NEW TARIFF FOR CANADA; OLD ONE TO BE WIPED OUT

The Results of the Revision To Be a Maximum, Minimum and Preferential Column.

TREND OF CHANGES WILL BE TO REDUCE DUTIES

Ottawa, Nov. 29 .- At 4 o'clock today the present Canadian tariff will be practically wiped out of existence and a complete new tariff will be put in its place. The budget speech will be delivered by the Minister of Finance this afternoon, and the results of the tariff revision will be made known at the same time. Instead of one tariff there are to be three columns—a maximum, a minimum and preferential. There will be, therefore, a complete new set of figures and an entirely new tariff. The difficulty in making comparisons with the old tariff will be somewhat difficult, and therefore Mr. Fielding will no doubt accompany the schedules with a very full explanation. The trend of the revision, it is said, will be to reduce, rather than increase the present rate of duties. The preferential will be changed from a fixed rate of 33 1-3 as at present. Some items will have more of a preference, some less.



CONQUERED McKINLEY

Daring Mountaineers Reach Top of America's Highest Peak.

New York, Nov. 28.-Dr. Frederick Cook, of Brooklyn, reached here last night after a trip to Alaska, where he climbed Mount McKinley, the highest elevation in North America. So far as known, Dr. Cook and Edward Barrille, who accompanied him, are the only persons who have reached this peak. which rises 20,300 feet above sea level. 'We left New York on May 16." said Dr. Cook tonight, "for our trip to Alaska. There were 10 of us in the party that tried to scale Mount McKin-


"As a party we tried to climb the southwest side of the mountain, but found that we could not succeed. We tried to scale the southeast side, but found that also impossible, as the sides of the mountain at that point are almost perpendicular."

On Aug. 1, Dr. Cook sald that the party separated into smaller parties. Mr. Barrille, John Dokkin and himself formed one party. They started to climb on the northeast side of the mountains. After three days of hard and dangerous climbing the party reached a ridge in the mountain, where they paused for a rest.

After the third day they found the cutting steps in the snow.

After six days Dr. Cook and his companions, he said, had reached a height of 18,000 feet. They had no trouble in breathing until they reached this height, when the great altitude seriously inconvenienced them. At that point Mr. Dokkin found that he could go no further. Just before sunset every night the climbers, who used climbing implements, built snow houses that had sheltered them for the night and started out for another day's climb.

On the eighth day they reached the summit of the mountain. They had intended to stay on the peak for several nours, but found breathing there so difficult that they remained but tweny minutes. Dr. Cook said that he atributed their success to the lateness of he season and the exceptionally clear weather, which favored mountain

BELL OFFER DID NOT "TAKE" WELL

Figured To Be \$1,200 a Year Mr. D. M. Stewart Says His In-Worse Than the Present Agreement.

In the face of this fact, and the fact that there are 500 more 'phones in the city than when the present franchise was given, the Bell people ask the city to accept an agreement which is several hundred dollars per annum worse than the old one. The company now offers \$3,300 a year for a five-year franchise, against \$2,500 a year paid for the presen three-year franchise, which expires in a month.

But under this agreement the city will have to pay to the company about \$500 per annum for civic 'phones, which it now gets free of charge, and the Bell Company is to be allowed to charge the doctors, dentists and veterinaries the same rate as is charged other business and professional men.

As there are 72 doctors in London and quite a number of dentists and veterinaries, and all of them have 'phones, the company would reap an extra income of more than \$1,500 a year from this source alone, estimating an increase of \$20 a year on each 'phone. Figuring the offer out on this basis,

It is seen that while the company is offering the city \$800 more for the new franchise than was given for the old, the company is exacting terms which will take \$500 per year out of the city chest, and \$1,500 per annum out of certain classes of telephone subscribers. 

ONTARIO HEALTH

The Figures for October Show Large Increase in Typhoid Cases.

Toronto, Nov. 28.—Dr. Hodgetts, secretary of the provincial board of health, this morning handed out a statement of the health returns for October.

The increase in typhoid is 120 cases and The increase in typhoid is 120 cases and 68 deaths over September last; and 525 cases and 88 deaths over October a year ago. Diphtheria also had been more prevalent in the Province, there being 376 cases, with 41 deats. The number of the other diseases reported may be considered satisfactory. The total deaths from all causes are 2,370 from a population of 2,101,200, making a death rate of 13.5 per 1,000, and for the same period last year, 2,047 deaths were reported from a much less population, the death rate being 12.3. Fort William had the greatest number of typhoid cases. There were 65 cases of typhoid cases. There were 65 cases and 11 deaths. Toronto had 53 cases and 6 deaths, while Parry Sound also had 53 cases, but only 4 deaths. Hamilton had 47 cases and 6 deaths.

You will remember that they were here last winter. Their report was submitted last summer, and recommended the adoption conditions of China. The commissioners reviewed the fundamental laws and systems of government in all the nations they visited, and this was their verdict.


