It is quite evident that the public accounts committee at Fredericton has great faith. There has been no probe in evidence at this session of the legislature.

Tariff reform is now in the hands of the Democrats in the United States, and Canada may fairly hope for some benefit from the revision at the session of Congress which will open early in April.

The announcement that the Intercolonial Railway has a surplus of a million dollars on the year's operations is an indication that there is no urgent need of leasing or selling the road.

The announcement of the opening up of new sub-divisions in various sections of the outskirts of the city indicates that activity in real estate will become much more pronounced with the coming of spring.

The suggestion that militant suffragettes should be deported might offer a solution of the problem, but it would first be necessary to find a country willing to take them in. Perhaps they might be sent to Africa to found an Amazon republic.

The Montreal Transcript says: "Our contemporary quotes The Montreal Herald as a Liberal newspaper. The Herald used to be a Liberal newspaper, but our contemporary knows it is under the control of Conservative financiers and no longer gives the Liberal an independent unprejudiced support."

Hon. Wm. Pugsley had a very enjoyable time in the house yesterday, when matters relating to St. John patriots were under discussion. There have been times when persons on the other side of the house showed an eager anxiety to enquire about dredging inspectors and measurements and that sort of thing, and in connection therewith Hon. Mr. Pugsley invariably came in for a certain amount of attention. Yesterday it was Dr. Pugsley's pleasing duty to see the shoe carefully placed on the other foot, and the Hon. Mr. Haas invited to give the necessary explanations. Needless to remark, the standard, which at one time had much to say on this subject, which it apparently deemed of vital importance to the Empire, does not feature the interesting little discussion of yesterday.

It is stated that there was more drunkenness in Ontario last year than the year before, although the area of so-called dry territory is increased every year. There were 786 more commitments for drunkenness in the province in 1912 than in 1911. This will not be taken, however, as an evidence that the cause of total abstinence is not making gains. Everybody knows that there are economic forces at work which must steadily reduce the number of persons of drinking habits. The increasing demand for sober men in all classes of work must have an important effect, apart altogether from the agitation that has been kept up by the churches and temperance organizations. Progress is necessarily slow, but the conditions are gradually improving. Here and there a community may lapse, and a wave of drunkenness sweep over it, and the reformers make a bad showing, but public sentiment against excessive drinking is steadily growing stronger.

It is peculiarly sad that in the hour of Greek triumph, when that country had gained such decisive victories over her traditional foe, that the king whose policy had contributed so much to this success should die at the hands of an assassin who was not of an alien race, but a Greek. There is no way of guarding the life of a sovereign from such a fate as that which has overtaken King George of Greece. The assassin was a degenerate or demented wretch who could have no personal cause for hatred of the king, and whom none would suspect of such a murderous design. All British subjects will deeply sympathize with Queen Alexandra, whose favorite brother the king was, and upon whom in recent years the burden of the war has been heavily pressed. So far as the affairs of Greece are concerned, the reports indicate that the new king is a man of much ability, in full sympathy with the policy pursued by his father, and that therefore this policy will be continued.

The Montreal Herald says: "The Board of Charities of New York State is asking state aid for deserving widows and dependent children. The idea is that, if the state gives some aid making it possible, a woman can make better citizens of her children in her own home than can any public institution, no matter how richly endowed or how 'scientifically' run. The day is not far distant when the same idea will dawn on Canada."

Of the apples imported by the United Kingdom last year Canada furnished 1,477,887 hundred weight, Australia 439,530 the Channel Islands 13,827, and other British territory 627, a total of 1,918,221 hundred weight from the British possessions, as against 152,370 from the United States and 245,527 from other foreign territory; 50 per cent in favor of British territory.

BIRTHDAYS OF NOTABILITIES

WEDNESDAY, MARCH NINETEEN. The Hon. Sir Lomer Gouin, Premier of Quebec since 1905, reaches his fifty-first birthday today. He studied law under Sir John Abbott and became a barrister in 1884, taking up the practice of law in Montreal. He entered the legislature in 1897 and from 1900 to 1904 was commissioner of public works in the Parent administration. His knighthood was conferred on him at the time of the Quebec Tercentenary.

Aubrey White, Ontario's deputy minister of lands and forests, was born in Tyrone, Ireland, on March 19, 1845, and came to Canada in 1882, where he entered the lumber business in the Muskoka district. He became crown lands agent at Bracebridge, and from that worked his way up to his present position which he has held for twenty-six years. He is a Mason of high degree.

Lieut.-Col. Burland, one of Montreal's prominent citizens, observes his fifty-second birthday today. He is a native of Montreal and a graduate of McGill University. His principal interest is in the British American Bank Note Company, of which he is president, but he is also a director of many other companies. He is noted for his warm interest in philanthropic and charitable work and was the founder of the Royal Edward Tuberculosis Institute in Montreal.

FALLS INTO SEWER, IS SWEEPED TO DEATH

Fearful Fate of Newark Man Trying to Open Clogged Drain. Newark, N. J., March 18.—Death in a sewer was the awful fate of Frederick Martin, a widower, sixty-seven years old, of this city. Sewer gas was responsible. Martin was an employe of A. Fink & Sons, wholesale butchers. A drain led from their stable to a trunk sewer six feet in diameter had become clogged. Martin and John Ulrich tried to open it. After digging a trench and trying in vain to push a heavy wire through the drain to the sewer, Martin concluded to enter the sewer and try to push the wire from that end. Procuring a lantern, Martin walked to a manhole a hundred feet away, near Seventh avenue. Two boys accompanied him with a ladder. The ladder was lowered through the main hole to the bottom of the sewer, through which water was rushing to the depth of eighteen inches. Martin started down the ladder, but had not reached the bottom when the boys saw the light suddenly go out. Martin fell into the rushing stream. In an instant he was swept out of sight. The boys ran screaming for help, and the police reserves responded, throwing open all manholes, so as to give light and air. The sewer department was notified and a gang of men was hurried to the sewer. They relieved men who had already travelled nearly a mile through the sewer and searched it without finding any trace of the missing man. Men were then stationed along the trench and kept a lookout until dark, but without finding the body.

RECENT DEATHS

After a brief illness, Mrs. Elizabeth J. Elliott, widow of Edward Elliott, passed away yesterday at her home, 44 Winter street. Mrs. Elliott was in the seventy-third year of her age, and had been very active until she became ill about a month ago. She is survived by two daughters—Mrs. Frederick E. Sturdevant, of New York, and Mrs. C. W. Henderson, of Oregon; and two sons, Edward, of Santiago, and Samuel, of this city. Six grandchildren, four in Washington, Oregon, and two in Vancouver, also survive. The funeral will take place on Thursday.

Moncton, March 18—(Special)—A telegram from Vancouver (B. C.) today announces the death of W. Ryan Angus, a former well known clothing merchant of Moncton, and later a traveler for various Canadian firms. The last few years Mr. Angus has resided in Vancouver. News of his death, which occurred this morning, came as a shock to relatives as they had no previous word of his illness. He was 52 years old and son of Mrs. James Angus, of this city. He was born in Pughwash (N. S.), but lived in Moncton the greater part of his early life. He was brother of the late Hanford Angus, of St. John. Three brothers and one sister, Mrs. Edward Cole, of Moncton, survive, besides a wife and three children.

Death came suddenly to Johanna, widow of Francis Hanneberry, early last evening. She had been in good health up till about 8 o'clock, when she was suddenly stricken with paralysis and died almost immediately. She had been out doing during the afternoon and went home and prepared for the evening meal. About 8 o'clock she was suddenly stricken with paralysis and passed away about 9 o'clock. 

No teacher worthy of the name works only five days in the week. If he doubts the truth of this statement let him interview any of our city teachers, be that teacher engaged in primary, intermediate or High School work.

Yes, in other words a teacher during his school year of ten months must scrape and save enough to tide him over July and August when his occupation is gone and he is consequently minus his regular monthly salary. Teachers are much better off than stenographers or clerks. Comparisons are odious and surely so in this case. Weigh against the few months of preparation of a stenographer at a business college, the years of study required before one is licensed as a member of that noble profession of teaching.



LONDON SOCIETY NEWS

Success of Handsome Princess Lichnowsky, German Ambassador's Wife, is Marked—Personal Notes of Canadians in the Old Country

(Times Special Correspondence)

London, March 8.—Not for many years has London as represented by society with a big S—been so gay at this time of the year. The observance of the centenary more honored in the breach than the observance, and dates are being snatched up almost as fast as in the season proper. The presence of the king and queen in London has something to do with it, of course; in Edwardian times, the king usually was on the continent at this time and all smart people were there too—by the doctor's orders.

This week in particular, has been a very gay one in town. The king and queen started off by giving a dance at Buckingham Palace. This was not a "court ball," but given to personal friends of Their Majesties and was as informal as a royal ball can possibly be. Ordinary evening frocks were worn by the women, while the men wore what is most of them the most becoming attire, "frock" dress—knee breeches, and silk stockings. All the available royalties were present, including the Prince of Wales, who came up from Oxford for the purpose, and who, I hear, "hailed" considerably at the list of partners presented to him with whom he was expected to dance.

You see, these were about 400 people there, so it was impossible for him to dance with them all. Again, to dance with whom he liked was to offend half Mayfair, so his partners' names were written down in order of precedence, and he worked his way steadily through that. Who would be a royal partner? The proceedings opened with that most boring of all terpsichorean exercises, the quadrille, in which all the royalties "took a hand." After that the older ones retired, and waltzes and polkas were in turn by all the guests. The ball finished soon after midnight with a gallop, the liveliest dance permitted in the delectable royal palace.

Going to a royal ball, too, means that you must do what is expected of you, i. e., dance. Young men are not allowed to stand about, or lean in doorways watching the proceedings; they have been asked for the purpose of dancing and dance they must to the bitter end. Further, the palace officials have to keep their eyes lifted to see that no one commits the simply heinous offense of daring to sit down while Her Majesty dances. This is about the most awful crime you can perpetrate, and if you do it, ever so unwittingly, a vigilant palace gentleman-waiting will quickly host you to your lock, however far you may be away from the royal date. So you see an invitation to Buckingham Palace is not an unalloyed delight.

There was a good deal of betting among Their Majesties' guests as to whether Queen Alexandra would arrive and most people were surprised when she did not in an appearance for a short time. She did not mix with the general company, as her morning has not needed as far as the evening frock line, but she went into one of the saloons overlooking the ballroom and watched the scene for about an hour, and her particular friends among the company were invited to have a chat with her in turn before she departed.

German Princess a Favorite

No German ambassador's wife has ever made her mark in English society so quickly as has Princess Lichnowsky. It is, of course, a long time since we have had such a smart representative of the Fatherland and then, too, the princess is far less stolidly Teutonic than her predecessors.

SOCIAL CONDITIONS

Reports to Yesterday Afternoon's Session—The Situation at Chatham Also Discussed—Representatives to the General Assembly

At the quarterly meeting of the St. John Presbytery yesterday afternoon (2:30) was granted the purchase of a moving picture machine to be used in the work of the Courtenay Bay. Several of the ministers endorsed the means of education and assistance in connection with the home mission.

The afternoon session met at 2 o'clock and did not adjourn until nearly 7 o'clock, a great deal of work being accomplished. An overture regarding the amalgamation of funds was read by His Honor Judge Forbes. The object of the overture was the funds of the church in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. The presbytery adopted the overture and referred it to the report of the board of social service and evangelism was submitted to the presbytery by Rev. Dr. MacVicar and gave a comprehensive account of social conditions in the province at the present time.

The report of Rev. Dr. Morrison with regard to the supply of Presbyterian ministers was read. Dr. Morrison stated the reason for the scarcity of Presbyterian ministers as greatly increased, and that there were fewer young men offering, and some leakage from the ranks of the ministers of the church.

On motion of Judge Forbes a recommendation for a detention home in connection with the presbytery of Miramichi was read. In submitting a long report of the home mission committee Rev. Gordon Dickie reported that he had been in church work at Courtenay Bay. He had taught two lots, copying about \$500 for the mission. The mission building, which was costing \$2,500, would be ready to occupy in a satisfactory position for the mission. 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THE LEGISLATURE

Fredericton, March 17.—The bill relating to crown lands and the extension of lumber leases was given its first and second readings yesterday. It had been amended in committee to make saw mill and pulp and paper mill leases interchangeable. Mr. Stewart moved an amendment to make pulp and paper mill leases good for forty and fifty years, instead of twenty and thirty, but withdrew the amendment on the request of the promoter. The amendment moved by J. L. Stewart, providing that 25 per cent of the holdings of operators who control more than 100 square miles should be divided among the smaller operators was pressed to a division and lost. The bill passed its first and second readings.

The amendments to the Game Act will not come into force until proclaimed. The four divisions into which the province was divided with head game wardens, have been abolished and officers will be appointed with respect to districts and will report to the chief game warden, an official, who with the chief fire warden will act together for the protection of fire.

THE PATRONAGE IN THIS CITY

Hon. Mr. Pugsley Shows Up Matter of Appointments

THE DREDGING INSPECTORS

Lively Moments in Parliament—Attempt to Apply Gag Falls Again—Awkward Statement is Drawn From Hon. Mr. Hazen

Ottawa, March 18.—There was no discussion of the speaker today because the speaker ruled that he could not be discussed. Hon. Mr. Emerson moved a adjournment for the purpose of discussing Speaker Pugsley's action on Saturday night when he ordered Acting Chairman Robb today to shut off the debate.

Today Speaker Pugsley said that discussion of his action could only take place on a motion of censure which would have to appear on the order paper. This course will likely be followed.

The Liberals are making good their promise to facilitate business. They have undertaken to pass the five million statute for this year by tomorrow evening. In reply there were interesting discussions in the manner in which dredging inspectors are appointed at St. John, and who has the naming of them.

When the supplies were being considered this afternoon, Mr. Sinclair, of Ontario (N. B.), asked Hon. Mr. Hazen, minister of marine, if it were true that several life-saving crews had been dismissed on the eastern Canadian coast and that inferior crews had been substituted since the Conservative government came into power.

The minister of marine and fisheries admitted that there had been some changes but he was not disposed to discuss the matter at the present juncture. There would be an opportunity to discuss it at a later date, he said.

"I am content to wait till the proposition," said Mr. Sinclair, "but I want to say that the life-boat service should not be made a political football. I have heard that at White Head, Conestogo, Ontario, was dismissed because it was suspected he was a Liberal. Such a thing has never occurred before. These men are appointed for the service because of their special ability for the work, and I wish to point out the importance of retaining able men until it is found that they do not possess the proper qualification."

They are a little suspicious of temporary chairmen of this committee. We have seen that temporary chairmen have recently been put in authority over the committee of the whole for special purposes. We do not intend to submit to the sort of rulings which have been given by some of these special chairmen during the last few days and especially on Friday and Saturday of last week when there was an attempt made to gag discussion."

Dr. Pugsley made his declaration with much heat and word was passed out that there was a crisis brewing. It looked as though there would be another deadlock especially when Hon. Mr. Lemieux followed Dr. Pugsley with even more emphasis, while Conservative members came tumbling into the chamber.

"I do not think that chairmen have been appointed for special purposes," said Hon. Mr. Hazen. "I can prove that they have," said Dr. Pugsley.

Not Shot for Tories. "This shows the annoyance of not having in the chair the regular chairman, Deputy Speaker Simpson, and Hon. Mr. Lemieux. He is paid a salary by the country," said Mr. Lemieux, thumping his fist on the table. "He has been asked to receive in his office in the house of commons election agents who are proved perennators, porcupines and blacklegs shown in affidavits submitted in defence of the secretary of state last night. We have seen chairmen changed every ten minutes and we have seen them advised by members opposite."

"Gag rule" abolished the Liberals. "This is the kind of thing that we have to put up with in the public accounts committee," said Mr. Carver, referring to the fact that acting Chairman Middleboro presides over the public accounts committee where there have been some very serious matters. "I don't think that there is any need for this legislation," said Hon. Mr. Hazen.

"Yes there is," shouted the Liberals. Mr. Hazen said that he had no objection to allowing full discussion of these matters but the item on which the discussion would arise was not in the supplementary estimates but was in the main estimates.

Dr. Pugsley said: "We are a little touchy as to the action of these temporary chairmen who are specially selected from the Conservative representation." "You are mistaken," said Mr. Hazen. "I can convince my honorable friend in ten minutes that I am not mistaken," said Dr. Pugsley. "We believe that chairmen have recently been put into the chair to shut off discussion. There is a possibility that we may not reach the main estimates, and if it is well we should discuss these matters when we can. There are rumors in the air," he added, referring to reports that parliament might be dissolved and a general election brought on.

Taking up the patronage question again, Dr. Pugsley said it was especially desirable that dredging inspectors should be appointed by a patronage committee, and one of the most important members of that dredging committee is a member of the company which is doing the dredging. It did not seem right that a man should have power to select inspectors to certify to the amount of material his company removed and was paid for.

Hon. Mr. Hazen questioned this and Dr. Pugsley said he referred to the president of the Conservative association. "It was not Mr. Baxter whom I had in mind, but Mr. Lockhart," said Hon. Mr. Hazen.

"So there are two of them," commented Dr. Pugsley, and added: "Would the minister furnish me with names of the St. John patronage committee? Is Mr. Lockhart the only one who is interested in a dredging company?" asked Dr. Pugsley. "So far as I know," said Mr. Hazen.

THE PERORATORS

(Ottawa Free Press.)

When Sir George Reid, the Australian high commissioner and statesman, went to the Royal Colonial Institute in London yesterday and told them that people were getting sick of perorations on imperial questions he did a very thing, because the Royal Colonial Institute has been the headquarters of just the kind of perorator of which Sir George says people have had enough.

The Imperialist visionary has become a nuisance and it is time he was suppressed with the mosquito and other pests. He has been raised largely in the afternoon oratory hall. A well-cooked well-served dinner of eight or ten courses invariably induces the diner into a rambling, incoherent, and uninteresting peroration which in a large way by the visionary. Occasionally these flights of oratory get into print, and when they do, some may wonder that such rubbish should ever have been uttered.

The stock text of the Imperial perorator is an Empire whose parts shall be bound together by unbreakable chains, each part absolutely subject to a central control. Sir George Reid seems to have touched on these differences sufficiently to demonstrate to his hearers that the scheme of centralization is absolutely impracticable.

We can quite imagine that Sir George Reid's views were not particularly acceptable to the Imperialist who usually attend the meetings of the Institute. The men who get the "corin" were there are not the Lauriers, the Bothas, the Reids, the Wards, who speak practical Empire rhetoric. The plan of the Institute patrons are reserved for the Robert Laird Borden, and the Hugh Graham, and the Max Aikins who drag into the whirlpool of the visionary.

Robert Laird Borden preached at the Colonial Institute on centralization and was cheered to the echo. The North-west force, controlled by a man who has close figured out the commercial and social possibilities in an Imperialist campaign, and Robert Laird Borden returned to Canada to deliver the first fruits of his newly-acquired gospel.

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NEW EXCESS RATE RULES FOR BAGGAGE

Washington, March 18.—Baggage in excess of 45 inches in any dimension, excepting widths as applied to "cases" may be charged for at excess rates by railroads, according to a decision by the Interstate Commerce Commission and if it measures more than seventy-two inches the carriers may refuse to accept it at all.

The charge may not exceed the charge for five pounds of excess baggage for every inch over forty-five inches. Widths in cases may run to ninety inches and twelve inches in diameter. A railroad may refuse to take more than two bulging sides, or with two such sides not opposite each other.

NEW REGULATIONS FOR THE FREE ENTRY OF PURE BRED ANIMALS

Ottawa, March 18—On April 1 this year there will come into force new regulations governing the free entry to Canada of animals for the improvement of stock. To this end the following amended regulations have been adopted by order-in-council for the guidance of importers and customs house officers:

"1. No animal imported for the improvement of stock shall be admitted free of duty unless the owner is a British subject, resident in the British Empire, or if more than one owner, each is a British subject, resident in the British Empire and there is furnished an import certificate stating that the animal is recorded in a Canadian national record or in a foreign record recognized as reliable by the National record committee.

"A statutory declaration by the owner or one of the owners, that he is a British subject, or that each is a British subject resident in the British Empire and that such animal is the identical animal described in such certificate must be provided, and that such animal is being imported into Canada for the improvement of stock.

"2. In case such certificate is not at hand at the time of the arrival of the animal, entry for duty may be accepted subject to refund of the duty upon the production of the requisite certificates and proofs in due form satisfactory to the collector within one year from the time of entry.

"3. The form of certificate to be accepted for the free importation of animals for the improvement of stock, and the customs procedure in connection therewith shall be subject to the direction of the minister of customs.

"4. The above declarations shall be attached to the free import entry and may be made before the collector, sub-collector, surveyor or chief clerk at the port where the goods are entered or before any functionary authorized by law to administer oaths.

Under the old regulations a British subject residing in a foreign country or the citizen of another country living in Canada could secure the free entry of properly registered animals, whereas under the new order foreign persons or firms are excluded from this privilege.

Customs officers are required to examine carefully the animals presented for entry to see that they correspond with the description contained in the import certificate and if they do not duty is collected. The statutory declaration required regarding citizenship and identity will it is hoped effectively prevent abuses that led up to the passing of the new regulations. As in the past animals are subjected to veterinary inspection at the port of entry. Officials of the health of animals branch who do this work are required to make a report as to color and markings. If it is found by the Canadian national records that foreign certificates of registration do not correspond with these reports Canadian registration and import certificates for the animals in question are refused.

Six Millions in Black Foxes

A P. E. Island paper says:—Elsewhere in this issue we publish a list of forty-seven incorporated island silver black fox companies, representing a total capital of \$6,222,250. The list does not include all the fox concerns, there being, in addition, no fewer than one hundred partnerships with, at a conservative estimate, an approximate capital of \$2,000,000, making an aggregate of over \$8,000,000. The total capital may be estimated roundly at \$9,000,000 and from outside, \$1,500,000.

Apart from gold and diamond booms which from time to time catch the popular fancy—but usually over a wider area—there has been nothing in recent financial records to compare with this mushroom-like development of so important a money-making proposition. It is but the other day the first company was floated, and already six million dollars have been eagerly subscribed, while almost daily new flotations are being placed at the market.

Butter can be kept as fresh as when newly made in the following manner:—Wrap each half-pound of butter in a piece of muslin. Make a brine strong enough for an egg to float in. When cold put in the butter, taking care that it is well covered with the brine. Keep in a cool place.

August. Estimate of the yield per acre of spring wheat, rye, oats, barley and flaxseed. Estimate of areas sown to these cereals that from any cause will not produce a crop. Condition of spring wheat, oats, barley, potatoes, turnips, mangolds, carrots, etc., hay and clover, alfalfa, corn for fodder, sugar beets, tobacco and pasture. Condition of live stock.

September. Estimate of the yield per

acre of fall wheat, spring wheat, oats, barley, rye, spelt, peas, beans, buckwheat, mixed grains, flaxseed, corn for hushing and tobacco. Quality of these crops when harvested. Percentage of areas under these crops destroyed from any cause. Condition of potatoes, turnips, mangolds, carrots, etc., sugar beets, corn for fodder and alfalfa.

October. Yield per acre, quality and average price of potatoes, sugar beets, turnips, corn for hushing, other roots (mangolds, carrots, etc.) hay and clover, alfalfa seed.

November. Per cent number and condition of live stock. Winter supplies for farm live stock.

December. Final estimate of yields per acre based upon reports of threshing results. Average market prices and weight per measured bushel of cereals. Yield per acre and price of clover, alfalfa and alfalfa seed.

PUT MORE INSURANCE ON FERRY LUDLOW

Only \$25,000 Carried and it Will Be Raised to \$40,000

The amount of insurance carried on the city ferry steamer was discussed by the commissioners at their meeting this morning. The harbor commissioner submitted a statement showing that the steamer Ludlow, against which bonds have been issued to the extent of \$25,000 is insured for only \$25,000. The Governor Carlisle is bonded for \$41,000 and insured for \$40,000. It was decided to increase the insurance on the Ludlow to \$40,000.

NOT INCLINED TO TAKE ACTION

Police Magistrate Matter Discussed in Fredericton

SOME PRESS FOR ACTION

There is Also Talk of a Compromise but Belief is That Government Will Let Judge Armstrong's Report Die

A special despatch from Fredericton says:—

"J. A. Barry, of St. John, was here yesterday and there was some revival of the talk in connection with the investigation in which Magistrate Ritchie of St. John, was the principal figure. It is understood that the report of the commissioner, Judge J. R. Armstrong, was adverse to the magistrate, and it is also understood that the government is very reluctant to take any action that will deprive the magistrate of his employment.

"Those, however, who have been working to this end are still persistent in demanding his dismissal. They have been surprised, nevertheless, to find that the magistrate's friends are very numerous, and that they are not idle on his behalf. The latest phase of the subject savours somewhat of a compromise.

"The salary that goes with the office amounts to \$3,000 a year, and it had been suggested that the magistrate should receive \$2,000 annually. Mr. Henderson, present police clerk and assistant magistrate, is mentioned here as likely to be appointed in the event of such an arrangement being carried out.

"J. A. Barry's name also has been mentioned as a probable successor to Mr. Henderson. Still it is asserted by those who ought to know that the government is not inclined to take any action on the report."

TO RESUME LOCAL MILITARY ACTIVITIES

Plans For Gunnery and Signalling Schools—The Annual Drill

Activities in militia training, which have been dormant in St. John during the winter months, will be resumed on next Monday when a school of instruction in gunnery will be opened for the officers, non-coms, and men of the 8th N. B. Artillery Regiment. It will be conducted in the Lower Cove armory and probably will be attended by about sixty members of the regiment. A supervising officer and an instructor are expected to arrive in the city at the latter part of the week to conduct the school, which will last about six weeks. It is the expectation that orders will be issued for the regular annual training to be begun immediately following the school of instruction, the sergeant instructor remaining in the city during the training, as was done last year.

A school of instruction in signalling also will be opened in the city in the near future, although the dates have not yet been decided. It is expected that it will be about the latter part of April or early in May, and that the instructing will be done by a member of No. 8 Section, who led all Canada last year as in previous years in signalling honors, even making superior marks to the crack Kingston corps.

This school will last about four weeks. The instructor will probably be A. J. Lindsay, Q. M. S., 1. of No. 8 Section. He delivered an interesting lecture last evening before the members of the signalling unit attached to the 62nd Regiment on "Practical Signalling," which was greatly appreciated by the members. This unit is up to full strength and has done some active signalling work during the winter under Lt. Dawson. Orders are expected for the 62nd Regiment St. John Fusiliers to resume their annual training about April 15.

SAD CASE OF A BOY

Problem of His Case is Being Worked Out

Adjutant Cummings of the Salvation Army might have seen this morning a company with a boy about eight or nine years old, whose clothing and general appearance gave every evidence of neglect. He was a bright, healthy looking boy, who under favorable conditions would no doubt develop into a good citizen. This boy's mother is not in the city. He has been living with his father, whose present home keeper smokes cigarettes, and has sent the boy out to get them for her.

Yesterday the boy was turned out from this so-called home and told to shift for himself. A gentleman took him last night to the Salvation Army home where he was cared for, and this morning Adjutant Cummings took him and went to that portion of the city where he had lived, to make enquiries. He learned from an uncle of the boy, who would be willing to care for the lad, but that he is unable to do so, that the home from which the little fellow had been turned away was really not a fit place for him, and that he would be better off somewhere else.

Adjutant Cummings conferred with the authorities of a private institution, and it is possible the boy may find a home there. If not there seems to be no other course but to send him to the Municipal Home. If there were a Children's Aid Society there would be no difficulty in providing him with a good home where he would have an opportunity to grow up a good citizen.
