A Desperate Resistance.
The German infantry is making a most determined resistance to retain this vital ground, and the Teuton artillery is retaliating heavily against the British guns.
Today's offensive will be known as the Battle of the Menin Road. Fair weather has improved the ground, but the mud still was deep and the whole territory covered with water-filled shell-holes, tangled barbed wire and shattered trees. The German defences were composed largely of concrete retrees. The German defences were composed largely of concrete redoubts, from which the enemy poured a wicked stream of bullets into the ranks of the advancing troops. Every little elevation and all the woods were choked with rapid fire guns.

The British encountered hard fighting at many places, but their magnificent artillery work had done much to make the first stage their drive easier.



HAIG SMASHES GERMANS AGAIN, TAKING VALUABLE POSITIONS: PLANS TO ISOLATE SUB BASES

THE WAR SITUATION

Early this morning the British infantry went "over the top" on a wide front east of Ypres and the Flanders offensive was on again. The rush was success ful at the outset, for the capture of positions of value were reported by Field Marshal Sir Douglas Haig during the forenoon and the progress made was described as satisfactory.

FOLLOWS LONG PAUSE.

The renewal of the offensive came af ter a long pause, in which intensive preparatory work had been carried on unceasingly. The fighting in this period, indeed, was such as to pile up heavy casualties on both sides, while the crushing drumfire from the British guns has been admitted by the Germans to have had a destructive effect on their posi-

Early reports did not outline definitely the extent of the front attacked, but a clue seems to have been furnished by Berlin, which yesterday reported the drumfire to be pounding the line from Houtholst Wood, some five miles south of Dixmude, to the River Lys, a distance of about 15 miles. British Troops At Dawn Today Carried Out a Successful Offensive To the East of Ypres.

London, Sept. 20 .- The British forces on the Belgian front attacked the German positions at 5:40 o'clock this morning east of Ypres. Field Marshal Haig reports that satisfactory progress was made, and that the British already have captured some valuable posi-

The text of the British official statement announcing that Field Marshal Haig had taken the offensive this morning says:

"We attacked at 5:40 o'clock this morning on a wide front east of Ypres. Satisfactory progress is reported. Our troops already have captured same valuable positions."

The new British offensive, for which recent reports of heavy artillery bom bardments, aerial activity and raids into the German lines had prepared the public, commenced at daylight this morning.

The attack was made on a wide front east of Ypres, and according to Field Marshal Haig's report, satisfactory progress was made and valuable positions captured.

This attack apparently is a continuation of the earlier offensive which was brought to a stop by bad weather and the necessity of bringing up guns for the assault which was made this morning.

The British barrage swept the country like a broom. The Germans kne w the attack was coming, but were unaware of its exact location.

CUTTING OFF SUB BASES. Field Marshal Haig's selection of the battlefront to the east of Ypres, in Belgium, as the scene of his latest offensive against the Germans indicates that it is a continuance of the expressed purpose of British commander-in-chief to force the armies of Crown Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria from the western coast of Belgium, and to cut the German submarine and airplane base on the North Sea from Zeebrugge to Nieuport, including Ostend.

OFFICIAL MESSAGE BLASTS ALL HOPE OF BOY'S SAFETY

Says That Lance-Corp. C. R. Belcher Was Killed In Action.

Official confirmation of the death in action of Lance-Corporal Cecil Russel Belcher today crushed hopes of his be-ing alive which had been aroused when press casualty lists reported him wounded and not dead. wounded and not dead.

An official telegram last week brought the first news of the young solder which had been received since he was reported missing after the batte of Vimy Ridge. It reported him to have been killed. On Monday the press casualty lists reported "Lance-Corporal C. R. Belcher-wounded" and it was this that first aroused hope that the report of his death was a mistake.

The Advertiser immediately telegraphed the Director of Records at Ottawa and received the following reply: "Latest report received states Lance-Corporal Cecil Russel Belcher, previously wounded and missing, now offi-cially reported killed in action, April 5, 1917."

Practical Housekeeping Hints

HOW TO USE LEFT-OVERS

European housewives are noted for knowing how to combine left-overs in such a way as to make most savory and nourishing dishes; indeed, it is a common saying that a European family can live on what the average family in this country throws away. Every scrap of food left over from a meal can

be used in some way. Learn to save money by avoid-If possible, buy for more than just one meal at a time; in other words, when buying plan to have something left over for another meal, particularly where the cooking takes a long time or where the

you time, labour, fuel and money. LEFT-OVER MEAT-Left-over beef, lamb, mutton and veal are excellent for hash, scalloped dishes, eroquettes, a loaf, and salads. Left-over beef, lamb or mutton makes excellent stews, with the addition

food can be reheated to advantage. This will save

of any left-over vegetables. Any left-over meat. vegetables and gravy can be used to make a meat pie. A left-over ham bone will greatly improve the flavour of pea or bean soup. Any kind of cold meat can be chopped and used in an omelet, or combined

with rice and tomatoes, used for scalloped dishes. LEFT-OVER VEGETABLES-Vegetables are not hurt by reheating. Left-over vegetables can be used for flavouring in soups, for making cream soups, scalloped dishes, vegetable hash, filling for an omelet, and for salads. The leaves of celery and any leftover parsley are valuable in the soup pot for flavouring. They can be dried out in a lukewarm oven and kept in a covered jar until needed. The celery roots can be saved for soup stock, and the water in which stewed celery has been cooked can be saved and used for cream of celery soup. The tops of summer beets and turnips, and the outer leaves of lettuce can each be cooked as spinach. They make excellent greens.

STALE BREAD-Small bits of stale bread can be slowly dried in the oven until crisp and brittle, then ground in a meat chopper and rolled. These bread crumbs should be kept in a covered jar, and can be used for frying croquettes, etc. Larger pieces of stale bread may be eaten with soup in place of crackers, or used to make croutons for soup. (Croutons are little squares of bread fried in fat. They are usually served with pea, bean and cream soups.) Small pieces and broken slices of stale bread may be used for stuffing, for griddle cakes, bread omelet

SOUR MILK OR CREAM-No sour milk or cream should be wasted. Put it into an earthen or glass jar, little by little, until you have half a cup or a cupful. As soon as it thickens, use it for cottage cheese, griddle cakes, or biscuits, cornbread or gin-




