Desperate Fighting Monday Afternoon in Suburbs of St. Petersburg---Soldiers Again Shoot to Kill.

TREPOFF NOW IN COMMAND OF ST. PETERSBURG

St. Petersburg, Jan. 25, 2:30 p.m.—
Governor-General Trepoff was in supreme command of the city today. Although a state of siege has not been actually proclaimed, it practically exists, the Emperor having conferred upon him as Governor-General almost absolute power, authorizing him to use the military, gendarmeries and the four papers named agreed to adopt the course indicated.
