



THE ALLIANCE MOVEMENT. The present is a period of unrest in the eighboring Republic. At no time since the formation of the Republican party, now dominant in national politics, has there been so many movements threatening to wreck that body. It was thought that by bringing in various territories as States, the Republicans would be able to entrench themselves in power for many a long day, and it cannot be denied that, for the present, the majority of the new States must be regarded as Republican. They need not be expected to be unlike other new territories in want of many public improvements and not averse to receiving public offices in return for votes. Such

But there is a vast body of electors in the States who are not contented with the present condition of affairs. They have reached the conclusion that a change in the regulation programmes of the two great political parties is necessary, and though their views may not be universally indersed, there can be no doubt that they are giving the party managers a great deal ern. One movement is led by workingmen who are in revolt against high taxation, imposed for the aggrandizement of combines. Another, with which the urban workers have more or less sympathy, and which in many instances they are loyally supporting, is an agriculturists' agitation. It is known as the Farmera' Alliance, and has made enormous progress in the Southern and Western States. The ers have reached the conclusion that if the Government is to be regarded as paternal, some special privileges should be nferred upon them as well as upon the manufacturers. The aims of their allian therefore, so far as they have been for-

inlated, include the following:

1. The Sub-Treasury Bill so called, being a project for the Government to take farm acts on storage and advance legal tender notes on them to the producers This is the prevailing alliance craze in the

2. Abolition of the Supreme Court, abolition of laws for the collection of debts, the setzure of railroad property in behalf of the people, the revaluation of mortgages and the defeat of Ingalls. These are among the avowed projects of the alliance in Kansas, or in Minnesota, or in both.

In other States the alliance takes the very strongest grounds against high taxation on imports and in favor of the idea that the farmer should be permitted, with-out State interference, to sell in the dearest and buy in the cheapest market. In Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, ee and Texas the farmers, under of many parents, who urge their children to walk prematurely, thereby producing pitiful Tennessee they have, for the first time in the history of the State, made themselves legs—those which have not been bent either outward or inward by the fond maternal did not come together until August, 1888, they have made such effective use of their time and opportunities since as to have captured the Democratic State Convention at Nashville and nominated their man for Governor. Gov. Gordon, a candidate for Senator Brown's seat, sought to make his calling and election sure with the Legishis calling and election sure with the Legis-lature that the alliance hopes to elect by subscribing some time ago to its numerous articles of faith. The Democrats of Mis-souri have, in a measure, followed the ex-ample of their brethren in Alabams. In Ohio the farmers have been nore reluctant to break away from party Only 300 alliances have thus far been organized, but even this small num-ber is attracting the attention of the poli-ticians of the old parties. Less conserva-tive than their Ohio brethren, the Iowa farmers have organized nearly 1,700 alliances, 500 of which have come into exist-ence within the past six months. In Illinois the alliance has been still more active; it has been in operation for three years, has a membership of 80,000, and is engaged in putting forward we and Congressional candidates. legislative and Congressional candidates. 
