# COCHRANE LOTS SELL AT HIGH FIGURES

### T. & N. O. Commission Realizes \$50,000 and Many Enterprises are Protected for G.T.P. Junction.

NORTH BAY, Nov. 27.—(Staff Special.)—A storm blew down the wires on the T. & N. O. last night and held up the World despatch, fled at Matheson, describing the record-breaking sale of the townsite lots at Cochrane yesterday.

Nothing like it has been known in real estate annals in Canada, and the \$50,000 realized by the railway commission is regarded by many here as the easiest money outside Cobalt.

The tremendous optimism and sanguine enterprise of the men of the north appears to be fully justified, and lots were resold to-day at an advance of \$15 and \$10.

A hotel is already projected by J. J. Kingston of Latchford and another by Thomas Murray, Pembroke. W. Taylor of the Taylor Hardware Company will open a store in his line, and a number of other stores are under consideration, the business men were reticent about their plans.

Italian storekeepers evidently look forward to a rich harvest from their countrymen, employed in railway construction during the next two or three years. Four lumber yards and two wholesale groceries are also announced by Toronto parties.

J. McKinnon, Cobalt; J. J. Hunter, Cobalt, and A. Foster, North Bay, were about the largest purchasers of these townsite lots, buying fourteen lots for about \$7000.

The romance of the situation is not at all appreciated. It is clear, by most of the people in Toronto who criticize the prices paid. The agricultural country around Cochrane is described by those entitled to judge as practically identical with that of the Winnipeg district. 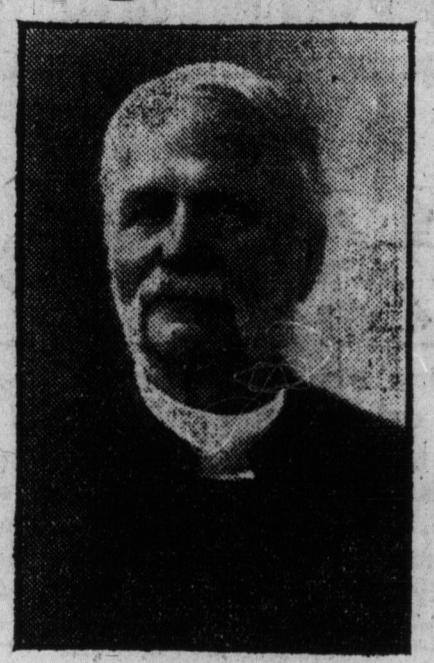

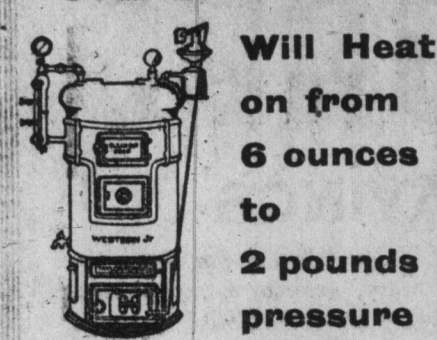

### AN ENDOWMENT FUND FOR A NOBLE CAUSE

Name of H. C. Hammond to be Perpetuated in a Strongly Humanitarian Way.

In September last, Herbert C. Hammond, from his sick room, wrote a final appeal on behalf of the prevention of tuberculosis, in which he proposed on broad lines a general public propaganda to stir up action by the government which would have for its object the eradication of this fell disease. While the direct object of the appeal was not so much for contributions as for a general up-stirring of public interest, there was an immediate and spontaneous response in monetary subscriptions.

At the same time a number of friends deemed the occasion appropriate for the establishment of a fund which would assist in perpetuating the work of the Toronto Free Hospital for Consumptives, and associate Mr. Hammond's name with it, while providing permanent means for continuing the splendid and self-sacrificing crusade initiated by him. It was decided to inaugurate the H. C. Hammond endowment fund, which has appealed very strongly to all who know him. The sum of \$38,000 has been secured by individual subscription without any systematic canvass, and as many of these in sympathy with this noble work, and its appealing object, have not been called upon, it is proposed to ask that any of those who feel so inclined should now subscribe.

While the subscriptions thus far received from Ontario have been in sums of considerable amount, any contributions, whether large or small, will be thankfully received by the committee, which is composed of Frank Darling (chairman), Chas. Cookshutt, Hume Blake, Stephen Haas, J. A. McKee, Sydney Small, C. A. Bogert (treasurer) and Stewart Houston (secretary). Subscriptions may be sent to any member of the committee, or to C. A. Bogert, general manager of the Dominion Bank.

A gratifying feature of the list of subscriptions is the considerable sum received from Montreal and Winnipeg. These two cities have now planned a systematic fight against tuberculosis, and are establishing hospitals of their own, much to the gratification of Mr. Hammond, who may regard the efforts made in other places as a logical result of the movement in Toronto and Ontario.

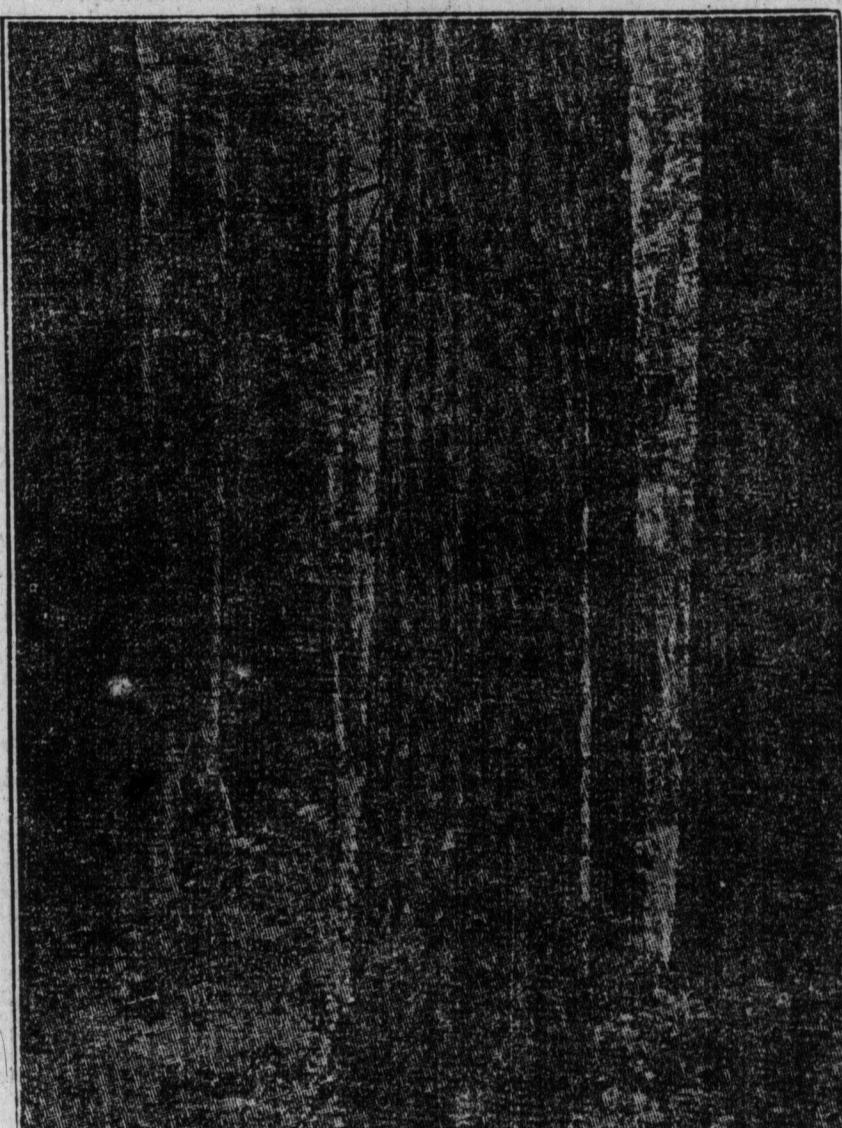

### AN ARMY-CORPS ARRESTED.

BUFFALO, Nov. 27.—The headquarters of the American Salvation Army, at 78 Genesee-street, was visited by the police and the whole corps, including Adjutant Calvin Spangler, taken to headquarters, where they were

questioned in regard to charges that they had solicited money under false pretences. The arrested men were committed to jail in default of \$500 bail. Frederick Hall and Thomas Wilson, also members of the army, were committed to jail as witnesses. The direct grounds for the charges are the statements of several merchants and dealers on the wholesale

and retail provision markets that the collectors of the organization have been soliciting funds, sometimes in the name of the American Salvation Army, and always for the purpose of helping their Children's Home or of providing for Thanksgiving dinner to the poor. Edward Newton and Jos. Rickard, two young men who were recently sent by the detectives to the headquarters on Genesee-street to offer

their services and to secure information, without being required to present references or to show proof of their reliability or good character, were immediately furnished with uniforms and sent out to solicit money from the public. "You may keep 50 per cent. of all the money you collect," Spangler is said to have told the young men. Mrs. Clara Graham of 33 Broadway

has signed the following statement: "I do hereby testify that in nine months I collected \$588 for the American Salvation Army and all that was done with the money was to support Major East, his family and his soldiers. At that time they had ten collectors besides myself." Major East, who started the Buffalo branch of the army just two years ago, left the city last May. Mrs. East,

who had charge of the work for some time after her husband's departure, is now at work in Chicago. "The American Salvation Army" is not the well-known Salvation Army which in Buffalo has a well-organized system of charities. It is entirely distinct from that body and, as far as can be learned, has no means of doing relief work. It is managed by James A. Duffin of Philadelphia.

**NEW YORK STOCK MARKET HAS A BUOYANT PERIOD**

Union Pacific and Some Other Issues Reach High Prices for the Year—Toronto Market Inactive.

World Office, Friday Evening, Nov. 27.  
 There was a little widening in the matter of business at the Toronto Stock Exchange to-day, but in no instance were prices much firmer than they have been.

The facts in regard to the proposed deal with the Toronto Electric Light shareholders are gradually leaking out and are practically the same as those mentioned in these columns two weeks ago, namely, that the Toronto Electric Light shareholders are to get an exchange of the Toronto Power debentures on a basis of five for four Electric Light shares. The Toronto Power debentures are expected to pay 7 per cent. This is figured as returning about the present rate of dividend on the Toronto Electric Light shares. There were small transactions in the Toronto Electric shares to-day and the price reached as high as 135. Mackay common was fairly firm, but there seems to be plenty of stock for sale at around the 76 level. Winnipeg Electric had a sudden decline of about points, but recovered a point after the sale of 50 shares had been executed. The foreign securities in the market were extremely dull and only steady in price. In the investment department there were fewer transactions to-day, but prices showed the same strong undertone which has marked them for some time. Whatever speculative enthusiasm exists for listed issues is being given in the New York market just now and very little interest is therefore taken in the local exchange.

A Visit to Floyd Property. Mr. N. C. Mick, editor of the "Cobalt Nugget," Cobalt, Ontario, writes to the President of the Floyd Silver Mines, Limited, in his letter of November 4th, 1908, as follows:

"I paid a trip to the property of the Floyd Silver Mines Limited yesterday afternoon, and, as you requested me before leaving Cobalt, I hereby enclose my personal opinion of the future prospects of the mine property. In the vein, calcite appears to be the predominant feature and with the proper depth good paying ore should be located. I would advise sinking the shaft another one hundred and fifty feet.'"

Navigation is now closed and shipments of heavy goods have fallen off. Country trade is moderately active, although the arrival of cold weather is much to be desired. Receipts of produce are not heavy and prices are holding up well. It is understood the Grand Trunk Railway contemplates the building of new terminal facilities here. The plans as reported include a new station and much track laying and facilities will be provided for the new Grand Trunk Pacific road.

Toronto reports say: General business conditions have shown little change during the past week. The weather has been unfavorable to retail trade, but wholesalers appear satisfied with the volume of orders. The demand for winter drygoods keeps up well and the sorting trade in this connection promises to be good as soon as cold weather appears. The trade for next spring is in advance of what it was a year ago and prospects for future business are considered excellent. Reasonable hardware continues to move well and the building trade keeps busy. Much activity is promised for this line next season. The demand for builders' hardware seems to be heavy in all parts of the country. Shipments of all lines of holiday goods have been heavy and a brisk trade is looked forward to. Country trade is moderate. Collections from all directions are satisfactory. The trade in provisions and grain is active. Hide prices show a slight tendency towards improvement, but trade is quiet. Orders for leather are more plentiful, although manufacturers are only fairly busy. The demand for provisions has improved while prices are easier.

Whitney reports say: Warm weather has hindered business here during the past week, but the outlook is bright for a good trade as soon as cooler weather sets in. Travelers report retailers' stocks light and good sorting orders are already coming in. The demand for furs and heavy drygoods is light, but the holiday

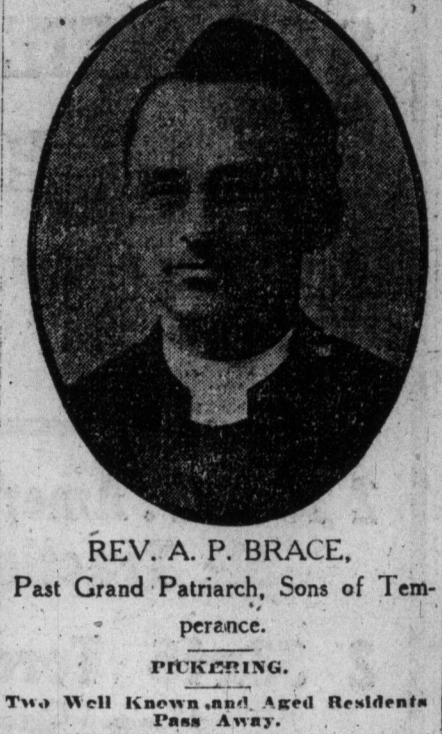
