

Washington, D. C., Feb. 3 .- The major ship remains the basis of sea power, and those who argue that the aeroplane and the submarine have supplanted it are asking the United States to "accept hopes for accomplishments," the navy general board says in a report to Secretary Daniels, made public today. The general board, having kept in touch with naval progress along all lines, says the report, "reiterates its belief in the battlesnips as forming the principal units of the fleet. Without them the United States cannot hope to cop

Urging that "equality in power be the continuing naval policy of the United States," the board says there is "no thought of instituting international competitive building," and "no other nation can in reason take exception to such a position."

The report was approved by Secretary Daniels, and was transmitted by him to the Senate naval committee for its information

START A CAMPAIGN AGAINST LIQUOR SMUGGLING INTO U.S.

Detroit. Feb. 3.—Frank D. Richardson, regional prohibition, enforcement director, will arrive in Detroit today to supervise action to be taken by his agents against liquor smugglers who are getting whiskey into the United States from Canada by aeroplane, boat and automobile, he declared. Mr. Richardson said that the order from Washington limiting drugglsts withdrawals of whiskey from warehouses to five cases, practically stops alleged bootlegging from that source. His attention will be directed now, he said, toward Canadian rum-running, which has been a menace to the district.

"The requirements for dwellings under the housing act make it impossible to erect houses as cheaply as was done in the past. It is no longer possible to use post foundations and other cheap and unsatisfactory methods. It pays in the long run to erect the proper kind of a house in the first place. In cities where the cheaper kind of houses were built several years ago they are now spending large sums in keeping them in repair. several years ago they are now spending large sums in Reeping them in repair. If the houses had been properly built there would be no need for this. I think it is a better policy to build proper houses even if the initial cost is greater. WARSHIPS FOR THE SCRAP HEAP.

[Wall Street Journal.]

Apart from the necessity to limit the expenses of government and restrict naval armament to bare necessities, there is a practical business reason why Great Britain is no longer building "capital ships," and has scrapped those she had already begun. Apparently this fact has not penetrated Washington intelligence, and, as might be expected. Secretary Daniels is the last person to see the fundamental change in naval armament. Capital ships on the plan he lays down would be worse than worthless. This is the plain business reason why his three billion dollar nexy project should be forthwith abandoned. Great Britain learned this lesson, from the battle of Jutland, and from subsequent naval activities. Every effort to bring battleships and cruisers of enormous gun power and displacement, into contact with the enemy was foiled by submarine menace, just as Germany's effort to surprise the British fleet was prevented by wireless warning. Since the battle of Jutland, Great Britain has completed only one capital ship, the Hood, a super-cruiser of great relative speed, gun power and defensive armament. She is, in fact, the latest word in armament and power—the greatest floating engine of destruction ever launched.

But Great Britain has scrapped all her sister ships already commenced, to save the cos. of completion. The Hood not only is useless to her, but is an added liability. She carries more men and more wealth liable to instant destruction by submarines or aerial torpedo than anyother war vessel ever floated.


