No Superintendent of District Union can fulfil her official obligations unless she secures in EACH local Union a Superintendent with whom she can be in constant co-operation for the purpose of advancing the work in their department.

This Union was organized March, 25th, 1887. It had previously

been working under the name of the Conference Union.

It comprises 11 Unions, with a membership of 502. There were nineteen business meetings neld and a devotional meeting the first Monday in each month, the different unions taking charge. Work has been done in the following departments:

Evangelistic.—Mrs Cowan, Supt., reports effective work done by the different Unions, such as Gospel Temperance Meetings, Mothers' Meetings, Prayer Meetings, Bible Meetings, personal visitation, and practical

work given, and tract distribution.

White Shield.—Mrs. Jarman, Supt., addressed several meetings, distributed literature and received a number of signatures to Purity

Sailors.—Mrs. J. Cowan, Supt., reports literature placed in boxes on Pledges. the steamers. Three Unions, viz.: Central, Parkdale and Bathurst, as-

sisted in the work. Soldiers---Mrs. McDowell, Supt. 500 Temperance Heralds, containing a letter from W. C. T. U. to the soldiers were distributed in the cars for volunteers leaving the city to celebrate the 24th May. 1000 more

were sent to Niagara camp. Lumbermen.-Mrs. Shortreed, Supt.; different Unions have contributed literature to this department, which has been distributed by the

Superintendent.

Railroad.—Mrs. Jarman, Supt.; meetings were held for the em-

4. -To 5. -To waited on the Minister of Education yesterday afternoon for the purpose of receiving explanations as to the position of the subject of scientific temperance instruction in the public schools, as affected by the new regulation about to be issued by the Educational Department. Those supporting the deputation were Messrs. J. J. McLaren, Q.C.; Daniel Rose, District Chief Good Templar; W. R. Watson, Independent Order of Good Templars; Wm. Munns, Royal Templars; and J. N. McKendry, Young Men's Prohibition Club.

Mr. McLaren introduced the deputation, for whom Mrs. McDonell was the spokeswoman. She said the unions were deeply interested in the subject of scientific temperance instruction. They hoped his answer would do much to clear up doubts which existed regarding the new regulation, and would also show the country that the department would see to it that the subject be taught in every public school. Mrs. McDonell then read the following questions, to which Mr. Ross replied categorically:

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS.

1. Does the new regulation, regarding the full scope of which we are still somewhat in doubt, place the subject of scientific temperance instruction among the subjects set forth in the programme of studies prescribed by the Education department—as referred to under "Duties of Teachers," regulation No. 46, clause 4?

Mr. Ross—Yes. The subjects of temperance and hygiene are placed on the programme of studies, and the teacher is under the same obligation to teach scientific temperance as he is to teach any other subject—such as reading, writing, etc. I took pains in framing the new regulation that

there should be no mistake as to that.

2. Under regulation No. 24 of the Education Department discretionary power is left with the trustees and the inspector under necessary circumstances to modify the programme of studies set forth by the department. In the event of this discretionary power being exercised for the purpose of excluding the subject of scientific temperance instruction from any public school, what action would the Education Department take in the matter? Would the Education Department deal with the exclusion of scientific temperance instruction in a similar manner to that in which it would deal with the exclusion of reading, writing or arithmetic, or any other subject on the regular programme of studies? For instance, where the money grant would be withheld for the omission of reading, would it be withheld for the omission of temperance teaching as set forth?

Mr. Ross—Under regulation 24 the trustees have no power to omit any subject from the school curriculum prescribed by the department. The regulation never intended that any subject prescribed by the department should be omitted by the trustees, nor is it intended that scientific

temperance be omitted.

If the inspector reports that parts of the curriculum or of the studies. scientific temperance instruction is not taught as it should be in any school, the grant would certainly be withdrawn. At least, so far as I am concerned, I would insist on such being done.

3. Will the subject of scientific temperance instruction be placed on a list of departmental examinations for public school pupils?

I do not in the Mr. Ross-No. Not for public school pupils. meantime propose to do so. There are various reasons why I think it would not be wise to do so. But I may state that every certified teacher must pass an examination in scientific temperance knowledge, whether he be a teacher for public or high schools.

4. Will the authorized temperance text book be placed on the list of books to be used by the pupils in the public schools in a similar manner to the text books in arithmetic, grammar and other school studies?

Mr. Ross-It is now in that position. But the use of a text book as a matter of law is not, nor has ever been, compulsory in the public schools of Ontario, in any subject; at the same time, where text books are used they must be authorized.

5. What machinery has the Education Department control of to enforce the use of authorized text books in the public schools, and how far would that machinery be applied in the case of the authorized temperance text book?

Mr. Ross-It is the duty of the inspector to report upon everything affecting the efficiency of every public school in their districts. There is no means of knowing the regulations are complied with except by those reports. Should an inspector complain in the matter of temperance, and should the complaint be good, the grant would be withheld.

6. Has the new regulation been yet officially issued to the inspectors,

and if not when may we expect its issue?

Mr. Ross-I have the last proof of the regulation by me; the regu-

lation will be out in a few days.

7. Will the Minister of Education change the wording of the new regulation so as to substitute the word "shall" for "should," and so remove the doubts to which the regulation as it stands has given rise?

Mr. Ross-I would be quite willing to do so were it necessary, but "Should" has been used in it is not necessary to alter the wording. The same word applies to those regulations for twenty or thirty years. all subjects on the programme, and everyone should now know its meaning.

Mrs. McDonell-I am still a little puzzled over the matter. You say no departmental examinations will be required, and yet you say scientific temperance instruction is on an equal footing with arithmetic or grammar.

Mr. Ross-All the subjects on the programme are not included in the departmental examinations. For instance, music is not a subject of examination, nor drill or calisthenics, and drawing was only recently made so.

Mr. Ross—Yes, as compulsory as reading. But I suppose teachers will not hold themselves responsible for teaching it until the new regulation is in their hands.

Mr. McKendry-The deputation would like to know why scientific

temperance is not a subject of departmental examination?

Mr. Ross—It is a subject of oral examination, just as reading, etc., is. Only some 10,000 pupils who desire to enter the high schools would be affected by a departmental examination, and we must consider that there are complaints at present that we examine in too many subjects. But if the subjects were properly taught, the mere examination would be of secondary importance.

Mr. McKendry-How are you to know whether the subject will be

efficiently taught unless there are to be examinations?

Mr. Ross—An inspector visits the school twice a year with instructions to examine in every subject, and he will report any deficiency in

temperance as in other subjects.

Mrs. McDonell—Why not make it a subject of examination? We are very anxious that it should not only be taught from the second form up, but that it should be a subject of departmental examination. One value of such an examination would be that teachers would more earnestly teach the subject, knowing that it would meet any pupil desiring to enter the high school, at the entrance examination.

Mr. Ross—I have stated the reason, which seems good at present, No doubt the departmental examination asked for will come. I have placed the subject precisely on the same footing as any other subject on the programme, and I have no doubt the inspectors will carry out the

regulation.

The deputation then withdrew.

Deputations also waited upon the High and Public School Boards with regard to the Temperance Lext-book, and, in conjunction with another Society, upon the Provincial Secretary for the purpose of having it placed in each cell of prison and reformatory.

A Complimentary Social was given to the Public School Teachers and Normal Students, and prizes costing \$13.00 to the scholars for the

three best essays on Temperance.

Unfermented Wine.—Mrs. Baxter, Supt. There are forty-three churches using unfermented wine.

Fair Work.—Mrs. Sinclair, Supt. A tent was placed on the Fair Grounds; two meetings held daily for two weeks, eighty children signed the Pledge and received illustrated cards. 10,000 pages of literature distributed. A large number of signatures obtained to the World's Petition. A collection taken of \$73.34.

Franchise, Legislation and Petitions.—Mrs. J. Spence, Supt., reports signatures obtained to Women's Franchise and World's Petition, also municipal election work.

Press.—Mrs. Carman, Supt., reports 433 items sent to the daily papers through the different Unions, besides special articles.

Headquarters.—This is a new department, formed about six months The great drawback and hindrance to the work of every department is the need of a Home of our own. This has been a long-felt want, more particularly in the Y. W. C. T. U. branch. Their work is almost wholly among young women and children. They must have airy rooms. We have started out in faith trusting in God we will succeed. The first and most important step has been taken, viz.: selecting a suitable site. The price being \$30,000; \$5,000 to be paid down. The remainder, \$25,000, we purpose leaving on interest at $5\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., secured by mortgage. The income from the nine houses on the property will about pay all interest on that amount until we are ready to build. The situation is central, size 122 feet on Shuter Street by 110 feet on Victoria Street, with the advantage of three fronts, one of them being a wide block-paved lane in the rear of the Yonge Street stores. The plans at present are very indefinite, all our energies being centred on paying the first \$5,000; that being done we will talk about building. We want our Home to be consecrated to God, home, native land and temperance, and we earnestly hope that every Christian women's organization will join hands and help build a woman's building that will be a credit to the women of Toronto. "Every wise woman buildeth her own house"-Prov. 14:1.

We have on the roll 159 names of members in good standing. 76 of these joined our Union since our last annual meeting.

MEETINGS.

During the year we have held 28 business meetings, at which there was an average attendance of 25. Devotional meetings were also held previous to the time at which this department of work was taken up by the District Union. In all, the Central has had charge of five devotional meetings; these, of course, do not include those conducted under the management of the Evangelistic Superintendent.

DEPARTMENTS OF WORK.

Superintendents were appointed and work carried on in the following departments:

Legislation and Franchise.—Mrs. Millar. In St. James' and St. John's wards the women voters were called upon and their votes solicited for temperance Mayor and Aldermen. We contributed \$10 towards the campaign against Scott Act repeal in Halton.

Scientific Temperance Instruction.—Mrs. Orr. Sent representatives to the Minister of Education and to the Public School Board, also to the Provincial Secretary.

Evangelistic.—Mrs. D. Cowan. Visited the gaol; noticed every special day of prayer.

Literature.—Mrs. McMillan, jr. 19,500 pages of different kinds of literature distributed.

Press.—Miss McGregor. Contributed items to five daily papers regularly, and special reports to the Canada Citizen and Woman's Journal.

Sailors—Mrs. J. Swift. From the 1st of June the Eastern ports were visited weekly, tracts distributed, and when families were found, a short time was spent in conversation. We were pleased to learn that very little drinking prevails among the hands while on duty, as one captain informed us Lake Ontario is too treacherous a water upon which to trust a cargo to liquor-loving men. The greatest danger to those employed upon the schooners is while in the city, as their duties cease upon the arrival of the vessel.

Our Union has also supplied literature for the receivers placed upon the steamers by the District Union. We were informed that the literature was read by the passengers, more particularly by the children. If those leaflets, placed as they are with a prayer that they may be messengers of mercy to some, should carry that message to even a few, our toil would be more than rewarded.

Unfermented Wine.—Mrs. Bastedo. 28 pastors of churches were written to and the following information gleaned: 13 churches are using unfermented wine 9 using fermented, 1 no sacrament and 5 were not heard from.

A great number of socials have been given in aid of the Union and the Building Fund, and one complimentary to the Y.M.C.A.; collection taken at all, \$178.40.

Our Union has a membership of 11. We have had twelve meetings during the year, with an average attendance of seven. We have given two entertainments, viz.: a concert in October by which we realized a net gain of \$8.60, and an "At Home," held in April, when we gained \$23.96. We started a Band of Hope in November which now has 150 names on the roll, and for use in this work we purchased an organ at a cost of \$55, on which we still owe \$23. We distributed to the children \$4.50 of temperance catechisms, and two entertainments were given by them. We have donated six baskets of provisions to the poor in our neighborhood, have sent temperance items to two papers, and have procured seven subscribers for the Journal, besides distributing 1100 text cards to the children at the Exhibition.

CONSTITUTION OF THE DISTRICT UNION OF TORONTO.

ARTICLE I.

The objects of the Union shall be:

1. The centralization of the work of the various Toronto Local Unions for more effectively carrying out the objects for which they were formed.

2. Joint consultation and advice on plans for more effective work.

3. Formation of new Unions in the city, where it may be deemed advisable.

ARTICLE II.

The officers of this Union shall be: President, Vice-President, Corresponding Secretary, Recording Secretary and Treasurer. These officers shall be elected by ballot after open nominations or informal ballot, at Annual Meeting. Presidents of Local Unions shall be Vice-Presidents, ex-officio, of the District Union.

ARTICLES III.

The Executive Committee shall consist of the President, Vice-President, Medials & Secretaries, Treasurer, Secretaries of Local Unions, and Superintendents of Departments, appointed by the District Union, five of whom, including the President and Corresponding Secretary, shall form a quorum. Should any of the representatives of Local Unions be unable to attend, their Union should appoint a substitute. This committee shall have general management of affairs in the Union, and nominate Superintendents of departments of work required in the city.

ARTICLE IV .- DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

1. The duties of the President shall be, to preside at all meetings, have supervision of work in the city, organize new Unions, and issue calls for meetings, and at the written request of eight members call special meetings.

2. Vice-President shall assist in managing the work of the Union, and shall preside in the absence of the President.

3. Local Presidents shall assist in managing the work of the Union, and aim to create and stimulate interest in same, assist in organization and preside in the absence of the President and Vice-President of District.

The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Union, notify Local Unions of new branches of work, send the name and address of each officer and Superintendent in Local Unions to corresponding officers in the County Union, secure reports from the Corresponding Secretaries of Local Unions from which she shall formulate a report to the County Union and assist the President in preparing for the Annual Meeting.

5. The Recording Secretary shall attend all meetings of the Union and of the Executive Committee, and keep a correct record of their proceedings and send to each member of the Executive Committee, notice of such meetings. She shall apprise all members of committees of their appointment and duties, notify the public of its meetings, and file and sign all orders at the request of the President.

6. The Trea Secretary, keep a same.

Superintendents of departments shall advise and encourage the Local Superintendents in the prosecution of their branch of work, subject to the approval of the Executive, secure reports of same, and embody each seperately in their representative reports to the County Convention, giving each Union credit by name.

ARTICLE V.

1. The Annual Meeting shall be held in ———— (time and place to be settled at previous meeting of the Executive). Notice of any amendment to be given at the Executive Meeting a month previous to the Annual. The Executive shall meet monthly.

2. Funds for carrying on the District work may be raised by any means
