In our last, the Chronological Summary was brought down to the. close of 1840. We resume in the present Number nur Record of Re* markable Occurrences connected with the History of this Province, from the beginning of 1841. The events referred to in preceding nums. bers, having elicited considerable interest, we again solicit the asgist*. ance of our Correspondents, in order that this department may be as: complete as possible in the subsequent numbers of this publication.
1841.-January 6th.-His Lordship the Catholic Bishop of the Province, having taken the Temperance Pledge himself, proceeded toadminister it to his congregation at Antigonish, and furm a large Temperance Society at that place.\22d.-The Rev, Messrs. Laughnan and Dease, commenced the St. Mary's Temperance Society in Halifax, by first taking the Pledge themselves.

February 3rd.-The eighteenth General Assembly convened at Halifax, and the Legislative Sessions were opened. The Hon. Joseph Howe was elected Speaker. 4th.-The inhabitants of Earitown, in Colchester, petitioned the House, to do away with the exclusive privilege of the Townships in that County, and to order-that all their Members should he elected as County Members. 17th.-The Hon. Hugh Bell took his seat in the Legislative Council. 25th.-A bill to incorporate the tovin of Halifax, framed by the Executive Council, was laid before the House.
March 1st.-Dr. McCulloch offered his private Museum;-being a beautiful collection of specimens of the Natural History of the Province, to the House of Assembly. 3rd.--St. Mary's College, which had been in operation above a year, was incorporated by an Aet of the Legisla-. ture. 29th.-The Incorporation Bill, after strong opposition, and many protracted debates, passed the House, and was subsequently agreed to by the Council. Reporters of the debates of the House were first paid by tbis Session. The House by an address to Her Majesty, requests that the Port of Antigonish, may be made a Port of entry. By information laid before the House, it appeared that there were throughout the Province Forty-six deaf and dumb persons. Within the last. five years, without including Halifax, there had been 222 criminal trials, by the several General Sessions of the Peace. The three small vessels employed in the Revenue Service--cost the last year $£ 2,181$ 15s 6d. The question of the Repeal of the Union with Cape Bretori, was the subject of a lengthy debate towards the close of thie: Session. The GasLight and.Water Company was incorporated this Session.I. J. A. Stayner, Post-Master-General of British North America, reported to.

the home government that it will take $£ 12,000$ to complete a Post road from Quebec to Halifax. By the Treasurer's accounts, laid before the House, it appeared that there was paid into the Treasury during the past year $£ 119,098$ 6s. 6d. From the same authority the casual and territorial Revenue amounted to $£ 12,517$ 7s. 9d. The Halifax Poor Asylum disbursment for the past year was $£ 3,789 \mathrm{17} \mathrm{s}, 8 \mathrm{~d}$. \The Small Pox appeared in Halifax this winter, and the poor were vaccinated at the public expense. $£ 5,000$ of the Public debt was paid off this year. $£ 24,000$ was granted for the Road and Bridge service. $£ 500$ per annum was granted to the Eastern Stage Coach Company. There were raised and sold by the proprietors of the Coal Mines, 44,656 chaldrons of Ccal ; all but 20,000 of which paid a duty of One Shilling per chaldron to our Treasury; consequently the duty amounted to the sum of £1,232 16s. 30th.-T. C. Halliburton, promoted to the Bench of Su preme Court.

April 9 th. - St. Mary's Total Abstinence Society, was regularly organized, and Rev. Mr. Laughnan chosen Piesident. 10th.-The Legisn lative Session closed, after a session of Sixty-six days, being the shortest Session we can find on Record. 15th.-Died in the 51st year of his age, Charles R. Fairbani:s, Esq., Master of the Rolls, and Judge of Her Majesty's Court of Vice Admiralty, -one of Nova Scotia's most talented sons. 28tin.-The Hon. S. G. W. Archibald, made Master of the Rolls and Judge of Vice Admiralty. The Hon. J. W. Johnston, Attorney General, and the Hon. James B. Uniacke, Solicitor General.
May 12th.-The Municipal Officers for the City of Halifax, were first elected, agreeably to the late Act of Incorporation. Stephen Binney, Esq., was elected Mayor. 19th.-The Steamship Britannia, in approaching the harbour, struck on a rock off Sambro, and received such injury as to make it nécessary to go to St. John, N.B., for repairs.
June $2 d$.-The first number of the Colonial Farmer, edited by Mri Titus Smith, made its appearance. 23rd.-The Halifax Hotel was completed. 24th.-The first Temperance Procession of the St. Mary's Society, in which nearly 4,000 new converts walked. It was the first Temperance Procession which took place in the Province. The same day, was laid the corner stone of the Penitentiary, at North West Arm. IJuly 23rd.-The first number of the Morning Herald made its ap. pearance; being the first tri-weekly or penny paper establisked in the Province; Publisher and Proprietor, William Cunnabell. A public Meeting was heid at Amherst, at which resolutions were passed in favour of a union between Nova Scotis and New Brunswick.
August 3 rd.-The first number of the Register, a Catholic Weekly paper, was published at Halifax.

September 6th.-The Prince De Joinville, son of the King of the French, arrived in Halifax, and was received with much ceremony by His Excellency and City authorities, and remained in Halifax about ten days. 22d.-Mr. John McNab appointed Colonial Aid-de-camp. in place of Stephen Binney, Esq., superseded. 26th.-Lord Sydenham, the Governor-General, died in Canada. Much gloom pervaded Halifax when the news arrived. Considerable mercantile distress, and many extensive failures about this time.

Navember 25th:-His Excellency and Lady Falkiand, attended the Mechanica' Institute, and heard a lecture from the Hon. Hugh Bell.

December 14th.-His Excellencr entertained a large company at a Ball at Government House, in honour of the birth of the Pricee of

Wales; news of which had lately arrived. Congratulatory addresses were sent home on the occasion. 23rd.-A public holiday was observed. The poor in Halifax were feasted, and other demonstrations of rejoicing, in consequence of the birth of the Prince of Wales. 25th. The Episcopal Church at the Three-Mile-House, near Halifax, was first opened for Divine Service.
1842.-January 1st.- The Hon. Joseph Howe retired from the Press, having disposect of the copyright of the Novascotian. 3rd.His Worship the Mayor embarked for England, and Alderman Kenny was chosen Mayor in his place. 13th.-Wm. Young, Esq., was sworn in as Executive Councillor, in place of Sir Rupert D. George, resign-1 ed. 20th.-The Legislative Session was opened; His Excellency's Speech was much longer than had been usual on such occasions. Dickens, the author of Boz, \&cc., happened to be in Halifax on his way to the United States, and had a chair at the Speaker's right, during the opening of the House. 22d. -The Hon. J. L. Starr, resigned his seat in the Legislative Council. The Bill transfering the appointment of Sheriffs, from the Chief Judge to His Excellency, in Council, passed the House; but was subsequently lost in the Council.
February 8 th.- $£ 28,000$ voted for the service of the Roads and Bridges. 15th.-The Bankrupt Bill prepared by the Executive, and laid before the House, was rejected; on which, the opposition claimed of the members of the Government, that they should retire. 16th. A vote of confidence in the Government, moved by the Hon: J. Howe. was carried by a large majority; forty names were recorded for, and only eight against it 22d. -Delegates from various Temperance $\mathrm{Sn}-$ cieties met in Brunswick Street Chapel, Halifax, to deliberate on the best mode of advancing the cause of Temperance. 24th.-Died at Lunenburg, Cornwallis Moureau, in the 92d year of his age. He wass the first male child born in Halifax. Much discussion arose, both in the House and Council, respecting the nature of the form of Government lately introduced-which was finally set at rest by what was called, "The Dodian Confession of Faith," being a plain and specific declaration of the Hon. Mr. Dodd, "That the Executive Council was responsible for their conduct to the House of Assembly, and through the House of Assembly to the Constituency at large."
March 19th. -The Session of the Legislature was closed.
April 15th. -Two little girls, the children of Mr. John Mahar, were lost in the Woods, north of the Dartmouth Road, where they both perished, and their bodies were found ten days after, locked in eack other's arms.
May 25 th.-Her Majesty not accepting of the resignation of Sir R. D. George, that gentleman again took his seat in the Executive Council. 27th.-A new Board of Governors of Dalhousie College was appointed. July $2 d$.-The Prince George, a large merchant vessel, cleared at Halifax direct for China, being the first vessel from this Province, which engaged in that trade. The political letters of "The Constitutionalist" were published about this time.
August 19th.-Died at Halifax, the Hon. H. N. Binney, who had for the period of fifty years filled the office of Collector of Excise for this Port, with credit to himself and benefit to the public.
September $7 t^{\mathrm{K}}$. -The Hon. Joseph Howe, appointed Commissioner Ni Excise, for the Port of Halifax; yacant by the death of the Hon. H.
N. Binney.

'16th.-Arrived in Halifax, his Lordship the Right Rev. Wm. Walsh, Bishop of the Catiolic Church. 2uth.-Died in the 100th year of his age, the Hon. S. S. Blowers; for many years Chief Judge of the Province and President of H. M. Council. Thomas Williamson, Esq., elected Mayor of Halifax.

December 1st.-The first Number of the Day Star, a tri-weekly paper, edited by W. J. Ward, was published in Halifax. 14th.-Died in England, Sir Alexander Croke; for many years Judge of the Court of 'Vice Admiralty in this Province.
1843.-January 11th.-Gas Lights were first used in Halifax. 18th. ${ }^{\text {Died, John Howe, Esq., Deputy Post Master General, and Queen' }}$ Printer. Mr. John S. Thompson, was shortly after appointed Queen's Printer. 26th.-The Legislative Session was opened. The Hon. Mr. Howe, in consequence of having accepted of the place of Commissioner of Excise, resigned the Speakership, and the Hon. William. Young wan elected Speaker. 31st.-Lord Falkland was informed by a Dispatch from the Colonial Office, that the treaty with the Unitel States respect ing the Boundary Question was ratified.

February 3rd.- The first Session of Dalhousie College, under the late arrangement, was opened with much ceremony by the Rev. Dr, MeCulloch. 7th-The Hon. T. A. S. DeWolfe, retired from the Executive Council. 8th.-The Qualification Bill was introduced by the Executive into the House, where it received much opposition, and $\infty$ casioned many lengthy Debates; but was finally carried by a small majority. 21st, -Mr. Annand moved a Resolution in ue Assembly-in opposition to the system of supporting Sectarian colleges. There is at the present time an Episcopalian, a Catholic, a Baptist and a Presby. terian College; all supported or sustained by the public funds, and the Methodists and Dissenting Presbyterians were expected to apply for gine each. 24th,-Mr. Annand's Resolution passed by a small majority, and onie general College was recommended, to be so conducted that all sects might participate in its benefis. 25th. -The Petition of a num"ber of Ladies of Liverpool, praying that the importation of ardent spi-- rits might be prohibited, was laid before the House.

March 1st.-Our Colonial Tariff reduced in conformity with Imperial Statutes, whereby manufactures of all kinds were allowed to be Frought into the county almost duty free. Thirty-two Petitions were this year presented in favour of extending the grant to Acadia (the Baptist) College. $£ 15,000$ were granted by this Session for the servio of Roads and Bridges. 18th.-Sir Charles Theophilus Metcalfe, the hewly uppointed Governor General, arrived at Halifax on his way to Quebec. 25th.- $£ 9,260$ granted by the House to complete the nem Penitentiary at the North West Arm in Hahfax. 29th,-The Legishative Session was proregued. Lord Falkland in his closing Speech, thanked them for their praiseworthy conduct, and hoped to receivea continuance of their assistance and co-operation, when they meet again, According to a Report to this Session there were $£ 59,917$ 10s. in Province Notes, in circulation. The Net amount of the public Debt at the commencement of this year, was $£ 77,750-5 \mathrm{~s}$. 2d. The cost of Light-house establishments, throughout the Province during the laat Tyear, amounted to $£ 4,8039 \mathrm{~s}$. 11d. By a Report of the Hon. April 11th.-Died, in the 67th year of his age, the Hon. Michae! Tobin, Senior. 31st.-Arthur Woodgate, Esq., arrived at Halifax, and assumed the duties of Deputy Post Master General, to which office he had been appointed by Her Majesty.
June 21st.-Hon. Peter Hall Clarke, of the Island of Cape Breton. was appointed to the Legislative Council, in place of Hon. Jas. Morse, resigned.

July 1st.-The Royal Mail Steamship Columbia, was cast away and wrecked on the South West coast of this Prevince, occasioned by an extraordinary and unknown current in the Bay-of Fundy.
August 4th. - The first cargo of Tea brought into Halifaix directiffom Canton, in the Prince Geoige; in the employ of J. Charman \& Cow
September 1st. - The Gatholic congregation of Halifax turned out en wnasse, and having previousidy levelled the syrface of their burying ground on the Common, erected a Chapel, and completed the outside before the close of that day.

October 3rd.-Alexander Keith, Esq., elected Mayor of Hhalinix, is place of Thothás Williamson, Esq., Whose tetm of office expired. DG ring the sumimer and fall, various public meetings were frefd on the zubjects of Colleges, some of which were attended by the Hon/My. Sohnston, in behalf of the plurality of Colleges, and others by the Mol. Mr. Howe at the same time, resigned his situation as Commissioner of Excise, and Mr. Uniacke that of Solicitor General. His Excellency Lord Falkland accetped these resignations.

Or the contrary, is is not, in nine cases out of ten, the fortunate speculatore who by watching the foreign markets, and by his knowledge of affairs at home, steps in before the farmer and coolly pockets all the gains?-m The latter, at home by his fireside, destitute of the important informa-s tion, which a few Shillings might procure for him if expended on a good newspaper, sells his wheat at the usual price, little dreaming bow much he is losing by the bargain, while the wiser speculator, makes a
