STEAMBOATS COLLIDE IN A VERY DENSE FOG

Both Badly Damaged By Terrific Crash Near Vancouver

Hindoos in a Panic-White Passengers Behaved • Splendidly

Vancouver, Oct. 19.-The C. P. R. gulf ferry steamer Charmer, plying between Vancouver and Victoria, orashed into the C. P. R. Pacific liner between Vancouver and Victoria, crashed into the C. P. R. Pacific liner Tartar off the sandheads of the Fraser at 6 o'clock on Thursday evening in a dense log. The Charmer crawled into port yesterday morning with herbow stove in for several yards, and the ocean liner was beached at the southern point of English Bay with a hole five feet wide on the port bow and her hold full of water. The Charmer was bound from Victoria to this port on the regular daily run. The Tartar was bound from Vancouver to the Orient. The Charmer came through Plumber's Pass at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. She ran into a fog and reduced speed. The skipper noticed two steamers drawing too close, and signalled: "I am going to port." The Tartar was then well off the starboard bow of the Charmer. port of the liner 30 feet abaft of her
bow, cutting through the hull above
and below the water line. The Charmeer's steel bow and wooden upper works
crumpled up like kindling wood. Water poured in, but the collision bulkhead held, averting immediate danger.
An old sail was swung into position
on the Charmer's bow and ahe was
headed for the Narrows. The fog
was so thick that the attempt to enter the halbor was temporarily abandoned. The Charmer's passengers
were safely transferred to the Tartar
by the boate of both vessels.

The arrangements were perfect. The
passengers behaved splendidly, and
there were some amusing incidents.
An old English gentleman, ruddy and
bearded, muffled in a coonskin coat,
stood near the rail, and a lady accompanied by her little son four or five
years old. The boy eyed the old gentleman ourlously, planting himself
before him, and piped the inquiry
"Please, sir, are you Santa Clans?"
In the burst of laughter that followed all anxiety was forgotten. Fiftyfive passengers boarded the Charmer,
some came ashore in the boats, and
others were brought in by the Nani
amin ferry steamer Joan. Aboard the
Tartar were 179 Hindoos being deported. When the collision occurred
they rushed up from below, and tried
to reach the boats, but were met by
the officers, the Chinese crew and the
passengers and beaten back. When
they had been quieted the crew lowered
the boats. There was no panic among
the white passengers.

Carney; boots and shoes.

Scantlebury's stock was partially
insured, but estimates his loss over
insurance at fully \$18,000. The building is ovened by George Wallbridge,
and is fully insured. The other places
mentioned were fully insured.

The firemen did excellent work, one
of them, J. Campbell, being avercome
by smoke, but was rescued in sime.

The cause of the fire is unknown,

FREIGHT SHEDS BURNED.

Poet of Empire Makes Earnest Appeal For Closer Union

Toronto, Oct. 19.—Mr. Rudyard Kip-ling addressed the Canadian Club last night and was received with great

last night and was received with great enthusiasm.

"Every nation," said Mr. Kipling, "within the Empire, and especially the Big Four, have contributed daring and sacrifice. History stirred with no more romantic interest than when its pages told of the courage, the daring and the enterprise of Canadian gloners. But pioneers were still upon the earth. They were add lighthearted, are to be found to day in South Africa and Australia."

He warned the people living in the older parts of Canada to beware of pessimism. "Having had miracles worked in your favor you must not conclude that the age of miracles is past. You may smile at the enthusiasm of some men from the bush, living at some jumping-off place, who wants you to believe that his place will soon be a second Toronto, a second Johannesburg, or a second Melbourne, as the case may be, but you will cease to smile when his farm becomes the centre of a thriving town and you learn that your rival in business has received a great big order for merchandise, as per specifications attached.

"I tell you, gentlemen, that while,

CHECK FOR PROVINCE.

O'Brien Sends \$51,992 to Govern-ment on Account of Rayalty. ment on Account of Royalty.

Toronte, Oct. 17.—The Provincial Exchequer has been enriched by the reception of a cheque for \$51,992 from the O'Brien Mining Co. This sum represents the royalty for three months, ending Sept. 30. It is collected by the Government under an agreement made last year, whereby, the province is entitled to 25 per cent. of the value of all ore mined by the company, less certain allowances for the expenses of operation. Since December last \$222,945 have been paid into the Treasury under the contract.

Early in the afternoon the guests invited to attend the opening, together with the press representatives, began to arrive at the towers, and at 2.30 the whole party conducted by the manager of the station, Mr. Vyvyan, set out on a tour of inspection.

The boiler-house, engine rooms and work shop were visited in turn. Their relation to the operation of the plant being explained en tour. The operation offices were finally reached, and a halt made to await the appearance of the inventor.

No one was allowed to actually enter the operating room, although the party were permitted to view through a window the work going on within. Marconi, assisted by another operator, could be seen seated at a table, alternately receiving and transmitting messages. Simultaneously with the pressing of the key of the transmitting instrument a blinding flash of blue flame was seen to be given off from a contrivance situated at the far end of the room, while a tearing sound not unlike the twanging of a deep bass string answered the flash as it traversed the wires overhead. The messager where recorded by means of a magnetic telephone receiver fastened to the head of the operator and connected to the receiving apparatus of the station. After an half hour's wait the inventor appeared and publicly gave utterance to the announcement previously given.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier sent the following message to the people of Great Britain via the bronicle:

Sir Hiram specified its lack of privacy and therefore uselessness in time of war, as the enemy could rig up a tower and tap the messages as they were going through the air. Marconi says he is now in continuous communication between the old and new worlds and he has satisfied himself from experiment that the messages cannot be intercepted by rival companies.

Fourth Arrest at White Horse. Vancouver, Oct. 18.—A Dawson despatch says: "John F. McDonald, a Dawson jeweler, was arrested at White. Horse on Wednesday on the arrival of the steamer Selkirk from Dawson, charged with complicity in the robbery of \$49,000 of Tanana gold from registered mail in Dawson last July. This makes four arrests in the case."


