ACTION OF REAL WAR IS EXECUTED AT VERA

MEXICAN GENERAL WAVED FAREWELL

Was First to Get Out of Vera Cruz and His Family Followed Later - Dangerous For Anyone to be at Large in City-They Shoot From All Angles and From House Tops---Lots of Excitement.

WASHINGTON, April 22.—The paraphrase of a despatch from Vera Cruz was made public to-day at 3 a.m. by the Navy Department:

"It is reported that Commandant General Maas left Vera Cruz in a carriage, that his family followed in another carriage, and that he had not been heard from since. The Mexican troops were turned loose to act as they pleased, few if any officers remaining. "It is said that there is some looting, making it dangerous for natives and foreign-

ers. At the time of this despatch the Mexicans are firing a 75-milimeter machine gun at corner of Callestran Morelos and Main street. Col. Cerrillo was wounded early in battle. "A telegram from Vera Cruz reports the town quiet except for occasional picket shots. A few refugees are still in consulate.

"It is believed the Mexican soldiers on the house-tops will escape under cover of darkness, and there will be no more fighting.

"A second messenger was sent to General Maas again requesting him to stop firing and prevent shelling of the town. At the time this telegram was sent the messenger had

When Federal Troops Fired on United States Troops a State of War Was Brought Into Existence---Warlike Scenes in Mexico Give Rise to Belief That Stubborn Fight May be Looked For---Supplies Are Cut Off.

NEW YORK, April 22.- A Washington despatch to the Tribune says: The United States is at war with the republic of Mexico. This admission was made by the Secretary of the Navy, on behalf of the Administration, and by several Democratic senators on the floor of the Upper House yesterday. Secretary Daniels, while contending that the seizure of the cusotms house at Vera Cruz was not an act of war, asserted that the firing on the Americans by the Federal troops was, so that it no longer could be denied that a state of war existed.

Mr. Daniels also said that the German ship carrying munitions of war had arrived at Vera Cruz yesterday, but had not entered the harbor. It was his understanding that she had on board 15,000,000 rounds of ammunition and 200 machine guns. It has been reported also that several hundred railway cars were being held in

readiness at Vera Cruz to transport these munitions to Mexico City. Following a conference at the White House last night, Secretary Bryan went to the German embassy and discussed the situation as it affects the German ship with the German ambassador.
