385.

By-law to amend By-law numbered three hundred and eighty.

PASSED JUNE 21, 1872.

Whereas, it is expedient to amend By-law numbered three hundred and eighty, passed on the twenty-sixth day of January, in the year one thousand eight and seventy-two, and intitled "A law to determine the limits of each High School District." Be it therefore enacted by the Council of the Corporation of the United Counties of Leeds and Grenville, and it is hereby enacted, that the said By-law be and the same is hereby amended as follows:—

1. That the Townships of Front of Leeds and Lansdowne, Front of Escott, Elizabethtown, Front of Yonge, and Rear of Leeds and Lansdowne be detached from and struck out of High School District number one, and after the passing of this By-law that the said District number one shall consist only of the Village of Gananoque, anything in the said By-law hereby amended to the contrary notwithstanding.

2. That the Townships of Bastard and Burgess, South Crosby, North Crosby, Kitley and Elmsley, be detached from and struck out of High School District number two, and after the passing of this By-law, that the said District number two shall consist only of the unincorporated village of Farmersville and School Section number six in the Township of Rear of Yonge and Escott, instead of the whole Township, anything in the said By-law hereby amended to the contrary notwithstanding.

3. That the Townships of Augusta, Edwardsburgh, Wolford, Oxford, South Gower, and the village of Merriekville, be detached from and struck out of High School District number three, and after the passing of this By-law, that the said District number three shall consist only of the Village of Kemptville, anything in the said By-law hereby amended to the contrary notwithstanding.

By-law to Assess the United Counties of Leeds & Grenville for the year A. D 1872.

PASSED JUNE 22, 1872.
