

BE CONSISTENT
The merchants of Campbellton for some time have been complaining of a shortage of trade sent out of town. Citizens to mail order firms and steps have been taken to devise ways and means to combat this evil. This movement the Graphic has evinced a great interest. We firmly believe that where a citizen sends his mail order, there should be a corresponding effort to make the business "is-to-a" extent co-operative. If you send your money in your town with your own merchants they will be more prosperous and consequently can in turn spend more money in their town. And some of it will eventually come back to you. In the past we have noticed what we have preached and members of our household have always been requested to make their purchases in Campbellton, and money of our staff has been discouraged from sending to mail order houses.

But our merchants live up to the rule? We are afraid not. In fact they know they do not. Every year hundreds of dollars are sent out of town for printed stationery, advertising matter and paper which could be sent to just as good advantage right here. Campbellton has two newspapers and two job printing offices. If more work was given them more people would be employed and consequently more wages paid to be sent in the town.

As an instance to show the inconsistency of our merchants, we quote the following: This morning we received statements of accounts from one of Campbellton's leading merchants and in both cases some of the printing was done outside of the town. We enclosed his statement in an envelope printed by outside printers and he other made his account on an imported bill head. In both of these cases the Graphic or any local printer could have done the work just as well and we venture to state that no matter what the cost, yet these merchants felt obliged to send to Montreal and Toronto for what they could have obtained here.

It is a wonder that citizens will continue to patronize mail order houses and more will learn to do so. In fact, citizens who want to be consistent in the use of the local printer, they must be consistent in the use of the local printer. When Campbellton merchants learn to be more progressive, courteous and successful; when they learn that the buying public must be educated to believe that they can buy to just as good advantage at home when they sell at lower prices for cash, then perhaps they will cut out at least a portion of their mail order business. Above all things let them be consistent and give the people that they are prepared to live up to what they preach.

The Graphic is not selfish and does not insist that it get all this printing and advertising. All that it wishes is that this work be done in town.

THE LUMBER CUT
According to the St. John Standard, Surveyor-General Grimmer is one of the greatest reformers of the age, and has saved the province immense sums of money, which, but for his earliest efforts, would have been gathered in by buccannier lumbermen. The Standard states the quantity of lumber cut on crown lands for a number of years, given in the government reports, show a large increase. The Standard contends that there has not really been an increase in the cut, but that Mr. Grimmer has had all of it added, and the province enriched by revenue, which formerly went to the lumbermen. It charges that the late government only derived revenue from a fraction of the actual quantity of lumber cut on crown lands. This statement by the Standard is not new. That journal has been making it at intervals ever since it was established. A statement by Mr. Grimmer that the cut on crown lands during the past winter was 280,000,000 feet, compared with 200,000,000 feet in the previous winter, is an excuse for repeating the charges against the old government. The Standard counts much upon the credulity of its readers. Every man who knows anything about the lumber business knows that the cut on crown lands during the past winter was unusually large. On the Restigouche, for example, the cut is a record for the river. Never before was so large a quantity brought to the stream. There was also an unusually large cut on crown lands on Miramichi and St. John waters. The lumbermen cut more logs, therefore Mr. Grimmer's scales were able to find more loss.—St. John Times.

A few years ago from fifty to seventy-five million feet was considered a large cut for the Restigouche, whereas this year it is estimated that one hundred and twenty-five millions will pass through the Restigouche boom.



Says Hon. Mr. Emmerson—How C. P. R. Benefits By Latest Move.

BRITISH AVIATORS GREAT PERFORMANCE

Flew From Dover to Calais and Back Without Alighting Made Fast Time

FIRST TRIP

Dover, Eng.—The Hon. Charles Stewart Rolls, captain in the London section of the army motor reserve, driving a Wright biplane, visited the English Channel twice last evening without alighting. He made the round trip between Dover and Calais in ninety minutes.

While two Frenchmen, Louis Bleriot and Count De Lesseps, have crossed the channel in an aeroplane, it remained for an Englishman to perform the double feat. The distance across between the two points is twenty-one miles, so that his over-water flight of forty-two miles without a stop established a new record.

Captain Rolls left Dover at 8:20 o'clock. The atmospheric conditions were excellent. He lost no time in manoeuvring but after describing a circle, headed towards the French coast. In anticipation of the flight torpedo boats steamed at full speed across the straits, but the pace of the aeroplane was swifter.

When finally the aviator became visible to the naked eye cheer after cheer arose from the enthusiastic spectators, and as he gracefully soared across the landing place made known by Bleriot as was given an ovation. He alighted at 8 o'clock at about the same spot as Bleriot showing little signs of strain of his magnificent flight.

**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-
WEST LAND REGULATIONS**

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry, (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.
