Cheaper Coal Seems In Sight

Operators Take Important Action-Prices Likely to be Announced Today, **Effective on July 1**

Washington, June 28.-A conference of four hundred operators, representing all coal producing states, took quick action today toward lowering coal prices by adopting resolutions outhorizing their committees to give assent to such maximum prices for coal free on board cars at mines, in the various districts as may be named by the secretary of the interior, federal trade commission and the council of national coal production committee.

Plans were agreed upon, for announcement later today, for tentative "fair in July 1.

But the soaring flight of such ideas is abruptly checked by contact with reality. What reasons have we to suppose that the mass of the German people have any such desire, or that if they have it will manifest itself in any effective form? They see themselves fighting a world of enemies. They began the war blithely in the firm belief that they would conquer a supreme domination for themselves and for their race forever. 



To Co-Operate Aid Requested In the Conservation of Food

Asks Hotel Men

The European Plan

Secretary of Maine Food Production Committee Offers Suggestions for Economizing in Serving of Meals-Urges I hat Servants be Instructed

(Bangor Commercial.) Augusta, June 28-E. L. Newdick of Sanford, secretary of the committee on food production and conservation, in a etter sent out on Monday to the hotel proprietors of the state, asks their cooperation to assist in the campaign for food conservation along the strictest lines

Secretary Newdick makes the follow? ng suggestions at the request of the "Such facts as we are able to obtain show that practically all the hotels in the state have been conducted in the

American plan. In order to secure a concensus of opinion of hotel proprietors, and to discuss possibilities of changes with the idea of economy, a conference was held June 7, to which all hotel men in Maine were invited. It was revealed at this conference that alwas revealed at this conference that alleady several large hotels in Maine had adopted the European plan service in place of the American plan, with very satisfactory results, that the inauguration of the European plan had tended to curtail waste, and that business in general had been conducted with satisfactory. eral had been conducted with faction to patrons. A significant fact was also brought out that, in the opinion of the hotel proprietors already conducting their business on the European plan, the same number of people could be fed on this plan, satisfactorily, with 50 per cent of the raw material required under the American plan. The adoption of the European plan means absotion of the European plan means absolute conservation of food, which seems to be necessary in the face of the pres-ent emergency; therefore, we urge you to adopt the European plan of service. "Facts brought out at the conference and statistics from unquestionable au-thority, also show that if persons eating on the American plan have to write out their orders they will not order in such quantities as when the order is given orally. Statistics at hand prove that the serving of 2,000,000 meals under the checking method resulted in saving 15

per cent of the food used in comparison with the oral order system. "With little competition, yau can readily understand that 15 per cent. of

readily understand that 15 per cent. of the cost of your material used last year would mean considerable saving of food. If it is found to be absolutely impracticable to adopt the European plan, we highly recommend and urge the adoption of this checking system in continuance of the American plan.

"We further recommend, if the American plan service is continued the reduction of the number of articles placed on the American plan menu. It is well understood by hotel-men that in many instances a greater variety of food is frequently ordered simply out of curiosity and not with the idea of supplying nutrition or satisfying hunger.

"As the conservation of certain kinds"

"As the conservation of certain kinds of foods—particularly meat, flour, potatoes, beans, and milk—seem necessary in the present emergency, to this end the following suggestions are made:
"Eliminate as far as possible serving

bacon, ham and cured meats. Avoid serving veal, young lamb and chickens for broiling, realizing that chickens raised to maturity will produce eggs a valuable substitute for meat. If killed for meat at a mature size, they will greatly increase the quantity of meat available for market, thus reducing the cost and insuring a greater amount of beef and pork products for the use of the army. This same principle will also apply to all young animals.

"Fish. Increase the consumption of fish as for each of the substitute "Fish. Increase the consumption of fish as far as possible, which will tend

to the saving of meat products.
"Flour. With the idea that white flour can better be utilized by the army, it is recommended that corn meal be substituted in every way possible for white flour in the preparation of corn bread, muffins, griddle cakes and cereals—particularly for the morning meal.



F. B. Carvell Appeals For United Efforts to Win War

Speech Made Deep Impression—Greeted With Cheers from Both Sides of House -Will Vote for Principle of Conscrip-

Ottawa, June 27-A dual appeal-an appeal for war winning and for national unity—couched in serious words and delivered with impressive earnestness, made today's sitting of parmament memorable. Many honorable members have said that in their judgment conscription is the proper form of raising an army, and from the purely material standpoint of getting the men who ought to go and leaving the man who ought to remain, probably that is correct, but had this bill

been proposed a year ago I would not have voted for it. I am glad that up to the present time it has not been neces-sary to attempt to take away from any man in Canada the freedom which is bestowed upon him by the constitution. So long as we were getting all the men we reasonably required by the voluntary system, I was opposed to conscription and if I believed today that we could get all the men we might require I would still be opposed to conscription.

"Believing that the voluntary sys-tem has not been honestly carried out, I do hope that the government will delay the practical enforcement of this act until the voluntary enlistof this act until the voluntary enlist-ment has had a fair chance. I do not know that we have all done our duty, but I do know that by a united, concerted effort, coupled with the abolition of the party system, in the last three years very much more could have been done throughout eastern Canada than has been done, and I believe that the same is true all over Canada.

Insect pests are not usually noticed or reported until they have caused considerable damage. Therefore it is urged that the closest watch be kept on all crops for the first appearance of any linsect pests or damage. Immediately such damage is observed steps should be taken to control the outbreak in its incipient stage. If the pest or the method of control is unknown specimens of the taken to control is unknown specimens of the insect and its injuries should be sent at once to the nearest of the following sources of expert assistance: The Agricultural Colleges, the Provincial Departments of Agriculture or their local District Representatives, the officer in charge of the nearest Dominion Entomologist, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, for examination; and advice in regard to control meas—should be recommended.


