
MURDERER TO DIE.

Negro Boy Convicted After a Quick Trial

at Newark.

York, Jan. 22 .- George Wilson, the negro bellboy, was found guilty of murder in the first degree by a jury in the Court of Oyer and Terminer at In the Court of Oyer and Terminer at Newark yesterday. He had confessed that he killed Frederick R. Romer in the Park Hotel, Orange, on December 13 last. Judge Ten Eyck sentenced him to death in the electric chair in the week beginning March 2.

13 last. Judge Ten Eyek sentenced him to death in the electric chair in the week beginning March 2. Wilson was placed on trial at 10 o'-clock in the morning and it was 5.45 o'-clock—fifteen minutes after the jury retired—when Albert Mink, the 10re-man, announced the finding. James I. Donaghy, captain of detectives in Phil-adelpnia, identified a copy of the con-fession which he said Wilson made to him. The statement described Wilson's actions in the hotel on the night of the tragedy. It related how Romer heard the negro in his rooms and con-tinued: "He (Romer) got out of bed and says, 'I ain't doing anything much.' I says 'I am going out right away.' Then he went to the washetand and started to open it. I says, 'We won't have any trouble if you leave me go out.' So I starts to pull him away from the door. He had nis back right up against the door when he reaches for the bureau drawer. I ask-ed him if he was going to kill me. I says, 'Well, I don't want to die.' 



IT IMPLIES TOO MUCH.

The letter written by Chairman Leitch, of the Ontario Railway Board, on the subject of railway jurisdiction may be eminently calculated to serve the imme diate purposes of the Toronto interests, which are desperately fighting the extension of the Radial Railway, but the more it is studied the less one is inclined to regard it as creditable to Mr. Leitch's usual good common sense of legal acumen.

Briefly, it asserts in effect that no Dominion legislation regarding agreements between electric railways and municipalities can be enforced.

Consider what this means. Lo, these many years agreements between rail ways under Dominion jurisdiction and municipalities throughout the country have been in existence covering a mu tiplicity of arrangements; and Govern ments, the people and the courts seem to have been blind to this discovery of Mr. Leitch. But then, Mr. Leitch refers only to "electric" railways. Supposing the various steam roads were electrified, would such change in motive power cancel all the agreements into which they may have entered, or render them unenforcable. And if Mr. Leitch's argument is to be admitted, why should it not? Is it to be conceived that the jur isdiction to enforce these agreements depends on whether the motive power is no hint steam or electricity? There is of such a thing in the constitution of the statutes. It would seem to be as mable to say that the validity of the laws and the power of the courts to enforce them would be affected by the question of whether the fuel used were coal or wood, or whether the engineer were white or black.

If the Dominion Government can legis late to enforce agreements with steam roads, whence does Mr. Leitch deduce the idea that it is incapable of effective ly legislating as to electric roads?

If Mr. Leitch wishes us to under stand that he means that only Ontario legislation as to agreements with railroad's in Ontario can be enforced, his claim is a marvelously wide one. Concede it, and at once Dominion control of any railway whatever becomes ineffective and impracticable. It is, in short, from that point of view a claim for the absolute withdrawal of the Dominior authority from railway matters, and a turning over thereof to the various Provinces and municipalities. He was thrown out into the street with only his shirt on, and wandered about all the rest of the night, shivering with cold, until he reached the office of the commissary of police, where he related his adven-ture.

He stated that he was the solution of Admiral Rataschievitch, commander of the imperial yacht, adding that he had fied from Russia, as he had been a participator in a political plot. Ratas-chievitch, it was alleged, had led a vicious and irregular life at Kishineff, where he was an officer of Cossacks. TRAGEDY IN A STORE

WOMAN SHOT A MAN, THEN COM-MITTED SUICIDE.

Mary B. Clark Killed Frank Brady in Restaurant of New York Department Store, Then Shot Herself- Had Three Revolvers With Her.

New York, Jan. 22 .- Several hun dred persons, most of whom were wo-

dred persons, most of whom were wo-meh shoppers, witnessed a murder and suicide in the restaurant of a large Broadway department store to-day.⁴ Frank Brady, an advertising solicitor for a newspaper was shot five times and instantly killed by Mrs. Mary Roberts Clark, "a manicurist, of 219 West 133rd street. The woman then shot herself and died in the hospital to which she was taken.

Drawing an-other revolver from her mulf, the wo-man quickly fired three shots into her own breast and fell backward on the floor. Her action was so sudden and unexpected that witnesses of the shoot-ing sat transfired until the last shot was fired. Brady was dead when they reached him, but the woman was still alive, and was hurried to a hospital, where she died within a short time. Besides the two revolvers used in the shooting, a third revolver, fully loaded, was found concealed in Mrs. Clark's mulf. SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST **Homestead Regulations**

A NY even numbered section of Domin-tion Lanods in Manitoba or the North-west Provinces, excepting 3 and 26, not re-served, may be homesteaded by any person the soile head of a family, or make sound readom, of 160 acres, more or less.

Application for homestead entry must be made in persor by the applicant at a Do-minion Lands Agency or Sub-agency. Entry by proxy may, however, be made at an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

an intending homesteader. An application for entry or cancellation made personally at any Sub-agent's office may be wired to the Agent by the Sub-agent, at the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram such application is to have prior-ity and the land will be held until the me-cessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail.

A homesteader whose entry is not the ubject of cancellation proceedings, may, ubject to the approval of Departument, re-nouish it in favour of father, mother, son, aughter, brother or sister if eligible, but o un one else, on filing declaration of aban-comment.

DUTIES-A settler is required to perform the duties under one of the following plans: (1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year dur-ing the term of three years.

As the term of three years. (3) A bouncesteader may, if he so desires, beform the required residence duties by lim, net on farming land owned solely by him, he vicinity of his honzestead. Joint owner-hibb in land will not meet this requirement, (3) If the facher (or mother, if the father s deceased) of a honzesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by lim, not less than eight? (80) acres in extent, not be vicinity of the noncestead, or upon a homesteade entered for by him in the vicinity, uch homesteader may perform his own resi-lence duties by living with the father (or mother).

(4) The term "vicinity" in the two pre-cedims paragraphs is defined at meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line, ex-clusive of road allowances crossed in the measurement. 5) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farm-ing land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention. Before making application for patent the titler must give six months' notice in writ-ar to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands Cottawa, of his intention to do so.



London, Jan. 23 .- The rate of discount of the Bank of England was to-day reduced from 5 to 4 per cent. 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

Output Smaller This Year-Big Decline in German Shipbuilding-Britain Also Buys Abroad-Too Many Alien Seamen on British Vessels.

London, Jan. 23.-The statistics of the world's shipbuildings in 1907, just issued hurt. by Lloyd's Register, shows a total output of mercantile tonnage by the Unit-ed Kingdom of 1,742,365, being a deerease of 220,200 tons as compared with the audience. 


