THIRTY-FIRST ANNUAL SESSION

OF THE

SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF MONTREAL.

FIRST DAY, 17th JUNE, 1890.

The Thirty-first Annual Meeting of the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal was held on Tuesday, the 17th day of June, 1890.

The Sermon was preached by Ven. Archdeacon Evans, M.A., Rector of St. Stephen's Church, Montreal. The Holy Communion was administered by the Bishop, assisted by Ven. Archdeacons Lindsay and Evans, Rev. Dr. Norton, Canon Fulton, M.A., Rev. E. A. W. King, M.A., Rev. G. A. Smith, M.A.

The Synod assembled at two o'clock in the Synod Hall, when the session was opened with prayer by the Bishop.

The Rolls were called by the Secretaries.

It was moved by Rev. Dr. Norton, seconded by Rev. Canon Anderson: That Canon Empson be re-elected Clerical Secretary.—Carried.

It was moved by Mr. C. Garth, seconded by Dr. L. H. Davidson: That Mr. Richard White be re-elected Lay Secretary.—Carried.

It was moved by Very Rev. Dean Carmichael, seconded by Mr. E. L. Bond:

That Mr. Charles Garth be elected Treasurer of the Synod.—Carried.

It was moved by Dr. L. H. Davidson, seconded by Mr. Thomas Binmore:

That Messrs. G. W. Simpson and Samuel C. Fatt be re-elected auditors.

—Carried.

The Minutes of the last session were considered as read, and were confirmed as printed in the "Proceedings of the Thirtieth Annual Synod of the Diocese of Montreal."

It was resolved that the Offertory at this morning's service be given to the Mission Fund.

The Bishop then named the several standing committees (see pp. 11-13). The Bishop gave notice of meetings as follows:—The Church of England Temperance Society in the Synod Hall this evening, the Council at 7.30 o'clock, and the General Annual Meeting at 8 o'clock.

The annual Missionary Meeting to-morrow, Wednesday, at 8 p.m.

The Lay Helpers Association Annual Meeting on Friday evening.

His Lordship also, at the request of Rev. Dr. Norton, gave notice that the Holy Communion will be administered each morning in the Cathedral at 9 o'clock, during the session.

The Bishop then read his charge to the Synod as follows :-

HIS LORDSHIP'S CHARGE.

In delivering his annual charge, His Lordship said: - Dear brethren of the clergy and laity,-It is with feelings of great thankfulness to Almighty God, who has granted me protection and health through another year, that I meet you once more in Synod assembled. The routine of diocesan visitation affords few novelties, although to me, personally, the work is of the greatest interest, and to you it must be gratifying to learn that progress is continually being made. We have had the usual confirmations throughout the diocese; 380 men and 580 women, a total of 960. I have admitted six to the diaconate and five to the priesthood. Three churches and one cemetery have been consecrated. With one or two exceptions, I have visited every parish and mission within the diocese. I observe with great satisfaction the systematic effort to supply the outlying districts and suburbs of the city with religious services; and growing out of this effort, the building of All Saints' Church at Cote St. Louis, opened by me on the 6th October last, when seven persons were confirmed, followed by nine others on a recent visit, and forming a separate congregation, under the charge of the Rev. H. J. Evans, whose zeal and faithfulness are known to all. It is clear to me that our efforts for the extension of our Church work in this diocese must be dependent for their success to a great extent on our work in the city. It would be a great mistake to permit that work to be hampered, in any degree, by our parochial system. And I feel sure that you will be ready to consider whether or no any modification of the limits of districts, or any other action, would conduce to the promotion of so desirable an object as the infusion of still greater energy into our Church work in the city. Of special subjects to be brought to your notice at this time, I will place first a resolution passed at the last meeting of the Provincial Synod. His Lordship here quoted the resolutions adopted at the last session of the Provincial Synod in Montreal last September, which authorized the appointment of a committee to invite a conference

of representatives from all the dioceses in British North America on the subject of the union of the branches of the Anglican Churches in British North America, this committee to meet in a year's time when the secretaries should have heard from the several dioceses.

His Lordship then continued: You will, of course, in conformity with the resolution of the committee appointed under that resolution, send two delegates to attend the conference at Winnipeg, to be held on Friday, 15th August, at 2 o'clock p.m., (I observe by a circular from the Bishop of Toronto, chairman, that the day of meeting has been changed from September to the 15th of August of this year). You will choose men by character and ability fitted to promote the design in the mind of the Provincial Synod, remembering also that the movement itself was inaugurated at Lambeth, at the great meeting of Anglican bishops and dignified clergy held in July, 1888, usually spoken of as Pan-Anglican.

WE ALL WISH FOR UNITY.

That His Church might be united, was the prayer of the great head of the Church, the Lord Jesus Christ Himself. The particular words to which I refer are to be found in the 17th chapter of the Gospel according to St. John, vs. 20-23, where, with divine foresight and power of comprehension, the Saviour includes the Church throughout all time, "neither pray I for these (my disciples) alone, but for them also which shall believe on me through their word, that they all may be one; as Thou, Father, art in Me, and I in Thee, that they also may be one in Us; that the world may believe that Thou hast sent Me. And the glory which Thou gavest Me I have given them; that they may be one, even as we are one; I in them and Thou in Me, that they may be made perfect in one; and that the world may know that Thou hast sent Me, and hast loved them as Thou hast loved me." It is spiritual unity—true, loving unity-at which we must aim; not uniformity, and certainly not centralization. Uniformity and centralization are apt to be carried to excess, because they seem orderly; but beyond a certain point they cramp the intelligence, produce a sort of mental laziness and obstruct freedom and progress. Consolidation is good, but anything which bars progressive development is bad. The whole of time as well as the whole of space belongs to God, and the unity we should desire is the unity which enables us to advance, side by side, with the development of God's will. The history of the Church, previous to the Reformation, and read in the light of that great movement, warns us against undue uniformity; so does the history of the Gallican Church. A comparison of primitive uses with the customs and requirements of our own day teaches that common sense must have its place in Church organization as well as in every-day life.

There are doctrines and usages so true and lasting that they belong to all time, such are the fundamental doctrines of Christianity, which must be maintained in their simplicity and purity as well in this age as in the first ages of the Church; but there are practices, and even beliefs, which should pass away, because they are limited to their own generation. The dress and manner suitable to West Asia and North Africa, where the Christian religion was cradled, do not of necessity belong to us. The knowledge of the schools, before the world was opened to the scholar, by science and travel, should be allowed respectfully to rest in its place in history, just as our own knowledge will have to rest in its place as the ages pass by. The unity to be desired is a oneness which grasps circumstantial diversity, and makes it a beautiful varied whole. We want so to organize the Church of God that we may cover the whole earth with the doctrines and practice of a pure Christianity. Sometimes we seem to crowd one another in a small space, and then leave large districts untouched. How shall the family of man be united in Christ if we hinder and impede one another? "To unite and consolidate the various branches of the Church of England in British North America" is, according to the resolution I have just read, the purpose of the conference at Winnipeg. Our delegates must be careful that the tree (of which the Canadian Churches are branches) has space and light wherein to grow in order that (to continue the metaphor) the birds of the air may come to lodge in the branches thereof. The branches are united with the tree in a manner natural and suitable, but we should scarcely speak of it as "consolidated," for "consolidation" would hinder its growth, if the tree survived the process at all. Bishop Fulford in his charge at the primary visitation of this diocese, exhorted us in these words: "Look at the duties of the clergy, not only towards those within our own communion, but also towards those who are without. The visible unity of the body of Christ is marred by the sins and weakness of man, and the unbeliever and ungodly draw from these much encouragement to gainsay the truths of revelation, and the plain requirements of the law of God. If, therefore, the differences that exist between various religious communities are not thought of material importance, they must surely appear to us to be unjustifiable and sinful; if, however, we think ourselves justified in maintaining them, we ought to be fully persuaded in our own minds of the grounds upon which they are founded.

"But in all such questions let it be our care still to maintain our Christian charity, to contend for truth, not for victory; to condemn, not persons, but their errors, and to be far more diligent in declaring positive truths than in denouncing the belief or practice of our neighbors." There is, I believe, something special in the craving for unity, which makes itself felt just now throughout the religious world; let us hope that it is

the voice of the Spirit of God striving with man for the realization of the Saviour's prayer. It must not, however, be forgotten that such unity, if we are in earnest, must begin at home. We must ourselves be ready to promote and accept unity; otherwise delegations and conferences will be worse than useless; they will be a waste of time and money, divert men's minds from regular work, and feed an appetite for excitement and unrest. To give up one's own will, and work under a sense of God's will, is to work with Him. Men conferring together with such an end in view enjoy already, in this lower life, a communion of saints, the fruition of which is beyond the grave.

A sense of progress in human goodness (such goodness as our Lord enjoins in the Sermon on the Mount) is actual enjoyment. We all know and feel the joy. It makes society pure and peaceful, and renders sacred every relationship of life. Nor need we shrink from the contemplation of such a high standard of conduct, seeing that Christ has said, "Be ye therefore perfect, even as your Father which is in heaven is perfect." But it is right that we should come still nearer home.

In the midst of debates and plans for the promotion of unity in the Dominion, and in the Church at large, we must not fail to remember that nothing permanent or valuable can be accomplished without personal effort and watchfulness. It were vain to legislate for general unity unless parochial concord be well understood and sincerely desired. All depends upon the trust and affection, the kindness and the devotion which exist, or should exist, between the pastor and his people. The clergyman should be the friend of his parish; and, I need scarcely add that, on the other hand, the parish should be the friend of its spiritual teacher and adviser. There must be real unity, simple, natural, permanent. No slight cause ought to be allowed to interfere with parochial peace and content. A general loving kindness should be cultivated as the first of duties. The time of the clergyman should be given to his people; his presence frequent in their houses; his advice and help always ready.

Of course, the people must extend a welcome in such manner that the clergyman can feel and understand that he is welcome, otherwise a fear of intrusion may keep a reticent or retiring man from intimate association. He will be tempted to reserve for the pulpit the instruction and advice, some of which would be more effectual in the home. It is quite necessary that the laity should make the clergyman know that he may without indiscretion discuss freely religious and moral subjects in the parlor and by the wayside, as well as in the church and school room.

The interests of the two orders, that is, of the clergy and laity, are mutual, and everything that enlightens and instructs the one, the other, or both, should be welcomed and cultivated at every possible opportunity. Nothing distresses or perplexes me more when on my pastoral visitation than to feel the want of this general parochial understanding. It is fatal to the pastor's usefulness. Let me affectionately advise my clerical brethren to spend a large portion of their time in house to house visiting, to the end that they may gain the confidence of their people; and let me ask for the clergy a warm welcome and friendly assistance to make their visits useful in things which belong to the peace of souls and the general promotion of our holy religion.

Closely connected with this matter, in thought, and coming out of it as a practical result, is the use of "lay helpers" in the Church. There is many a man whose circumstances do not allow him to devote himself entirely to the ministry, who can yet give much time and thought to parish work. I can imagine nothing more serviceable to a clergyman in charge of an extensive parish than the assistance of a staff of men, young and old, to help him in the promotion of order, good will and unity, by reading in the church, teaching in the Sunday School, and visiting in the lighter and chronic cases of sickness. Such a band of godly men will bring a spirit of good will into all parochial meetings, and prevent or repress those trifling misunderstandings which have a tendency to arise when earnest, enthusiastic people meet together, not fully informed of each other's wishes and intentions.

The members of the Y. M. C. A. (connected with our different churches) and other devout laymen, do a great deal of work of this kind in the city. In one or two instances, in places where it has been found impossible to provide the stipend of a settled minister, mission churches have been planted and maintained almost without cost. But here (as in all offices of the Church, whether lay or clerical), great care must be exercised in the choice of the persons to serve. They must answer the Apostolic description, "Men of honest report, full of the Holy Ghost and wisdom."

I watch with great interest the movement in favor of free and unappropriated sittings in the churches, and I hope the zeal exhibited in St. Martin's church in this city will provoke many to follow the example of that congregation, and make trial of some plan desirable for its unselfishness and hospitality. Nothing can be more in accordance with Gospel precepts than the reception of the poor in our places of public worship to the full enjoyment of Church privileges. But it is not yet quite clear to me that the abolition of pew rental will have that effect. Pew rental, whether direct or by envelopes, is but a promise to pay for value received, for the space, warmth and cleanliness necessary to decent and comfortable lodgment; there can be no moral wrong in pew rents. That they should include (in the case of unendowed churches) provision for the stipends of the clergy is quite orderly and proper. The human needs of the clergyman who devotes his life to the ministry must be provided for, or how shall

I would not call it faith, but presumption, to accumulate debt without assurance of means to pay; so that whatever plan is tried, let it be one which has a basis in an honesty which is appreciable, not only by the church members themselves, but by contractors and tradesmen with whom of necessity we have to do in things temporal. And our church buildings are things of time. They are human (not divine) institutions. The Church of the living God is the body of believers in Christ imperishable, indestructible, admission to which is without money and without price. Of this Church the temple at Jerusalem was the type. There was only one for the whole nation, and to it the body of the people was not admitted. Our churches are material structures for the use of Christians during the time of their earthly sojourn. They may be many or few, handsome or plain, a schoolroom or a house, but they are sacred or holy, just so far as they are set aside for sacred or holy purposes. They are necessary as part of our Christian civilization and for no other reason. The Gospel was introduced without them. The head of the Church taught in none. The Apostles preached in none. The Church in their day gathered on the mountain side, in fields, in dwelling houses, in upper chambers. But material structures are necessary to us now; we could make no progress without them; they should be in accordance with our requirements, and worthy of the purpose to which they are put, and of course they should be honestly built and maintained, as much as, nay more, than any other buildings in our city.

I fear there may arise confusion if it were admitted as a general principle, the "giving to God" as free, church buildings before they are paid for. I confess, I see but one difference between pew rents and "envelopes" in the case of unpaid buildings, and that is that the pew rents are recoverable by law and the "envelopes" are not. But I am glad that the question of free accommodation in the churches has been raised, and I trust that the good spirit which distinguishes the beginning of the movement will continue to the end. In the meantime, let every one do what he can in the direction of free churches-If nothing else is possible, church members who are wealthy can rent one or two pews more than they require for their own use, and place them at the disposal of the churchwardens for the service of strangers and persons who cannot afford to pay; such an offering might, perhaps, be called a "gift to God," especially if such free pews were chosen in the most desirable parts of the church, with a view to the comfort of the old, the

needs of the sick or deaf, and the gratification of strangers.

But I should not say all that is in my mind were I to withhold the thoughts that occur to me in favor of appropriated pews. It does seem to me that, in some respects, there are direct and important advantages in having an appointed place in church. It induces regular attendance, enables the pastor, at a glance, to note those present, and enquire about those who are absent, and, above all, it facilitates the presence of the family as a whole, parents being sure that they will not be separated from their young children, whose church-going is, in a sense, the introduction to the still greater family in Christ. The seat in church corresponds somewhat with the place in the home, as distinct from a mere lodging. There may be a fear that, the tie to place being loosened, a habit of wandering may be engendered, and that, belonging nowhere in particular, some may be tempted to forsake the assembly of the church altogether.

I wish to draw your attention to the canon and rules touching the patronage of rectories, which does not operate so justly and efficiently as doubtless was intended. It is provided in the canon that the vestry of the vacant rectory shall send two names to the bishop of whom he must choose one as rector, unless there be canonical disqualification. It is intended of course that the vestry, having made its selection from the whole body of the clergy, the bishop shall have a choice between two men; but of this he is deprived, by what I do not care to characterize. The vestry manages to obtain absolute nomination by sending with the name of one available clergyman a second name, of a clergyman canonically qualified, but not in the least likely to accept the vacant cure. Dean Carmichael may be chosen as a second name for a country parish, or a superannuated clergyman for a post requiring great activity. I have remonstrated and shown the vexatious delay which follows such unbecoming procedure, but I have not observed that it has in any way lessened the inconvenience; on the contrary, if it is suspected that I do not approve the only available nominee a wearisome struggle threatens, and in the long run the bishop and the diocese suffer. The vestry (by no means a stable body) after a short time changes its mind, and cries as persistently for the removal of its pastor as once it struggled for his appointment. All parties are made unhappy and the usefulness of a church impeded by a wilfulness as wrong headed in the end as it was in the beginning. I hope, therefore, that the canon may be amended so as to make it necessary that the names convey a bona fide choice to the bishop. The Committee of Conference fails of its purpose under the present canon.

The affairs of the Church Home have required considerable personal attention during the year. The bishop of the diocese is the only permanent member of the corporation, and it has been necessary that I should inform myself concerning the details of its management. The house itself stood in need of repair and enlargement, and an appeal for money could not be made for these purposes without a clear understanding of its objects and status. The history of the institution is soon told.

It divides itself into two equal parts. It was a parochial charity for about twenty years, attached to Christ Church Cathedral. In 1870, the vestry of Christ Church gave notice that it could no longer bear the cost of its maintenance; then Bishop Oxenden convened a meeting of the city clergy, and urged upon them the continuance of an institution which was associated with the memory of our first bishop and his excellent wife, Mrs. Fulford. With many others, I was at that meeting. We all entered heartily into the feeling of the occasion, only objecting that the home, as it then stood, was not of sufficient general interest to justify a general appeal for support. It was a very small enterprize, with objects relating only to the parish. It had no property and no money, not even for current expenses. For the sake of the association of the institution with Mrs. Fulford, and in deference to the wish of Bishop Oxenden, we pledged ourselves to its immediate support for one year, with the understanding that its affairs would be investigated, and that it might be formed into an institution useful to the diocese and of sufficient importance to claim general interest and maintenance. As its future began to take shape, it was announced from time to time at the annual meetings that an effort was being made to build it up into a home for gentlewomen needing such a place. This was a real need, and the clergy present never failed to express their satisfaction. At the same time it was always understood that any inmates surviving the change from a parochial to a diocesan institution would have a home there for the remainder of their lives.

The home was incorporated in 1875, and in 1877 its first property came in the form of a sum of money collected, as we were expressly told by Bishop Oxenden, for the building or purchase of a house to be used as a home for "ladies in reduced circumstances." This announcement is explicitly made in the annual report of 1877. The property, 116 University street, was purchased with that money in 1878. From that year to the present time women of education in needy circumstances, being old or feeble, have been received as inmates. I wish to correct any impression that may exist as to some change having been made quite lately in the kind of inmates admitted. No change has been effected, or even possible, for the Home has been full of gentlewomen for many years past, with the exception of a few survivors from the Cathedral parish, of whom one passed away recently at the mature age of 96. I had, however, reason to believe in 1887 that the Church Home was not prospering as it might. The first directress and other officers had resigned, and it was found impossible to fill their places, no one being willing to assume the responsibility. I therefore named a large and influential sub-committee, of which Dr. Norman was convener, to make full enquiry, report and advise. This report, which was very practical, was duly made and

The late Mrs. Blake consented to fill the vacant office of first directress, but unhappily this lady fell almost immediately into ill health, and was not able to restore, as I had hoped, the tone of the management by her genial presence and sensible administration. I therefore immediately turned my personal attention to the question whether or no the house in University street had been wrongly or rightly appropriated to the sole use of ladies in reduced circumstances. I wish to repeat that the use was not in question, the ladies had now been there from 1878, ten years. It was their right to the Home as a class which was in dispute. No pains were spared in the investigation. All that was desired was the truth. The result of this enquiry, instituted by myself, and carried out by certain officers of the committee, has since been embodied in the report of the committee of management, and printed in the last annual report, January, 1890.

No one questions the right of the Church Home to have an institution for the use of women of the working classes, but there is no evidence or record of money having been given for that purpose. The retention of the old women who gained a home in University street at the time of the change from parochial to diocesan ownership has led to some slight confusion; but nothing more. A great step in advance has been carefully and solidly taken during the present year. The energetic committee of management, assisted by many liberal friends, has acquired a handsome property in Guy street, which, we believe, will soon be the centre of woman's work in the diocese. The committee was afraid to buy all the land desirable, lest a heavier responsibility should be incurred than it present means would justify; but it may be hoped that the publicity lately given to its affairs will gain for the Church Home the good will and confidence of all; so that its usefulness and prosperity will continually increase, and the institution be generally recognized, practically and substantially, as a Church institution, for the right use and maintenance of which the bishop is always responsible.

The report of the mission fund is quite satisfactory, on the whole, thanks being especially due to the increased liberality of the congregation of St. George's Church. I am grateful to add there has been an increase in the contributions of some of the other churches. Yearly, as the financial year draws to a close, I cannot suppress the recurrence of a certain amount of anxiety, because of the fluctuating nature of this great source of our Church support. Each year when the returns have been made, I have had to upbraid myself with want of faith. Thank God the necessary supplies have always been provided. There is, however, one recommendation in the report of the executive committee which gives me real concern. In my absence, and without the last hint of any such

intention, \$500 was voted to defray my travelling expenses. It was kindly and affectionately done and I am grateful; but it has troubled me considerably. Such a grant is not desirable. Wherever I go, the hospitality of the clergy and the people is extended to me most gladly, and the cost of my travel, over and above the assistance thus rendered, is not great.

I have nothing but good to say of the Montreal Diocesan Theological college. It is the mainstay of the missionary work of the diocese. If it continues to grow and increase at the rate it has hitherto, it will, in a short time, become one of the most, if not the most, important institution of the Church in Montreal. I would earnestly plead for endowments for the teaching work of the college. The controversy concerning degrees has been happily brought to a satisfactory conclusion.

The Dunham Ladies' college has done good and useful work under the efficient management of Miss Baker. There is a flourishing day school in active operation. The resident pupils are but few, but the numbers will doubtless increase as the work of the school becomes known and established. I would ask the clergy and laity to take a more active interest in this Church and truly missionary institution.

An old and valued worker has passed to his rest since we last met. The Rev. John Allan, chaplain of the penitentiary at St. Vincent de Paul, was a good and quiet pastor, greatly interesting himself in the peculiar duties which he had undertaken, and much beloved and trusted by his unhappy flock. It gives me pleasure to say the Rev. Canon Fulton has been appointed his successor.

We have also to mourn the loss of one who was actively identified with the work of the Church in this diocese for nearly half a century. Mr. James Hutton was a leading member of the Synod from its institution, and for many years he filled the office of treasurer. How kind and helpful he was to the clergy you all know. Especially was this the case in the early days of diocesan self-support, when the low state of the mission fund made it sometimes necessary that the salaries of the mission clergy should be paid in advance. This he did rather than that any should go empty and disappointed away. In character he was simple and devout, a sympathetic and firm friend, an honorable and upright man. His judgment was excellent, and his advice, often backed with substantial help, was at the service of all who claimed it. Those of his contemporaries, who, like myself, enjoyed his intimate friendship, will never cease to regret the loss of his cheerful, affectionate companionship.

And now I will dismiss you to the work for which you are gathered to-day, praying Almighty God of His great mercy to bless your deliberations and make them useful to our Church and diocese.

Rev. R. Lindsay, Rural Dean, read reports of the Church Home, Immigration Chaplain, City Missionary, Girls Friendly Society, and gave notice of motion for their adoption.

The Bishop announced that the report of the Executive Committee, including the Treasurer's report will be taken up first after routine to-morrow morning.

Rev. W. P. Chambers presented the report of the Committee on Church Provision in Lumber Districts, and gave notice that he would move its adoption.

Rev. W. P. Chambers read a report of the Committee on Immigration and gave notice of motion for its adoption.

Dr. Davidson read a report of the Church of England Temperance Society, and gave notice of motion for its adoption.

A motion by Rev. J. H. DIXON, seconded by Archdeacon LINDSAY:

That in view of the growth of the Church in this Diocese, Section 1 of By-law on Executive Committee, be amended by changing the word fifteen into twenty before the words "Clerical members," and "Lay members," was, after discussion, withdrawn by permission of the House.

Rev. Canon Henderson moved the adoption of the Report on Education, asking that the clause referring to the Berthier School be omitted.

The House adjourned at one o'clock.

AFTERNOON, SECOND DAY.

The Synod re-assembled at half-past two o'clock. The DEAN occupied the chair.

On motion by Archdeacon Lindsay, seconded by Col. Hanson, the rules of order were suspended, to receive the report of the Committee on the address to the Bishop. The following address was then read by the Chairman and adopted on motion by Canon Anderson, seconded by the Chancellor, and at the suggestion of Dr. Davidson it was resolved that the Dean present the address. A deputation consisting of Archdeacon Lindsay, Rev. Canon Anderson, Messrs. Charles Garth and Col. Hanson, was named by the Chairman to request the presence of the Bishop, and on their return to the Synod with his Lordship, the following address was presented by the Dean:—

ADDRESS.

To the Right Rev. William Bennet Bond, LL.D., Lord Bishop of Montreal.

We, the clergy and laity of the diocese of Montreal in Synod assembled, approach your Lordship with warm congratulations on this the fiftieth year of your Christian ministry, assuring you of our sincere esteem, regard and affection, and of our united good wishes for your Lordship's happiness, both now and onward in your episcopal career.

In your Lordship we recognize, not only one who has been called by the voice of the diocese to the highest apostolic office within the Church, but one who step by step has passed through the varied honorable positions to which a clergyman of the Church of England may attain. As a faithful missionary in a widespread field of country work, as a preeminently successful rector of a large city parish, as one who attained every dignity connected with the diocesan life, your Lordship has made in each office the record of "a workman that needeth not to be ashamed" faithful, devoted and untiring. Few lives have been favoured with such widespread opportunities, and few under God have been more blest in the holier ministrations of the sacred calling. In the long past of devoted parish work your voice has whispered the message of God's ambassador in silent rooms where to speak ought else would be sacrilege, has poured it forth in all its depth and beauty, where hearts have been dried and withered by the woes and sorrows of life, has told it as a child to children, has driven it home with the energy of youth into the hearts of youthful men; and has spoken it with the dignity of age in the stricken presence of the mature and chastened. But there has been more than a voice sounding through your lips for half a century of varied work. If honest practice of honest preaching, if a spirit of disinterestedness, and

freedom from self seeking, if a helping hand held out to other men, if kindness to the lowly, gentleness to the afflicted, and boldness for the truth, if one or all of these are aspects of the higher life, that higher life has lived out its years in your person in the presence of the fathers and children of the Church for half a century.

As Bishop of the diocese your Lordship has proved yourself not only a missionary bishop, unsparing of self and devoted in labors, but you have been ever willing to lead the church in larger centres of life, unto those good works which naturally spring into existence within a city such as ours.

To clergy and laity in country, and to clergy and laity in city, you have proved yourself a real leader of men, and that with a spirit of father-like gentleness which, whilst winning for you the affection of many, has lost you the esteem and respect of none; none the less a friend for being a bishop, none the less a bishop for being a friend.

We ask your Lordship, therefore, to accept through these weak words the sincere congratulations of the Church throughout the diocese, now in Synod assembled, as in some faint measure a "harvest home" of the good seed sown by you through the long years of your faithful and devoted labors.

Words can but faintly express our appreciation of your work and the sincerity of our desire that God may long spare you to guide and develop the work of the Church within this diocese.

The BISHOP replied as follows:-

HIS LORDSHIP'S REPLY.

In reply, His Lordship said: - My dear Friends and Brethren of the Clergy and Laity,—No one could receive unmoved such an address as you have just presented to me. But I find it almost impossible to make That my fellow men amongst whom my life has been spent should review my work so favorably makes me inexpressibly happy, for I believe that your hearts suggested the words. not ask myself how far I deserve all that you have said. Half a century is a long time, and an old man, especially an old clergyman, if he have any power of self analysis, cannot flatter himself at the close of such a period of active duty that he has reached his own ideal. Yet I may honestly allow that I have always desired to succeed in all my work in. the Church, for the love I bear to the Great Head of the Church, and so far as I have known and understood I have tried to forget myself in my duty to God. If by the grace of God my life has not been a failure, I am not unmindful also that much of my success is due to the good people, clerical and lay, with whom my lot in life has been cast. I could not find

words to express the love that abides in my heart for the Church and the people of Montreal. If, like the aged Patriarch, I have a weakness for one above the rest of my spiritual daughters; if the love of St. George's church makes itself apparent, even in the midst of my effort to be as a chief pastor should be, impartial in affection, I know you will forgive that weakness, and set it to the account of natural human infirmity. At no period of my ministry have I been far removed from the city of Montreal. I was one of a band of men to whom was given up the building of the Church in this province and diocese, and I see now with mental vision that army of men struggling through good report and evil report, through fever and poverty, through heat by summer and frost by winter, to plant the banner of the cross on all the heights of ignorance and sin from Labrador to Red River. It is no small honor to have belonged to such a goodly company. It is no small honor to have served under Bishop Mountain and Bishop Fulford and Bishop Oxenden, though my place may not have been in the forefront of the battle. Forgive the brief retrospect. Any word of praise to me, in circumstances like the present, must necessarily recall the dead to life, and awaken recollections in which the names of dear and brave companions in arms, fallen many of them on the field, crowd the memory, and make it treachery to withhold mention of their deeds. This generation has seen few of the dread scenes which were part of our early experience—ship fever, cholera, fires, famines, long journeys by water, and still longer and harder journeys by land. These seem to be past and gone, so far as this diocese is concerned. God grant it may remain so.

I accept your loving address very gratefully, and pray earnestly that you may enjoy a long and fruitful christian prosperity. I pray that you may have God's blessing resting on your homes, and on your business, whether that business be in the Church or in the world. And I wish further for those who in the Providence of God shall reach the limit of human life, as I have done, that in their old age they may have the same consolation and encouragement which you have so tenderly and gracefully given me."

On motion by Dr. Davidson, seconded by Rev. Dr. Norton, the address was ordered to be engrossed and signed by the Dean, as chairman, and the secretaries on behalf of the Synod, and forwarded to his Lordship.

Besides these, members of the Association have conducted about 280 services during the year at the following places, not under the care of the Committee:

Church of the Redeemer, Cote St. Paul.

St. Henri Mission.

Grace Church Mission.

Iberville Mission.

Laprairie.

Members of this committee also assist regularly at the services at All Saints in the morning, and at St. Matthias. We have no record of services rendered by laymen in the country; this we shall seek to remedy in future reports.

The Mission at Maisonneuve was opened in July last by the Rector, and has been regularly carried on since, with an increasing congregation of between forty and fifty members, a larger room having recently been obtained.

At Mount Royal Vale, service is held every alternate Sunday, the intervening Sundays being occupied by Presbyterians; services being held in the School house, a portion of which is set off and suitably arranged for the purpose.

At the Home for Friendless Women, a service is held every Sunday morning at 9.30.

The Committee has reason to believe that the relief occasionally afforded the clergy, especially in the country, has been of real service, as an instance may be mentioned the setting free of two clergy to visit the lumber districts for a fortnight during the past winter, their own services being taken by Lay readers.

So far as is known, every call by clergy upon this Committee for assistance has been met, but it will be obliging if a little more notice could sometimes be afforded; it has not been without some difficulty in the past that the requisitions have been filled.

Further particulars will appear in the Annual Report as well as reports of the other work undertaken by the Association.

Your petitioners believe that crimes and offences against the chastity of women are numerous, and are on the increase throughout the land; and that a large number of women are annually ruined and go down to premature graves for want of legal protection.

Your petitioners respectfully thank Parliament for what was done last session towards amending the law in this matter; and your petitioners humbly and earnestly pray that Parliament will assimilate our laws respecting morals to those of the Mother Country and the neighboring States, and more particularly that traffickers in girlhood and inciters of minors to vice be punished as felons, and that the age of consent for girls be raised to at least 16 years.

And your petitioners will ever pray, etc., etc.—Carried.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The Executive Committee beg to make the following report of their proceedings during the year ending 30th April, 1890, to the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal, at its Thirty-first Annual Meeting in June, 1890.

MEETINGS.

The appointed quarterly meetings were held. There was also a special meeting held on 10th September, at which were named the various subcommittees, and an adjourned meeting on 5th June, 1890.

OBITUARY.

The Committee deeply regret having to record the death in August, 1889, of Mr. James Hutton, who for so many years filled the position of Honorary Treasurer of the Diocese. The following resolution adopted by the Committee indicates the esteem and affection in which he was held:—"The Executive Committee of the Diocese of Montreal desire to place on record their sense of the great loss which the Church has sustained by the death of the late James Hutton Esq., Treasurer of the Synod, who, during a long residence in this city, gave to the Church so large a proportion of his time and great ability in the care and management of its finances, and whose wise counsels, high personal character, and many Christian graces gave him a place in the esteem and love of the members of the Church, which is rarely enjoyed by any." This resolution was transmitted to Mrs. Hutton, along with the expression of the sincere sympathy of the members of the Committee with her in her deep affliction.

Bristol.—In view of the increased work due to the extension of mining and other works in Bristol, the grant to Bristol was supplemented by a special grant of \$50 for one year only.

City limits.—The sum of \$300 was placed at the disposal of the Bishop to assist in Mission work, as in his judgment it could be usefully expended, within the city limits.

North Shefford and South Roxton.-The grant of \$300 was renewed.

Warden.-A grant of \$100 was made to Warden.

Bolton.—The grant of \$360 was renewed to Bolton.

Hemmingford and Hallerton.—The grant of \$315 to this mission was increased to \$360.

I beg to lay before you the accounts of the Diocese for the year ending 30th April, 1890, and to give a brief synopsis of them.

No. 1. Clergy Trust Fund.—There was a balance of capital on hand at the beginning of the year, amounting to \$1,800. This sum has been invested. The Capital amounts to \$56,500.00.

The sum of \$3,129.10 was received in interest, of which \$2,092.68 were paid to clergymen who rank on the fund; \$380 were charged as proportion of the year's expenses; and the balance (\$656.42) was transferred to the Mission Fund.

On this resolution, which was passed in the absence of the Bishop, being communicated to his Lordship, he gratefully but positively declined to accept the proposed grant.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROVISION FOR THE LUMBER DISTRICTS.

Your Committee desire to report as follows:-

Missionary work amongst the lumbermen has been carried on during the past year by the Rev. H. Plaisted, and by the Rev. Rural Dean Sanders, and the Rev. Wm. Harris.

The Rev. H. Plaisted reports having visited a new portion of the lumber region, on the Thomasine and Desert Lakes, where he found large gangs of men who had received no ministrations except from priests of the Roman Church, and one of these gangs was altogether, he says, non-Roman. He visited seven shanties, finding one-third of all the men Protestants. He held a service at every shanty, and spoke individually to many of the men. Besides the shanties, he also visited a number of houses on the route, where he had never visited before.

He speaks in the highest terms of the benefits of the letters of the Christians' Letter Mission Society of Montreal, of which Mrs. Capel is secretary, and also of the work of a Band of I. H. N. workers, of which Mrs. Hutton is secretary.

The Rev. Rural Dean Sanders spent twelve days in company with the Rev. W. Harris, in visiting the workmen at the head waters of the Nation and Savage Rivers, and also upon the Rouge River. They took with them 150 pounds of magazines and illustrated papers, kindly furnished by the Ladies' Auxiliary, Canon Empson, and others. They visited nine shanties, holding services when possible. The literature was very acceptable to the men, and they appeared to appreciate the effort put forth to benefit them.

It is to be regretted that more cannot be done for the lumbermen. Rural Dean Sanders speaks of extensive shantying being done on the Lievre River, but so far up that three weeks would be required for a visit to that section.

On the Coulonge and Black Rivers also there are a great many men employed. It was impossible to visit them last winter, all the clergy within reach of them being more than fully occupied with the work of their own missions. Your Committee would take this opportunity of requesting the members of the Church to save papers and magazines, which might otherwise be thrown away, for our toilers in the forest; especially bright illustrated papers, and papers easily read and under-

REPORT OF THE FOREIGN MISSION COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESE OF MONTREAL.

At the time of the Lambeth Conference a meeting of the Bishops was held with the S. P. G. The subject of Foreign Missions in connection with the Canadian Church was fully considered.

The S. P. G. recommended that it was not advisable for the Canadian Church to take an independent position in the Foreign field till it could be morally certain of \$15,000 per annum.

In the meanwhile the S. P. G. (in which the C. M. S. and the C. & C. C. S. joined) would be willing to put on their list for any of their mission stations, and pay from their funds any persons sent out by the Canadian Church, to the extent of the money paid by the Canadian Church to them.

The amount collected for Foreign Missions by the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada for all Foreign Mission purposes during the last three years was \$35,740. Of this, \$10,105 went directly to the S. P. G., \$3,425 to the C. M. S., \$1,220 to the Diocese of Madras, \$9,193 to the Societies for the Jews, \$2,420 to Zenana work, the rest scattering.

Wycliffe College supports one clergyman in the foreign mission field, and one has gone, Rev. Mr. Baldwin, at his own cost.

At the last meeting of the Domestic and Foreign Mission Board of the Provincial Synod, one name was sent in which was referred to a Committee to consider and report at the next meeting of the Board.

The Foreign Committee of the Montreal Synod would recommend that the moneys unappropriated be applied as they were before, until needed for support of missionaries from the Canadian Church.

The Bishop of Madras applied our last grant to his Diocese to support a work of the S. P. G. which needed help.

All which is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FRENCH WORK.

The Committee on French Work regret that the record for the year is comparatively small, but nevertheless there is an amount of quiet (almost unknown to many members of the Church) sowing of the seed which with God's blessings must produce fruit. The work, more especially in connection with what is known as the Sabrevois Mission, comes prominently under consideration.

1. L'Eglise du Rédempteur, under the Rev. D. Larivière, is growing in usefulness and taking an important place among the many noble missionary enterprises of the city of Montreal. The pastor of this Church should give the whole of his time to its pastoral work, and no claim which the growing wants of the city are now pressing upon the Executive Committee should be more earnestly considered than that our French Protestant brethren should be faithfully provided with the ministry of our Church. A grant towards the support of the clergyman of this church giving himself exclusively to its ministry, would be among the most useful of our missionary grants. The average congregation of this church is 75; the communicants, 32; the schools, 70; the number confirmed, 16.

2. Sabrevois is the noble gift of the late Major Christie, and though intended for ministration to French Protestants, has been under God blessed to the English population. Your Coumittee feel ashamed of the scanty pittance which the clergyman of this historic church receives, and regret that any hindrances exist which prevent the Executive Committee nurturing this church to the fullest extent, if only in pious memory of the wishes of the generous donor of the church and land. French services are held in this church, and with it are associated the early aspirations of our duty towards our French brethren, and it should have the loving care of the Synod, for from it has grown our great and increasing work to-day.

3. St. Francis is partly sustained by a grant from Government, and has a defined work among the Indians of that place.

4. The schools in Montreal, the great hope of our work, have made most successful progress during the past year with a staff of four teachers. There has been an attendance of 82 boys and girls, of whom 56 have been boarders, and some of these students are now preparing for the ministry. It is only right to add that the whole of the foregoing work is sustained by what is known by the name of the Sabrevois Mission which ought, in some way, to have a more intimate relationship with the Synod, and be enabled to plead for the sustenance of its work that

In doing this, they only followed the early traditions of the Canadian Church-The first clergymen sent to this country were chosen with regard to this special qualification, and it is to be regretted that this qualification is not more insisted upon to-day. Untold are the opportunities which are lost for want of this gift, and your committee would fain hope that all Theological colleges within the Ecclesiastical Province will endeavour to carry out this recommendation of the Provincial Synod.

6. There are engaged in French work 4 clergymen, 1 catechist and 1 colporteur. Your committee cannot conclude their annual report without confessing that the Church in the Diocese of Montreal is peculiarly called to this work. In no part of the world is the Anglican Church so brought face to face with the doctrines against which our forefathers so solemnly protested even unto death, and at the same time we have sorrowfully to add we are not doing all we might do, and perhaps the reason of our apparent want of zeal is that we have not given this work the synodical recognition which is its righteous due, and which this committee on French work we hope is destined to promote by its annually telling how much there is to do in this particular portion of the vineyard of the Lord.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON IMMIGRATION AND COLONIZATION.

There is little to report with reference to these objects during the past year. Continued prosperity in the motherland has checked the stream of emigration therefrom to an appreciable extent. But the action of the Dominion Government in setting aside a large sum of money at its last session for the direct promotion of immigration of a desirable kind is likely to have the effect of causing an increased number of English families to land upon our shores, and your committee would be glad to feel assured that the Church in Canada, and especially of this diocese, stood ready to assist, as in duty bound, those who come to us as strangers. to a strange land, but who might reasonably expect to be met as brothers in language and in creed. The committee of one appointed at the last session of this Synod to make enquiries about the much needed wharf accommodation for immigrants, has had interviews with the authorities upon the subject, and may be expected to report to this Synod. The chaplains, one of whom is under the direction of the Colonial and Continental Church School Society, the other working in connection with the city mission, are, we believe, of great service to those landing here, on their way to the other Provinces or the North-West. And the efforts of Rev. Mr. Acton on behalf of those wishing to remain within the limits of this diocese are worthy of all commendation.

Your committee would be glad to be able to see its way towards promoting Church immigration, or to assist in Church colonization. But as no financial means are available, very little can be done in those directions.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON WORKS OF MERCY.

Including report of the City Missionary, Immigration Chaplain, Montreal Branch of Girls Friendly Society, Church Home, Women's Auxiliary.

CITY MISSIONARY'S REPORT.

Rev. H. J. Evans, City Missionary, reports nearly 1500 visits to patients in the Montreal General Hospital, more than one-third with religious instruction, etc. Occasional visits have been made to other charitable institutions, including McGill Maternity Hospital, where he holds a service for the inmates on the fourth Sunday in each month. Stress of

other work has made it impossible for him to give his attention to many charities outside the General Hospital, which come under the head of City Missions.

Mr. Evans gratefully acknowledges the assistance given in the Hospital by Miss Coo, who has for a number of years had charge of the music at the Sunday service, and by Mr. Coo, her father, and other members of St. George's Y.M.A., who visit the Hospital every Sunday and distribute library books and gather in the patients to the afternoon service. The average attendance ranges from 15 to 30, and the services are heartily and fully appreciated by the patients.

Outremont which represents another portion of the city (properly suburban) mission work is a place where the congregations have been fluctuating, and the progress consequently up-hill. It is felt that the erection of a small church, to take the place of the public hall at present in use, where a variety of secular meetings and entertainments are. held, would greatly contribute to the success and permanency of the mission. All Saint's Church, built in Upper St. Denis Street, in the neighbourhood of Cote St. Louis, was first used for Divine service on the last Sunday in July, and formally opened by His Lordship on the 6th of October, 1889. The building is still in an incomplete state, but an effort will be made early in the summer to encase it with brick. The congregations in All Saint's have kept up wonderfully well-there often being as many as 150 persons present at the morning service, a larger number than this attended on Easter Sunday morning when there were as many as 64 communicants., Great praise is due to the members of the Lay Helper's Association who have kindly conducted the services in All Saint's Church on Sunday evening.

The Sunday School, under the able superintendence of Mr. Marleborough Berry, one of the lay helpers, averages over 100 pupils.

The proposal to separate All Saints from the city mission proper, is a move in the right direction, as a clergyman's whole time and undivided interest should, as soon as possible, be given to the Mile End District.

IMMIGRATION CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

In presenting my annual report on immigration it may be well to explain that as the date of the meeting of Synod precludes the possibility of a finished report for the current season, I have in the present instance, as formerly, covered the ground from January to December last.

The opportunities of doing good which this work for the spiritual and moral welfare of the immigrants affords, are practically unlimited, and the spirit of thankfulness with which my attentions are almost invariably received, have afforded no small share of gratification and encouragement.

I have systematically reported to the clergy, both in city and country, the addresses, as far as possible, of all immigrants newly settled within their several parishes, and it is gratifying to state that the great majority of the immigrants have been promptly visited. Some of the new comers are already reported to be doing good work in the several churches with which they are connected.

Nearly all of these I have met, conversed with, and rendered more or less assistance to in a variety of ways. Taking all together I do not think a better class of immigrants ever landed at this port, and speaking of the arrivals generally, Mr. Stafford, the Dominion Immigration Agent at Quebec, in his annual report says: "The immigrants of 1889, particularly the families from the British Isles, destined for Ontario, the Northwest and British Columbia were of a very superior class of farmers; the others, who, though not practical farmers, had grown-up, healthy families, and had apparently means to purchase improved farms, or to settle on free grants. The aggregate capital brought into the country by these people must have been very considerable. The Customs value of their effects alone amounted to \$142,960.

As will be seen by the foregoing statistics the great majority of the people who arrived here were English, but amongst them were a considerable number of Scandinavians whose intention was to settle in our new lands in the Northwest. As these people are almost universally Protestant, and readily adopt the liturgy of the Church of England, as being in many respects similar to their own, it is to be hoped that means

may soon be taken for ministering to their spiritual necessities, particularly as the Scandinavian colonies are rapidly growing by the addition of large arrivals each year. They are proverbially industrious, docile people, and will evidently make most desirable settlers.

During the past season of St. Lawrence navigation, the three leading steamship companies have granted their passengers the privilege of landing at this port direct instead of at Quebec as formerly, and large numbers have availed themselves of the opportunity to do so. From the 42 steamships which came with passengers to this port last season there were landed 829 cabin, 673 intermediate, 3,978 steerage, a total of 5,480. The delay of three or four hours usually occupied in their disembarkation affords me an excellent opportunity of dealing with those who may continue their journey to points westward by train.

No action has yet been taken by the Government to establish a temporary lodging house here for newly arrived families and others. At present all Montreal immigrants must pass the first day or two either in a comparatively expensive hotel, or partake of the charity of some of our local institutions. If some public building could be made available for merely sleeping accommodation, with the use also of a large cooking range for the preparation of self-provided victuals, this want would in a great measure be met, while the cost to the Government would be merely nominal. St. George's Society, with its characteristic liberality, provided temporary accommodation last year for no less than 1,084 persons, chiefly immigrants, at a cost of \$672.35.

The demand for female domestics is still greatly in excess of the supply. Last year only 236 were received at the Mansfield Street Woman's Protective Home. But I think in the near future a larger and better supply will be forthcoming. The Hon. Mrs. Joyce, who is at the head of the United British Women's Emigration Society, Miss Denison, of the Church Emigration Society, and other lady associates, are now devoting much of their time and money in assisting to emigrate to this country a considerable number of strictly respectable and useful females. But some co-operation on this side is naturally expected. Mrs. Joyce in a recent letter to me has briefly stated the present situation of affairs as follows: "At the present moment young women who produce the necessary certificate can go 11,000 miles to Queensland for £1, in consequence five go to Queensland for one to Canada, which I much regret, as I believe myself your colony is the best, morally and physically. The supply you get, however, is very largely dependent upon English good nature, nearly all the young women sent to Canada being helped by ladies, but we cannot always be giving or lending. I hope some plan for collecting loans may be organized, or the supply will run short." I may state that our Dominion Government has recently appropriated an

MONTREAL DIOCESAN BRANCH, GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY.

In reviewing the work of the G. F. S. in this diocese during the past year the prospects for its future success seem hopeful. In the opening of two new branches, those of St. John's and St. Jude's, there is encouragement, and we trust that before another year's report is written we may have to record the enrolment of every Episcopal Church in the city amongst our members. We regret that in the country parishes no progress has been made, and our ranks are recruited more by girls coming from England, Scotland and Ireland than by those coming to the city from the country districts. During the past year forty-six girls have been commended to us from the Parent Society. Of this number only a few remained in the city; some went to the States, others to various parts of Canada. In every case where possible their letters of commendation have been forwarded, and a kindly interest bespoken for them. Many of these girls have been a cause of anxiety to their associates, whilst, on the other hand, there are many whose lives have been such that they have set an example for good to those around them. The great danger is in sending out girls too young-girls probably trained in homes or orphanages, where strict rules of discipline have prevailed; and these girls, suddenly emancipated from all control and restraint, find this to be indeed a free country, where they can do as they like. Many of these girls have, alas! hereditary instincts towards evil, which have been kept in abeyance during their more sheltered life in the home; but these often break out, and the girls become an easy prey to those who are ever on the watch to destroy souls. The Diocesan Council desire to impress on their English co-workers the danger of sending out girls of 14 to 17, unless they are unexceptionably steady and well principled.

The annual service was held this year in St. George's Church, by kind permission of the Dean, when the sermon was preached by the Bishop. The annual festival was held in St. George's school house on the 14th January. There were between 70 and 80 members present, and the

attendance would have been larger if it had not been for the prevailing epidemic of influenza. There were present on this occasion the Bishop, the Dean, the Rev. R. Lindsay, R.D., Rev. L. N. Tucker, Rev. G. A. Smith, and a number of ladies interested in the work of the society. The annual meeting was held in the Synod Hall, April 24th. the Bishop in the chair. There was a good attendance of the friends of the society. Speeches were made by the Bishop, the Dean, Rev. R. Lindsay, R.D., Rev. J. H. Dixon, and Archdeacon Fortin, of Winnipeg.

In conclusion we cannot but feel that a high compliment has been paid to Canada in one of the G. F. S. English magazines, where, in an announcement of the sailing of the first protected party of the season, it is stated that "the high tone of religion, temperance and morals in Canada should recommend that colony to the members."

The Committee of Works of Mercy feel it is most important that in all missions of this diocese, branches of this society should be formed to give the advantages which its numerous branches render to girls seeking employment and having to go from home.

CHURCH HOME.

The managers of the Church Home in this city desire to present a brief report of their work of the year to the Diocesan Synod now in session.

They first of all would speak of the purchase of a larger and more suitable building, with a frontage of 100 feet, into which they remove shortly, or as soon as the necessary alterations are completed. This will give greater scope for their work. If the committee has any regret it is that their means did not justify them in acquiring the whole property, or at all events another 100 feet, the advantage of ground being very great.

The committee would urge the Synod to supply their need in the matter of a deaconess. In the working of their institution they feel the necessity of one who will be in spiritual sympathy with the residents, and who will at the same time minister to their bodily needs as a daughter or sister would in every case of infirmity. They think that a nurse appointed by themselves could not so efficiently occupy this position. as a lady coming to them approved and appointed by the Diocesan. The managers heartily desire to co-operate, by providing a permanent home, paying a salary, and recognizing the authority of the Bishop in all matters which concern the deaconess as a Diocesan officer.

The committee desire to express their gratitude to the clergy and laity for kindness and attention shown to the inmates of the Home.

REPORT OF CHURCH OF ENGLAND TEMPERANCE SOCIETY.

The Council of the Diocesan branch of the C. E. T. S. begs to report as follows:—

That it met in May to receive the report of work done during the year in the diocese, and by the Secretary. There has not been much general activity in the parishes so far as reported, that is to say, on C.E.T.S. lines. apart from W. C. T. U., Good Templars, etc., but there have been some notable exceptions. For instance, in the Rural Deanery of Clarendon several of the missions and parishes had hearty and well arranged meetings, at which addresses were given by the clergy from the various parishes, and the result was the quickening of the zeal in some, and the starting of branches in others. In the Townships there have been a few branches organized, particularly in the junior or Band of Hope department. But the Council thinks that there is great room for further activity. With a view to promoting this they recommend: (1) That if possible an agent, clerical or lay, be appointed to visit the Rural Deaneries, and where invited to assist the incumbent in holding meetings and organizing. (2) That Mr. Robert Church's offer be accepted, viz., that he shall be furnished with pledge cards, badges, and temperance literature, that he may do some of this work wherever an opening is given him. (3) That an accurate register be kept of the numbers belonging to the various Bands of Hope, and forwarded annually to the Diocesan C. E. T. S. Secretary, who shall summarize same; and that other steps be taken for uniting the Bands of Hope in one common bond. (4) That the clergy be invited to avail themselves of the stock of literature, badges, cards, etc., that has been procured from the headquarters of the Society in England. and which will shortly be largely increased. (5) That special effort be made at the annual public meeting, to be held during Synod, to arouse or quicken the interest of the clerical and lay delegates and the public. The Secretary reported a better response this year than last to the appeal for funds wherewith to equip the newly formed Diocesan Society, and also that more of the clergy in the country parishes were writing for information about the Society and its work. The Secretary was authorized to issue a circular, with questions framed, so as to elicit information as to the number of Church temperance societies, the number of temperance societies not connected with the Church, and the membership roll. The figures will be given at the public meeting. A communication was presented from the Electoral League asking your Council to endorse certain suggestions looking to a better enforcing of the present laws, and to a reduction in the number of licensed houses. After carefully reading these suggestions, your Council desire to recommend them to your favorable notice. In doing this they are only carrying out a part of the

The better establishment of a depository-for the supplying of all Sunday School requisites at the lowest possible prices; and they would earnestly hope that the Executive Committee may see their way to lend or advance to the Book and Tract Committee a sufficient sum to make a beginning in this direction, thus supplying a greatly felt and growing need.

2nd. That all Sunday Schools who have not sufficient means at their disposal to purchase necessary requisites, may apply to this Committee for the same, the means to be furnished by some of the larger and city Sunday Schools.

3rd. That His Lordship be asked to appoint the 2nd Sunday in October as Sunday School Sunday. That special children's services be held, and the claims of the support of the schools be urged on the congregations. That the children's collections on this and throughout the entire year. when possible, be devoted to missionary purposes.

4th. This Committee would further recommend that a series of questions, one for intermediate and another for advanced scholars, be prepared and circulated throughout the diocese, bearing on the portion of Scripture studied during the year, and prizes to those obtaining a certain number of marks, in order to stimulate and increase Bible study.

The Diocesan Sunday School Association continue to hold their monthly meetings the third Monday of each month, and are growing in influence and usefulness, and it is earnestly hoped some way may be opened for the extension of its usefulness into the country parts.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON QUEBEC SCHEME.

The Committee on the Quebec Scheme beg to report that the further consideration they have been able to give this subject has more firmly convinced them that the adoption of this scheme, or a modification of it. would be for the best interests of the Church in this diocese.

The Committee had hoped to report to the present Synod on a modification of the scheme in force in a western diocese, but the information sought has been unaccountably idelayed, and they are unable to do so. They would therefore respectfully suggest that the Committee be re-appointed, in order that a full report may be made to the next Synod. together with such suggestions for a modification of the Quebec Scheme as will, in the judgment of the Committee, meet the objections urged against it in this House.

RURAL DEANERY OF BEDFORD.

My LORD,

The 28th annual meeting of the Rural Deanery of Bedford was held at Farnham, on the 25th of May. It was attended by seven clerical and five lay members of the deanery. The Ven. Archdeacon of Bedford and the Rural Dean of Iberville were also present, and were invited to take part in the deliberations of the Chapter.

REPORTS.

The reports from the various parishes and missions were, on the whole, highly satisfactory. The collections prescribed by the Synod have been in most cases taken up, with results fully equal to those of previous years. All the Church property in the deanery is insured, with the notable exception of the Bishop Stewart Memorial Church at Frelighsburg. Only one parish reports any debt, and that to a small amount. The parishes of Abbotsford, Clarenceville, and Rougemont have been vacant during the greater part of the year, but the services of the Church have been kept up, with but little intermission, by the ministrations of students of the Diocesan Theological College.

CLERICAL STIPENDS.

The stipends of most of the clergy in this deanery are considerably below the requirements of the Synod, and are by no means commensurate with the ability of the people. I feel it my duty to call your Lordship's special attention to the fact that the rector of St. Armands East, one of the oldest and by no means the least wealthy of our parishes, reports the whole amount of stipend received last year as only a trifle over \$500.

ST. HYACINTHE AND UPTON.

The condition of the Mission of St. Hyacinthe and Upton has been, and is still, a subject of much anxious consideration. That half-a-dozen families should be in receipt of one of the largest grants made from the Mission Fund is felt by many to be a grievance, but it should be remembered that these few people contribute to the maintenance of the Church in their midst with a liberality which, if it were generally imitated, would at once make many of our missions self-supporting.

CLERICAL CHANGES.

There have been several changes in our clerical staff during the year. The Rev. George Forsey has resigned the rectory of Nelsonville, and has been succeeded by the Rev. R. D. Mills, M.A., from the Diocese of

year. d has Ontario. The Rev. W. N. Duthie has been appointed to the rectory of Clarenceville, and the Rev. H. E. Horsey, M.A., deacon, has been placed in charge of the rectory of Abbotsford. The Rev. L. V. Lariviere, M.A., has recently resigned the Mission of St. Hyacinthe and Upton, to engage in French missionary work in the city of Quebec. This mission and the parish of Rougemont are now vacant.

PERSONAL,

The Rev. Canon Mussen has, in a great measure, recovered from a long and serious illness, and we all unite in the hope that his health may soon be fully re-established, and that his useful life may long be spared to this deanery and to the diocese.

Another venerable and highly respected clergyman, the Rev. I. Constantine, is slowly recovering from a dangerous sickness contracted while in the discharge of his ministerial duties. The deanery meeting unanimously adopted the following resolution, which, we are glad to know, consoled and gladdened the heart of our brother on his sick-bed:—

"The Deanery of Bedford, now in chapter assembled, desire hereby to express the sorrow with which they have learned of the serious illness of the Rev. I. Constantine, one of the oldest priests of the diocese, and a member of this chapter from its inception. They regret that they are deprived to-day of his presence, and of his wise counsel, and they wish to assure him of their deep respect and brotherly affection, and of their hope that, in the mercy of Almighty God, he may speedily be restored to his former health and ministerial usefulness."

CONCLUSION.

This deanery, in common with the whole of the eastern townships, suffers from a chronic leakage of membership, owing to the tendency of our younger and more adventurous spirits to seek for more promising fields of labor in the newer parts of the Dominion and elsewhere. We have also to contend with the omnipresent, overshadowing influence of the Church of Rome, and the vigorous, aggressive policy of many Pretestant sects. That, notwithstanding these adverse influences, we are still able to hold our own, and even to report some progress, is cause for devout thankfulness to Him who is thus fulfilling His gracious promise to be "with His Church always, even unto the end of the world."

RURAL DEANERY OF BROME.

MY LORD,

It is my first and pleasing duty, in my own name and that of the deanery, to congratulate your Lordship on the pleasing fact of your entrance upon the 50th year of the sacred ministry of Christ's Holy Church—fifty years of time, during which your Lordship has seen the Church in Canada pass from its infancy to its present state of efficiency, and on this fiftieth year of your ministry finding yourself, as we are pleased to see, ruling the diocese with a vigor of body and clearness of spirit as have but few equals; and it is the prayer of both the clerical and lay members of this deanery, that you may have many years of usefulness added to that ministry.

Passing from this to matters connected with the work in this deanery, it is my pleasure to report as follows:—

The annual meeting of the deanery was, by the kind permission of the rector, held in the parish of Knowlton on the 27th May last, with an adjourned meeting also in the same place on the 10th of June. Both meetings were very well attended, there being about thirteen of the laity (church wardens and lay delegates) present and four of the clergy.

The question of parochial boundaries received full consideration, and was brought to such a conclusion as renders the position of the several parishes in the deanery more clearly ascertainable and definite. As a result from the discussion of this matter, a resolution was passed respectfully requesting your Lordship to give effect to their recommendation that the division line between the missions of South Stukely and Bolton be so drawn as to include in Stukely the first seven lots in the township of East Bolton only, and that of Bolton be made to include lots in Potton from 28 to 21 inclusive.

MISSIONARY MEETINGS.

The annual meetings in behalf of the Mission Fund were held, as has been the rule lately, in the autumn. The interest in these meetings and the information imparted was largely enhanced by the assistance of the lantern illustrations on Church History, given by Rev. W. P. Chambers, who, at great personal fatigue and sometimes inconvenience, was always present. The contributions to the Mission Fund, judging from the statistics, show an appreciable increase in consequence; at least it is reasonable to suppose so.

CHURCH PROPERTY.

No additions to the actual "real" estate " of the Church is reported; but from the memoranda furnished, improvement and care of what does exist is a marked feature.

In the parish of Knowlton, in the district or section known as Bondville, very desirable improvements have been made. The church exterior has been painted, and the expense met from local funds. The interior has been essentially improved by the enlargement of the sanctuary, and the placing therein of a fine carved oaken holy table and reredos, and a good painted window. Both of these are gifts "in memoriam," from friends in Montreal and elsewhere. A gift also is thankfully acknowledged of a large donation of hymn books (A. & M., new ed.) from a friend in the city.

In Sutton the congregation still continue to improve the property. Since last year they have erected a fine barn and wood house, which have

cost, together, in the vicinity of \$500.

In Bolton South the church has been painted, and in St. Patrick's church at the Centre there have been some improved desks erected and new service books obtained. The Ladies' Guild here has provided surplices for the choir, and other requirements for Divine service. The parsonage grounds have been referred, and the parsonage itself put into general repair. The cemetery ground has also been fenced in.

Brome Corner church and the church in Iron Hill have both been renovated. In the latter parish a church hall, having a seating capacity for 125, has been furnished, and the parsonage painted within and without. The expenses in all these cases have been borne by the respective Ladies' Guilds.

VACANCIES.

There are two vacancies in this deanery, Brome and Glen Sutton. That of Brome has been created by the removal of the Rev. R. L. Mc-Farlane to the diocese of Huron, and that of Glen Sutton by the removal of Rev. H. A. Meek to the parish of Buckingham. Both of these gentlemen we are very sorry to lose. The parishes they have vacated suffer by their removal, and we hope that both may be speedily filled. The Rev. A. H. Manning has entered upon the charge of Bolton parish, and is actively working it up. He reports that the envelope system is in full exercise in his parish, and with the most satisfactory results, pleasing both to the clergyman and the people. If this system could be generally introduced and thoroughly worked in our several parishes, it would relieve many a burdened pastor's mind.

The deanery, by special resolution, desires that your Lordship urge the Executive Committee to augment the grant to the Mission of Potton, seeing that, notwithstanding the reduction of the grant having been made so as to spur the people to do more, more has not been done, and the clergyman there has been living on a stipend far below what the canon on clerical stipends, and his years of service demand.

DONATIONS.

The rector of Knowlton has received from his people the gift of a complete driving equipment, the horse and harness coming from the people generally, and the phaeton from one individual. Special mention may here be made that the late Col. Dyer made a donation of one hundred dollars to the Algoma Diocese—an example that many parishes might well emulate.

CHURCH BUILDING.

In the parish of Knowlton steps are being taken to build a new church. Towards it some \$300 have already been collected. It is a pleasure to be able to note that this parish has taken great interest in good works outside of its own bounds. It has furnished, and undertaken to maintain, a room in the new hospital for the Protestant insane—an example that might well be imitated. In this work the ladies have been the mainstay and movers.

Reviewing the work in the whole deanery, I am thankful to say that earnestness, and steady increase in faithful churchmanship, with other marks of spiritual as well as ecclesiastical well-being, characterize the field.

RURAL DEANERY OF CLARENDON.

My LORD,

I desire to present the following report of the Rural Deanery of Clarendon:—

The twelfth meeting was held at Shawville on the 11th day of June. The reports from the several parishes and missions were read, representing the following facts:—

1. There are at present employed in the Rural Deanery 13 clergymen and 3 students. There are also 2 licensed lay readers. The number of churches is 23, and of other stations 27, in all 50 congregations.

2. The number of families identified with the Church is 779—an increase of 10 since last year.

3. The number of confirmed persons is given in all reports except four. Adding in the case of these the number confirmed during the year to the reported number of names on the communicants lists of last year,

except e year t year, we would arrive at nearly the number of confirmed persons. It is certain the numbers so obtained would be under, not over, the actual number. This will give us at least 1,554 confirmed persons in the Rural Deanery.

111

4. Three parishes fail to report the actual number of communicants. Assuming them to have been as many as last year, we have a total of 1,026—an increase of 25.

5. The number of baptisms is 200, and of persons confirmed 107, less in both cases than last year.

6. There are 30 Sunday Schools—an increase of 6; and 855 S. S. scholars—114 more than last year, and 318 more than two years ago; and 84 S. S. teachers—an increase of 17. This is one of the most gratifying features of our work.

7. There has been contributed within the Deanery for all purposes the sum of \$8,151.69—a slight advance upon the amount of last year.

LUMBERMEN.

The Rev. H. Plaisted read an interesting account of work amongst the lumbermen. As a result of this report and of the ensuing discussion, the Rural Deanery adopted a resolution to the following effect, viz.: "That it would strengthen the hands of missionaries to lumbermen to have a written permission from the heads of firms to visit the men employed by them; and that such permission would have more weight if obtained on application of the Bishop, or other authority in the diocese."

MISSIONARY MEBTINGS.

Much difficulty is experienced in arranging for series of meetings which shall include all the missions. Severe weather and the great distances to be travelled were the causes of much suffering to the members of one of our deputations last October. It is, nevertheless, desirable that there should be at least one missionary meeting in every separate congregation or parish every year; and with a view to securing this it was resolved that for this year each incumbent shall arrange for the missionary meetings in his parish.

GRANTS.

Neither Alleyn nor Aylwin have as yet raised the amounts expected of them for clergyman's stipend, and it is a matter for serious consideration what should be done. One of three things must be done, either—

1. The people must make larger contributions; or,

2. The Executive Committee make larger grants. This has been done conditionally in the case of Alleyne; but as the people have failed to

comply with the condition, the clergyman loses both the people's contribution and the Committee's grant; or,

3. The two missions might be reunited. With reference to the latter, a missionary who knows both places affirms that it is utterly impossible for one man to do the work of the two parishes. Such a step would mean retrogression.

In this connection the Deanery highly honors the Rev. J. Senior for his self-denying efforts on behalf, as he considered, of his successor, but it is felt that churchwardens should never fallow their clergyman to canvas for stipend. On their part it is a degree of neglect of their own especial work, and on the part of the clergyman it is a degree of usurpation.

The Deanery also urges the essentially missionary nature of the work in both parishes, and feels that the people of Alleyne especially are doing more in proportion to their means and numbers than is done in many an older parish.

CLERICAL STIPENDS.

The Rural Deanery reaffirms resolutions adopted at the meeting of the Deanery at Hull, Sept. 5, 1889, recommending:

- 1. That payments for Church purposes should be made weekly, or at least monthly.
- 2. That churchwardens should have printed each year, after the Easter vestry meeting, a list of the contributors to the support of the Church's work in the parish, and that a copy of such lists should be sent to each family in the parish.
- 3. That each clergyman should make it a duty to represent to his people from time to time the necessity of supporting the work of the Church in their midst.

S. P. C. K.

Collections for this Society have been made in nine parishes of the Deanery, amounting to \$27.77. It was resolved to make the last Sunday in July again the day for collections for the very important work of the Society, the money to be sent to the secretary of Synod.

S. S. INSTITUTE.

A very profitable S. S. Teachers' Institute was held at Aylmer, Sept. 6, 1889. There were about 20 teachers in attendance. It was resolved to hold another in the coming October, at Shawville.

PAROCHIAL ENDOWMENTS.

Owing to the liberality of the Rev. Thos. Everett, Bristol has now a good nucleus of an endowment, amounting to \$350.00.

Aylmer has added \$100.00 during the year to its endowment. Hull possesses a good endowment of \$7,778.00. Chelsea, Onslow and Clarendon have made small beginnings.

It was resolved that further efforts should be made to create and increase parochial endowments, and that an annual sermon should be preached and a collection taken up for that purpose.

CHURCH BUILDINGS.

The Hull rectory is now completed, and is a most admirable building. The parsonage at Shawville is very comfortable and commodious, although not finished externally. The parsonage at Alleyne is unfinished. Steps are being taken to proceed with the work. Repairs and additions have been made to the parsonages at Bristol, Thorne, and River Desert, and bells have been obtained for St. Peter's Church, Cawood, and for the Mission House Chapel at River Desert.

All Church buildings in the Rural Deanery are insured.

CHURCH EXTENSION.

The Church families residing at Fort Coulonge and its vicinity are this year receiving regular Sunday services.

CHANGES.

Only one has taken place during the year. The Rev. Geo. Johnson has been succeeded at Chelsea by the Rev. W. Fyles, who has taken up the work of his predecessor, and is carrying it on with much earnestness.

CONCLUSION.

We do not profess to be satisfied with our own work. We do claim to have taught and labored, visited the sick and dying, ministered the Lord's Bread of Life, journeyed in cold and peril, for the Lord's glory. We love old England's Church. We believe it to be the true branch of Christ's Church for our race and empire; but we confess many failures, much need of wisdom, strength and prayerfulness; and we would ask of the body of the Church much sympathy and intercession.

CLERGY.

There are in the rural deanery 7 clergy serving in missions, 20 in rectories, 1 chaplain of the Montreal gaol, 1 chaplain at the Penitentiary at St. Vincent de Paul, 2 at the Theological College, 1 immigrant chaplain, 1 city missionary, 1 secretary of synod; in all, 34 clergy.

CHANGES.

Rev. E. A. W. King has resigned his position at the Cathedral, and is now assistant at Trinity Church. Rev. H. J. Winterbourne has resigned Lachine, and Rev. R. Hewton has been appointed in his place. On the death of the Rev. J. Allan, chaplain of the penitentiary, the Rev. Canon Fulton was appointed to the vacancy. Rev. W. Windsor has resigned the position of assistant minister of Sorel. The vacancy is supplied by Rev. E. J. Capel.

DEATHS.

The death of Mr. Hutton, treasurer of the Synod, is a loss much greater than to us a rural deanery; it is a diocesan loss. In every position he faithfully and perseveringly ministered to the Church. We have to thank God for his great services to the Church in this diocese. The Rev. J. Allan, chaplain of the penitentiary, died after a life of usefulness.

INSURANCE.

All the property in the rural deanery is reported insured.

LAY HELPERS' ASSOCIATION.

This Association has done a great amount of valuable work. Full accounts will be given in their report to Synod. The following resolution was adopted:

Moved by REV. H. J. Evans, seconded by REV. CANON ANDERSON,-

At the annual meeting of the clergy and lay members of the Hochelaga Rural Deanery, the invaluable, long continued and gratuitously rendered services of the members of the Church of England Lay Association of this city elicited a general expression of gratitude and warmest approbation, which the meeting desire to place on permanent record in their minutes, and in their present report strongly to convey to the Synod.

CITY MISSIONARY.

The Rev. H. J. Evans has continued his valuable services as before. The church at Cote St. Louis, which he has built, was opened last July. It is now felt that the time has come for dividing that mission from the work of the city missionary. At Cote St. Louis there are 90 Church families reported, and at Outremont 16; communicants, 64.

CHURCH EXTENSION.

This opens a most important subject. The city is growing in every direction. In 1871, according to the census, there was a Church population in this city of 12,786; in 1881, 16,247, an increase of 30 per cent. If it has increased at the same rate there will be over 20,000 at the next census. In the year 1871, beside the Cathedral, there were St. George's, Trinity, St. Stephen's, St. Luke's, St. John's, St. James', St. Mary's, St. Thomas', St. George's Mission, now St. Jude's, Grace Church, making in all eleven churches. There were in addition the mission of Cote des Neiges, now Outremont, and the French mission on St. Joseph street, now Eglise du Redempteur. Ten years after, in 1881, there were added St. Martin's, Church of the Redeemer, Cote St. Paul, St. Matthias', making in all fifteen churches. Up to 1890 we have added only one church, Cote St. Louis. From 1871 to 1890 we have added only five churches, three have been enlarged, with three mission stations, whilst our Church population has grown from 12,786 in 1871 to probably 20,000 in 1890. Are we keeping pace with the growth of our Church population in the city? We commend this subject to your Lordship's consideration.

Considering the report of the Rural Dean to the effect that the Church Association of the city has not during the past kept pace with the growth of the population, and inasmuch as in our opinion this is largely due to the parish system as it stands at present, this meeting recommend that Synod take such action as may be necessary, to such a re-distribution of parishes as shall be in the interest of Church extension.

RURAL MISSIONS.

Very different is the account we have to give about the rural missions. In every case there has been a continued decrease of Church members. The large increase of the French population has made great difficulty in supporting schools. The ability of the missions to support their clergy is less than it was twenty years ago. The difference of language and cus-The opening of our toms is such as to make it very inconvenient. North-west has drawn many away. To illustrate this: In 1871 Sorel reported 85 communicants and 100 Sunday-school scholars; in 1890, 60 communicants and 47 Sunday-school scholars. In 1871 Kildare reported 65 communicants and 50 Sunday-school scholars; in 1890, 37 communicants and 13 Sunday-school scholars. In 1871 Rawdon reported 200 communicants, and in 1890, 125.

The rural missions have petitioned your Lordship to form a distinct rural deanery, which this meeting feels would be for the advantage of

the Church.

The Synod of Quebec expressed its concurrence in a Church Immigration Society formed at Sherbrooke, which, by the means of information scattered in Britain by the agency of our Church Societies there, has been instrumental in bringing out many Church families. Whether it would apply to our Rural Missions is a subject for consideration.

The annual meeting of the Deanery of Iberville was held in the lecture room of the Baldwyn Hall, St. Johns, Quebec, on Wednesday, the 11th of June, the Venerable the Archdeacon of Bedford kindly presiding, in the place of the Rural Dean. There were present six clergy and four laymen. This deanery comprises seven rectories and four missions, under the charge of ten clergymen.

Since ou been filled Lacolle, a no unsupp And now, my Lord, before presenting to you the annual report of my deanery, I have in trust for its clergy and people a most pleasant duty to perform, as their representative.

In congratulating your Lordship on the fiftieth anniversary of your Church work in this diocese, none can more lovingly remember you than those among whom you first labored in that then obscure corner of the Lord's vineyard. God has so prospered your never-failing efforts for Christ's cause that the old parishioners of your first mission field, now greeting you on the event, experience a pleasure and satisfaction not easily conveyed in words. As our Bishop and our head you have but attained the position that those who have so long known you would most desire.

A Bishop's message to his people is as loving as a father's to his children, and none the less loving is our expression of affection to you, or our prayers and good wishes for your long and as faithful care of the shepherds and their flocks in Iberville.

In presenting my report, my Lord, I would like, with your permission, to explain what to some members of the Synod may appear its unnecessary length and minute details. From personal experience I find that most of the parishioners in the several cures of the deanery are totally ignorant of the spiritual and financial condition of their parishes. More than once has it been said to me, "Had I but known, I would gladly have done more." The "tabulated statistics" are little read and less understood by the people; therefore I have elaborated, with measured but well weighed words, our annual synopsis of the Deanery of Iberville, trusting that those who have done little may do more, and those who have done nothing may be stimulated to exertion and self-denial for Jesus Christ's sake, and for the growth of the Gospel and the fruits of the Spirit in their several parishes, and the spread of the knowledge of the Gospel in the Diocese of Montreal, in our domestic missionary fields and in foreign lands.

Should your Lordship consider that the Deanery of Iberville occupies too much space in the Synod report, or occupies too much of the valuable time of the Synod, of course I bow obediently and loyally to your decision, and will, though reluctantly, reduce our return within the old cut-and-dry limits of a statistical report, to be relegated to the Synod office, unread by the people; however, I am assured of the effect of such recapitulation of figures, and the repetition of an earnest appeal for increased activity on the part of pastors and people.

APPOINTMENTS.

Since our last report, the vacant rectories of Lacolle and Franklin have been filled by your Lordship's appointment of J. W. Dennis, deacon, to Lacolle, and Rev. W. J. M. Beattie to Franklin, so that to-day there are no unsupplied parishes in the deanery.

INSURANCE.

Every church and all buildings connected with Church property are reported as "insured."

CHAMBLY.

This parish has held its own in the way of numbers during the last year—which, under existing state of unequal rights, is more than can be said of other cures. The wardens were enabled to report a balance to the credit of the Church, besides expending over \$60.00 upon improvements and repairs.

We hear of the hope that a Woman's Auxiliary will shortly be added to the societies connected with St. Stephen's, and may prove a power of reflex spiritual blessing, arousing direct missionary interest.

There are 27 families in this parish, 69 confirmed persons. 49 communed during the year.

There is a Sunday school of 27 scholars, taught by 2 teachers. Amount of insurance on property, \$5,600. An endowment of \$4,113, yielding \$229.44 interest, which is applied to the rector's stipend, and augmented by \$370.50, paid by parish, making up the most insignificant sum of \$600, the total income of the rector. This parish raised for all purposes the sum of \$751.59 during the past year.

CHRISTIEVILLE.

Christieville, a rectory founded by the Christian liberality of the late Major Christie, is in itself now but a small field of labor—containing but 21 families, about 29 confirmed persons, of which number 19 communed during the last year. There is 1 Sunday school of 23 children and 4 teachers. The church, rectory and buildings are insured to the amount of \$3,200. The sum of \$600 is derivable from the seigniory, and forms the endowment, being the amount paid the rector as his stipend. The parishioners pay nothing towards the maintenance of their rector.

The mission fund and other offertories were more liberally responded to than usual.

The total sum raised by the parishioners for all purposes amounted to \$347.07.

The rector of Christieville serves Lacadie and Savanne, the people subscribing \$100 and the Mission Fund a grant of \$100. Service is held on Sunday afternoon in either place, every alternate Sunday. There are 22 families in this district; 37 confirmed persons, of which 27 communed in the last year. The two churches are insured for the sum of \$900.00.

There is a deficiency in the clergyman's stipend of about \$15.00, which doubtless will soon be wiped out. We cannot but feel that the people in this district are not sufficiently alive to their duty and privileges in the way of giving in proportion as the Lord has blessed them in temporal or spiritual things. Besides the promised sum of \$100 towards the maintenance of their clergyman, all that these 22 families contributed to the Mission Fund during the year was \$1.03; Widows and Orphans Fund, \$7.94; Superannuation, \$8.14; other purposes, \$19.39; making a total of \$22.02. There is no Sunday school here, and no Church organization of any kind.

EDWARDSTOWN.

In this mission there are 2 churches and 1 schoolhouse. Service held every Sunday in Edwardstown, and fortnightly in the others. There are 33 families identifying themselves with the Church, and 42 communicants. There are 2 Sunday schools and 36 scholars. There is no debt resting upon the mission except a debt of gratitude and love to their pastor. An endowment fund has been created by the Rev. E. G. Sutton, and we would strongly recommend each and every parish to follow his example, for surely the day is fast approaching when parishes now self-sustaining will, through the exodus of Church people squeezed out by French pressure, fall back upon the Mission Fund. We sound again the note of warning, prepare for such a day, and secure while you may an endowment fund, and thus relieve our Mission Fund.

We do believe, from expressions we ourselves have heard, that the people of this mission love and respect their pastor, who has lived in their midst for so many years, but parsons cannot live upon kindly expressions: they are of such a peculiar nature, be they as spiritually minded as their people would desire, that they require, now and again, something more nourishing and substantial. They require, just as their brethren of the laity do, the needful means of living decently and in order as do their neighbors. The clergy and their families have bodies and mouths: they require to be clothed and fed. Who planteth a vineyard, and eateth not of the fruit thereof? Who feedeth a flock, and eateth not of the milk of the flock? Far too many of the clergy in some of our missions, I say! In this mission the pastor all his ministerial life has sown spiritual things, and of the worldly things of his people, the rich harvest in dollars and cents has amounted to \$97.50. The total amount of stipend which this reverend gentleman, who has been years in the ministry, received during the last 12 months was \$497.50; superanuation, \$292; parish, \$97.50.

Here there was nothing raised for the Mission Fund; and only \$30.58 for all purposes, with the exception of the \$97.50 devoted to their clergyman—an average of \$3.88 for each family in the mission.

The dealery would recommend another division of the parish when your Lordship deems the time auspicious. Certainly some measures should be adopted speedily to prevent the sad necessity of reporting such culpable carelessness, indifference and penuriousness as is manifested here and in the other missions referred to.

SABREVOIS.

I may repeat very much what has just been said in connection with this station. We reported last year, with sorrow and shame, the fact that the total stipend of the missionary was the munificent sum of \$395.50, \$300 being paid by the Colonial Church Society, and \$95.50 being paid by the 18 Church families who reside at Sabrevois. At the present moment the church and property is not vested in the Bishop, in trust for the diocese. But a copy of the deed of gift was procured, and the opinion expressed, that the transfer can legally and easily be made. Steps should be taken for this transfer, and then we feel such a state of things will be forever removed from our diocese.

Besides the \$95.50 raised for stipend, the following are the only sums given by the above mentioned 18 families:—Mission Fund, \$7.60; W. and O. Fund, \$1.70; Superannuation Fund, \$2.00; for other purposes, \$15.00; a total of \$26.30.

There are 37 communicants. A Sunday school of 26 scholars. Insurance of \$1,000 on Church property. Facts and figures speak for themselves.

FRANKLIN AND HAVBLOCK.

This mission, two or three years ago, became self-sustaining and was constituted a synodical rectory. The Church families are equally divided between Franklin and Havelock, 60 being reported as identifying themselves with the Church. There is a Sunday school attached to each congregation—30 scholars in Franklin, 45 in Havelock. We are sorry to report a deficit of \$100 in the clergyman's stipend from this part of the parish, also \$37.50 of arrears from the Franklin division, the total amount promised from the whole parish being \$600. A deficit of \$137.50 is a most serious matter to the incumbent.

Several of the synodical offertories have been utterly disregarded, especially so in the case of Franklin, while the sum contributed is out of all proportion to the ability of the people. We gladly notice, however, needed repairs have been made in the church, and the Franklin proportion of the rectory debt reduced by \$144.00, while a number of new books have been added to the Sunday school library. that the members of Trinity Church have succeeded in wiping out their share of the rectory debt. The Trinity branch of the Woman's Auxiliary have been interested in the Indian schools in Algoma Diocese, presided over by Rev. E. Wilson. A box of clothing has been forwarded, valued at \$44.00. The church here has been put into thorough order. Churches and buildings are all insured to the amount of \$2,794.00. The total amount of moneys raised in this parish for all purposes is reported as \$729.40.

HEMMINGFORD.

This mission comprises the village of Hemmingford and its surroundings, Hallerton and Barrington, which the incumbent has taken up There are 62 families reported as identifying instead of Roxham. themselves with the Church. There are 2 churches where service is held once each Sunday, having a Sunday school attached to each, of 13 and 6 scholars respectively, taught by the incumbent. There are no libraries and no lay helpers apparently. Service is held once a fortnight in summer at Barrington. The total raised in this mission for all purposes, clergyman's stipend included, is \$335.66—an average of \$5.41 per family. There is a debt of \$52.00, besides an arrearage of \$34.15 due the clergyman. The Church at Hallerton shows signs of life and activity. The church edifice has been throughly renovated, plastered, painted and carpeted. There is a missionary society of 30 members interested in the Indians of the North-west and working for their benefit. There is a fund started to enable the wardens in time to purchase a bell for St. John's Church. The ladies as usual are the moving spirits in all this good work. with these facts as reported we cannot understand the statement that "the Sunday schools are practically a failure. No young people to join

The report concerning St. Luke's congregation, Hemmingford, is a discouraging one—the attendance at service small, the offerings of the people smaller still; great difficulty in procuring a layman sufficiently interested in his Church to act as warden; Sunday school a failure through the lack of material and the want of a teacher. The envelope system is adopted and would succeed well if it had only the moral support of a few more members, and the active weekly supervision of diligent wardens. We do not wonder, in the face of so many drawbacks, the indifference and want of liberality of our people, that the hands of our missionaries should fall down in sheer disheartedness. Our clergy work hard and faithfully, but often they have to carry a dead weight, and that alone as far as fellow-workers are concerned. In many of our parishes there is no future, no growth, no youth, to work for or look forward to.

God alone gives our missionaries in this district the heart and spirit to take up their daily work in the midst of so great trials and reverse influences, and preach the Gospel to all, whether they will hear or whether they will forbear.

The churches and property are insured to the amount of \$2300.00.

HUNTINGDON.

This rectory consists at present of Huntingdon, Hinchinbrook, a church in each place, and two other stations. 104 families are reported as connected with the Church. There are 3 Sunday schools, 130 scholars and 16 teachers, with 200 books in their libraries. The clergyman's stipend amounted to \$711 paid by parish. All the different funds have been contributed to, and the Mission Fund augmented by the sum of \$94.03. The total raised in this parish, including a box of clothing valued at \$59.00, amounting to the goodly sum of \$1,192.56. New church sheds have been built and paid for. A branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has been formed, and as the result of their work the ladies have forwarded to the Rev. S. Trevell clothing to be distributed among the Indians in the Saskatchewan diocese. The Sunday school children are also interested in mission work, while the ladies connected with the parish see that home work is not neglected. A fund is started for the decoration of the Huntingdon church, a new surplice purchased, while the rector presented the church with a new chandelier.

The annual missionary meetings are reported to have eclipsed all former ones, the Rev. G. O. Troop being the speaker, the collection amounting to \$18.86.

We are sorry not to be able to give any details of the work done in Hinchinbrooke or at the other two stations, no separate amounts being forwarded.

We would recommend that a report be returned of each congregation or station. This parish is being served by a student during the four months' absence of the rector, who is doing missionary work in the North-west.

LACOLLE.

This rectory is in charge of the Rev. J. W. Dennis, a deacon, for the last four months, until the incumbent is advanced to priest's orders. His stipend is only \$600, which is a pittance upon which to maintain a wife and six children, and hire a horse for Napierville duty and visiting.

There are 48 families belonging to the Church, a Sunday school of 40 scholars and 3 teachers, and a good library of 300 books. There is no debt,

Your Lordship has been pleased to appoint Mr. W. A. Stuart as one of the trustees of the Napierville glebe, in the place of Mr. James W. Stuart,

It is hard work for the incumbent to regain the ground lost by the parish being for such a long time without a responsible head, but increased interest is at last manifested, and the people plucking up heart again notwithstanding the steadily decreasing Protestant population. The ladies' guild here is simply invaluable, never wearying in well doing, never allowing themselves to be discouraged by adverse circumstances. should be morning and evening service in Lacolle every Sunday, if the Church is to hold its own, to say nothing of increasing. When there is only one service in the morning, children and adults are obliged to attend other services, and thus often are weaned away from their own by the aggressiveness of other denominations.

ORMSTOWN.

This rectory possesses an endowment fund of \$10,000, yielding interest to the amount of \$650, which is applied to the rector's stipend.

There are 40 families identifying themselves with the Church. day school of 31 scholars, the rector being the superintendent, Mrs. Lockhart and daughters taking the leading part as teachers, training up the young and interesting them in Mr. Wilson's work and missionary objects generally. The parish subscribed \$150 towards their clergyman's stipend, making up the income of \$800. Church property is insured for \$1,300. The total amount raised for all purposes only amounted to \$250. There is but one church and no out stations. We still think that an effort should be made to establish a service in Valleyfield and adjacent parts. members of the deanery feel that it would advance the work of the Church if the present boundaries of the parishes of Franklin, Huntingdon and Edwardstown were so altered as to permit of the following changes:— Hinchinbrook and Franklin, Edwardstown and Havelock, Huntingdon with places adjacent forming a parish by itself. Huntingdon being a valuable centre, work should be more concentrated and developed in the village than is now possible under the present division.

We feel that the interests of the individual parishes would be increased if delegates to the Synod were chosen from their own midst, and we also feel that hospitality should be accorded to the laity equally with the clergy of the Synod of Montreal.

Is one of the oldest Crown rectories. In St. Johns there are 108 families identifying themselves with the Church. There are 169 confirmed persons, of which 111 communed during the year. There is a Sunday school of 91 scholars, 8 teachers and 2 librarians, with 430 books in the library. The offertory is largely used in this parish as the medium of the people's free-will offerings to Almighty God. During the year \$1,408.58 was received through the offertory. The Mission Fund, through the envelopes placed on the plate on Easter Sunday, amounted to the sum of \$242.27. All the diocesan collections have been duly made. The total amount raised in this parish is \$3,608.39.

The Ladies' Aid Association ranks first in all its works of love, generosity and self-denial. The Woman's Auxiliary, the Girls' Guild, the Literary Society, the Lads' Saturday Evening Class and the St. Johns Temperance Society and Band of Hope are all working societies, helpful, useful and strengthening the Church in old historical St. Johns. It is to the unwearied energy, prayers and hearty co-operation of my people I am thus enabled to present to your Lordship such an improved state of affairs in my own immediate cure.

With respect to the salaries in general, I am but voicing the sense of the deanery in declaring our united opinion, that unless a way be found of adequately rewarding work faithfully done, by those in long standing in the mission field, we stand in perpetual danger of losing our men at the first chance that offers.

We most strongly insist upon the adoption of a graded scale of salaries, according to length of service in the field. Without this we see no remedy for the present distress.

All the buildings are in good repair, and are fully insured.

By the appointment of the Rev. Malcolm Forbes to the incumbency of North Shefford, in the room of the Rev. W. N. Duthie, removed to Clarenceville, the missions are now filled, with the exception that Warden, which we had hoped would, by this time, be receiving an independent supervision, has been included for the present in the former clergyman's charge.

We are sorry to be in a position to report nothing distinctively attempted in the way of French evangelization.

RURAL DEANERY OF ST. ANDREWS.

My LORD,

The annual meeting of the Deanery of St. Andrews was held at Lachute, May 7, preceded as usual by celebration of the Holy Communion and a sermon preached by Rev. L. G. A. Roberts of Como. 7 clergy, 16 lay delegates and 2 lay readers were present, representing 9 of the 10 parishes, and though this is an improvement, we wish that more would avail themselves of the opportunity to discuss deanery matters.

Full reports were received from all the parishes except Papineauville and Portland, and the failure of these to report fully was due to the missions being vacant. It seems a pity that we are still so dependent upon the clergy for the information to be given in the reports, and that the laity appear to be to no small extent so unacquainted with parochia details. We learn from the reports received that all Church property is fully insured; that the Mission Fund collections indicate in some cases a marked advance in the interest shown by the people, while the total is slightly in advance of that of last year.

Rev. H. A. Meek, late of Glen Sutton, has been appointed to Buckingham; Rev. P. E. Judge to Papineauville, succeeding Rev. E. T. Saphir, who resigned the beginning of April. Mr. W. S. King, lay reader, is taking duty in Portland. Mr. F. A. Warden continues his work in Arundel, where he has been acting as lay reader since last September; and Mr. Jas. Thompson, of the College, is in Avoca and Ponsonby.

GRANTS

The deanery thoroughly recommended that Grenville be allowed a grant of \$100 for this year, and that the grant to Lakefield be raised from \$350 to \$400.

MISSIONARY MEETINGS.

Missionary meetings were held generally this year, and show an increase in interest which is cheering and hopeful, as knowledge and sympathy go together, so that the more learned about missions at home and abroad, the greater will be the practical interest manifested.

OTHER MATTERS.

In speaking of other matters it would be better to speak of them under the heads of the missions with which they are connected.

Portland.—This mission is now in the midst of a mining district of great promise and importance. It is growing steadily not merely in numbers, but in what has been noticeable throughout, a steady love for the Church and a desire to work. The little log church built at Poltimore, some six miles from the bank of the Lièvre River, has during the past two years been much improved. Good congregations gather there—indeed, considering the roads, most creditable—while the attendance atthe Holy Table is far above the average. The people though poor give good support in many ways. A church is being completed at the Blanche Lake, some six miles from Poltimore, and, it is hoped, will be ready to be consecrated this year.

Buckingham.—This old mission feels the influence of the activity in mining up the Lièvre. Good work is being done, and it would not be surprising if in a few years it became self-supporting, and held the first position in the deanery. The parsonage, much out of repair, is being thorougly overhauled at considerable outlay, and when finished will make a comfortable home for the clergyman.

Grenville.—St. Matthew's Church has been well repaired inside and out at a cost of \$650, and some good changes have been made in the chancel. The dark, dreary appearance has gone, and the change is very striking especially as seen by lamplight. Accustomed to what had been, it was almost startling to enter the church upon such an occasion as that of your Lordship's visitation last fall, and observe the brightness and warmth of the building. Trinity Church, Calumet, was freed from debt last summer, and consecrated at your last visit.

Lachute.—The prospects of this parish have steadily improved. While the number of families does not increase owing to the constant removals, yet it maintains its position, and the average attendance at the services is rising. Last summer through special efforts St. Simeon's Church underwent much repair, made necessary by its draughty condition, and then by the generosity of two gentlemen in the congregation the body and roof were painted on the outside. The interior of the building needs no such work, being sheeted with ash. This spring some alterations were made with a view to increased accommodation, comfort and appearance. At Easter a very timely offering was made to the church of a reading desk and communion table. The debt on the parsonage has been reduced \$150, and we hope a few years will see the whole of it wiped out. The congregation may well feel pleased at the very comfortable home they are able to offer their clergyman.

Mille Isles.—This mission is to be congratulated upon the progress it is making in many ways. The people have shown their energy by making a number of improvements to the two churches. Last summer they built a tower to both of the edifices, and purchased for each a good bell. Your Lordship consecrated these buildings as well as the burying ground at Mille Isles, when there in September.

Arundel.—This mission, so scattered, so hard to work is in spite of all one of the mostpromising missions in the missionary portions of the diocese. The congregation at Laurel are working at the little church commenced last year, and it will probably be soon ready for occupation. The step they have taken is a good one and deserving of commendation.

WORK IN THE SHANTIES.

As the committee for this special work will report upon what was done in this deanery last winter to benefit the shantymen, it is only necessary to mention that this work is very important and worthy of much consideration; That the importance of at least a speaking acquaintance with French in the preparation of students. If any incentive is needed, let those in authority take a trip to the rear of Ottawa and Argenteuil Counties in winter, and try to travel from shanty to shanty without knowing French. One trip will convince them if they have the experience of some travellers in that wild region.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

My LORD,-

Your committee report that the following information has been received from the Rural Deans of Hochelaga, Bedford, Clarendon, St. Andrew's and Brome. There are no reports from the Deaneries of Iberville or Shefford. They regret to learn therefrom that the number of Church schools is declining in the Diocese. In the Deanery of Hochelaga, the "Sabrevois" school is doing an efficient work. Many more pupils apply annually for admission than can be received. The total attendance last year was 80. The average number of boarders 56. The school in connection with the Church of St. John the Evangelist is in a prosperous state. The present number of boarders is 17. The total number of pupils 62. The Theological College in this city reports that the unfinished portion of the building has been completed to meet the increased demand for accommodation. The highest number on the role last year was 30, the lowest 26. Attention is called to the fact that the educational standard of the college is very much higher than it was 17 years ago. Matriculation at McGill University and a two years' partial course in Arts is now required of every student. The possession of the "Testamur" is the minimum test of those for whom the College holds itself responsible. It is important to note this, for the possession of the "testamur" is not indispensable to ordination, as we earnestly wish it were. McGill University has remitted tuition fees to all Divinity Students, so that the facilities for acquiring a liberal and professional education in Montreal are unusually great, and when it is remembered that the difficulties respecting Divinity Degrees have been satisfactorily settled, the prospects for greater prosperity in the future are largely guaranteed. Only a more liberal supply of money is needed for the immediate development of the College. In the Deanery of Bedford the only Church Schools are the "Rectory School" at Freleighsburgh. It is strictly a private institution; and the "Dunham Ladies' College" which is, but ought not to be, practically private. The self-denying efforts of Miss Baker for its revival should be gratefully recognized, but as a memorial on the subject is to be laid before the Synod, it is not necessary now to say more. The "Missisquoi High School" is not mentioned. Only two schools are in operation in the Deanery of Clarendon, viz.; one at "Griermount," in which there are about 40 scholars, and one at "Danford Lake," reported as being very efficient. There are Elementary schools, of which there are others in the Diocese under the Colonial Society, but of which I have received no report. In the Deaneries of St. Andrew's and Brome there are no Church Schools.
