Oliver McClary, on being examined, contradicted the statements of the witnesses for the plaintiff. He was 77 years old, and had never said anything of an improper nature to Mrs. Hammill. As to the assault, plaintiff was entirely to blame, as on returning home on the night

assault, plaintiff was entirely to blame, as on returning home on the night of Aug. 1, 1892, he was passing Hammill's back gate, when a voice attracted his attention and, turning, was confronted by Hammill, who wanted to knock McClary's brains out. On going through the gate McClary slleges that he received a blow on the head with a heavy stick, inflicting a cut about three and a half inches in length, which bled profusely and required six stitches by a medical officer. In the first row with Hammill witness stated that it was a case of blackmail, and that he would take action against Hammill, but here the matter dropped. When the license commissioners decreed that all the screens should be removed from the doors and windows of barrooms, and that the hour of closing in the evening should be 10 instead of 11 o'clock at night, the salcon-keepers did not relish the curtailing of their privileges. Two years ago the hour for discontinuing The important part which the union had

not relies the curtailing of their privileges. Two years ago the hour for discontinuing the nefarious business was 12 o'clock. Quite an advance, it would be seen, had been made in this direction. 'Here lets me pay a tribute,' continued Mrs. Carson, 'to the invariable courtesy shown us by the license commissioners when we pay them our annual visit. Very different was the treatment accorded by the board in East Middlesex. The interview with them was extremely unsatisfactory."

During the coming year, continued the report, it was proposed to add a cooking department to the industrial school. Additional accommodation had been secured upon the top flat of Somerest Hall for the purpose, and proper fittings had been procured at considerable expense. The funds for carrying on this work had been obtained by holding an art loan exhibition, which was a gratifying success. A new feature of the union's operations had been the supplying of refreshments to school children during a demonstration in Queen's Park. Mrs. D. Holmes reported in connection with the legislative department that a petition egislative department that a petition rom the "Women of the World," which yould be presented to every court in both hemispheres, was being prepared at the World's Fair. The ladies of London had

The evangelistic department has been working steadily. It is interested not only in those matters which the name given would indicate, but also in jail and hospital visitation. Mrs. M. E. Robertson reported that two mass meetings had been held during the year. At both about 3,000 were present. One thousand leaflets were distributed.

Mrs. M. Williams, who superintends the hospital visitation, said that 43 visits had

hospital visitation, said that 43 visits had been paid to that institution at intervals throughout the year, and that 2,000 religious newspapers (always thankfully received) had been distributed.

The weekly meetings of the union in the jail, Mrs. Lillian Rodger stated, had been continued during the year with great profit. Several of the women inmates had been permanently reclaimed.

REALM OF EDUCATION.

The educational department is probably the most extensive under the union's

The educational department is probably the most extensive under the union's direction and is ramified more than any other. Mrs. Janet Melbermid reported that whea the Band of Hope opened for the year sixteen boys were in attendance. Eighty names were on the roll at the concusion of the term. Fifty-one of these pledged to abstain from the use of alcohol, totacco and profane language. The death of Miss Bethel, one of the most valued teachers, was referred to feelingly.

Mrs. Jennie D. Jones submitted the report of the industrial school. Last year there were 80 scholars' names on the roll, and those of thirteen teachers. The latter were: Mesdames Arnott, Struthers, Holmes, Westland, Andrus, and the Misses Fowler, Bargess, Ingram, Trebilcock, Daley, Jeffrey, Guernsey and Tantou. Fifty children had already been enlisted this year. The work of temperance advocacy in the Sunday schools was said to be progressing favorably.

Mrs. Alice Saunby stated that 621 persons had been charged during the year before Magistrate Parke with being drunk and disorderly. Thirty-seven liquor cases had been prosecuted. 



THE RECORD BROKEN.

Tuesday was Chicago Day at the World's Fair, and it was to be expected that the boastful city would beat the record in point of attendance, but the guessers have never suggested that the attendance could be greater than from 500,000 to 600, 000. The crowd, however, surpassed all expectations, upwards of 700,000 persons having entered the gates. This is nearly double the biggest attendance at the Paris Exposition of 1889, when 397,150 persons were counted, and over three times as many as attended the Philadelphia Exhibition on its "greatest klay," when 217,526 persons passed the turnstiles.

It is to be regretted that the crushing crowd became so unmanageable that lives have been lost. The grounds and buildings at Jackson Park are commodious, but it must have been a very difficult thing to control a crowd equaling one-third of the population of the Province of Ontario. The wonder is that the casualties were not more numerous,

HEATING BY ELECTRICITY.

When will the electricians give us chear neating? With fuel at its present cost, and likely to increase if there is no com petition with coal and wood, the heating bill of the average worker's family swal-lows up a large proportion of his income. If we could have heating by electricity, at a moderate price, it would be infinitely better than either coal or wood, for it would be cleanly and easily turned on or off, and therefore a great labor-saver. In some of the hotels in the west they already have a system of novel heat regulation. A guest in, say room 156, asks for heat, the order is transmitted to a particular person, the typewriter of the hotel generally. She goes to a switchboard and con nection is given electrically with that room, allowing heat to pass into it. The occupant of the room is, perhaps, par-ticular. A hot-blooded person wishes merely to keep from freezing; another wants a high temperature. Each can have his wish, for a thermostat with a pointer i automatically as desired. CHICAGO'S DAY.

Seven Hundred Thousand People at the World's Fair.

The Largest Crowd Ever Congregated— Indian Chies Henored—Crand Electrical Display—Fatal-lites and Accidents.

Werld's Fair Grounds, Chicago, Oct. 10.—Seven hundred thourand people, the greatest crowd that ever congregated, visited the World's Fair yesterday, breaking the greatest one-day record at Paris by an overwhelming majority. The first event took place at 9 o clock. The old Pottawettenic chief, whose father deeded the land upon which Chicago is belit, had been induced to come from his home in Hartford, Mich., for Chicago day, and stood beside the Columbia bell with uncovered head in the dress of the white man, and received the homage of thousands. He was born! 63 years ago, Sept. 27 last, on the day that the transfer deed was delivered to the agents of the United States Government, and by his side stood Chief John Young, 60 years of age, who came from the Pottawattomic reservation in Michigan to tell the people of all nations that his father, who bore the same name, christened the WCRLD'S FAIR GROUNDS, CHICAGO, Oct orbore the same name, christened the orld's Fair city "Chicago," which literal-interpreted means "where the skunk

dwells."

During the afternoon there was a reunion of the States, in which thousands of girls took part; but the crowning glory of the day was the procession of fleats, which entered the grounds at dark. The last float in the procession was "Electra, the Genius of Electricity," drawn by eight horses. It was represented by enormous dragoons, changing color from green to red, and lighted by 2,000 electric lights. The display of fireworks on the lake front, adjoining the perestyle, exceeded in magnificence anything heretofore given in the United States, if not in the world. Long before the last bomb of fireworks had been exploded on the lake front there was a dangerous jam of people on the highway leading to the elevated railroad station and the Forty-eighth street gates. The precautions taken by the police and officers of the guards to resist the human tidal wave which swept toward the street and the stairway leading to the elevated road were inefficient and many men and women were injured in the crush. 
