EXPIRES AT MASS

Prominent Citizen Stricken in Cathedral and Dies in Few Minutes.

While attending the 9.26 o'clock mass in the Cathedral on Sunday, Martin R. Dolan, a man prominent in Martin R. Dolan, a man prominent in the community life for many years, was fatally stricken. He passed away within a few minutes after being taken from his pew to the church vestibule in the hope that the fresh air would revive him. Rev. J. B. Ward and Rev. Roy McDonald administered the last rites of the church as sorrowing members of his family, who had accompanied him to mass, stood nearby. It was a solemnly impressive scene. Rev. W. M. Duke also was present, as well as Dr. J. M. Barry, who had been called from the church when Mr. Dolan was stricken. The body was removed to P. J. Fitzpatrick's undertaking rooms and later to the late Mr. Dolan's home.

Some whose seats were near to Mr. Dolan's saw him collapse as he inelt in prayer and heard the moans of the stricken man. Others who saw him carried down the aisle thought he had fainted and that he would revive when taken into the open air. It was therefore a great shock to all when His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc, in sking the prayers of the people for the repose of the souls of those who had died during the week, included in the list of names that of Mr. Dolan, saying that he had died during the mass just celebrated. The Bishop poke of the uncertainty of life's tenure and recommended the soul of the departed man to the prayers of the people.
