### SOCIALISTS AND nihilists

Appear to be Having a Warm Time in Germany.

EIGHT REICHSTAG MEMBERS Have Been Sent to Prison for Indignity to the Emperor.

Some Russo-Polish Students of Nihilistic Tendencies Arrested in Berlin and Handed Over to the Russian Police—A German Baron Who Had Been Deprived of His Rights Has Them Restored—A Social Science Professor Makes a Sensation—Farmers Up in Arms.

Berlin, July 17.—Eight out of 148 Socialists in the Reichstag, including Herr Leibnitz, Herr Leutemann, and Herr Stadthagen are serving terms of imprisonment for the offence of lese majeste. For a similar offence a number of Russo-Polish students of the Technical High School at Charlottenburg were arrested yesterday and taken to the Russian frontier, where they were handed over to the Russian police.

Among them was the noted nihilist Wischewski, who will be immediately sent to Siberia. There have been several other arrests upon suspicion.

As a result of a case espionage of the military barracks at Ulm the son of a prominent citizen named Wagner and a Frenchman named Estocq are in custody upon the latter being found with special maps and charts with plans of fortifications and a number of letters written in cipher.

Baron von Munch, a member of the Reichstag, who had been declared insane and deprived of the control of his estate and fortune by order of court, has been restored to his civic rights, the court declaring that an error had been committed.

**William Displeased.**  
Emperor William is greatly displeased with the decision of the Court of Arbitration which deprives his brother-in-law, Prince Adolf Schumacher, of the right of succession to the regency in Lippe Detmold. The regency is worth 240,000 marks a year. Prince Adolf is comparatively poor. He has gone back to Bonn to resume his military studies.

The Emperor's telegram to the Prince after the decision by the King of Saxony in favor of Count Lippe-Biesterfeldt, has caused a great sensation among the German partisans. It contains the following sentence: "I am disappointed that I did not intend his disavowal for publication."

**Embarrassing Predicament.**  
The Government, the agrarians and the producers are all placed in a very embarrassing predicament, through a rise of the Government's attempts to effect a compromise in the leading German cities, so as to enable the agrarians to have their own way in the matter of wheat and yet have traders in futures attend the exchanges regularly.

The farmers no longer know what prices to ask or expect for grain, no market quotations being published. This condition of things is seriously felt in connection with new crops expected in the rural districts where the small farmers and the large ones are in the hands of unscrupulous speculators.

As a result of the war, the Government has been obliged to raise the price of wheat for cereals have declined steadily since May, and the Government is daily receiving from thousands of small farmers vigorous protests against the new law.

**Sensational Speech.**  
Dr. Reinhold of Wiesbaden, the newly appointed Professor of Social Science at the University of Berlin, took occasion at a recent banquet to deliver a most sensational speech, ridiculing the Government's policy in connection with the matter of governing now in vogue in Russia was a danger for Prussia and for the whole of Germany, and predicted that the German people in the coming elections would show how long as they intended to be ruled no longer as at present. He concluded: "Socialism is powerless to accomplish radical reformatory measures. Only a free people, though one with a strong government, can accomplish radical reforms."

In the afternoon, on passing the point of an island, we came in sight of an Indian village across a wide sweep of rapid river a mile or more away. We knew then that we were near the mouth of the Klondike. We made a landing at a slight projection of land a mile below the village, and were surprised to find the camp of a white man near the little patch of quiet water afforded by the point.

"The owner of the camp was Carmack. He caught the line we threw out and pulled our boat into his little harbor. He gave us a hearty welcome and showed us a pleasant place to put our tents.

**Married a Native.**  
"Then it developed that Carmack had a family with him. Two little dark-skinned children followed him everywhere, and presently he pointed out his wife, who was a native, a woman of the stock tribe.

"Carmack, who is a very intelligent man, gave us much information about the upper Yukon. The Klondike had been known for several years to drain a gold country, and the first five miles of it had been indifferently prospected, but the gold hunters were generally run out by bears.

**Hunts for Gold.**  
"Carmack told us of his intention to prospect the Klondike as soon as the salmon season was over. Four weeks later, as we afterward learned, he took two Indians and started up the stream. After a few miles of laborious poling against a rapid current they turned into the first considerable tributary that came in from the right. Here conditions were favorable for prospecting, the water being shallow, and they found gold in encouraging quantities on the bars of the creek. They followed the windings of this stream for 20 or 25 miles before they made locations and went to work.

"The results were almost enough to turn the brain of a prospector who had searched for many years in the hope of finding gravel that would yield a few grains weight of gold to the pan. Here

Represented as a Mild Mannered, Polite and Gentle Man Who is Tolerant and Being an Assassin.

New York, July 18.—Harold Frederic writes to The Times to-day from London the following:

"A curious light is thrown on the Sultan and his surroundings in the new number of the Quarterly Review by one who evidently has an inward knowledge of Eastern affairs. I have myself heard similar things from men brought in close contact with the Sultan, but it will astonish you to see how accurate the account of the 'Great Assassin,' so to say by those personally acquainted with him, that they agree in describing him as remarkably gentle, polite and amiable. Indeed, one of our French diplomatists speaks of him as a Prince whose heart is always open to every generous sentiment, and he is so well able to gain the confidence of clever men of the world that the present French Minister of Foreign Affairs, in a famous essay in the Review, did not dare to say a word to excuse and defend some of the Sultan's worst acts. His morals are, they say, irreproachable, and they are puzzled to find an explanation of so mild-mannered a man committing so many crimes.
