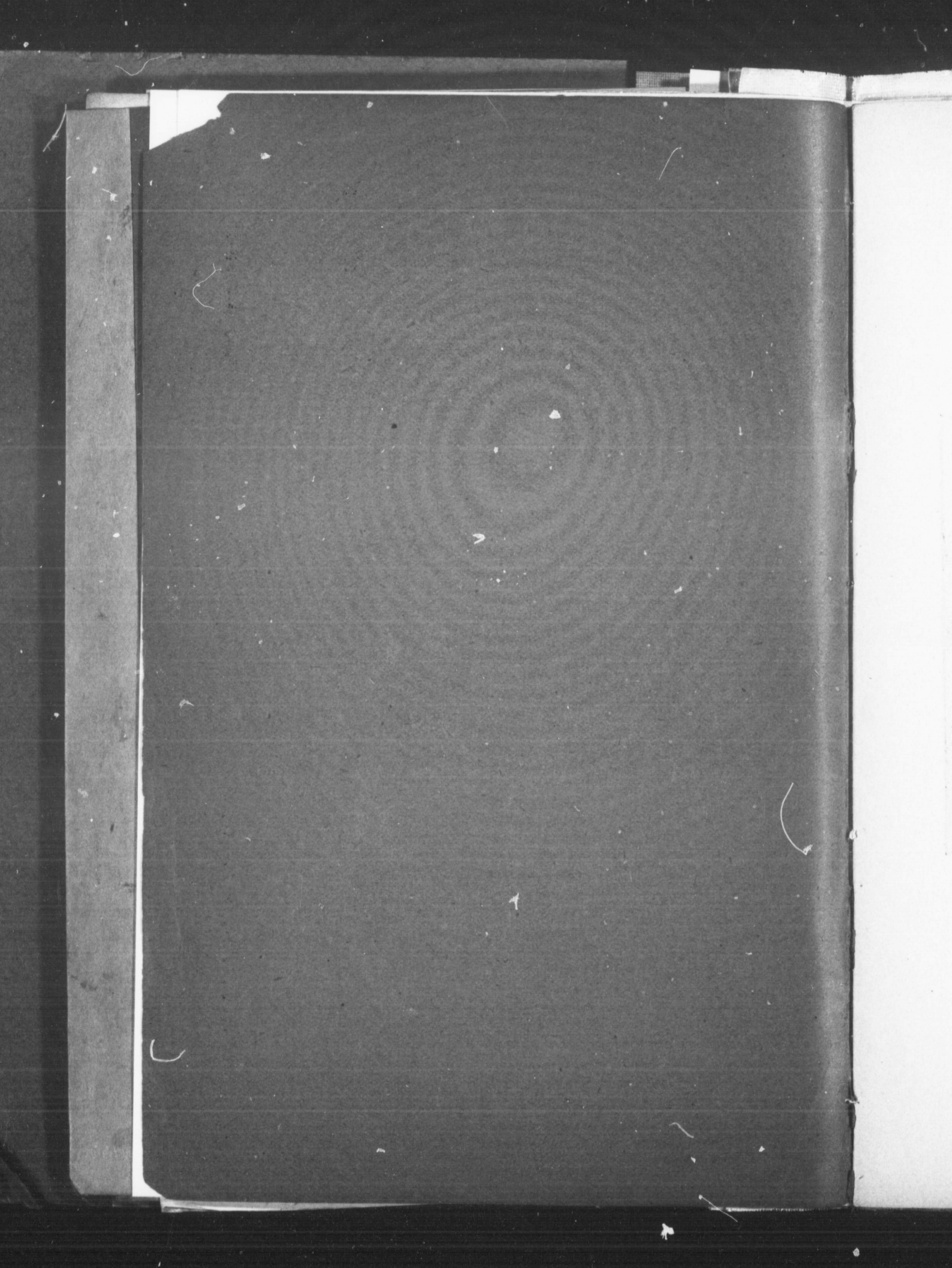

SECRETARY'S REPORT FOR YEAR ENDED SEPT. 30, 1893.

The year just closed has been without doubt the most eventful in the history of the Hospital. From small beginnings three years ago the institution has prospered continually, and now, having outlived the trying period of infancy, we see it budding forth into a strong and vigorous youth, with a "local habitation and a name." In the last annual report it was mentioned that, through the interest of kind friends, a building suitable for hospital purposes had been secured on the corner of College and Huron streets; into this building the staff and patients were removed early in January, 1893, and the institution is now known as "Grace Hospital (Homeopathic)."

The increased accommodation afforded by the new building has been of the greatest importance to the welfare of the Hospital. It is now possible to provide for a much greater number of patients both in public and private wards, and also to admit a larger staff of nurses in the Training School. The building itself is extremely bright and cheerful, and much thoughtful care and taste have been displayed in the furnishing and appointments generally.

The private and semi-private wards have nearly all been furnished by friends of the Hospital. They number nineteen in all, and some are named as follows: The "Grant Macdonald," the "Robert Baldwin," the "Christie-Palmer," the "Annie Roper," the "Mary," the "Lilias Piper," the "Todhunter," the "Gurney," the "Sutherland," the "Jacques," the "Reid" and the "King's Daughters," which latter at present contains one free bed fully endowed. It might be mentioned that this is the only endowed bed in the Hospital. On the third floor are the Children's Wards, among which are the "Theodore," the "King's Daughters," and the "Jack"; also the following cots: the "Caro," the "In Memoriam," and the "Two Friends."

The public wards have also been fitted up in a bright and tasteful manner, and, as far as possible, with a view to the comfort and convenience of the patients. They contain in all 69 beds, which is inclusive of the Maternity Ward. This latter ward occupies the whole of the wing to the west of the main building.

The total number of patients treated in the Hospital during the year was 423, as against 380 last year; of these 394 have been admitted since the removal to the new quarters. The largest number of

patients in the Hospital at one time was during the month of March, 1893, when 82 patients were under treatment.

In consequence of the decision of the Board to allow private patients the attendance of any qualified physician they might desire, irrespective of his medical school, seventeen Allopathic physicians have had patients in the private wards to the number of 21 in all. These physicians have in every case expressed themselves as entirely satisfied with the nursing and attention received by their patients.

The efficiency of the Training School is further attested by the establishment of a medal, by Mr. and Mrs. W. H. VanderSmussen, for the nurse obtaining 75 per cent. on all her examinations. This efficiency is mainly due to the careful training received by the nurses at the hands of Miss Brent, whose services as Lady Superintendent of the Hospital and of the Training School continue to be of the greatest value to the Medical Staff and management.

The position of House Physician is now filled by a fully qualified practitioner, Wm. Chambers, M.D., the former house physician having been a third year student.

The patients have been visited from time to time by many kind friends, and religious services have been held regularly for those able to attend. The Rector and Curate of St. Stephen's Parish have been unremitting in their attentions, and, in addition to other ministrations, have baptized several infants in the Maternity Ward.

In the autumn of 1892 the necessity for immediate aid to the funds of the Hospital became very urgent, and after some deliberation it was decided to give an entertainment for that purpose. The outcome of this decision was the production in December last of the "Marriage Dramas," under the management of Miss C. H. Allan, of Arlington, Mass. The undertaking proved in every way a distinct success, both artistically and financially, and benefited the funds of the hospital to the extent of something over \$1,000. The management would take this somewhat tardy opportunity to express their sincere thanks to the many ladies and gentlemen who so kindly gave their time and services on the occasion, and particularly is their gratitude due to Mr. S. B. Brush, through whose untiring energy and excellent management the financial success was mainly owing.

Through the exertions of a few of the ladies, a very successful Strawberry Festival was given in the Granite Rink, early in July last, the proceeds of which were applied to the purchase of a large refrigerator, a long felt want; also a complete set of rubber pads for the stairs throughout the building, and a set of oak and cane chairs and portierre curtains for the Board Room.

The Women's Auxiliary has been active, as usual, during the year, and has given much assistance to the Hospital, particularly at the time of the removal to the new quarters. Special attention is called to their report, which will be found on another page.

The Board have, with great reluctance, been obliged to accept Mrs. Vere Brown's resignation of the Secretaryship, and would express to her their warm appreciation of her work for, and interest in, the welfare of the Hospital, which interest they trust she will continue to manifest.

In conclusion we may add that while much has undoubtedly been done in the past, much still remains for the future to accomplish, and it becomes all not to "weary in well-doing." It must be remembered that except for bare running expenses, the Hospital is in no sense self-supporting, and the interest and annual payments due under the mortgages must be a cause of more or less anxiety to the Trustees for some time to come. For the removal of this anxiety and the establishment of Grace Hospital on a permanent and substantial basis, we must look for assistance to our friends and the public generally, not as though asking charity at their hands, but rather in the sense of putting within their reach the great privilege of practically aiding a noble work.

Medical Report.

FOR YEAR ENDED SEPT. 30, 1893.

The Report of In-patients treated during the year is most satisfactory, showing an increase of 120 patients over the number treated during the previous year.

The private wards have been almost constantly occupied, many old school physicians availing themselves of the privilege of using them. The death rate per cent., 2.70, is exceedingly low. Of the deaths *one* was caused by Pernicious Anæmia, *two* by Heart Disease, *two* by Consumption, *one* by Tuberculosis of the bowels, *one* by Cirrhosis of the Liver, *one* by General Tuberculosis, *two* by Pneumonia and *one* by Hemorrhage of the Bowels during Typhoid Fever.

In the Maternity Wards, there were *five* infants still-born, and *two* died within a week of Congenital Syphilis. These are not counted in the death rate.

Report of the Training School for Nurses.

YEAR ENDED SEPTEMBER 30, 1893.

The third year of the Training School has been one of hard work with, I hope, good results. With the greater number of patients has naturally followed more variety of cases, many being operations of a very serious nature requiring most careful and intelligent nursing, and we have great reason to be thankful for the results of these as well as of our medical cases.

The admission of patients under treatment by physicians of the other school has been beneficial to the nurses, and these physicians, as well as those of our own staff, have expressed themselves as being entirely satisfied with the care given.

Our School has greatly increased in numbers during the last year. In September, 1892, there were fourteen nurses in the school; in the corresponding month of this year the number was twenty-two. Increasing the staff of nurses so rapidly has of necessity given us a great number of juniors and that has handicapped us a good deal. Owing to the press of work in the Hospital we have not been able to supply many outside calls, but those nurses who have been sent out have brought home good reports.

The health of the nurses has, on the whole, been good, three only having been seriously ill, but owing to the untiring care of the physicians attending the cases, we are thankful to say that none of them proved fatal.

Four nurses have graduated with honors and of the number going up for examinations last spring, half passed with honors.

I can furnish no better proof of the satisfaction given by the nurses than the following letter from Prof. W. H. VanderSmisssen of University College, dated May 31, 1893:

"Moved by the great kindness and unremitting attention shown to my wife throughout her stay at Grace Hospital, we desire to found a medal for the nurses of your Training School, as a slight token of our appreciation of her treatment and in memory of our eldest son, whose early death we still mourn.

"The conditions on which we desire this medal to be awarded are contained in the accompanying draft of a deed which I am ready to execute with this object in view. I also enclose designs for the proposed medal.

"This deed I am ready to execute as soon as your acceptance shall be signified, handing over to you at the same time a cheque for the necessary amount.

"I may add that, as our chief desire is the good of the Hospital and the advancement of the Training School for Nurses, I shall be glad to consider carefully any suggestions the Board may think proper to offer with regard either to the qualities for which the medal shall be awarded or the manner of that award.

"The medal is to be given annually to the nurse who, during her service at the Hospital, has shown in the highest degree the following characteristics, namely: skill in nursing, punctuality, personal neatness, general orderliness, a gentle voice and manner, patience, self-control and discretion in all intercourse and conversation with patients and fellow-employees, and (above all) cheerful submission to authority.

"The medal shall be awarded as follows: It shall be open to all nurses who have completed their course satisfactorily and have passed the final written examination with honors. As soon as possible after each annual final written examination, the senior and junior Medical Examiners, together with the Lady Superintendent, shall select not less than two or more than three nurses who, in their opinion, possess

Report of the Women's Auxiliary.

FOR YEAR ENDED SEPT. 30. 1893.

The Auxiliary met weekly during the past year. Money collected by fees, cards, and donations, \$105. This money was expended in the purchase of material which was made up by the Auxiliary. The following are some of the articles made: 6 linen table cloths, 13 damask tray cloths, 21 washstand covers, 3 pincushions, 9 toilet mats, 11 tea cosies, 15 bureau scarfs, 1 dozen duster bags, 1 dozen egg cosies, 34 brush and comb bags, sheets, pillow cases, towels, surgical and glass towels, wrappers, night gowns, chemises. Material bought by Hospital and also donated and made up by Auxiliary: 54 pairs of sheets, 8 table cloths, 24 curtains, 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ dozen towels, and 26 night gowns.

Some of the members visited at the Hospital, others sent donations of fruit and delicacies through the summer.

Mrs. Clarkson and Miss Shanly have also given much assistance in making up material.

Act of Incorporation.

56 Vic., Chap. CXIII. Assented to May 27, 1893.

AN ACT TO INCORPORATE GRACE HOSPITAL (HOMŒOPATHIC.)

Whereas the Toronto Homœopathic Hospital and Free Dispensary Association carrying on its work in the City of Toronto, is an institution incorporated under the provisions of the "Act respecting Benevolent, Provident and other Societies;" and whereas the said corporation has represented by petition that its operations have been greatly increased since its foundation, that voluntary contributions, bequests and legacies from those interested in the welfare of the institution are the principal means of raising the large amount of money necessary for the maintenance of the Hospital and Dispensary in the City of Toronto, and that by reason of the increase in magnitude and importance of the work of the said charity, it is desirable to obtain a special Act of Incorporation providing for the more efficient management of the affairs of the said institution and enlarging its powers of taking gifts, devises and bequests made for the benefit of the said institution; and whereas the present corporators, Joseph Easton McDougall, John Gordon Brown, Clarkson Jones, Frank Arnoldi, Thomas McCracken, Frederic John Stewart, James Henderson, John Drysdale Nasmith, Frederic Roper, John M. Burnside, Elizabeth Maria Baldwin, Marianne Henderson, Marian Torrance Gibson, Georgina Martha Hoyles, Zippie Simpson Jones, Caroline Brown, Sarah Minerva Macdonald, Henrietta Walsh, Mary Vandersmissen, Appa Grant Tyrrell, and Kathleen O'Brien have by their petition set forth the facts aforesaid and have prayed for a special Act of Incorporation vesting the assets, affairs and management of the said corporation in the hands of five trustees and their successors, and have named Joseph Easton McDougall, of Toronto, county judge, Frederic Roper, of Toronto, accountant, William Barclay McMurrich, of Toronto, barrister, John D. Nasmith, of Toronto, manufacturer, and Edward Gurney, of Toronto, manufacturer, as the first board of trustees; and whereas it is expedient to grant the prayer of the said petition;

Therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the said Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, enacts as follows:—

1. The said Joseph Easton McDougall, Frederic Roper, William Barclay McMurrich, John Drysdale Nasmith and Edward Gurney and their successors are hereby constituted and declared a body corporate and politic by the name of "Grace Hospital (Homœopathic)," and by that name shall have perpetual succession and a common seal, and by that name shall sue and be sued and shall have all the powers, rights and authorities in addition to those hereinafter given, now vested in the Toronto Homœopathic Hospital and Free Dispensary Association as heretofore incorporated under the Act aforesaid.

2. All the assets of every kind now vested in or owned or held by the Toronto Homœopathic Hospital and Free Dispensary Association as heretofore incorporated under a certain declaration made in pursuance of the provisions of section 2, of an "Act Respecting Benevolent, Provident and other Societies," are hereby vested in and transferred to the said corporation hereby constituted, with full power subject always to the terms of any gift, devise or bequest affecting the same to hold, sell, mortgage and manage the same, and all property hereafter acquired by the corpo-

ration hereby constituted, and the corporation hereby constituted shall be entitled to take, hold and receive all gifts, devises and bequests heretofore lawfully made and not yet paid over to the Toronto Homœopathic Hospital and Free Dispensary Association as heretofore incorporated.

3. The corporation hereby constituted shall assume and be liable for all the debts, obligations and liabilities of the Toronto Homœopathic Hospital and Free Dispensary Association as heretofore constituted.

4. The corporation hereinbefore named and their successors shall have the management of the affairs of the said corporation and shall appoint all officers for conducting its affairs and shall regulate the discipline and management, make such regulations for the government of the said hospital as shall to them seem meet and expedient, and make by-laws, rules and regulations for the effective government and management of the affairs of the said corporation.

5. In case of the death or resignation of any of the said Trustees, the vacancy so caused shall be filled up at the regular meeting by a majority of the remaining Trustees, the name of the proposed Trustee or Trustees being sent to each Trustee at least one week prior to the meeting at which such new Trustee or Trustees is or are to be appointed.

6. The corporation hereby constituted is authorized and empowered to take all gifts, legacies and bequests of money or personalty, and to acquire, hold and possess so much land as may from time to time be necessary for the actual use and occupation of the said corporation whether the same be acquired by gift, devise or bequest or by purchase, and the said corporation in addition to such lands as may be required for its actual use and occupation as aforesaid, is hereby authorized and empowered to take by gift, devise or bequest, lands, tenements or hereditaments and interests therein, the annual value of which together with all other lands, tenements and hereditaments or any interests therein theretofore acquired by like means and then held by the corporation, shall not exceed in the whole the annual value of \$15,000, but such last mentioned lands, tenements or hereditaments or interests therein shall not be held for a longer period than 7 years from the acquisition thereof, and within that period shall be absolutely disposed of by the said corporation, and such lands, tenements or hereditaments or interests therein as have not within the said period been so disposed of, shall revert to the person from whom the same were acquired, his heirs, executors, administrators and assigns; and the proceeds of the sales or all or any part of the moneys derived therefrom or from any other source may be invested from time to time in mortgage securities upon real estate whether freehold or leasehold, and also in municipal debentures or the debentures of any society or company in which any trustee under section 30 of the "Act Respecting Trustees and Executors and the Administration of Estates," and under any Act or Acts amending the same may invest any trust fund.

By-Laws, Rules and Regulations,

ADOPTED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, NOV. 25, 1893.

BY-LAWS.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

1. The Trustees shall annually elect by a majority vote, at their first meeting in November of each year, a Chairman who shall preside at all meetings, sign on behalf of the corporation all deeds, mortgages, cheques, notes, leases, contracts, and instruments which the Trustees or the corporation may authorise or require to be executed or be bound to execute. During the absence from Toronto, or illness, or other incapacity of the Chairman, the remaining Trustees may appoint an acting Chairman who, while so acting, shall have all the powers of the Chairman.

2. The regular meeting of the Trustees shall be held on the first Saturday after the first Thursday of each month, at an hour to be named by the Chairman, or by resolution of the Trustees, and the same may be varied from time to time without affecting the regularity of the meeting.

3. At such regular monthly meeting all accounts for the previous month shall be examined and passed, and any other business may be brought before the Trustees.

4. Meetings may be held at any time on the call of the Chairman or at the request of any two Trustees. Business of any nature, save and except any alteration to these by-laws, rules, and regulations, may be transacted at these special meetings without special notice. It shall be necessary before any alteration of a by-law, rule, or regulation shall be made, to give each Trustee a week's notice in writing of the proposed change.

5. Each Trustee shall, for one month in rotation, be allotted the duty of visiting the Hospital, and is expected to pay at least three visits during his month. A book shall be kept at the Hospital for the purpose, and the visiting Trustee may enter therein any observations he may desire to make relative to the management of the Hospital, or any other matter that he may think proper; and such book shall be produced at each regular monthly meeting of the Trustees.

6. The Trustees shall at each annual meeting aforesaid elect one of their number to be Secretary and Treasurer of the Trust. As Secretary he shall take and record the minutes of all meetings of the Board of Trustees, and as Treasurer he shall receive and bank all funds to the credit of the corporation, keep an accurate account of the income and expenditure of the institution, countersign all deeds, mortgages, cheques, notes, leases, and contracts; collect rents, interest, and other income; maintain all insurance; pay all salaries, wages, accounts, and claims, and take proper receipts for the same; and keep in a safe place all deeds, mortgages, contracts, books, accounts, reports, etc., belonging to or relating to the Trust, and take charge of any money or effects of any patients dying in the Hospital, which may not be claimed by the person entitled by law to receive the same. He shall deposit all moneys received on account of the Hospital in some incorporated bank, having its head office in Toronto, to the credit of "Grace Hospital (Homœopathic)", and the same shall only be drawn from the said account by cheques signed by the Chairman, or in his absence by the acting Chairman, and countersigned by the Treasurer. The Treasurer's accounts shall be audited by an auditor or auditors to be named by the Trustees. The Treasurer shall furnish

monthly to the Secretary of the Board of Management, hereinafter referred to, a summary of the financial position of the Hospital, and shall once a year prepare a statement of its affairs for the previous twelve months, ending September 30, showing in detail all moneys received from all sources, the manner in which the same has been expended and invested, and any other information necessary to show the financial position of the Hospital.

7. The Trustees shall, after consultation with the Board of Management, appoint all officers and other employees other than female domestic servants (which latter shall be appointed by the Board of Management), remove or discharge them, fix the salaries and the wages, and regulate or vary from time to time the number, position and duties of the said officers and other employees.

8. They may make or cause to be made, through the Board of Management, all arrangements for the purchase by public tender or otherwise of furniture, stores, medicine, food, clothing and other necessaries required for the use of the Hospital, its employees and patients.

9. They shall determine, after consultation with the Board of Management, the number of wards for pay patients and the rates to be paid by pay patients, and give such directions as to reception and discharge of patients as they may deem expedient; but there shall always be provided both a male and a female public ward for the accommodation of at least forty patients.

10. They shall have general charge and care of all property belonging to the Hospital. They may lease or sell such portions of the Hospital property as they may deem advantageous, upon such terms as they may consider beneficial to the Hospital.

11. They shall approve of rules for the reasonable admission of parents and relatives and other persons to visit the patients.

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

12. A Board of Management to consist of not more than thirty ladies, who may be disposed to assist in the work of the Hospital, shall be appointed by the Trustees.

13. The Board, at their first meeting, shall elect from their number the following officers: President, 1st Vice-President, 2nd Vice-President, Secretary (and, if desirable, an Assistant Secretary), and Treasurer; said officers shall be elected annually by a majority vote, to be taken by ballot.

14. The Board shall meet at least once a week, five members constituting a quorum, and may, if they so determine, appoint committees to undertake the supervision of the various departments in the Hospital.

It shall be the duty of the Board to ascertain as nearly as may be, through the reports of the committees, the domestic needs of the institution on or before the last Wednesday of each month, and report to the Trustees a detailed estimate of the probable expenditure for the succeeding month, and the amount so reported may be appropriated by the Trustees to be expended by the Board.

It shall be the duty of the Board to make suggestions to the Lady Superintendent, who shall be advised by the Board, in connection with the internal economy of the institution. All recommendations involving a money expenditure beyond the appropriation for the month, shall first be reported to the Trustees for their approval, it being understood that no debts of any kind, beyond the appropriation for each month, shall be contracted without the consent of the Trustees.

The Board shall appoint at least two of their number to visit the Hospital in rotation each week.

15. Any member of the Board failing to attend regular meetings for six consecutive months shall cease to be a member thereof; but the said six months shall be extended to eight months in case the non-attendance has been occasioned by the illness or absence from Toronto of the member. Every vacancy caused by death, resignation or absence shall be noted in the minutes of the next regular meeting, or, if omitted by inadvertence, at some other regular meeting, and such vacancy shall be filled by the Trustees at any of their regular or special meetings, upon the recommendation of the Board of Management.

16. It shall be the duty of each member of the Board to aid the objects of the Hospital by obtaining donations and subscriptions towards defraying the current expenses of the Hospital, and reducing the building debt thereon.

17. The Secretary of the Board shall keep regular minutes of the meetings in a book to be provided for that purpose, and shall preserve all the records and papers of the Board. She shall cause a notice of each regular and special meeting of the Board to be sent to the address of each member thereof, at least one day previous to the day fixed for the meeting. She shall act as the medium of communication between the Trustees and the public, unless otherwise ordered, communicate to the Trustees all recommendations of the Board, and see that a stock-book is kept, with a list in detail of all furniture, bedding, linen, utensils, and other chattels of the Hospital, and that the same has entered in it regularly all additions and changes. The Assistant Secretary shall, when desired, assist the Secretary in her duties, and act for her in her absence.

LADY SUPERINTENDENT.

18. The Lady Superintendent shall hold office during the pleasure of the Trustees. She shall consult and advise with the Board of Management, when necessary. She shall keep a book for entering all such things as she may consider needful for the use of the Hospital, and submit it to the meetings of the Board of Management for transmission to the Trustees.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

PATIENTS—ADMISSION AND DISCHARGE.

1. An applicant for admission to the Hospital must present the certificate of a medical man that his or her case is a fit and proper one for hospital treatment, and is not of an infectious character. To persons meeting with accidents or sudden injuries this rule will not apply, but in such cases the admission shall be at the discretion of any member of the Medical and Surgical Staff, or, if his authority cannot be procured with sufficient promptness, at the discretion of the Lady Superintendent.

2. The charge for patients in the public wards will be \$2.80 per week; and in the semi-private and private wards, from \$5 to \$20 per week. Medical and surgical services are given without any charge to patients in the public wards.

3. Any person desiring admission to the Hospital as a pay patient must pay in advance for one week's board, or must present a letter from some satisfactory person, agreeing to become responsible to the Hospital for the charges of such applicant during a specified time.

4. All arrangements regarding terms of payment for patients must be made with the Lady Superintendent.

5. Any person desiring admission to the Hospital on a city order must procure and send to the City Health Officer:—

(a) A medical certificate that the applicant is a fit subject for admission.

(b) A recommendation by some clergyman or responsible citizen showing that the applicant cannot afford to pay the ordinary charges.

6. Persons afflicted with incurable diseases will not be admitted to the Hospital.

7. No patient will be allowed to remain longer than twelve weeks, except by the special consent of the Board of Trustees.

8. Patients will be discharged from the Hospital only on a written order from the attending physician or surgeon, except when discharged by the Lady Superintendent or House Physician for insubordination or violation of the rules of the Hospital.

9. In case of the decease of a patient, the friends shall be apprised thereof by the House Physician; and the attending physician or surgeon shall sign a certificate of death, and furnish the City Registrar with a copy of the same. He shall also state the time and cause of death and the disposition made of the body—whether delivered to friends or buried from the Hospital. In the latter case he shall mention the place of interment.

10. He shall not deliver the body of a patient without a written receipt from the parties taking the same.

PATIENTS—CONDUCT.

1. Patients are forbidden to use profane or indecent language; to express

immoral or infidel sentiments ; to play at any game for money ; to procure for themselves or others any intoxicating liquors ; or to have or circulate any book, print, pamphlet, or newspaper of a vulgar, immoral, or indecent character.

2. Patients shall not go into the morgue, operating room, pharmacy, offices, engine room, laundry or kitchen, or into any of the officers' or attendants' rooms, except on special business and by special permission ; nor shall any patient leave his or her ward or hall without the knowledge and consent of a nurse.

3. Bed patients must not leave their beds without permission of the attending physician or head nurse, nor walk about the ward except when clothed decently.

4. Loud talking or noise of any kind is forbidden.

5. Smoking is positively forbidden.

6. Patients must remain quietly at their bedside during the ward visits of the physicians.

7. Patients are forbidden to hold discussions with nurses or other patients regarding physicians on staff, treatment, diet, ventilation, or any rules of the Hospital.

8. Convalescent free patients will be responsible for the neatness of their beds and bedside tables, and will, if requested, assist the nurse in any light work of which the physicians do not disapprove.

9. Patients must cheerfully obey the nurses' orders.

10. Patients not confined to bed may receive friends in such places as may be designated by the House Physician.

11. Patients must notify their friends of the visiting days and hours, and visitors will not be admitted except at such times. All packages of clothing or eatables must be left at the office, when, after inspection, if appropriate, they will be sent to the patients.

12. Passes will be issued to patients by the House Physician upon application being made to the head nurse. A patient will not be permitted to return after the time marked on the pass has expired.

13. Lights must be extinguished in all private wards not later than 10.15 p.m.

14. Complaints can only be made to the Lady Superintendent, and must be presented in writing by the head nurse, and signed by both the head nurse and the patient making complaint.

15. Violation of any of these rules will result in dismissal from the Hospital.

MEDICAL AND SURGICAL STAFF.

1. The Medical and Surgical Staff shall consist of the physicians and surgeons appointed by the Board of Trustees.

2. They shall have full power and control over the medical and surgical treatment of all patients in the Hospital, including the Dispensary.

3. They shall make such rules and regulations as they may deem best for their own control and government, not inconsistent with the by-laws, rules and regulations of the Hospital, as established by the Board of Trustees.

LADY SUPERINTENDENT OF HOSPITAL AND TRAINING SCHOOL.

1. The Lady Superintendent shall have full authority in the internal management of the Hospital.

2. It shall be the duty of the Lady Superintendent to keep the account with the City of Toronto and to render the monthly statement to the Medical Health Officer ; also to keep the Government register and prepare the annual report and account, forwarding the same to the Government Inspector.

3. She shall keep full and accurate account of all moneys received from pay patients, and for nurses' fees, contributions, etc., and shall hand them over, as received, with a detailed statement thereof, to the Secretary and Treasurer of the Board of Trustees. She shall also furnish him at the close of each month with a full account of the expenditure of money advanced to her by him.

4. The Lady Superintendent shall give such lectures and bedside instruction to the nurses as the Medical and Surgical Staff shall deem necessary, seeing that each nurse provides herself with proper text-books, and at the end of the term hold an examination on the subjects taught by her.

5. She shall personally instruct the nurse on duty in the diet kitchen as to the proper way of preparing the food belonging to her department, *i.e.*, extras or delicacies ordered by the attending physician.

6. During the absence of the House Physician the Lady Superintendent shall assume his authority and responsibility. They shall not both be absent from the Hospital at the same time.

HOUSE PHYSICIAN.

1. A committee of the Medical and Surgical Staff shall examine all applicants for the position of House Physician. He shall receive his appointment from the Board of Trustees upon the recommendation of the Medical and Surgical Staff.

2. The appointment of House Physician shall be for the term of one year, and shall be made annually in the month of June. The House Physician shall be subject to removal at any time for insubordination, misconduct or incompetency, if the Board of Trustees deem proper.

3. The House Physician shall not engage in the practice of his profession or any other occupation outside of the Hospital, nor shall he charge or receive a fee for attending patients therein.

4. The House Physician shall have control of everything pertaining to medical matters, subject to the Medical and Surgical Staff.

5. He shall see that proper order is kept in the wards by the patients, and shall have the power to discharge any patient for insubordination or improper conduct.

6. It shall be his duty to examine each patient, to determine whether a suitable case for admission to the Hospital, and also to which department the patient belongs.

7. He shall visit the wards twice each day (beginning not later than 9.30 a.m. and 11 p.m.), and oftener if necessary. He shall also accompany the attending physicians and surgeons on their rounds.

8. He shall, if required, administer the anæsthetic during an operation.

9. The attending physicians alone shall order the diet of the patients, especially as regards extras, a list thereof being handed to the Lady Superintendent.

10. The House Physician shall keep a complete history of each case, and of operations which come under his charge. The history shall be neatly written in a book provided by the Hospital for that purpose. It shall be his duty also to keep the medical register of the Hospital, entering the names and addresses of the patients, their ages, diseases, result of treatment, dates of admission and discharge, and the physicians under whose care they have been placed.

11. It shall be the duty of the House Physician to attend the Dispensary any day the physician is unavoidably absent. He shall begin to treat the patients if the physician be later than fifteen minutes after the appointed hour.

12. The House Physician and Lady Superintendent shall not both be absent from the Hospital at the same time.

13. The House Physician is expected to conform to the rules of the household; and, except professionally, shall not occupy the time of the nurses.

HOUSEKEEPER.

1. The Housekeeper shall have entire control of the household and the direction of the servants. Her staff of servants shall be such as the Board of Management may think proper, and she shall engage, and, when necessary, discharge the same.

2. She shall have charge and superintendence of all furniture, bedding, linen, provisions, table and household supplies, and see that none are wasted or destroyed. She shall keep in a book designed for the purpose, an exact inventory of all goods belonging to the Hospital; and also memoranda of breakages or losses occasioned by the patients, or otherwise, and shall require payment for articles carelessly injured or broken.

3. All supplies purchased for the Hospital shall be entered in a book provided for the purpose, which, together with the pass books, shall be laid before the Board of Management once a month.

4. The Housekeeper shall make the entire round of the Hospital at least once a day, so that she may be assured of the neatness and order of each department.

5. *The Housekeeper shall require punctuality at meals on the part of all*

connected with the Hospital. The following are the hours for meals: For Public Patients, breakfast, 7.30 a.m.; dinner 12 noon; tea, 5 p.m. For Private Patients, breakfast, 8.30 to 9 a.m.; dinner, 12.45 p.m.; tea, 5.30 p.m. For Lady Superintendent, House Physician and Housekeeper, breakfast, 8.15 a.m.; dinner, 2 p.m.; tea, 6.30 p.m. For Nurses, breakfast, 7-7.30 a.m.; dinner, 1-1.30 p.m.; tea, 5.30-6 p.m. For Servants, breakfast, 7 a.m.; dinner, 12 noon; tea, 5.30 p.m.

6. The Housekeeper shall insist upon economy in all departments of the Hospital.

NURSES—GENERAL RULES.

1. Nurses are, at all hours, under the authority of the Lady Superintendent and must not leave the Hospital nor their duties without her permission.

2. Nurses and orderlies must also regard themselves as subordinate to the Head Nurse and obey her orders.

3. The hour for rising is 6 a.m. Before leaving her room, each nurse must make her bed, dust and arrange her bureau, etc., leaving them in good order. The hour for retiring is 10 p.m., when lights will be put out in the parlor and lowered in the halls, and nurses must retire. All nurses off duty are expected to be in their rooms by 9.30 p.m., unless they have special permission to be absent.

4. Nurses must be punctual at meals, and not linger about the table afterwards, but return promptly to their duties. No food is provided for the nurses but at the appointed times, except when ordered by the Lady Superintendent. Supper for night nurses, prepared in the kitchen, will be sent to the corridors at 9.45 p.m.

5. Nurses are not permitted to give any orders in the kitchen; all such matters are to be referred to the Lady Superintendent.

6. Nurses are not permitted to receive visitors in the wards, nor at any time when on duty; nor are nurses off duty allowed in the wards.

7. The conditions upon which nurses can have the privileges of the laundry are as follows:—Allowance for each nurse per week, 18 pieces, well marked. No laces, muslins or white skirts will be received. Each nurse must be provided with a clothes bag, marked, in which clothes are to be put, and the same placed in the laundry baskets on Tuesday morning. A book with list of clothes must be sent in every week, with name on the outside of the book. Clothing not marked will be charged for at five cents each piece.

8. When off duty on account of sickness, nurses must not leave their rooms, nor return to their hospital duties without the direction of the Lady Superintendent.

9. Physicians will be selected by the Lady Superintendent to attend the nurses in sickness; they will not be allowed to consult any medical man without permission from the Lady Superintendent, nor to obtain medicine from the Hospital Dispensary without order of the attending physician.

10. Except necessary stating of the cases to the physicians or Head Nurse, nurses shall not discuss patients, their condition, etc., at the bedside, nor in wards or corridors; nor shall nurses at any time, with private or public ward patients, discuss the physicians, the treatment pursued, or the authorities or employees.

11. Every direction of the physicians shall be carefully noted, and medicines shall be faithfully administered at the time and in the quantity prescribed.

12. The day and night nurses shall report to each other before they go off duty when any medicines or attention for patients shall be due.

13. Nurses are to see that perfect discipline is kept in the wards. They must be kind and attentive to patients, but on no account whatever be familiar with patients, either male or female.

14. Nurses on the entrance of an officer or stranger into the ward shall, if seated, at once rise, and give all visitors prompt attention.

15. Nurses and orderlies are not to visit other wards, rooms or corridors, or talk with other nurses or orderlies when on duty, except in the performance thereof.

16. All communications between male and female nurses, resident staff and patients of the Hospital, must be strictly professional and in no way social.

17. Nurses must conform to all the rules and regulations laid down for the government of the Hospital, and the Head Nurse shall be responsible to the Lady Superintendent for the observation of all the foregoing rules.

18. At the discretion of the Lady Superintendent, nurses will be allowed leave of absence one afternoon of each week ; and they shall also, if the pressure of their duties permits, spend an hour daily in the open air. They shall be allowed off duty one-half of each Sunday. It is expected that nurses will avail themselves of the time given them on Sunday to attend some place of worship.

19. Any nurse found to be untrustworthy in any particular will be considered a subject for dismissal.

20. Punctuality, personal neatness, general order, a gentle voice and manner, patient temper, and self-control regarding aversion to patients and fellow-employees, are essential in a good nurse.

DAY NURSES.

1. All day nurses must be in their respective places from 7.30 a.m. to 7 p.m. They are entitled to half an hour for each meal.

2. Upon going on duty in the morning the Head Nurse will receive from the night nurses a strict account of the condition of each patient and of the wards generally, during the night. She will inspect the bathrooms, closets, etc., as well as the patients, and report to the Lady Superintendent any neglect on the part of the night nurse to fulfil her duties. It is the duty of the Head Nurse to receive all orders from physicians and to record the same in a book kept for the purpose ; and she will be accountable for the carrying out of the same, and for the general welfare and comfort of the patients under her care.

3. The wards must be in perfect order, ready for rounds, at 9.30 a.m.

4. A ward must never be left without a nurse in charge.

5. Any bedding or clothing needed in the ward is to be asked for by the Head Nurse only. Screens must be used as far as possible to prevent any exposure.

6. Every patient shall have a full bath at least once a week, unless otherwise ordered by the physician in charge.

NIGHT NURSES.

1. Night nurses must remain in their rooms from 9 a.m. till 4 p.m., and must be prompt on duty at 7 p.m. They will have entire charge of the wards, and will be responsible for the patients and carrying out of all orders until 7 a.m. They will make written reports, to be handed to the House Physician. They will see that lights are extinguished and patients in bed by 8 p.m.; that lights in the corridors are lowered as far as possible by 10 p.m., and that anyone coming in after that hour is reported to the Lady Superintendent.

2. Night nurses, when on duty, are entitled to half an hour for supper and may meet in the diet kitchen to prepare the same, but on no account are they to go into the lower kitchen. They are always to remain within call of patients, making rounds every hour. Utmost quiet must be observed. Any nurse wilfully breaking these rules will be considered a subject for dismissal.

3. The convalescent patients are to rise at 6 a.m., and the nurses in charge will see that they make their toilets properly. The bed patients, who are able, are to have water to wash. The helpless patients are in charge of the day nurses. It will be the duty of the night nurses to see that all articles used during the night are put away clean, and that the bathrooms and closets are in order. They must see that the wards are properly ventilated, and that the same attention is paid to the patients as during the day, remembering that the night is often the most trying time for an invalid.

NURSES ON PRIVATE DUTY.

All applications for nurses for outside cases must be made to the Lady Superintendent, who will send them out on the conditions expressed in the following form :—

The charge for the services of a nurse is \$2 per day, or if employed one week or more, \$10 per week. In contagious cases, \$2 per day from commencement. Travelling expenses, cabs, and washing to be paid by family employing nurse.

When the nurse's services are no longer required, this sheet of paper is to be returned to the Lady Superintendent, sealed up, with a candid statement written on the fly-leaf, of her conduct and efficiency, either by one of the family or the medical attendant, and enclosing the amount of fees due to the Hospital, or stating that it will be sent to the Lady Superintendent.

The nurse is to be allowed reasonable time for rest, at least six hours out of the twenty-four. Except in cases of extreme illness, the nurse is to be allowed to attend church once every Sunday.

Her meals are to be served apart from servants (not in the kitchen); and when on duty at night some refreshments are to be provided.

When on duty the nurse is always to wear the dress prescribed by the regulations of the Hospital, and is at no time to receive or entertain her friends.

It is especially requested that any violation of these rules be at once reported to the Lady Superintendent.

When it is possible, a few days' notice of the nurse's return to the Hospital shall be sent to the Lady Superintendent.

Remarks as to conduct, efficiency, etc.

VISITORS.

1. Public patients may receive visits from their friends on Sunday, Tuesday and Thursday of each week, from 2 to 4 p.m., and at no other time without a special permit from the attending physician or House Physician. In any case, however, the attending physician may exercise discretionary powers as to the excluding or admitting of visitors. Visitors must leave at the expiration of the visiting hours.

2. Visitors, either to patients or nurses, will not be permitted to take any meals in the Hospital or to pass the night therein.

3. A visitor will not be allowed to give any article of food or drink to a patient unless by permission of the attending physician, and any article sent to a patient shall be left with the Head Nurse.

4. Private patients may receive visitors any day, at the discretion of the attending physicians, between the hours of 10 a.m. and 9.30 p.m., when all visitors must leave the Hospital.

NURSES' TRAINING SCHOOL.

ADMISSION OF PUPILS.

The course of training for women desirous of becoming professional nurses is two years.

Those wishing to receive the course must apply either in person or by letter to the Lady Superintendent, upon whose approval they will be received into the school, to remain one month on probation before becoming pupil nurses.

The most desirable age for a candidate to enter the school is from twenty-five to thirty-five, but every candidate must be over twenty years of age.

The applicant must send, with answers to the paper of questions, a letter from a clergyman, testifying to her good moral character, and from a physician stating that she is in good health.

Applicants must have their teeth in perfect order before entering the school, and before final acceptance pass an examination before the Medical Board of the Hospital as to their physical condition.

During the month of probation the applicant must be prepared for an examination in reading, penmanship, simple arithmetic and English dictation. Such examination is to test their ability to read aloud well, to write legibly and

accurately, to keep simple accounts, and to take notes of lectures. This measure of education is indispensable for a nurse, but applicants are reminded that women of superior education and cultivation, when equally fitted for nurses, will be preferred to those who do not possess these advantages.

Applicants are admitted any time during the year when there is a vacancy.

During the month of probation nurses are boarded and lodged at the expense of the Hospital, but receive no other compensation. They must come provided with the necessary clothing, including two cotton gowns and six white aprons. All clothing must be plainly marked with *surname* of owner. Eighteen pieces are allowed in the wash each week.

Those accepted as pupil nurses are to sign the following contract: "I, the undersigned, hereby agree to remain two years in the Training School for Nurses, as a pupil nurse, and to obey the rules of the Hospital and School."

They will reside at the Hospital, and serve as nurses in the wards.

They will receive \$3 per month during the first year, and \$6 per month during the second year; and those who complete the full course and pass the final examination shall be entitled to receive \$25 each with their diplomas.

The Hospital will provide material for two dresses, six aprons, and six kerchiefs each year, and for one cap each month; anything in excess of this must be paid for by the nurses themselves.

In sickness, nurses will be cared for gratuitously. Every nurse will be expected to perform any duty assigned to her, either as nurse in the Hospital, or when sent to private cases among rich and poor in any part of the Province of Ontario. Nurses will not be entitled to any perquisites or gratuities, without the sanction of the Lady Superintendent, the above remuneration with their education being considered a full equivalent.

Nurses are allowed two weeks' vacation each year.

Nurses are expected to attend morning prayers.

TRAINING.

The instruction includes:

1. Dressing of blisters, burns, sores and wounds; the preparation and application of fomentations, poultices, and minor dressings.
2. Administration of enemata, and use of female catheter.
3. The best method of friction to the body and extremities.
4. Management of helpless patients, moving, changing, giving baths in bed; preventing bed sores, and managing position.
5. Bandaging, making bandages and rollers, and lining splints.
6. Making beds and changing sheets while patient is in bed.
7. The preparing, cooking and serving of delicacies for the sick; to understand the art of ventilation without chilling the patient, both in private houses and hospital wards, and the management of convalescents. They are also given instruction in preparing reports for the physicians, as to state of secretions, expectoration, pulse, temperature of the body, skin, appetite, intelligence (as to delirium or stupor), breathing, sleeping, condition of wounds, eruptions, suppuration, and effect of diet.

The instruction will be given by attending physicians and surgeons and the Head Nurse, at the bedside of the patients and in various other ways; also lectures by visiting physicians, and by the Lady Superintendent. Lectures will be given on such subjects as anatomy, physiology, hygiene, diseases, surgery, *materia medica* and obstetrics, and examinations will be held at stated periods.

When the full term of two years is completed, the nurses, after passing final examination, will receive a diploma signed by the Examining Board, the Lady Superintendent and the officers of the Board of Trustees.

Only nurses obtaining seventy-five per cent. or over, at the final examination, together with a good record during the two years' course, will be granted diplomas.

WOMEN'S AUXILIARIES.

Committees of Ladies, to be known as Women's Auxiliaries, may be formed outside of the management, of those who may desire to assist in promoting the objects of the Hospital, and in adding to the comforts of the patients and nurses.

The following rules have been adopted by the Auxiliaries organized before the incorporation of this Hospital, and they are suggested as suitable for the future working of such associations:

1. Each member to pay a yearly fee of \$1. The year to commence in October.
2. All members to attend the meetings as often as possible; such meetings to be held at the Hospital on the last Wednesday in each month, at 10.30 a.m.
3. It is expected that all members, who are able, will take their turn in filling the "Saturday basket."
4. It is desired that each member should collect at least \$5 during the year, and collecting cards will be sent to the members for that purpose.
5. Each member is requested to write her name plainly on a card accompanying donations sent to the Hospital, and also to mention that such donations are sent from a member of the Women's Auxiliary.
6. It is hoped that all members will take an interest in the Hospital, and do all in their power to promote its welfare.

METHODS OF ASSISTING THE HOSPITAL

Friends can aid the Hospital in any of the following ways:—

1. Donations of money; also of fruit, flowers, vegetables, provisions, books, clothing, bandages, old linen, and whatever is necessary or useful to the sick.
2. Annual subscriptions, to be paid at any time during the year, and continued at will of the subscriber.
3. Subscribers of \$100 and upwards shall be known as "Donors," and shall have the privilege of sending a patient for twenty weeks, free of charge, to the public ward of the Hospital. This privilege will be good till used, but is extended only to those who subscribe at least \$100. The like privilege attaches to every additional \$100 subscribed by the same giver.
4. Two hundred and forty dollars subscribed annually will maintain a bed in the public ward of the Hospital, to which the donor shall have the right to send any proper hospital patient.

FORM OF BEQUEST.
