It has already been announced that, with the sovereign approval of His Holiness the Pope, there has been formed, in Rome, an International Committee for the purpose of promoting a Solemn Act of Thanksgiving and devotion, to Jesus Christ, Our Redeemer, on the completion of the present century, and the beginning of the coming one. Giving practical effect to his kind wishes, and in order to insure a wider scope and greater efficacy to the labors of the Committee, His Holiness has thought good to appoint Cardinal Domenico Jacobini as its Honorary President. His Eminence has already been pleased to place himself in correspondence with the Patriarchs, Archbishops, Bishops, and Ordinaries of the Universal Church, by the following letter.

Most Illustrious and Right Reverend Lord:

Doubtless you have been apprised of a scheme set on foot by persons of unquestioned piety whereby on the occasion of the present century, the faithful scattered through the world, should manifest in a solemn manner, by a common demonstration of faith their love and gratitude towards the Most Holy Redeemer of the Human Race. Their design has been to second the wishes of His Holiness Leo XIII., who looks for peace and concord to mark the close of the present century, and when in the coming one, under the invocation of Christ God and Man, His Holiness has approved most heartily of the project, and there has been formed in Rome a committee, chosen from among the representatives of all nations, to bring it to a successful issue. And now it has seemed good to the Supreme Pontiff, to appoint me, unworthy as I am, as Honorary President of that committee. Yet I am far from saying that I do not gladly and willingly accept this honorable position, for surely nothing can be more pleasing or more acceptable to me, than to seize any opportunity during the few remaining years of my life, of employing all my energies for the glory of our Saviour, and that more especially at the close of a century such as this has been. A century, I would observe, when men puffed up with an untruthful science, in the delirium of their feverish minds, blush not to call into question the origin of Christianity, and dare with unparadonable temerity to look upon the Divine Person of Our Lord Himself as an idle fable. To repair these crying insults received by Him, to appease His Divine Majesty, and to celebrate with fitting praise, at the opening of the century, the brightness of God's glory and the figure of His Substance; this is the work that calls for our every diligence and energy. And thus it will assuredly come to pass with all our forces banded together, that what with unwonted demonstrations of piety and expiation, the concurrence of able writers—repeated articles in the best periodicals—and lastly the public attestation of love towards the Roman Pontiff—this grand solemnity will be celebrated amid the universal joy of all nations. Greater concord of Christian hearts will ensue—the wondrous unity of the church and in particular the bond of perfect union between the faithful and the Head of Christendom will be brought into stronger relief. So that when the standard of the cross in which alone is salvation, shall have been exalted in every quarter of the world, humanity may come forth unbarred from the perils of imminent destruction, and at the beginning of the new century, may enter happily on the path of peace and prosperity. I cherish the hope that your Lordship, together with all the other bishops, will kindly extend your valuable assistance to me and to the committee formed in Rome, and will proceed without delay to the selection of a diocesan committee for this same object. Before we arrange together the measures to be taken, I await your Lordship's answer, and meanwhile fervently pray our Lord to grant you all your heart's desires. Rome, 15 April, 1897. 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THE DANCING PILGRIMS. Here is his account of the dance which forms so prominent a feature of this Eghternach pilgrimage, occurring during the procession: "The boys come first, and jump up and down with the music. This perpetual jump they keep up all along the route, which, please to remember, is not far from two miles in length. After them come the other dancing pilgrims, who have a step of their own. How shall I describe it? We must confine our attention to one section of the pilgrims, who, headed by their own band, may serve as a sample of the rest. Well fancy some eight hundred men and women of all ages, the old bent with years and gray-haired; the young full of life and vigor; the sick supported by their friends—all dancing in time to the music, three steps forward and two steps backward; or sometimes five steps forward and three backward. They are all silent and dance gravely with their hands by their sides, four or five in a row. All is recollection, and seriousness is marked upon every face. No roughness, no horse-play. There is nothing the most captious could lay hold of as savouring of dissipation. The whole thing is evidently done in a deeply religious spirit. Forward and backward they go, like the flow and ebb of a sea. There is no appearance of superstition or fanaticism, but the whole scene is full of faith. There is a solemnity about the whole proceeding very foreign to one's preconceived ideas; and, far from there being anything to laugh at or to excite ridicule, the lookers-on can hardly refrain from tears, so touching and so edifying is the spectacle of the dancing pilgrims." Fr. Taunton tells us that the origin of this queer Eghternach dancing pilgrimage is a matter of dispute. Some date it back to the penitential processions that were inaugurated in the middle of the fourteenth century, when the terrible plague known as the black death was devastating Europe. Others see in it an outgrowth of the St. Vitus dance; but our writer thinks that its real origin in all probability dates from St. Willibrord's own days, when, so history tells us, it was not an unusual performance in places for an overjoyed flock to

welcome back from a missionary tour a beloved bishop by a procession whose members danced with very gladness at seeing their pastor home again. "Whatever may have been its origin," Fr. Taunton adds, "it remains an edifying relic of the days of faith. It still survives in spite of the scoffs of unbelievers who have never seen it. I cannot imagine any one, no matter what he professes in the way of religion, witnessing the dancing pilgrimage of Eghternach without being profoundly touched and moved to contrition. Many have come to scoff, and, like the centurion, have returned, striking their breasts."

TERMS OF INTEREST TO CATHOLIC READERS.

(Sacred Heart Review.)

AN EVENT AT EIGHTERNACH.

One of the most readable articles in the current issue of the Catholic World is Rev. Eghard L. Taunton's paper on "Eghternach and the Dancing Pilgrims," which gives us an account of an annual religious happening that takes place on Whit Tuesday at Eghternach, a town in the grand duchy of Luxemburg, and which more than one non-Catholic writer, not understanding the real character of the event, have endeavored to use as a weapon of ridicule against Catholicism. Fr. Taunton was present two years ago at the pilgrimage, whereat this dancing takes place, to Eghternach, where there is a shrine in memory of St. Willibrord, who left, in 690, England to carry Christianity into Friesland; and his description of the place and the dancing is, consequently, reliable. Of the shrine to the local saint he tells us that the basilica which bears his name adjoins the Benedictine monastery at Eghternach, was founded by the saint, and chosen by him for his last resting place, held his remains from 739 up to the time of the French revolution. The present church dates from 1017, in which year it was begun, and it was finished in 1030, though it has undergone several alterations since that date. Lately restored to Catholic worship, it has been magnificently decorated, and the pious folk of Eghternach hope that before long the saint's relics, which now rest in the parish church, will be restored to their first resting place. Of the parish church Fr. Taunton writes that it is small and presents a poor appearance in contrast with the magnificent basilica. Its site is a fine one, he adds, but the walls of the edifice are damp and discolored with age; the altar rude, with a clear passage all around it, presumably to allow a better view of the reliquary wherein, under the altar, the saint's remains are enshrined; and he informs us that, apart from the hair shirt which St. Willibrord wore as a penance, and which is preserved in the church, there is little else of interest in it.

GOLDEN MEDALS AND GOLDEN DEEDS.

One of those ceremonies that give proof of the brotherhood of man despite the quarrels of monarchs and nations, took place in France last week. It was the presentation of gold medals sent by the English Government to the people of the Island of Molene, off the coast of Brittany, in acknowledgement of their touching humanity regarding the ill-fated steamer, the Drummond Castle. When the steamer sank there were more than two hundred souls on board, and most of the bodies were washed ashore at Molene and a couple of adjacent islands. They were treated most reverently by the pious peasantry, laid out and buried in Christian fashion, and over their remains the Catholic cure held a religious service and delivered a profoundly sympathetic and moving address. Most of those drowned were of a fervent faith, and the charity of the poor islanders under the circumstances evoked the liveliest feeling of gratitude among the relatives of the victims. It was suggested that this feeling should take on a more substantial form than mere sentiment, and the late Archbishop of Canterbury and many other prominent men in the English Church took pains to give this idea effect. The Government has now given official expression to it also. The incident is one to stir Catholic hearts to the core, awakening thoughts of the beauty of that religion to which it is their privilege to belong such as cannot fail to compensate for the pain of bigoted misrepresentation and unjust aspersion. If the hate which is aroused between different nations when they are stirred by the unnatural frenzy of war be disengaged to our common humanity, the love which manifests itself in such noble deeds is proof that there is an underlying feeling, after all, without which the bonds of the world could not hold together. The charity of Christ still urges us, despite the malice of sectaries and infidels, and, hoping in its continuance, we may look calmly into the troubled mist of the unknown future.—Standard and Times.

APOSTLESHIP OF PRAYER.

The episcopal jubilee of His Eminence Cardinal Vaughan, of Westminster, comes appropriately in this jubilee year, and the event will be suitably marked in October by the Catholic community.

Father Bernard Vaughan, who had arranged to be back in England by the 1st of May, has been detained in Rome for a time by His Holiness the Pope. In a recent address with the Pope Father Vaughan received from the Holy Father the rosary he had been using for many years.

The late Princess Volkarsky, who died about two months ago, was a Catholic, having been received into the Church when abroad, though this fact was not generally known in Russia. Before her death she sent for the French priest of St. Catherine's, on the Nevy, to administer the last Sacraments. Determined that there should no longer be any concealment of her religious faith, it is reported that she ordered the whole household to be assembled to witness the act, and even ordered all the doors and windows to be opened as a sign that all the world might know. Thus did the courageous lady bear witness to the true faith and to her rights to liberty of conscience. Endeavors were made to have the funeral ceremonies performed according to Orthodox rites, but Mons. Paladine, the metropolitan refused to allow the ceremony, as the Princess had abjured the Russian Church; so they were performed in presence of the Grand Duke and Grand Duchess Vladimir and members of the Russian aristocracy. Had the event happened to an obscure person in the province, the priests would have been exiled and the church closed. This is the first bold stroke for liberty of conscience in Russia, and up to the present the authorities have ignored it.

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

JOHN BURROWS aged fifteen years was killed at the Springfield, N. S. mines on Saturday last, by falling stones and earth.

BURLIANS broke into Hunt's bank at Brookbridge, Ont., on Wednesday night last, and stole \$1,000 cash and \$9,000 bonds.

MISS ELIZA PALMER was found dead on the Marsh at Middle Sackville, N. B., on Thursday last. She was a sister of ex-Judge Palmer of St. John.

JOHN H. YORK, a blacksmith from Bear River, N. S., blew out the gas in the Duffin Hotel, St. John, the other evening, with the result that he died.

The Government at Ottawa have taken over Monday for ministerial business. This leaves no private members' day, except Monday next which is reserved.

A SLIGHT earthquake shock felt in Montreal at 10.13 last Thursday night, caused considerable alarm, dishes and windows shaking and people rushing into the street. The shock was of about five seconds duration.

A NUMBER of the parishioners of St. Theresa's waited on their esteemed pastor, Rev. M. J. McMillan, on Saturday evening May 15th, and presented him with a beautiful baggy and an appropriate address. The Rev. gentleman made a suitable and feeling reply.

The well known millionaire, J. H. R. Molson, President of Molson's Bank, Montreal, died at that place on Friday last. Molson was a benefactor of McGill to the amount of a quarter of a million dollars. By instructions in Molson's will the relatives will take the body to Boston, where it will be cremated, and the ashes brought back to Montreal.

Devotion devolves to the Cathedral of Pisa, Italy, on Sunday last, at the unveiling of an image of the Blessed Virgin, a candle fell and set fire to the building. A panic ensued, and during the rush for the doors seven persons were killed and several injured, some seriously. The fire was immediately extinguished. The damage to the building was slight.
