



Getting Ready or Children's Day

It is none too soon to begin prepations for this happy event. Teach-sand church officers should aim to the ildren with well and sunny, to impress the joyfulnoss of relon upon plastic minds. This should the main idea in arranging a present of the children of the children's Day the "Month of Roses," with its wealth bloom to add beauty to the service.

Naturally, each church has it particular method of observance. In some the noming service is devoted to the primary scholars and the evening to the older children. Again, there may be a pecial meeting for the afternoon; usually, though, all the children of the church assemble at the regular morning iervice.

The decorations should be just as profuse and beautiful as possible. Fortunately, this is easy to arrange, with the woods and gardens full of lovely bloom. Let the windows be banked with flowers, gallery, pillars, choir rails twined with tak boughs or daisy chains, and chancel or pulpit turned to a bower of color. Paloma Del Mar, an artist of New York city.

This lady's interpretation of the Mile Venus is that her goddess-ship is no Venus at all, but none less than the Divine Mother of the ancient religions, in this statue Demeter of the Greeks mother of all the living, even Mater Deorum, Mother of the Gods.

Miss Del Mar declares the pose of the so called Venus shows that she must have been holding a somewhat heavy weight upon her left arm and supporting it by her shoulder when she had her picture taken. No human figure would assume such a posture

Del Mar has made a painting, heroic
size, of her ideal restoration of the
statue, with a child in its arms, holding the infant in the manner described. She says that in securing women models to stand for her in this attitude

models to stand for her in this attitude she had not the slightest difficulty, in placing them, as they naturally fell into the pose of their own accord while holding a child upon the left arm and against the left shoulder.

It will be observed that, as Miss Del Mar has restored the statue in her painting, it resembles a picture of the Madonna and Holy Child even to the nimbus around the head of each. This is precisely the artist's idea. The Divine Mother and Holy Child are a conception evolved by paganism agés be vine Mother and Holy Child are a conception evolved by paganism agés before the Christian era. The fathers of the Christian church adopted the tender and beautiful emblem among the symbols of the new faith. The nimbus or radiance around the heads of divinities was also employed as farback as heathen detites have been represented. The wall paintings of ruined Poripeli show pagan gods and god-deases with the halo, and Pompeli was destroyed in the year 79. Upon the

deases with the halo, and Pompeli was deastroyed in the year 79. Upon the mutilated heads of many ancient statues are still the fastenings of the destroyed nimbus.

Demeter, goddess of motherhood, one of the twelve deities of Olympus, was worshiped as the fertilizing and nourishing principle of nature. She was represented in painting and sculpture as a beautiful, nobly formed woman, yet "blooming with eternal youth" Her face is dignified, but always gentle, a different face from any of the various brands of Venuses, except indeed it be the Milo which is under discussion. It is a fact that when the mutilated Venus of Milo was found there were near it remains of the sculptured body and limbs of an infant.

Francesca Del Mar's art reputation was made in Europe, where she has frequently exhibited in Paris and London galleries under the name of Frank Paloma, thus conveying the impression







OLD LETTER FROM DICKENS:

Which Started Agitation That Eventually Brought About Abelition of Public Executions.

Public Executions.

Charles Dickens was so horrorstricken by the revolting spectacles seen
among the enormous crowd, gathered
to witness the hanging of feilow human
beings, that he wrote a powerful letter, which was published in The Dispatch, protesting against public executions. The great novelist's letter is of
particular interest as it not only gives
a graphic picture of the horrors of that
soene, but it started that agitation
which never ceased until nineteen years
later, in 1868, executions were no longlater, in 1868, executions were no long-er carried out in public. Charles Dick-Mr. Editor,-I was a witness of the

execution at Horsemonger lane. I went there with the intention of observing the crowd gathered to behold it, and I had excellent opportunities of doing so, at intervals all through the night, and continuously from daybreak until after the spectacle was over. I do not address you on the subject with any intention of discussing the abstract question of capital punishment or any of the arguments of its opponents or advocates. I simply wish to turn this dreadful experience to some account for the general good, by taking the readiest and most public means of adverting to an intimation given by Sir G. Grey in the last session of Parliament, that the Government might be induced to give its support to a measure making. that the Government magnet be induced to give its support to a measure making the infliction of capital punishment a private solemnity within the prison walls (with such guarantees for the last sentence of the law being inexorably and surely administered as should be theoremaking subject to the world and the support of be thoroughly satisfactory to the pub-lic at large) and of most earnestly be-seeching Sir G. Grey, as a solemn duty which he owes to society, and a respon-sibility which he cannot forever put away, to originate such a legislative change himself.

I believe that a sight so inconceivably awful as the wickedness and levity of the immense crowd collected at that execution could be imagined by no man, and could be presented in no heather lead under the second. heathen land under the sun. The hor-rors of the gibbet and of the crime which brought the wretched murderers to it faded in my mind before the atro-cious bearing, looks, and language of the assembled spectators. When I came the assembled spectators. When I came upon the scene at midnight, the shrllness of the cries and howls that were raised from time to time, denoting that they came from a concourse of girls and boys akready assembled in the best places, made my blood run cold. As the night went on, screeching and laughing and yelling in strong chorus of parodies on negro melodies, with substitution of "Mrs. Manning" for "Susannah," and the like, were added to these, When the day dawned, thleves, to these. When the day dawned, thieves low prostitutes, reffians and vagabonds of every kind flocked on to the ground, with every variety of offensive and foul behavior. Fightings, faintings, whistlings, unitations of Punch, brutal winstings, initiations of Punch, brutal jokes, tumultuous demonstrations of indecent delight when swooning women were dragged out of the crowd by the police with their dresses disordered, gave a new zest to the general enter-



BY DOMESTIC FOES

MUNICIPAL CORRUPTION RIFE

FRev. Dr. Talmage Preaches His Fourth of July Sermon and Patriotically Attempts to Induce the People to Scotch the Evils In the Body Politic -Where and How to Begin the Crusade Pointed Out In Clear-Cut

Los Angeles, Cal., July 1.-In this ermon the preacher makes a powerful appeal for an independence which shall result in the redemption of our cities from official corruption. text is Jeremiah vii, 17, "Seest thou not what they do in the cities of Judah?"

This is the Sunday preceding the national holiday. This is the hour when thousands of patriotic sermons are being preached over this land, most of them in eulogistic strain, I want this morning to place my finger upon the most flagrant weakness of our national life. This is not the weakness of national or state legislation. It is the weakness of municipal corruption, which we find in most of the large cities scattered over our land. cancer which is gnawing and eating toward the vitals of man's physical body is even more fatal in its results than the dangers which are threatening him from without. Indeed, the only enemies which are threatening to undermine our national foundations are dermine our national foundations are domestic foes and not foreign invaders.

Most great statesmen are as loath to enter an international controversy as is the present head of the German em-pire. Some years ago the young emper-or was looking at the Vereschagin pictures depicting Napoleon's invasion of Russia. He said, "Vereschagin, never did the judgment of God so plainly strike man as it struck Napoleon at Moscow." Then he locked a little longer at the pictures and said, "Veres chagin, your pictures are an excellent corrective of warlike appetites." Then he looked a little longer and again said, Vereschagin, the statesman who would needlessly plunge his country into an international strife is a fool." anto an international strife is a fool."
Emperor William shudders at the thought of war. The great statesmen, both trans and cis Atlantic, have the same dread. The one great purpose of their lives is to prevent international complications. SIR HECTOR LANGEVIN

Only Two Still Survive Now-Sir Heotor Was Bong Leader of Conservative Party of Quebec, and Long Held a Portfolio-Minister of Public Works In Cabinets of Sir John Macdonald and Premier Abbott.

the history of both French and British regimes. In his own career he was true to the traditions of his race and family, and took a place in the life of his country not unworthy of his name and lineage. Few Canadians have occupied

lineage. Few Canadians have occupied a more prominent position in public affairs, and none have done more to soften the asperities of racial and religious differences.

Mr. Langevin was born Aug. 25, 1826, in the City of Quebec, the son of Jean Langevin, assistant Civil Secretary under the Earl of Gosford and Lord Sydenham, Governor-General of Canada. His mother was Sophie Scholastique La Force, daughter of Major Pierre ada. His mother was Sophie Scholasti-que La Force, daughter of Major Pierre La Force, an officer of distinction in the American War of 1812, whose grandfather was acting commodore of the British fleet on Lake Ontario dur-ing the American Revolution War. He was educated at the Quebec Sem-

His Marriage.

In 1854 he married Justine, eldest daughter of Lieut-Col Charles H. Tetu, J.P. Two years later he was chosen representative of Palace Ward in the Quebec City Council, and subsequently became chairman of the Waterworks Committee. In the following year he was elected Mayor of Quebec, a position which he filled for four successive years.

tion which he filled for four successive years.

In 1857, besides being honored with the chief magistracy of his native city, he was also elected member of Parliament for the county of Dorchester. He very naturally was found supporting the Administration, one of the leaders of which was the gentleman at whose hands he had received his political, as well as his legal, training. The Macdonald-Cartier Ministry, however, held life by a very precarious tenure, and as the difficulties thickened about it, was forced to resign. Then Mr. George Brown was called to office, but had to relinquish it in three days.

The old Ministry was recalled to power and a readjustment took place. On the 30th of March, 1864, Mr. Langevin became a Queen's Counsel, and on the same day entered the Tache-Macdonald Administration as Solicitor-General-East. Two years later he became Postmaster-General, which office he retained till Confederation the following year.

In the Confederation movement he

suavity and broad statesmanship which has been shown so prominently in later years came into light. While Sir George Cartier was energetic, forceful and patriotic, he had not the savoirfaire of Mr. Langevin, and he often exasperated where he should have conclilated.

In the first Dominion Administration Mr. Langevin was Secretary of State, and the following year he was created a C. B. civil. In 1869 he assumed the portfolio of Public Works, and the next year was created a Knight Commander of the Roman Order of Pope Gregory the Great.

During Sir George Cartier's absence in England in 1873, Mr. Langevin acted as leader of the French-Canadian Conservative party, and upon the death of his chief he became the permanent leader. In 1873, on the downfall of Sir John Macdonald's Administration, he resigned office. At the general elections in 1878 he was an unsuccessful candidate for Rimouski, but Mr. William MacDougall, the member for Three Rivers, made way for him, and he was chosen for the vacated constituency by acclamation.

In the new Conservative Government he became Postmaster-General till 1879, when he became again Minister of Public Works, and retained the position till his retirement from public life. Regarding his brilliant parts and the service he had rendered his country and the French-Canadian people, the Queen conferred upon him the knighthood of the Order of St. Michael and St. George.

Mr. Langevin took no active part in political life after 1891, the year of what was known as the Langevin-McGreevy scandal. His friends assert that through loyalty to his party and his leader he took upon himself far more than his share of responsibility for those unhappy revelations. He continued to sit in the Hobse of Commons till 1896, but only addressed the House two or three times during that period. In 1896 he retired from public life, and since that time lived quietly at his home in Quebec.

Sir Hector Louis Langevin, P.C., C.B., K.C.M.G., K.C., LL.D., whose death was recently amounted, was descended from one of the oldest of French-Canadian families, renowned in the church and in the State throughout

He was educated at the Quebec Seminary and began the study of law in 1846 in the offices of the late Hon. A. N. Morin, in Montreal, on whose retirement from practice he entered the offices of the late Sir George Etienne Cartier. In 1850 he was called to the bar of Lower Canada.

He displayed decided literary tastes and was strongly interested in public affairs, and even when a student contributed frequently to the press. At the age of twenty-one he accepted the edi-

buted frequently to the press. At the age of twenty-one he accepted the editorship of Les Melanges Religieux, Montreal, where he made his mark. Subsequently he edited The Journal of Agriculture, and 1857 he became editor of the Courrier du Canada for a short time. He was a great reader and a well-informed man.

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
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

VANISHED TREASURES.

Masterpieces of Art That Are Lost

The "Venus de Milo," which has been the Louvre for many years is, as all the world knows, an imperfect piece of sculpture, though it is the greatest treasure of its kind the world has ever seen. A great reward would be given the man who could find the missing parts. About 1878 the most important of them—the right arm—came to light in London and was proved by experts to be genuine. The owner, however, refused to part with it and concealed it for fear it would be stolen. Unfortunately he died without revealing its hiding place, so it is as much lost as ever.

A bronze drinking cup which was stolen from an Egyptian temple in 1739 and brought to Europe has mirac ulously disappeared. On it is engraved the whole history of the Pharaohs, and it could easily be sold for \$100,000. In fact, the French government offered a reward of \$14,000 for its discovery, but the famous cup has vanished, probably forever.

Another treasure which has vanished in as strange a way is the Marcella vase of the Dresden collection. This is the only piece missing from the famous Dresden Marcella collection, the value of which is said to be \$75,000. It bears the cross arrows and the lion's head. Not long ago the vase was said to be in England, but, be that as it may, the person who rediscovers this treasure may command any price in

reason for it. How it is possible that a treasure so large as a painting could be lost sight of entirely is not easily explained, but this has often happened. One of Reyn-olds' naintings "Countries of Donky" olds' paintings, "Countess of Derby," which is considered his best portrait, has disappeared. Not long after it was painted it disappeared from the collection of the Earl of Derby and has never been heard of since, though it would bring \$150,000 to the finder. There are also two Vandykes and a Rembrandt missing, for which collectors are willing to pay \$200,000. The Earl of Crewe would give a large sum for the return of a Cupid which some vandal cut from the portrait of the former Countess of Crewe and her son. who was painted as the sprite.




