WEDNESDAY, January 10, 1912. Consul Benedict on our Fisheries.

U. S. Consul Benedict has furnish ed his Government with a review of the Newfoundland Fisheries. He gives the codfish catch for 1910 at 1,304,525 quintals, and states that the shortage was 426,475 partly made up by its high prices, which especially benefit-ed shore fishermen. Those on the oth and west coasts sold 30,00 quintals to American buyers at about \$7.50 per (dry) quintal, and shore fish sold in St. John's during the latter part of the year at an average of \$6 r quintal.

The catch of the shore cod fishery in 1910 amounted to 900,000 quintals, or 100,000 less than in 1909, the total value being estimated at \$4,700,000 for

The bank fishery, with 101 vessels aggregating 6,630 tons, had a catch of 144,524 quintals of dry fish, as compared with 181,450 quintals in 1909, and good prices were obtained.

The Labrador catch, however, was ne of the poorest on record, only 260,000 quintals being secured, as against 600,000 in 1909, a decrease in value of at least \$1,500,000. There were 12,800 persons engaged, and 1.-136 vesels and about 3,150 traps were in use. The quantity of codfish ship-ped from the Labrador coast direct to foreign markets was only 81,368 quls... as against 168,692 quintals in 1909 and 288,836 in 1908."



The 'longshoremen's Trade Council has voted to ask for the support of all the other transportation organizations in the district, including the Knights of Labour, which includes freight clerks and steamship carpenters. The steamship agents maintain that they can replace the strikers by strike-breakers, even if the full 6,000 affiliated men go out. Two thousand new hands from New York and Canada are handling the freight about the wharves, and further additions are arriving by every train The final vote upon the general strike will be taken to-night. A decision to go cut will have the effect at midnight of the strike-breakers being put to work on the liners now in port. It is thought that sailing may be delayed for a few days.




