LONDON, July 12 .- The Liberals have gained so far three seats to day-Chestergained so far three seeks to day—conser-field, Woodstock and Doncaster, and have wiped out the Tory majority in Egrement. Cheaterfield was formerly represented by Airred Barnes, Liberal-Unionist; Wood-stock by Lora Randelph Churchill, Con-servative; Doncaster by Hon. W. H. W. Fitzwilliam, Liberal-Unionist, and Egre-mont by Lord Muncaster, Conservative. Fifteen elections took place in Scotland to-day, and the majority of them are expected to go for Gladatone. The election in which the greatest interest is felt is that in the Midlothiandistrict Eddinburghshire, where Mr. Gladatone is opposed by Col. Wane-hope, Liberal-Unionist. Party feeling in the district is raised to fever heat, and polling was never before known to be so heavy. LIVELY TIMES AHEAD IN MANY CASES. LONDON, July 13.—Since Lord Salisbury's return from Windsor the Carlton Club has ppeared to have received information that he Government will remain in office until t is defeated on a party division. Lord salisbury will meet Parliament with the Queen's speech, declaring his policy, and inviting an attack on a division following debate to an amendment to the address. The Government will be defeated and the Cabinet will resign. Lord Salisbury thereupon will recommend to the Queen that she send for Mr. Gladstone. Prominent Radicals in the National Liberal Club are Radicals in the National Liberal Club are ppeared to have received information that upon will recommend to the Queen that she send for Mr. Gladstene. Prominent Radicals in the National Liberal Club are to-night discussing what Mr. Gladstone ought to do. They favored postponing the Home Rule Bill for a year and to open the session of Parliament with the labor and rural reform programme. The reasons for adopting this course are: First, the recognition of the fact that home rule will precipitate a dissociation the first year of Parliament, and, second, if home rule is postponed the members can rely for two years and the next will give Mr. Gladstone time to perfect the details of the measure. Representations to this effect will be made to Mr. Gladstone, but it is doubtful if they succeed, as in his private conversation with his colleagues he has never faltered in his intention to expedite home rule and then retire from public life. Mount Ætna's Eruption.

Rome, July 12.—The eruption of Mount Ætna is rapidly increasing in violence. Great explosions are continually taking place. A severe earthquake shockoccurred this morning which reduced to ruins the village of Giarre, on the coast of Sicily, five hours' journey from the craters of Mount Ætna. The population of Giarre is about 18,000. No mention of loss of life is made, but it is feared here that many must have perished. The whole country suffered severely from the shocks.

Paris, July 12 .- From Algiers comes the news of a tragic affair. Two young men, formerly of Berlin, named Gustav Robert and Earl Schwartz, were foolish enough to and Earl Schwartz, were foolish enough to enlist in the French Legion. They were sent to Algiers and so ill-treated that they deserted. They were exptured at Oran and court martialled. The court martial sentenced them to be shot, a sovere and unusual penalty for desertion in time of peace, and irflicted, it is believed, chiefly on account of the prejudice against them as Germans. Over 150 bodies have been recovered from the Arve, and these, with the 30 taken from the ruins of the houses, bring the death roll up to 180. It is not believed this will cover the entire loss of life, as there are undoubtedly many bodies buried under the masses of debris that will never be recovered.

The whole 'surface of the river is strewn with the wreckage of the houses and trees. It is believed not a single person in the line of descending glaciers and debris they carried along with them escaped. Many of the dead were mangled beyond recognition. A number of visitors were at the place and many of them are among the victime.

The baths of St. Gervais were in five separate buildings joined by a stone wall erected in a narrow gorge. They were situated about 2,066 feet above the sea on a road from Geneva to Chamonix. A glacier became detached from Mont Blauc and fell into the mountain torrent, carrying away the hamlet of Bionnay and filling the torrent with masses of ice. The masses of ice and the wreckage of the village formed a dam which effectually restrained the water for some time. Finally the dam broke and the waters burst like a cataract into the stream of Bon Nant, which passes through St. Gervais.

The inmates of the bath houses were awakened about 2:15 n.m. by the sound or ushing waters and a loud crashing noise? Before they were able to leave the buildings the torrent, filled with the debris of the village and large masses of ice, crashed against the bath houses. Three of the buildings were entirely destroyed and another one partially. The torrent continued into the valley destroying everything in its course.

Terrible Experience for Three Londoners, Who Mistake Tincture of Aconite

for Whisky,

And Quaff the Deadly Fluid-Henry Ware, Bert Dopotic and John Sigsworth Have an Impressive Lesson

It was a terrible temperance lesson that Messrs. Ware, Depotie and Sigsworth were taught Tuesday afternoon.

Henry Ware is a packer employed at Pigot & Bryan's, Dudas street. Bert Depotis, a middle-aged man, works in the kin at the same establishment. Young Sigsworth, a lad of 17 or 18 years of age, drives a parcel delivery wagon. The three were together in the rear of Saunders' drug store, which is next door to Pigot & Bryan's. The former firm were engaged in removing some stock from their retail branch to their wholesale house on Clarence street. Among the things lying around in the rear waiting for a dray was a demijohn of tincture of acouite. Aconite is a narcotic poison, very deadly in its effects. Its coor, appearance and taste are very much like those of whisky—so much so that Messrs. Ware, Depotie and Sigsworth were fully convinced it was the "genuine stuft." Here was a chance for a free drink. Each took a swallow.

It wasn't very long before a strange griping sensation at the stomach told them that something was wrong. The pain increased and so did their fears. Hurriedly they made inquiries at the drug store as to the nature of the liquid they had drunk, and then they discovered the awful truth. Physicians were instantly sent for. Ware didn't wait. Ho made a rush for Dr. George Wilson's office and managed to reach it. Evidently he had taken a lighter dose than the others, as emetics promptly administered sufficed to place him out of danger in a comparatively short time. But with Depotie and Sigsworth the results were more serious. When Dectors Arnott and Woodruff arrived they found them both stretched out in a most alarming condition. 

Sankey, the sweet interpreter of gospel melodies, gave an address in which he referred to the pleasant relations of England and America, and said that war between the two nations and said that was between the two nations was forever out of the question. The Canadian delegates sprang to their feet as Mr. Sankey sat down and electrified the audience by striking up "God Save the Queen." The convention broke into cheering, and all the women in the house waved their handkerchiefs. When the Canadians were through the audience promptly continued the song, substituting the words of "My Country, "Tis of Thee." It was now Canada's turn to cheer and wave handkerchiefs. She replied to "America" with "Blest Be the Tie that Binds," the whole audience joined in and there was another scene of wild enthusiasm.

ONE of the more notable among the suc cessful candidates in the British elections is the Right Hon. Dadabhai Naoroji, the newly-elected member for Central Finsbury. He is a native of Bombay. He went to London in 1855, and became a partner in the firm of Cana & Co. That the Liberal chief still holds it by a majority so substantial, in spite of the most strenuous efforts on the part of his opponents to secure his defeat, is proof that the masses of Midlothian now think and vote for themselves.

They confirm the view that honest people have always entertained regarding the unfairness of the partisan compilation of the Dominion voters' lists. A few men in close constituencies are virtually placed in a position to make and un make parliaments.

GREAT BRITAIN'S PROGRESS

Those Canadians who have been lament ing the alleged decadence of Creat Britain because the motherland refuses to return to the system of high taxation on imports which brought misery and starvation to her workers half a century ago, should read the peech which Sir John Lubbock delivered in reply to Sir Charles Tupper's "protectionist" proposal at the Associated Cham bers of Commerce. Sir John was president of the conference, and he twitted Sir

Charles with ignorance of the progres which the Empire had made in commerce. British shipping had increased not only absolutely but relatively. As regarded trade, British commerce had increased \$500,000,000 in five years. There seemed to be an impression that protection was making progress. That was not so. If they took the free trading part of the En pire the commerce amounted to \$5,000,000,000,000, and the increase in twenty years had been \$1.500,000,000. In the protectionis been \$1,300,000,000. In the protectional part of the Empire the commerce was \$885, 000,000, and the increase in the same time had been only \$375,000,000. Another indication of the prosperity of Great Britain has been advanced by Mr. Gladstone in his Midlothian campaign. He less a sum than \$1,5 expended by the taxpayers for the re-demption of the national debt, which shows a steady reduction year by year. No nation outside of the United States. with its enormous natural resources and free trade over a territory the size of Europe, with between 60,000,000 and 70,000,000 of people, has made such phenomenal progress. The States have made wonderful strides, but not more marked, all things considered, than the enterprising industrial population found within the narrow confines of Great Britain.
