





Now, for the making. Pleat lower edge of the front, placing "T" on small "o" perforations and tack. Centerfront indicated by deuble "oo" perforations. Jein front and back sections as notched. Slash back on lines of three small "ooo" perforations; finish edges for openings to pass pleated ribedges for openings to pass pleated rib-

ben through, tie in front.

Adjust collar to position underneath front and stitch along single small "o" perforations, bringing single large "O" and double small "o" perforations in collar and in front together; tack extension at upper edge of back to posi-tion, notches even. Close sleeve and cuff seams as notched, sew cuff to sleeve, notches and seams even. Sew in armhole as notched. The skirt is high waisted and finish-

ed with a wide girdle of soft satin, which is fastened at the front.

Rice or Tapioca Custard Pudding Boil 1-3 cup of rice in plenty of water; when cooked, pour into a strainer. Put the strainer that holds the cooked rice under the cold water faucet, turning it over gently by shaking seive. Butter your baking dish well, toss the cooked rice in dish, add I pint of milk, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoonfuls of sugar, nutmeg to taste and 3 well-beaten eggs. Stir up. Put into oven, with in-dicator at 265 degrees or in a very slow oven, so it cannot boil, as it turns watery if it boils in oven. Stir in the beginning until it begins to custard, then leave it alone until done, only turn it round so







Although the anthracite trade is experiencing a certain spring activity, it is becoming more apparent all the time that there is an absence of the customary snap and urgency. As usual all companies will carry some of the April orders over into May, particularly for stove coal, and this paucity of supplies is being accentuated by a recurrence of the incipient "button" strikes, which has threatened to materially restrict productions. threatened to materially restrict produc-tion. The trade is most active in the line business; the situation at tidewater showing a tendency to drag and lake shipping is slow in getting under way. The large output of domestic coal is also threatening to develop a surplus of the

steam grades.

The demand for prompt bituminous has disappeared almost entirely. Prices are weakening, and coal of all kinds continues to pile up. The movement is confined entirely to contracts, requisitions on which are heavily curtailed as a result of the large stocks accumulated in anticipation of labor difficulties, and also anticipation of labor difficulties, and also in part to the general industrial curtailment. Much demurrage coal is being forced on the market, indicating considerable speculation on the labor agreement, and the situation will be further aggravated by the general resumption of operations in the central Pennsylvania district.

Contracting in the Pittsburgh district

Contracting in the Pittsburgh district Contracting in the Pittsburgh district continues slowly on the same basis as last year with but little shading, although substantial concessions are offered on prompt and short-term business. # CANADA NINTH AS A SHIPOWNER

Increase in Tonnage in 1913 Was 60,687-St. John is Now The Sixth in Canada

(Montreal Journal of Commerce) The list of vessels upon the registry ooks of the Dominion of Canada for 1913 has just been issued by the Department of Marine and Fisheries, and the record shows an increase of 155 vessels and 60,687 tons over the list of 1912.

The figures show that Canada now ranks ninth place among the ship-owning nations of the world with a total net tonnage upon her register of 896,965 tons. Preceding the dominion, Great Britain comes first with a shipping tonnage of 10,989,335 net tons. Next in rank comes Germany, with 3,321,060 tons; United States, 2,706,226 tons; Norway, 1,736,349 tons; France, 1,476,079 tons; Japan, 1,184,158 tons; Russia, 1,115,060 tons; Italy, 1,082,491 tons.

The register is made up of 8,545 vessels—3,847 being steamers with a gross tonnage of 711,512 tons, and it is estimated that 43,968 men and boys, including masters were employed upon Can-adian registered ships during 1913. Taking \$30 as the average value of the ton-nage registered, Canada's shipping amounts to \$26,908,950 in value. Montreal Leads



SERVIA'S NEW RAILROAD

ically and commercially, isolated and wholly dependent on herself.

The new railroad will start at the town of Berza Palanka. Here it will be connected by a bridge with the Rumanian lines and through them with the Russian railroads through northern Bessarabia. Thus Servia has found a way out commercially, independently of Austria-Hungary and is enabled to find a logical means of alliance with Rumania and Russia. 




