working double time and have their output sold over a year ahead, it does not mean so much. Twenty-five years at 10.000 tons per day would exhaust even this latest big colliery. The coal lands of the Canadian Northwest are being pretty eagerly bought up, and the opportunities for securing bituminous coal lands are get-ting very rare. It is not generally known by the pub lic that the area of bituminous coal i Western Canada is practically limited to the Crow's Nest district in Southern Alberta and the Peace River district in Northern British Columbia. There are enormous deposits of lignitic ting very rare. Christmas in England.

There are enormous deposits of lightlic coals in Alberta, Manitoba and Sas-katchewan, but the lightlic coals are unfit for railway purposes, for the rea-son that they produce cinders which cause prairie and forest fires, and, con-sequently, involve the railways in heavy damages. It is a well-known fact that the C.P.R. were importing bitumbaus coals from Kentucky and lact that the C.F.R. were imperfuls bituminous coals from Kentucky and Ohio for use during the dry seasons before the Crow's Nest Company's mines were opened up. 


