





How many citizens today know that there are 418 vacant places in the city, of which 116 are new houses? This is 27 more than existed last year at this date. This does not follow that house rent will lower, because the taxes are not falling, but increasing. It will take approximately one million in 1908 taxes to cover the increase in salaries made by the civic boards of 1967. Where is all this to come from except from

Building materials must naturally be higher. Labor is not likely to be less, at least for some time, and as it lowers, material grows higher. It takes fuel to make either cement or brick. The price of fuel will not

recede but is bound to go higher. The same may be said of lumber. Hence, although we are over-stocked in good houses rents cannot be lowered. Money now commands 9 per cent on realty loans, hence, with high money, high taxes, high prices for material, the wise man, who rents, will make a long lease now. Later he must pay more, especially if all those bylaws carry. None of these things will stop London growing; she is a healthy and a very wealthy city. Is there another city anywhere, of our population, can support 15 chartered banks to say nothing of her loan companies? But, is it wise under present conditions to borrow, when by good generalship we can stand it off for a more favorable set




