A practical device for facilitating the task of firemen in a smoke hole by reducing the danger of suffocation is all but assured by a test made in New York. This new mask employs a principle so simple that the surprise is that something of the kind was not invented long ago.



While the majority of people have faith in a record cropand ultimately lower prices, barring accidents to the crop, it is beginning to be felt that short selling is attending with some danger at a level \$22 per bale below the prices prevailing when the decline began. The possibilities of early frost, better tradeconditions and a firmer holding of spots at the South, are beginning to impress a large number of people who have hitherto maintained a bearish attitude. We believe that these considerations are well taken and while not anticipating any sustained advance under present conditions, we prefer to wait for a substantial rally before selling the market short.


