They speak of Moses and pretend to be descendants of the lost tribes of Israel ; they tell fairy tales about huge bears or they relate traditions of ancient wars. They are very anxious to know if white people ever kill each other as the Indiana used to do. "Wien you understand

comings. I was for seven years alone, east of Athabasca Lake, 150 miles from the nearest priest. This was one of the hardest trials of my life. Occasionally I could visit the nearest neighbor, my o'mpanion in those missions, but to do so 1 had to travel with my dogs from Monday morning till Saturday. In summer, when the ice breaks up in Athabasca Lake, about the feast of St John the Baptist, Jane 24 h, I used to spend two months with my companion at the principal mission house. Bay when we were separated, if I wanted, to go to confession, I had to travel a week, which gave me plenty of time for preparation, and then travel back another week, which gave me plenty of time to perform my penance.
