But what is still worse is that the fruit industry of British Columbia, deprived of its call from the prairie provinces and exposed to the free entry from the great organized fruit production. Future development is at once checked, present development has to fight for its existence with all the odds against it.

If we have made ourselves clear in the above, we have opened up to our thoughtful readers what we consider the vital point in the proposed arrangement.
