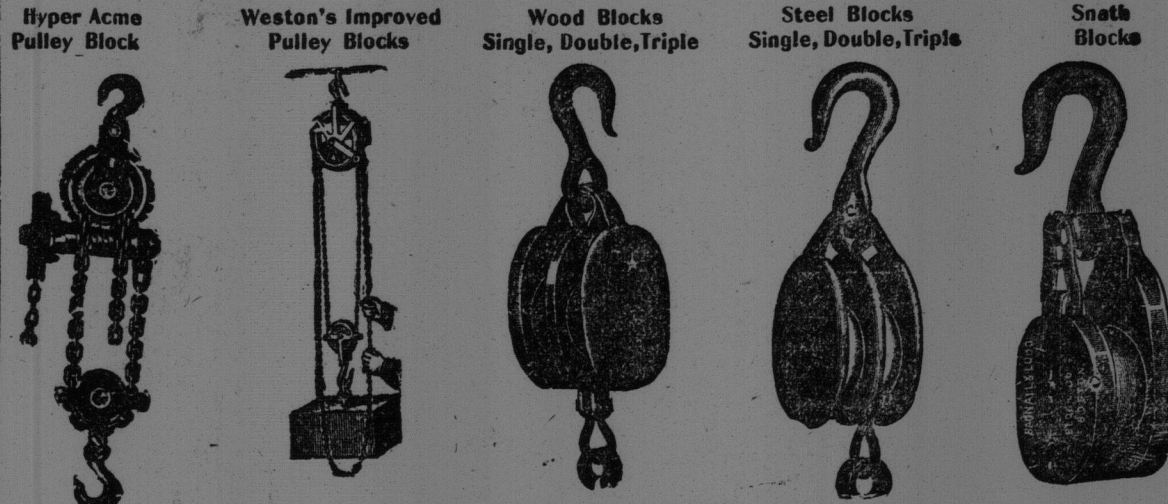

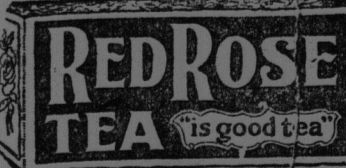

Daily Hints For the Cook

PUMPKIN CONSERVE. Allow to each pound of peeled pumpkin three quarters of a pound of granulated sugar. Cut the pumpkin in thin, narrow strips, sprinkle with the sugar and let stand in a preserving kettle over night, when the sugar will have extracted much juice. Add for every six pounds of peeled pumpkin the juice, pulp and grated rind of six lemons and a quarter pound green ginger root, washed, scraped and chopped fine. Cook all together until the consistency of thin marmalade.

TOMATO SAUCE. Six ripe tomatoes; half a cupful of lean ham; six peppercorns; half a tablespoonful of cornstarch, one onion, one carrot, one sprig of thyme, two tablespoonfuls of butter, salt and cayenne pepper. Peel and slice the tomatoes, onions and carrots; chop the ham and melt the butter in a stew pan. Put the ham into the melted butter with the vegetables. Fry for five minutes and add the tomatoes and seasonings. Let simmer for fifteen minutes, then rub the sauce through a hair sieve. Return it to the saucepan, and when it comes to a boil add the cornstarch mixed with a little cold water. Stir until the tomatoes thicken, and serve on spaghetti, roast veal or other meats.

ASTORS THE LARGEST OF THE TAXPAYERS

Realty Holdings in New York Declared to Be Worth \$150,000,000.

GROWTH OF A FORTUNE

Founder Was John Jacob Astor, Who, to Amusement of His Friends, Developed Penchant for Buying Farm Lands

(New York Times.) The New York Times has obtained an authoritative statement of the realty holdings of the Astor estate in this city. It shows that the total assessed valuation of the property on Manhattan Island, owned by Col. John Jacob Astor, his cousin, William Waldorf Astor of England, and the estate of William Astor, the father of the present John Jacob, in which various members of the family hold interests, is \$107,000,000. The Astor estate therefore is New York's largest taxpayer by a wide margin.

Of the enormous amount of realty scattered all over the city, William Waldorf Astor is the greatest holder, his possessions being assessed at \$50,200,000. John Jacob Astor pays taxes on \$41,922,000, while the holdings of the William Astor estate are assessed at \$16,400,000. Despite the increased assessments in recent years, it is safe to say that the entire Astor holdings are not taxed on much more than 60 per cent. of what the holdings would bring at private or public sale, so that the marketable value of this \$107,000,000 worth of property would doubtless reach \$150,000,000.

ROYAL MEMBERS OF MASONIC FRATERNITY

Rulers of Denmark and Sweden and President of States Become Honorary Members of Craft in England

London, Oct. 25.—"The Daily Telegraph" says that, by consenting to associate themselves with the English branch of the order as honorary members of the Lodge of King Solomon, the King of Denmark, Past Grand Master of England; the King of Sweden, and the President of the United States have further cemented the fraternal bonds existing between England and the heads of foreign states, and their respective systems

of Freemasonry. King George V. is not a member of the Order, but his father, King Edward, was a most enthusiastic Mason, and, as Prince of Wales, filled the office of Grand Master for upwards of twenty-six years, and was Protector of the craft during the period he was on the throne.

The Kaiser, like the King, has kept apart from the fraternity, although his father also was an enthusiastic Mason. The emperor's brother, Prince Henry of Prussia, is, however, associated with the order, and so, too, are Prince Henry of the Netherlands and the King of Norway, Greece, and Wurtemberg. The Emperor Frederick was grand master of the German Masons during the last thirty years of his life, and that section of the craft in its three grand lodges has for its protector Prince Frederick Leopold of Prussia, the Kaiser's brother-in-law, who was elected a past grand master of England in 1881.

Italian rite, and endeavored to counteract the tendency of the French Masons to radicalism and republicanism, by getting his cousin, Prince Murat, appointed chief of the Grand Orient of France; but his efforts in this direction were doomed to failure.

It is interesting to add, in this connection, that a vast majority of the presidents of the United States of America, from George Washington down to Theodore Roosevelt, and the present head, have been Masons. A notable exception, however, was John Quincy Adams, who talked and wrote antagonistically to the order, with much vigor. The Duke of Connaught is the present grand master in England. He was initiated in 1874.

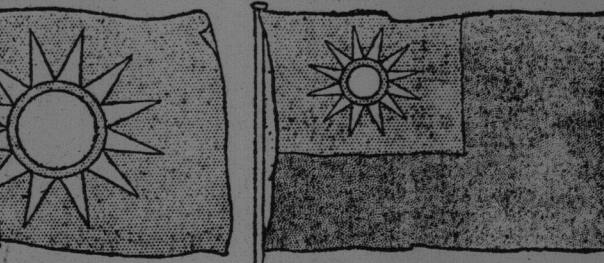

FLAGS ADOPTED BY CHINESE REBELS.



C. S. Gunn, treasurer of the New York branch of the Young China Association and friend of Dr. Sun Yat Sen, leader of the Chinese uprising, displays two flags, which he says have been adopted by the rebels. One of red, blue and white, he said, was to be the national flag of China, while the other of blue, with a twelve-pointed white sun in the center, as the battle flag of the revolution. In neither flag does the famous dragon appear, and there is not a yellow thread in either of them.

In the red, blue and white flag, the field is of red, with the union of blue with a white sun, with twelve rays in the center. The twelve rays represent the twelve two-hour periods into which the Chinese day is divided. The new battle flag is entirely blue, with the exception of the great white sun, also twelve-rayed, in the center. This latter flag is the one that now flies above the revolutionary armies.

LOYD GEORGE BILL MAY CAUSE SPLIT IN LABOR PARTY.

Majority in Favor of National Insurance Project, But Some Members Oppose It.

London, Oct. 26.—(Canadian Press)—Lloyd George's national insurance bill for the consideration of which the House of Commons agreed to allocate most of the time of the autumn session, threatens to split the labor party.

At a meeting of the party last night the majority decided to support the bill. Messrs. Snowden, Jewitt, Lansbury, and Thorne are among the dissenters, and refuse to abide by the decision. They intend to form a separate group.

Labor Men Heard at Meeting of Aldermen—Plan of the Parcels is to Be Drawn up

The proposal to sell the city lands in Lancaster to workmen at a fair price was advanced at the special meeting of the safety board last evening.

The plan as drawn up by the delegation and laid before the board was as follows: The common council is to instruct their engineer:

1. To survey and lay out in November for settlement all Lancaster lands as per Lord Patric's plan, Aug. 1809, fronting on the Gypsy Settlement road, also on the two reserved roads, and also any other lots by street on the Manawagish road, except those fronting on the Manawagish road and the C. F. R. track not now under permanent lease.

2. Early in January the safety board to advertise these lots to be sold on the following conditions: (a) Any man 21 years of age and over, married or a widow, and a resident for not less than six months of St. John city or county, to have the right to apply for a lot.

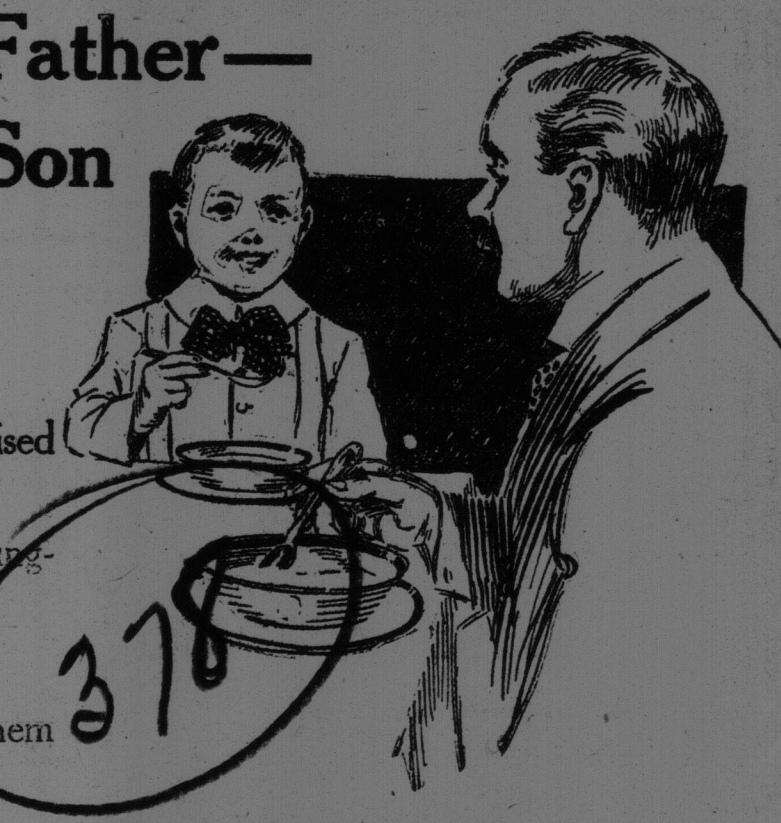


Table with financial data: Quarter ending June 30, 1911. Initiated, Reinstated, Expelled, Suspended, etc.

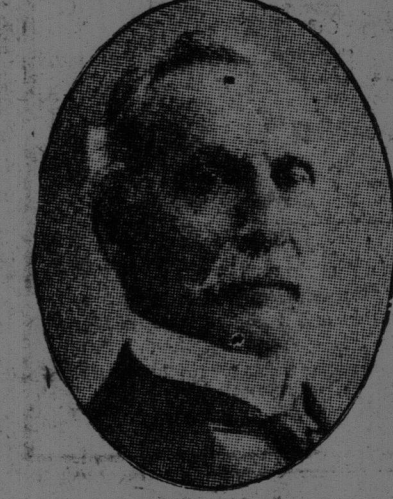

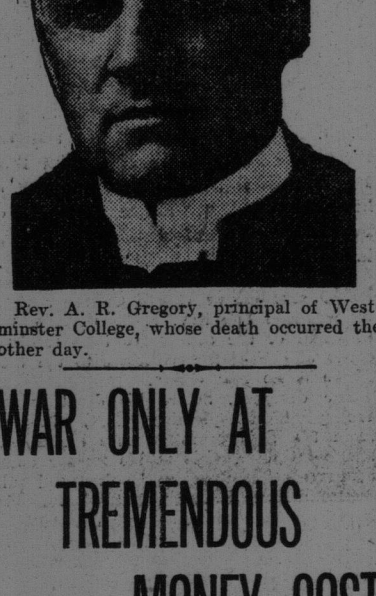

AUTO ACCIDENT BRINGS FIRST SOUND FROM DUMB BOY

Further Particulars of Fatality in Which Dr. Cass and His Wife Met Death

On Monday the Times published news of the death of Dr. and Mrs. James Cass in an automobile accident in Stoneham, Pennsylvania. The sad news came to a brother of Dr. Cass in Sackville.

Further particulars, received yesterday, are that the automobile was crossing the Pennsylvania Railroad tracks when a locomotive came along and struck the car. Dr. and Mrs. Cass were instantly killed.

Their eight-year old son Fred, who rode in the machine with his parents, was hurt fifty feet, but was not severely hurt. Until the accident he had never uttered a sound in his life, but as he scrambled from a ditch and saw his dead father and mother lying near the wrecked automobile he screamed several times for help. Physicians now believe that he may be able to speak.

Bring Home Moose and Birds—Association Looking Into Reports of Game Law Violation

Local sportsmen and those from other provinces and the states are practicing unanimity in their assertions that this year has been one of the best in New Brunswick for an abundance of wild game of all kinds, and there are few who went into the woods for big game who did not return reporting success in securing a moose and deer. Smaller game such as partridges and ducks, particularly the former, are reported as being very plentiful throughout the province as a whole, including many sections of St. John county.

Frank W. Fowler, of the New Brunswick Telephone Co., and Wm. Smith, of Vancouver, who have been on a hunting trip to Newcastle Bridge, Grand Lake, returned last evening, bringing back with them a fine big moose and a bag of birds as well.

G. G. Vincent and A. G. Pearson, of St. John, Railway Co. employ, with Clarence Pearson, returned this week after a successful hunting expedition in the woods about Carleton Place. They were accompanied by Fred and Chas. Coles as guides. They brought back two fine specimens of the moose family. The antlers of one measured fifty-four and a half inches, with nineteen points, while the other measured fifty inches with thirteen points. They spoke highly of the work of the guides, who have met with much success not only this year but in other seasons in taking hunting parties into the woods for big game.

Several cases of violation of the game laws have been reported to the N. B. Fish, Forest, and Game Association, and inquiry is being made. There are reports of instances wherein mooseheads have been shipped without the proper tags accompanying them, and this is a matter which it is intended to try to stop. It is probable that officials on the railways will be notified that this violation of the game laws should not be further allowed.
