



The Royal-Traders' Bank amalgamation—or, more correctly, the purchase of the Traders' Bank by purchase of the Traders' Bank by the Royal Bank—has been sanction-ed by the treasury board, and noth-ing now stands in the way of giv-ing effect to the terms accepted by the shareholders of each bank, a process which will be completed within two or three weeks. The newspaper agitation against the newspaper agitation against the deal has found no echo in any reasonable quarter, and we presume that no more will be heard of it. We venture to predict, moreover, that the same will prove to be the case with the newspaper agi-tation against the C.P.R. stock in-

The two agitations have this in common, that both were a demand for interference by the government in transactions of the internal busi ness of certain corporations, transactions which require the formal approval of parliament or of the vernment, but which should by all precedent and equity have received If the shareholders of a bank can-not sell their undertaking, lock, stock and barrel, to the only kind of purchaser who is in the least likely to bid for it-another bankthere is an end of all true property rights in banking business.

After observing that it is no con cern of the public how many banks are consolidated; that the intervention of the treasury board is only for the protection of shareholders, and that its powers are limited to seeing that the proper legal formalities are complied with, the article continues: The agitation against the increase

in the capital stock of the C.P.R. is equally a demand for interference by the government in a pro-ceeding which should receive approval as a matter of course. The idea that new C.P.R. stock, with its enormously valuable participa-tion in the non-railway assets of the company—assets which are the property of the present shareholders, which were acquired out of their profits or granted them by governments on account of their enterprise—should be put up at aucto the highest bidder, thereby taking the belongings of the old shareholders and selling them to provide money for railway works, is contrary to equity and a violation of property rights. On its earnings as a railway proposition alone, C.P.R. stock is worth no more than the 175 which it is proposed to ask for the new issue from the shareholders. Its additional value arises from its right to participate in the accumulated land and stock holdings of the com-pany. The present high price of C.P.R. stock is due to the expectation that shareholders will be allowed periodically to "cash in" on their "hidden assets" by the grant of profitable rights to new stock. If that expectation is to be abolished, we doubt whether C.P.R. will sell much above the price to which the west takes such excep-tion. But it will not be abolished.






Regina's street railway is municipally owned and operated. The following are details of the installation up to December 31,

Capital expenditure, \$565,000; miles of track, 101/2; rolling stock, six cars and one snow sweeper; gross earnings to December 31, 1911, \$23,637.58; operating expenses, \$17,646.96; total number of passengers carried, 480,695.

The city possesses a spur track system on its own property, consisting of some 320 acres, and supplied with spur tracks laid out in a suitable way to serve all districts from the G.T.P., C. N. R. and C. P. Railways.

Regina holds warehouse sites throughout the wholesale district which are served by spur tracks at a uniform value at the present time of \$1000 for lots 25 by 125 feet size, except corner lots, which are sold at a slight additional charge. The price is far below the value of the property.

The electric lighting system is owned by the city; the generating plant consists of six boilers, aggregating 2000 horsepower, two sections of economizer, 4000 square feet; one 300 kilowatt Carlin's engine type generating unit; one 100 kilowatt Ideal engine type generating unit; one 450 kilowatt low pressure turbine generating unit; one 1500 kilowatt high pressure type generating unit; one 400 kilowatt direct current railway unit,



Regina has 25.7 miles of sewer, and reduction works capable of treating 9,000,000 gallons of sewage per day. By the close of 1912 \$630,000 will have been spent on extension of sewer system alone during the past three years.

A fifty-ton incinerator plant has been erected on North Broad Street, at a cost of \$40,500, for the disposal of all garbage and refuse.

The waterworks system is owned and operated by the city. The supply is obtained from the springs of Boggy Creek, supplemented by an extensive reservoir system.

Regina has about 257 acres of land set aside for park purposes.


