
Clay Furthed by Electricity. Electricity is being more and more used for the purification of kaolin and other por-celain clays. The clay is affed on to a rapidly revolving horizontal plate, which is surrounded with powerful electro-magnets, which rotain the particles of iron. From this the clay passes to a second plate which removes the last traces. The process is said to be comparatively cheap and very rapid, and since its introduction many clays hithorto rejected as containing too much iron have become of value for the manufac-ture of pottery. 
